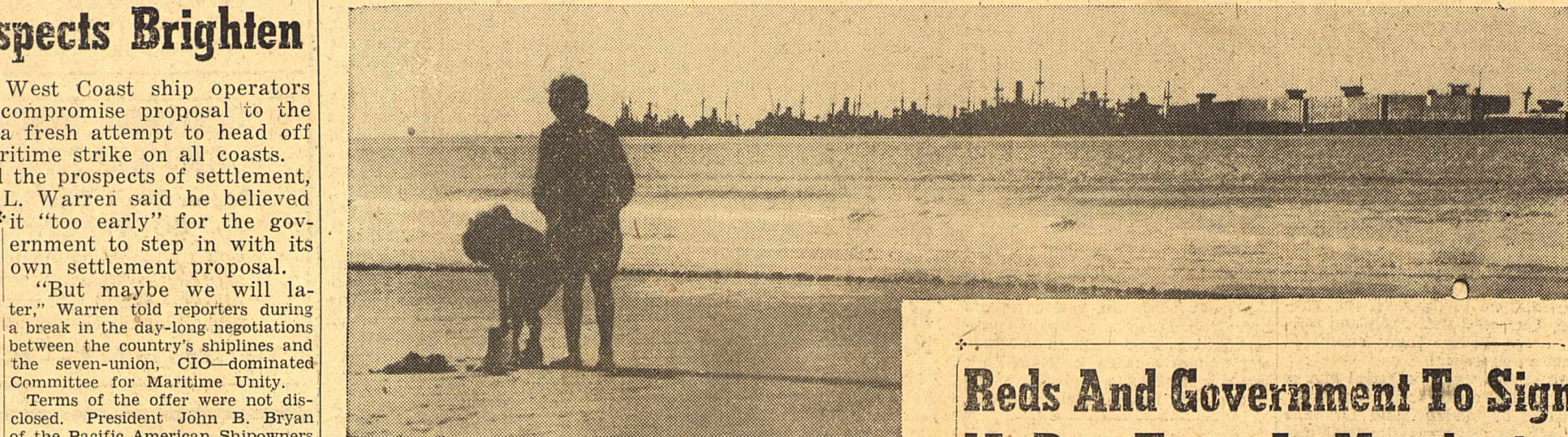

200 Are Injured As La Salle Burns After Mystery Explosions

CHICAGO—(P)—At least 58 persons were killed—many suffocated in their beds without being awakened—Wednesday in an early morning fire that swept through the 22-story La Salle Hotel in the heart of Chicago's Loop district.

Fire department sources estimated about 200 persons were injured.

Identified Dead In La Salle Fire

CHICAGO—(P)—The identified dead in the Hotel La Salle fire Wednesday as recorded at the Cook County morgue included:

Most of those who were burned had been housed on the third, fourth, fifth and sixth floors. Above the sixth floor, smoke and panic claimed their victims. At least 10 persons died as they leaped from their rooms and fell to the street or in a courtyard.

Of the 54 bodies which overflowed the county morgue—27 were listed as unidentified. On many of the bodies there were only a few fragments of burned clothing, which crumbled when touched. Most were clad only in negligees or robes.

Hard To Explain In addition three unidentified bodies—those of two young boys and a woman—had not been removed from St. Luke's Hospital to the morgue 12 hours after the blaze.

Fire Marshal Michael Corrigan, calling the fire the worst in his 35 years of experience and "one of the hardest to explain," said firemen had heard three explosions, spaced about a minute and a half apart, preceding discovery of the fire.

John Flanagan, chief house detective at the La Salle, said the fire started in the No. 5 elevator shaft. He quoted Detective Edward McNamara as saying that the operator of the No. 5 elevator rushed into the lobby and said there was fire in his pit.

Several persons with fire extinguishers went to the reported location of the fire, and the fire department was summoned, arriving in five or six minutes.

"But it was simply appalling, the way the fire spread," McNamara said. "In a twinkling the whole lobby was a mass of flames. From then on, everything was chaos."

Coroner A. L. Brodie called an inquest Wednesday morning, and said he would use prominent hotel managers and engineers for members of the jury.

Firemen and volunteers rushed into the hotel, to control the blaze, and assist the guests from the building. Smoke and heat rushed to the upper floors through the elevator shafts, permeating all the halls and filling the rooms. On the fourth floor, seven bodies were found in a crawling position. The victims had been headed toward a fire escape, and had been overcome on the way.

