Cloud-seeding's future still up in the air

The future of cloud-seeding here is still up in the air following last Wednesday's election in parts of Castro and four other counties.

On an area-wide basis, voters in the proposed target area favored the cloud-seeding proposal, 2,260 to 1,873, US Weather Observer with Castro County posting

'yes" votes.

But under the rules of the election, the boundaries are to be determined on a precinctby-precinct basis. Those precincts favoring the cloudseeding proposal could be included in the program, while those opposed must be exempted.

And in all four counties, the precinct-by-precinct results

The final vote in Castro County was 245 in favor of the program and 69 against. The issue carried in Precinct 6 by

the highest percentage of 134-24, in Precinct 7 by 16-8, in Precinct 10 by 41-7, and in Precinct 16 by 32-4. But in Precinct 11-the southwestern corner of the county-the

proposal was defeated, 26-18.

By counties, the issue carried only in Castro and Lamb, while it lost in Hale and Floyd. Hale County voters cast more than half of the total ballots in the election, opposing the issue by 1,264 to 1,150.





Program compliance is the most important area of ASCS programs you, as a farmer, are confronted with. This is true only if you want to be eligible for disaster coverage, deficiency payments and/or loan program benefits. To have a farm in compliance or out of compliance depends on your acreage report. Each farmer has a reporting tolerance of 1.0 acres of 5% of the reported acres not to exceed

Spot checks of recently certified wheat acres reflect that some farmers still play the guessing game. In some of these cases, a very small will cause the farm to be ineligible for all program benefits mentioned above for

Farmers have so much invested in farm equipment, land and the producing of the crops. The history of participation in the farm program in Castro County runs in the high 90 percent range which indicates most folks at least want the benefits of the program should they feel they

need them. Why take the benefits because you did not take the time to measure your

Do not rely on someone else's measurements, prior year measurements made by ASCS or even acreages you certified to in past years as to how many acres are in a certain field. Measure the acreages yourself unless you asked for measurement service through this office for the 1980 crop year. Again, this is the most important aspect of your program particcipation. Be prepared to report acres on a field by field

DISASTER PROGRAM

If you should lose or have wheat acreage on the farm lost any feed grain, cotton or wheat acreage, you should report the loss to this office prior to destroying the crop or making any other use of the land. Wheat or barley that has been damaged, but you will harvest for grain, may be eligible for low yield consideration. An application for disaster credit should be filed within 15 days after harvest.

Also, should you lose your feed grains or cotton and make application for disaster credit, this also becomes your acreage reporting date for that crop. The acreage report will be based on your own measurements. The point to be made here is he, who may have requested measuring service on the particular commodity and lost it to a hail storm prior to August 1 certification deadline, will need to measure his own acres in order to be able to make his acreage report at the time he files his loss. This is a full acreage report of the total crop acres and not just those acres which failed.



Hydroponic gardening is simple for kids

gardening — by growing your own bean sprouts at home.

It won't really be the same, but it will give you an idea of what hydroponic gardening means, says Dr. Rose Tindall Postel, a foods and nutrition specialist.

Hydroponic gardening means growing garden crops in water and feeding the plants with nutrients added to the water, she explains.

Dr. Postel, on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service suggests the following instructions, developed for kids ages nine to 12, from the "1979 Yearbook of Agriculture:"

jar, water and a little time. Wash a half cup of the beans, need soil, light and air.

Get a "taste" of hydroponic and soak them overnight in cold water.

Drain off the water. Punch holes in the lid of your screw-top jar. Put the beans in it and screw on the lid.

3. Put the jar in a dark place. Rince the beans with water and drain them two or three times each day. Each time, put the jar back in a dark place. Sprouts grow very fast - they'll be ready to eat in five days. They're really good in salads, or cooked with other vegetables.

Many children born to women who drink "excessively" while pregnant have shown recognizable patterns of physical and mental birth defects, known as fetal alcohol syndrome, she

Dr. Shirer, on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says that no one knows what the "safe" levels of drinking for a pregnant woman are. Hence, her advice - "Don't drink."

Since safe levels of drinking are unknown, pregnant women and those likely to become pregnant should discuss their drinking habits and the potential dangers with their physicians.

The "do's and don'ts" associated with pregnancy may seem overwhelming, but underlying all the advice and recommendations you get is this important message: WHAT YOU DO MAKES A DIFFERENCE, the specialist

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UETERAN'S SERUICES

By BEDFORD W. SMITH

County Service Officer If there is a copy on file of a Veteran's DD-214 or its equivalent (an AGO Form for WWII veterans or WWI veterans) on file in our office, burial benefits, including a burial flag can be expedited. This document, necessary for any VA benefit is the Veteran's Service Record which came with his or her discharge. It is part of the separation papers.

Veterans should remind their families periodically that the Veterans Administration can provide from \$450 to \$1,100 toward their burial expenses, according to Jack Coker, Waco VA Regional Office Director. The amount depends on whether the death results from a serviceconnected condition and whether the veteran is buried in a national cemetery.

Awareness of VA burial benefits can often spare the family of a deceased veteran both anxiety and financial hardship immediately following the veteran's death.

VA provides up to \$300 toward the burial expenses of eligible veterans and an additional \$150 as a plot or interment allowance if the veteran is not buried in a national cemetery or other government cemetery.

If the veteran's death is service-connected, VA will pay an amount not to exceed \$1,100 in lieu of the usual burial allowances.

Peacetime veterans with other than dishonorable discharges are eligible for burial in a national cemetery and for a headstone or grave marker. But peacetime veterans are not entitled to the burial or plot allowance unless they were receiving compensation payments or were discharged for disability

VA will also provide a headstone or grave marker for eligible veterans, and memorial markers will be furnished for certain members of the armed forces who die on active duty and whose remains are not recovered, or

who are buried at sea. An American flag will also be provided upon request for use in covering the casket.

With the exception of Arlington National Cemetery, burial is available to eligible veterans at all national cemeteries having space, and may also be authorized for an eligible veteran's wife or husband, minor children and, under certain circumstances, unmarried adult children
