## Pipe Set In Hale Wildcat; Tests To Be Run On Shows

Stanford Oil & Gas Company No. 1 E. L. Fisher, prospective discovery for a new oil field in Southeast Hale County, cemented 1-inch casing at 6,890 feet, over total depth of 6,992 feet, and was due to drill out the plug by the middle of the week, and start testing on the open hole which had shown some free oil, and considerable gas cut during drilling mud in driller's tests. Located 650 feet from south and west lines of section 5, block CL, EL survey, and about six miles northwest of Petersburg, this exploration is regarded by many observers as an extremely important development.

Shallow Wildcat  
C. S. Messinger filed application to drill his No. 1 prospectively as a 1,500-foot wildcat in North Pease County. It will be 1,650 feet from east and 2,310 feet from south lines of section 53, block 10, H&G survey. That puts it about 10 miles west of Imperial. Drilling with cable tools will start at once.

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 2-B E. P. Cowden, first well in the Dollar Hide field in extreme Southeast Andrews County to develop production from the Silurian, has completed for a 24-hour natural potential of 534.52 barrels of 43.6 gravity oil, from open hole at 8,345-65 feet. The official potential test was flowing through a one-quarter inch tubing choke. Gas-oil ratio was 270-1.

Gets Discovery Allowable  
Flowing casing pressure was 300 pounds and flowing tubing pressure was 550 pounds. As a new discovery, the well will be given a daily allowable of 180 barrels per day.

James C. Roberts of Fort Worth, completed another shallow producer from the Tobarg sand in the Pecos River bed in East Pecos County. His No. 15-B Pecos River Bed, three feet from the west bank of the river and 1,920 feet from south line of section 61, block 1, I&G survey, made a yield of 25.51 barrels of 26-gravity oil, pumping in five hours from pay topped at 98 feet and drilled to 101 feet.

Stanford Oil & Gas Company No. 10 Brown, northeast stepout from production in the Empress Holt field, in Southeast Winkler County, and about six miles south of Kernit, completed for a 24-hour flowing potential of 107 barrels, from pay at 4,805-17 feet, which had been treated with 1,250 gallons of acid. Gravity was 37 degrees and gas-oil ratio was 5,404-1.

Unofficial Report  
Stanford No. 1-TT University, Northeast Crockett County, well in northwest corner of section 12, block 39, University survey, was reported by unofficial sources to have taken a drillem test in the top of the Ellenburger at 8,085-8,182 feet.

No Shows Developed  
Humble No. 1 Blair, Southwest Kent County wildcat, in block 5, I&G survey, two miles southwest of the initial Ellenburger producer in the Polar field, was drilling below 7,880 feet in Ellenburger lime. Cores, and a drillem test from 7,813 feet to 7,835 feet, had failed to develop any indications of oil or gas.

Humble No. 1 Pinson, West Andrews flanker, filed application to plug and abandon production in the Nelson field, and 650 feet from north and east lines of section 13, block A-40, psi survey, was bottomed at 10,861 feet, in granite, entered at 10,829 feet, and was run to 5 1/2-inch casing to test the Ellenburger, between 10,647 feet and the top of the granite. Operator attempted several drillem tests on that zone while the hole was being made—but none of the attempts were successful.

## Twenty-Seven Die In Five Plane Crashes Sunday

Airplane crashes took a toll of 27 lives in the United States Sunday as only two of 29 persons in five planes involved in disasters survived.

Eighteen persons, 15 passengers and three crew members, died in the flaming wreck of an Eastern Airlines Detroit-Miami passenger plane which crashed during a rainstorm in hilly country near Galax, Va.

Two Crashes in Florida  
Five persons were killed when two planes collided over the Miami (Fla.) aviation center airport. One person was injured critically.

Another disaster in Florida cost the lives of two persons as an Army training plane crashed near Cocoa in Brevard County, Fla.

A two-seated private plane crashed near suburban Van Dyke, near Detroit, killing its occupants, an Army Air Forces veteran and a student pilot.

## St. Peter's Closed For Reconsecration

VATICAN CITY —(P)—An attempted suicide in St. Peter's Monday forced closing of the world's largest church briefly until it could be reconsecrated.

A 25-year-old Roman, shot himself in the temple with a revolver as he stood near a confessional booth. He was taken to a hospital in a grave condition. No reason for the attempt was given.

The church was reopened to the public after the ceremonies of reconsecration.