On a glass canopy were found the bodies of a mother and her child, arms banding one another. Both were burned beyond recognition.

The figures of many persons appeared in windows, as if they were planning to leap. Even as flame and smoke menaced those in the windows, firemen cautioned: "Sit tight—we'll get you out."

"Baby Born To Rescued Mother" Rescue ladders were quickly raised and more than 50 persons were rescued. Military police and shore patrol members banded together with police, firemen and other volunteers to stretch nets in the streets to catch those who chose to leap. One woman was carried down a fire escape by a fireman and rushed to Passavant Hospital. Almost on arrival, she gave birth to a baby.

"If only some of them had not been panicked, they might have been saved," said Fire Marshal Corrigan.

A temporary morgue was hastily set up in the City Hall, only a block from the hotel. More than 600 policemen were called to the scene. More than 50 Red Cross people assisted.

The hotel's register was destroyed in the fire and an emergency list of those who had not been injured was compiled by police, to aid in answering the pitiful pleas of those seeking loved ones.

Other Loop hotels quickly volunteered shelter for those driven from their rooms. Cots were set up in ballrooms, and other guests in the

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Legislation providing for a broad program of "military cooperation" with other Western Hemisphere nations was approved Wednesday by the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

LONDON—(AP)—Prime Minister Attlee charged in the House of Commons Wednesday that Russia had disregarded the spirit in which the Allies entered into the Potsdam Agreement. He spoke in a foreign affairs debate shortly after Winston Churchill, wartime prime minister and now opposition leader, declared that "the seeds of a new world war are being sown" in the Soviet-dominated areas of Eastern Europe.

was bottomed at 4,566 feet in lime, and was shut down for orders. It had cored through signs of slight porosity and oil stains, and of sulphur water.

Still Makes Hole
Argo Oil Corporation No. 1 Roberts, Southeast Reeves County wildcat, which has shown for some oil and gas production from the lower Permian, was making hole below 11,200 feet in sand.

Argo No. 1-E Jones, in northwest corner of east half of section 2, block A-6, ps1 survey, and three-quarters of a mile east of the discovery for Devonian production in the Jones Ranch field, in Northwest Gaines County, had penetrated below 11,380 feet, in hard lime, and was continuing.

No shows of oil had been reported and operator did not say that the Devonian had been reached.

Still Losing Returns
Argo No. 1 Mitchell, East Presidio County wildcat in section 40, block 1, TW&NG survey, had reached 5,356 feet, and was drilling ahead, with identity of the formation not reported. It was not getting returns on drilling fluid.

Cooper Gas Company No. 1-A Koy, north outpost to the Page gas field, in Schleicher County, and located at center of northwest quarter of section 38, block L, GH&SA survey, was bottomed at 5,700 feet, in the Strawn-Pennsylvanian, and was running 5 1/2-inch casing to the total depth, to cement it there. Operator plans to perforate and test in three sections between 5,340 feet and the total depth, where indications of possible gas or oil production had been logged.

nearby hotels shared their rooms with the displaced.

One fireman was killed and 20 to 30 were injured.

There were many stories of individual heroism. Taxicab drivers waiting at the hotel for fares went to the upper floors to assist. Walter Boris, an employe of the Chicago Elevated Lines, was credited with carrying 12 persons from the third floor.

Boris said that he came on one couple overcome in their bed. He carried them to the bath tub, covered them with wet towels and called help. Police then evacuated them on stretchers.

All streets were blockaded one or two blocks away from the hotel, situated at Madison and La Salle Streets, in Chicago's financial district, to keep back the thousands of spectators who gathered.

The hotel was built in 1909 and City Building Commissioner Paul Gerhardt Wednesday said it had never been cited for any violation of the building code. The Fire Prevention Bureau said a warning had been addressed to the hotel on May 10, listing 10 points which needed correction, and giving the hotel 15 days to comply. Chief John L. Fenn, of the Fire Prevention Bureau, said warnings had been issued on various instances since 1927, resulting in corrections by the hotel.

More Than 300 Attending Food Handler Course

The third day of the foodhandler's short course being conducted at the City Auditorium swelled the attendance to well over 300, it was reported Wednesday. The course is being taught by C. B. Breedlove of the Texas State Department of Health and will continue through Friday of this week.

The importance of keeping food protected from contamination by flies, rats, roaches and other insects was the subject of the Wednesday program. Films shown included "Vandals in the Night," "The Housefly," and "The Winged Scourge."

