## Pipe Set In Hale Wildcat: Tests To Be Run On Shows

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 E. L. ## **GOP May Create** Strong Foreign Trade Board

lican proposal to create a foreign board with power to veto State Department decisions on tariff cutting developed Monday from Senator Vandenberg's restatement of GOP international policy.

The Michigan senator told Cleveland audience Saturday night in his first speech since becoming chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee he believes Congress will continue the device of reciprocal trade agreements in one form or

another. Translating this into action, Sen-ator Brewster (R-Me) told a reporter he and Vandenberg may join this week in introducing legislato establish a six member board which could reject State Department proposals to whittle tarffs under the reciprocal program.

Program Under Attack

This program has been under sharp attack by some Republican leaders. Senator Wherry of Nebraska, the GOP whip, has insisted that no reductions in tariffs should be made until Congress itself passes on individual rates.

Any successful move in this direction by Wherry and others of like viewpoint would run counter to the general authority Congress has given the State Department to make tariff cuts to nations which give the same favors to this country. As it now stands, Congress cannot question the State Department's decision except by passing new legislation.

As Brewster outlined the proposal, it would involve setting up a board of six experts, two each representing agriculture, industry and organized labor. Interested parties could appeal to the board when they felt a State Department decision was unfair to them. The board would have no original power, however, to fix tariffs.

PARIS—(P)—The French govern-ment announced Monday that the liner Ile De France had sailed Sunday from Toulon carrying 8,000 troops to reinforce French forces now battling Viet-Namese Nationalists in Indochina.

Some disagreement over French policy in Indochina was in evidence neanwhile among socialist leaders ack from the scene of fighting in

JERUSALEM—(A)—Haifa's 95,000 inhabitants were held under virtual house arrest Monday by a British curfew imposed Sunday night after a violent explosion wrecked the city's police station, killing four policemen and injuring more than 142 other persons.

The casualty list showed two British policemen and two Arab temporary constables dead; 62 policemen -British, Arab and Jewish -hurt, one Briton severely;

## Familiar Pattern

Senator Owen Brewster has returned from Argentina with substantially the same conclusions about conditions there as Andrew Jackson Higgins brought back several months ago. Both the Maine senator and the New Orleans industrialist have nothing but praise for President

Brewster doesn't go as far as Higgins did in extolling the Argentine president and attacking our official attitude toward him. But he does call our policy "schizo-phrenic", and he presents General Peron as a man of energy and apparently peaceable intentions.

It may seem foolish to take issue, at a distance of some 5000 miles, with Brewster's recent, first-hand observations. Yet we cannot forget all the factors that went into the generally accepted portrait of General Peron as a Fascist-type dictator with Nazi sympathies.

We cannot forget the charges of former Ambassador Braden, who spent considerably more time in Argentina than either Brewster or Higgins. We cannot forget the State Department's White paper, ill-timed as it was. Nor can we forget the story of the Farrell-Peron dictatorship as told by American correspondents in Argentina, with their personal experiences of news suppression, official

dressings-down and threats of violence. We also are aware of how easily a strong government can arrange for an official guest to see only the right things, talk with only the right people, and carry away precisely the impression that the government wishes him

So we are deluctant to accept completely Brewster's assurance that all is peaceful, happy and democratic in Argentina. At the same time we are grateful to him for bringing back some remarks by Argentine businessmen which, to us, are highly significant and disturbingly familiar.

Brewster reports that they told him that "the alternative to Peron is chaos", and that last February's election, which put General Peron in office, was "the most democratic and fairly conducted election in Argentine history".

We seem to recall that Adolf Hitler also attained power by means of honest, free elections, and that he had substantial support from businessmen. Hitler's methods and philosophy were clearly visible in 1933, but apparently the businessmen were ready to trade the loss of individual freedom and national decency for order, discipline and stability.

The "democratic and fairly conducted election" of General Peron seems less important to us than the less fair and democratic events that led up to it. The threatened "chaos" seems less important than the alternative choice of the present government.

Fear of chaos has never frightened men who have loved freedom well enough to fight for it. Americans endured 13 years of chaos from Lexington to Washington's inaurguration. The French preferred the chaos of revolution to Bourbon tyranny. And the continuing chaos in Communist Russia must at least be preferable to existence under the Romanovs.

There must be many Argentinians, as freedom-loving and individualistic as Republican Senator Brewster, who do not share his views. For their sake, and for the sake GEORGIA ASSEMBLY MEETS of a world which remembers too well what a "freely elected" dictator is capable of, it scarcely seems wise to accept General Peron's political canonization on the meager evidence which Brewster and Higgins have gathered in their brief journeys.

### Editorial Responsibility

Henry Wallace, new editor of the New Republic, is no stranger to an editor's chair. He occupied one for 23 years, first as associate and then as chief editor of Wallace's Farmer. Yet it seems that agricultural journalism failed to give him a complete picture of the generally accepted duties of an editor.

When Bernard Baruch branded as false a New Republic story from Washington which identified him as one of the government string-pullers in the recent coal strike, Wallace replied: "He (Mr. Baruch) must know that I naturally had nothing to do with this story from Wash-

We don't see why Wallace assumes that Baruch or anyone else knows that. An editor naturally has something to do with every story in his magazine or newspaper, inasmuch as he traditionally accepts responsibility for what appears in his publication.

Editor Wallace is not Orator Wallace, responsible only for his personally spoken or written word. If he persists in the opposite belief, he may be in for some painfully embarrassing enlightenment in the future.

## Postal Receipts At Lamesa Drop In 1946

LAMESA—Lamesa's postal re-ceipts for 1946 totaled \$59,053.23 as compared with \$62,746.25 for 1945. Returning servicemen and a resulting slump in airmail postage is said by officials to be the main reason for the decrease. Although the 1946 receipts were

less than the year previous, they show quite an improvement over receipts 30 years ago. Records released by Owen C. Taylor show that the receipts in the Lamesa post office for 1916 were only \$5,166.19. They jumped to \$6,015.01 in 1917, the war year,

but slumped to \$5,881.59 in 1918. Two of the largest increases were n 1924 and 1942. In 1924 the total postal receipts jumped to \$21,825.99 from \$10,638.33 in 1923. After staying up in the \$20,000's for almost ten years, receipts dropped in 1931, 1932, 1933 and 1934. A low of \$15,768 was reached in the depression year

Receipts leaped from \$33,758.54 in 1941 to \$41,383.10 in 1942.







We hope to install well over 600,000 new telephones this year, and 78 more new buildings or additions will be started to house new equipment to handle telephone calls.

We plan to install 800,000 more new miles of such wire, and to build more farm telephone lines than before.

We'll add 150,000 miles of new long distance lines in 1947 and keep trying in every way we can to make all service still better.

It took a lot of work to get the results we report here-work beset by shortages and done under pressure. We wish we could have done more.

Many people are still without telephones, mostly because the backed-up demand for service keeps pouring in.




