

Talmadge Seizes Governorship

Henry Ford, II, Announces Reductions Of \$15 To \$50 On Ford Model Automobiles

DETROIT—(AP)—The Ford Motor Co. slashed car prices Wednesday and touched off immediate speculation in trade circles as to whether the action would be followed by its competitors in the low-priced field.

The competitors—General Motors for Chevrolet and Chrysler for Plymouth—withheld comment.

The cuts, ranging from \$15 to \$50 on the company's Ford models only, were the first to be announced by any car maker since the war; they were made in the face of repeated statements elsewhere in the industry that prices probably would go still higher before they could be reduced.

Wildcat West Of Fullerton Field Has O & G Signs

Stanford Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Young estate, about two miles west of the Fullerton field in Northwest Andrews County, has developed signs of oil and gas in a pre-Permian formation.

Located 660 feet from south and 1,994 feet from east lines of section 6, block A-48, psi survey, this prospect failed to get production in the regular Fullerton field pay above 7,250 feet.

It drilled to 8,478 feet and encountered soft drilling and some signs of oil and gas.

A drillstem test of unreported length, was run at 8,445-78 feet. Recovery was 180 feet of drilling mud and 80 feet of oil and gas cut mud.

Will Make More Hole
No water was reported. Official identification of the zone making the shows has not been released.

Some observers think it is in the top of the Devonian. Others are inclined to the idea that it is in the Woodford—or possibly is in lower Mississippian. The prospect is to make more hole.

Sun Oil Company No. 1-B McKinley, East Lea County, New Mexico, wildcat, between Hobbs and Lovington, and 2,310 feet from north and east lines of section 20-18-38e, had some slight oil stains and fluorescence from 7,695 feet to about 7,852 feet, in streaks in dolomite. The interval at 7,852-60 feet had fair porosity, stain and fluorescence. Operator was preparing to run a drillstem test at 7,895-7,880 feet. The formation has not been officially identified. If the section now being tested fails to make an oil well, operator will deepen.

Davis to Test Again
Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Davis, Northwest Scurry County wildcat, about six and one-half miles northwest of Snyder, and in southwest corner of section 339, block 97, H&TC survey, was on total depth of 8,002 feet, in Ellenburger lime, on which top had not been reported, and was to take a drillstem test.

A test was taken for 30 minutes at 7,958-82 feet. Recovery was 30 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil or gas reported.

Santa Fe Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Wheeler, East-Central Winkler County wildcat, in northwest corner of section 21, block B-6, psi survey, was to take a drillstem test at 9,770-10,100 feet, in the Silurian.

The Plymouth Oil Company No. 1-1 R. B. Cowden, South Andrews County flanker to Ellenburger production in the Andador field, and 660 feet from south and west lines of section 1, block 45, TP survey, T-2-N, ran a drillstem test at 8,667-87 feet, in the top of the Ellenburger.

Slight Shows
Recovery was 30 feet of oil cut drilling mud, and 30 feet of straight drilling mud. No water developed. The prospect was to core ahead about 29 feet, and try another drillstem test.

Stanford No. 1 Fisher, prospective discovery from the Wolfcamp, lower Permian in Southeast Hale County and in section 5, block CL, EL survey, six miles northwest of Petersburg, drilled out cement in seven-inch casing which had been set at 6,890 feet, over total depth of 6,992 feet.

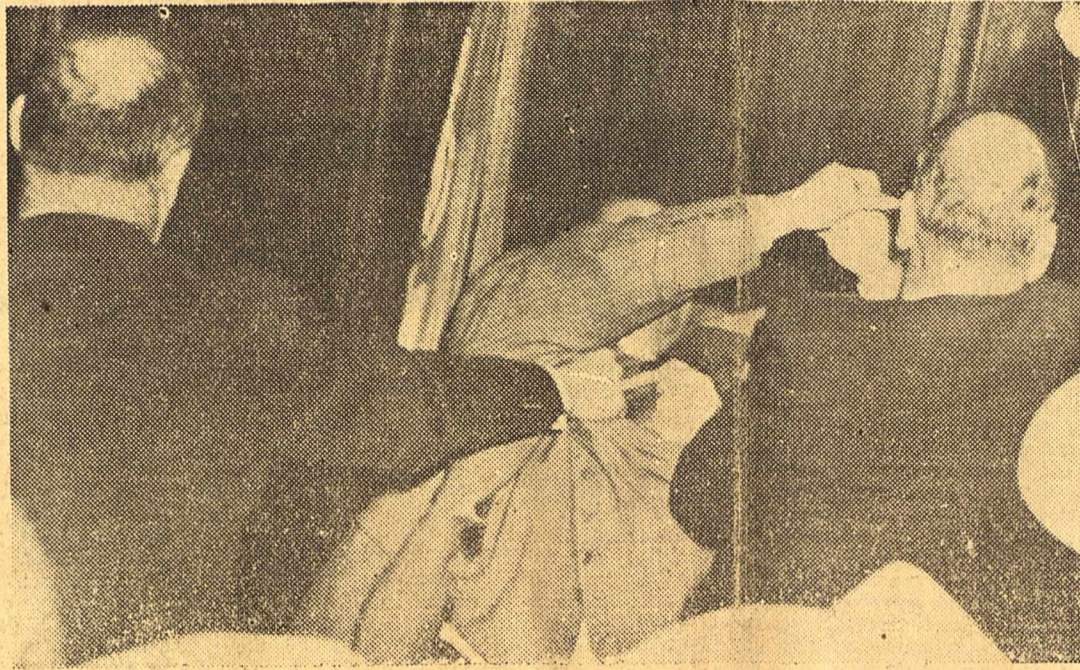
Swabbing to Start
Drilling mud had been replaced with water, and the water was to be replaced with oil. Operator was then to start swabbing on the open hole, to try to develop production from the streaks of saturated lime logged in that interval.