Breedlove pointed out that many cases of diseases such as dysentery, diarrhea, typhoid, paratyphoid, and food poisoning can be prevented if foods are properly stored and displayed.

"The common housefly," Breedlove said, "is one of man's most deadly enemies due to its filthy breeding places and habits of feeding. Flies and other foodstuffs left out on back bars or counters, and open sugar bowls attract the vagrant fly and are open invitations to disease. Customers should refuse to accept food which is not properly displayed or handled in a sanitary manner."

Thursday one of the most important lessons of the entire course will be presented. The lesson will deal with problems of the food business which affect every worker in food establishments. Housewives and others are urged to attend sessions at either 9:30 a. m. or 2:30 p. m.

Report Of Patch Testing Program Heard By Board

Approximately 250 pre-school children of Midland County have been given patch-tests for tuberculosis, and X-rays already have been made on all showing positive reactions.

Molotov As Accuser

The charges which Foreign Minister Molotov leveled at the United States and Britain in his report to the home folks on the Paris conference were not new. But heretofore Russia has usually been on the receiving rather than the giving end.

Accusations of "imperialism," of "pressure, threats and intimidation," of "a desire to impose their will" have been heard from both sides. And we of the western democracies, surveying the evidence along with the indictments, might be pardoned for believing that the shoe fits the Russian foot better than it does our own.

We cannot be sure whether Molotov and his government really do feel intimidated (they certainly don't act it) or whether they are seeking to excuse their own activities. It is quite possible that Molotov feels that all Russia's actions toward peace have been logical and reasonable. And that is one of the discouraging things about his speech. For if he is being candid, then the lack of understanding among the three great powers is re-emphasized.

It seems impossible that, in the face of Britain's offers of self-government to India and of withdrawal from Egypt and other empire outposts, Molotov should think that British imperialism is on the march. It seems equally impossible that, in the face of Byrnes's disarmament proposals, he should see in the presence of our troops in Japan and of a handful of soldiers in Iceland and Greenland a threat of "aggressive wars."

But perhaps Molotov began sensing threats and intimidations from the moment that America stopped granting Russia concession after concession and began suggesting that she act a little more like a member of the world community of nations and a little less like an ambitious empire on the make.

None of the great powers has been completely innocent of putting its own interests first at the previous fruitless meetings. But Russia has seemed least capable of abandoning nationalistic ways of thinking.

Yet, whether Russia really fears aggression or whether she is merely bluffing to get a free hand, she must see that the only sane solution is to alter her present aggressive, truculent diplomacy. Molotov's latest speech only makes clearer the fact that this will be a slow process of attrition.

But agreement will surely come. For, if the goal of any of the great powers is toward anything other than national suicide, it is the only solution.

A Sure Thing

The Pulitzer Prize which went to William L. Lawrence of the New York Times for his report on the atomic bomb development was, besides being well deserved, certainly the oddest journalistic award in the history of this famous annual bestowal.

Not only was the account of the Manhattan Project one of the greatest stories in history, but Lawrence, at the Army's request, was the only reporter who covered it. Lawrence couldn't miss, and neither could the trustees of Columbia University, who make the Pulitzer awards. It was the like figuring out the winner of the Kentucky Derby with only one horse entered.

Parking Meters Go Into Operation In Business District Here Thursday

Installation of parking meters was started in Midland Wednesday morning, and enforcement of parking regulations will be started Thursday.

Although no cars were marked Wednesday, a number of motorists dropped nickels into the meters during the day.

Police Chief Jack Ellington said that 503 of the meters will be in operation Thursday. Metered parking will be in effect from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. daily except Sunday.

Meters on the courthouse side of the square will be for two hours, and this amount of time may be purchased for one nickel. All other meters are of the one-hour type. Plates on the meters designate the type.

No meters will be placed on the west side of the courthouse, where all space is reserved for county officials, or on the half block in front of the post office, where a 20-minute zone will be in effect.

Areas where the one-hour meters will operate are on Main Street from Illinois to Front; on Texas Avenue from Main Street to the alley between Colorado and Big Spring; on Colorado from Illinois to Wall with the exception of the space reserved for county officials; on Loraine from Missouri to the alley between Illinois and Texas, and on Wall Street from Baird to Colorado.

Ellington warned that motorists who overstay their limit in a parking place will receive tickets and be subject to fines. Warning tickets will be issued for the first few days.

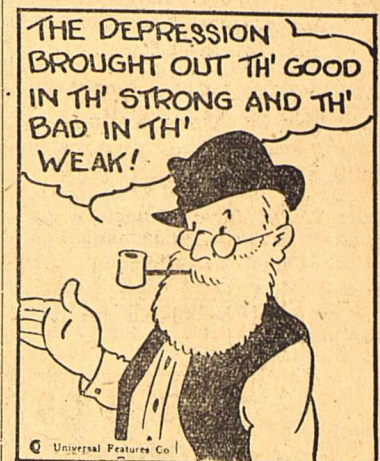
The police official also warned against tampering with the meters and depositing slugs instead of coins. He pointed out that city ordinance levies heavy penalties for such offenses.

The parking meters are being installed here on a trial basis in an attempt to remedy crowded traffic conditions in the business area.

Rainey Proposes Taxes On Oil, Gas To Finance Health, Schools, Roads

Bread Shortage Acute But Relief Is Expected In Two Or Three Weeks

CHICAGO—(AP)—Bread lines were forming in most of the nation's stores and bakeries as the country experienced its worst wheat shortage, but the Millers National Federation predicted relief in two or three weeks.

However, Herman Steen, executive secretary of the federation, said Tuesday "this is the worst week the millers will have" and added that from 80 to 90 per cent of the nation's flour mills will shut down for lack of wheat to grind into flour.

Scarcely any city escaped the pinch.

However, two factors pointed to an upturn. They were the new winter wheat crop, running 25 per cent above expectations, coming in in Texas and Oklahoma; and a plan by the Department of Agriculture to divert some foreign relief wheat stocks to the most acute domestic bread shortage areas.

Steen predicted the shortage would be considerably relieved by mid-to-late July as more of the new winter wheat chop reaches the mills. He said, however, "government red tape," shipping the grain from elevators to mills, getting the right "blend" for bread flour, and delivering the flour to bakers, all would require a time lag of two or more weeks.

SHERMAN—(AP)—Dr. Homer P. Rainey formally opened his campaign for governor here Tuesday night with a pledge that he would seek a formula for industrial peace in Texas if elected.

A few great financial groups have a stranglehold on the state, he told a crowd at the Sherman baseball park. Financial returns from Texas' great wealth of industrial and natural resources are going to a relatively few people.

"Our problem is to break this stranglehold," he declared.

As a solution he proposed millions in new taxes on oil, gas, and other natural resources to finance greatly expanded public health, welfare, school and road programs in Texas.

"Texas is a sleeping giant," he said. "I propose that we get from these natural resources and other resources enough tax revenue to give us a decent school system, a first-class health program, a good system of farm-to-market roads, and an adequate welfare program. We can do it."

Rainey advocated repeal of the state property tax, establishment of "the finest school system in America," including a first-class negro university, and 100 per cent cooperation with the federal government in building homes for Texas veterans.

He urged a law making it a criminal offense to transport black market lumber and building materials within the state. He promised an unceasing war on monopolies which he said were "drying up the opportunities for the little man."

Rainey proposed a one cent per thousand gathering tax on natural gas which he said would raise about \$20,000,000 a year. He said a one cent tax on oil would raise between \$8,000,000 and \$9,000,000.

"I do not believe automobile owners would object to an increase in gasoline tax if the money were used wisely to build farm-to-market roads," he said.

He said he did not believe those who drink or smoke would object to a tax on those commodities if the proceeds were used to build hospitals and finance a public health program.

Other planks in his platform included:

Appropriation of \$1 a year per person for a program of sanitation and preventive medicine. He said he did not believe in socialized medicine.

Appropriation of \$5,000,000 a year for grants to local communities to build hospital facilities.

A \$36,000,000 school program with a \$1,800 minimum starting salary for school teachers.

A \$35,000,000 yearly appropriation for welfare activities.

Strengthening of law enforcement agencies through both personnel and larger appropriations and "great discretion" in use of governor's pardoning power "when I am elected."

Worker Opens Fight To Unionize Pirates

PITTSBURGH—(AP)—Robert Murphy, a dark-haired determined man from Boston, opens his battle Wednesday to unionize baseball in the city which has been a keystone of the labor movement.

Murphy meets with Pittsburgh Pirate officials to make good his claims that "90 per cent" of the Pirate players are enrolled in the guild and to ask that the guild be recognized as their bargaining agent.

"If the Pittsburgh club refuses to recognize the guild," Murphy declared, "we will refer the case to the National Labor Board, requesting a hearing and an election to prove we have a majority."

Action about other ball clubs will not be taken until this case has been settled, Murphy added.

If successful, the union movement will give baseball its most complete change since Abner Doubleday invented it 107 years ago.

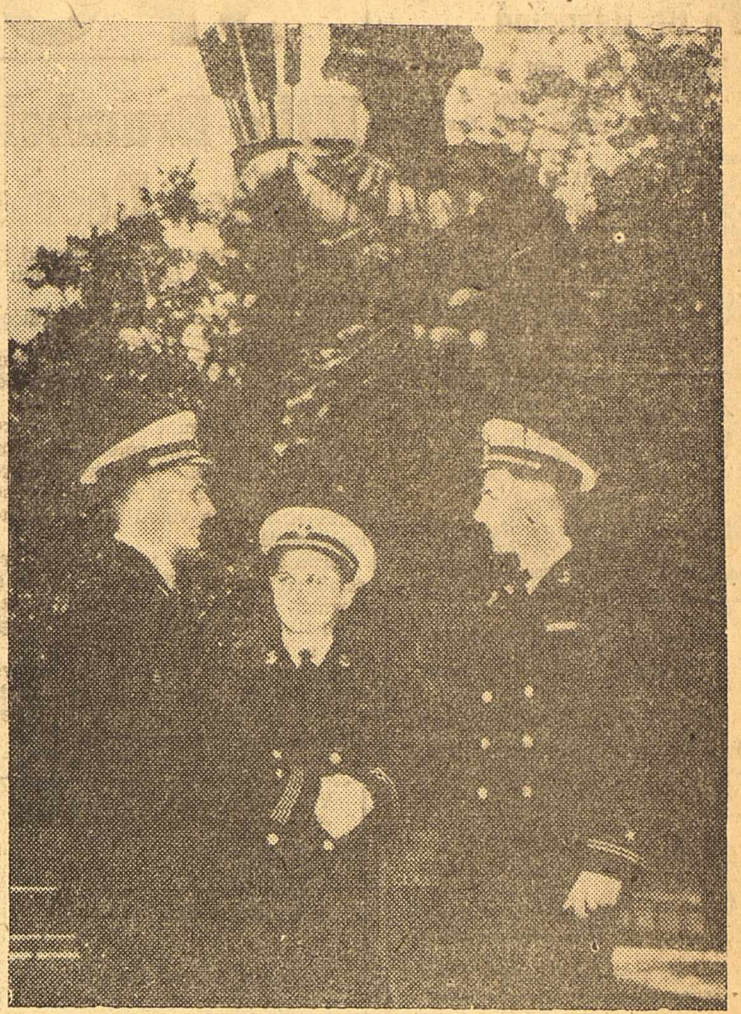

Stan Erskine was chosen vice-president and J. M. (Senator) McDonald, secretary-treasurer.

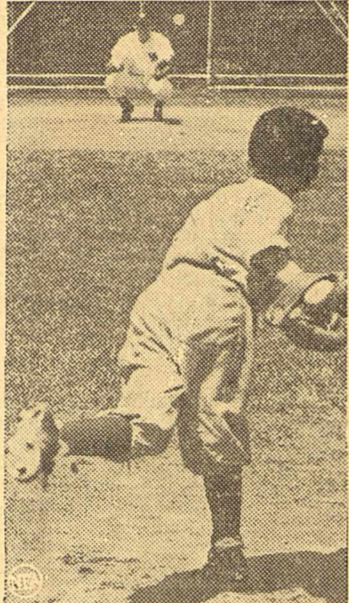
John Scrogin, retiring president, was appointed board director. The new officers probably will be installed at a July meeting.

With 118 Strikeouts Already, Feller Aims At Hall Of Fame's 343 Mark

Bobby Feller's amazing record of 118 strikeouts in 107 innings so far outdistances the field that his sole competition appears to be the dusty record books in the Hall of Fame.

With Hal Newhouser, the 1944-45 king, running a distant second with 75 victims and no National League hurler up to the 50 mark, Rapid Robert has only Babe Waddell's modern big league record of 343 at which to aim.

Feller might make it, too, for he's pitched but 12 games for the Cleveland Indians—approximately 30 per cent of his normal schedule of 40 starts. If he can maintain his early pace he will wind up with plenty to spare.

The Tribe has won but 19 games and the Van Meter, Iowa, speed-boy has captured eight, working 11 complete contests. The only time he failed to go the route he was lifted for a pinch hitter at Boston. Three times he has been hit hard but in every other start he has looked like just about the best pitcher in baseball.

Washington is a particularly fine vantage point to sign any Feller testimonials for the Senators have been the chief contributors to his soaring strikeout total. When he faced them for the first time this season, May 17, he whiffed 14 and Tuesday night he repeated the trick with 14 additional third strike victims in coasting to a 10-2 decision. Boston and New York maintained the status quo in the pennant "race" as the Red Sox trimmed the St. Louis Browns, 9-4, and the Yankees edged out Chicago, 2-1, leaving Joe Cronin's gang seven full games ahead.

Detroit presented a patched-up lineup that was good enough to hand the Philadelphia Athletics another trimming, 2-0, on Dizzy Trout's seven-hit chucking.

St. Louis clipped a half game off Brooklyn's National League lead but still trailed by 3 1/2 lengths after trimming Boston, 5-1, in a night game.

Brooklyn rallied to score three runs in the ninth inning of the second tilt at Pittsburgh and pulled out with a 7-6 "evener" in the 11th. Fritz Ostermueller southpawed the Pirates to a 4-3 victory in the opener when Hugh Casey threw a bunt-down ball wildly in the ninth inning.

Ewell Blackwell, Cincinnati's rookie mound ace, turned in a gaudy three-hit job on the Phillies, 5-0, facing only 27 men, for his third straight triumph.

The New York Giants touched Hooks Wise and Russ Meers for 15 hits but lost to Chicago, 3-2. Peanut Lowrey romped home with the tie-breaking tally in the eighth when he doubled, moved to third on a wild pitch by Junior Thompson and scored on Marv Rickert's fly.

The dark-horse long-shot closed with a great rush in the last 100 yards to overhaul Gulf Stream, the favorite and hope of 82-year-old Lord Derby for his fourth Derby triumph, and finish a length in front.

A furlong from home, Gulf Stream looked like the winner when the grey Airborne turned loose his finishing kick to sweep to the wire and pick up the \$32,062 winner's purse.

Running on a soft track, Airborne posted one of the slowest times for the mile and 885 yards—2:44 3/5.

Behind the two leaders at the wire was Tom Lilley's Radiotherapy, an 8 to 1 shot. Another outsider, Lord Durham's White Jacket, was fourth.

Airborne is owned by J. E. Ferguson, a plastic manufacturer with a small stable. The colt is trained by R. Perrymann who won the St. Leger last year with Chamosaire, and was ridden by T. Lowrey, each chalking up his first Derby triumph.

Hogan Clips Nelson's Rally To Win Goodall

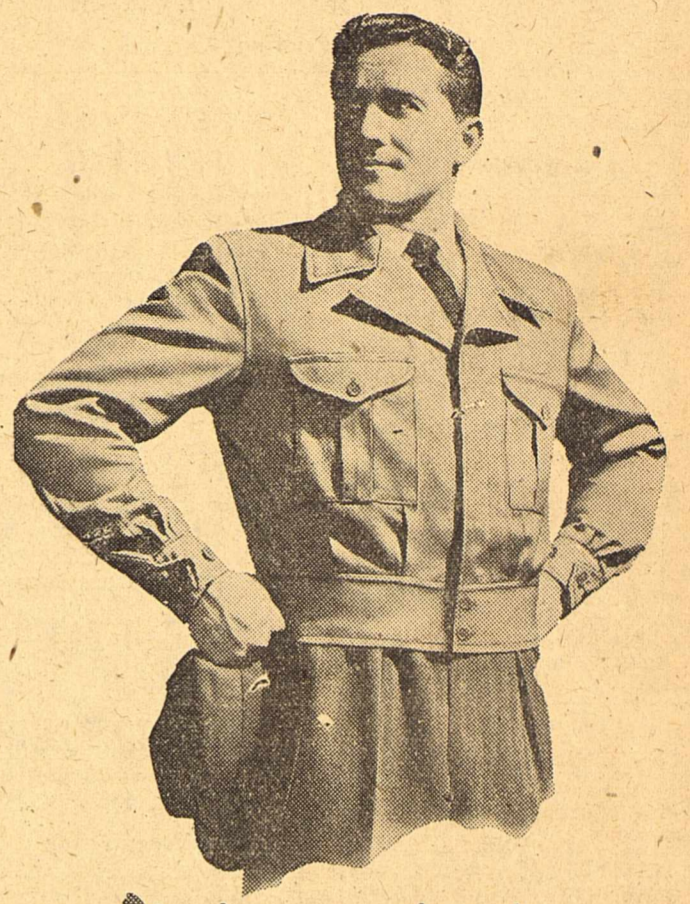