A. G. Classen Of El Paso Is Hired By Council To Develop City Water Project

City councilmen Wednesday voted to employ Ashley G. Classen, El Paso consulting engineer, who has handled a number of Midland projects to do the engineering work in developing the city's new water system on the Wadley section, which was purchased last week.

The project will include the gathering and piping of the water into the city. The Wadley section is a mile north of the city. When completed, the new system will double Midland's present water supply.

The council rejected the written request of George D. Geer of Sweetwater for a 50-year electric and power franchise here. Geer submitted a proposed ordinance granting him a franchise.

Petition Presented
A petition, bearing the names of approximately 175 citizens, asking the city to investigate and improve the drainage condition in "the sec-

tion of Midland south of the railroad" was submitted. Councilmen said consideration and study will be given the matter.

Mrs. W. T. Schneider, representing the Children's Service League, asked financial assistance in paying the hospital bill of a patient in which the league is interested. She told of the work and accomplishments of the organization and explained the league's interest in the case in which it seeks assistance. No action was taken.

REACH 1,982 MARK
Fire Chief Luther Tidwell discussed the needs of the fire department and recommended the purchase of a booster truck. Other needs mentioned by the chief included the employing of at least two additional paid firemen, and the purchase of a net, new hose and other equipment.

The council authorized Tidwell to purchase a stove and an electric refrigerator for the station living quarters.

Short Sessions Are In Prospect For House, Senate

AUSTIN—(AP)—Short sessions for both the House and Senate, then a long week-end recess were in prospect Thursday for the 50th Legislature.

The announcement of committee appointments in the Senate Wednesday completed its organization in rapid-fire time. The outlook was that committee assignments to the House would not be completed until the middle of next week.

The House completed action on its first two bills Wednesday, one appropriating \$350,000 for salaries and expenses of the session, the other authorizing judges of appellate courts to administer oaths of office.

Canvas Election Vote
The House set Monday as the formal canvassing of the general election votes in the governor's and lieutenant governor's race. It passed a concurrent resolution to this effect, and Senate agreement for the joint session was a foregone conclusion.

A steady flow of bill introductions continued in the Senate. They included a bill by Sen. G. C. Morris of Greenville requiring the licensing, inspection and regulation of hospitals and related institutions and creating a hospital licensing council. Hospitals now in operation would be given one year to comply with the new rules and regulations.

Proposes Graduate School
Sen. R. L. Proffer of Justin offered a bill appropriating \$125,000 for the next two years beginning September 1 to establish a graduate school of social work to train students who want to become health and welfare workers, at the University of Texas. A similar bill failed last session.

West Texans Named To Senate Committees

AUSTIN—(AP)—Four West Texans were named to Senate committees here Wednesday.

The appointees were H. L. Winfield of Fort Stockton, oil, gas and conservation; Pat Bullock, Colorado City, education; Dorsey Hardeman, San Angelo, federal relations, and Sterling J. Parrish, Lubbock, representative districts and stock and stock raising.

TOKYO—(AP)—A Japanese army captain's frank confession that he had ordered 37 French and Indo-Chinese soldiers, killed two French officers and two women with a revolver and raped a French woman was read to the International War Crimes Tribunal Thursday.

17-Year-Old Wins Bareback Riding Event At Denver

DENVER—(AP)—Casey Tibbs, 17-year-old cowpoke from Fort Pierre, S. D., who has only one year of rodeo competition under his belt, won the bareback bronc riding contest at Wednesday night's session of the National Western Show Rodeo.

In the steer wrestling event, Buckshot Sorrells of Tucson, Ariz., made the best time of the show to date when he tossed his animal in 6.6 seconds. R. L. Bland of Abilene, Texas, had the second best time of the week at 8.2 seconds.

It was a rough night in the saddle bronc riding contest, with three casualties. Ray Stark of Denver sprained a wrist. Bill Howard of Arco, Colo., was stopped on his horse and knocked out, and Texas Kidd of Burleson, Texas, received an ankle injury that put him out of action for the rest of the week.

Bill Linderman of Billings, Mont., won the event, with Byrl Joseph of Fort Worth, Texas, second and Frank Finley of Phoenix, Ariz., third.

Stanley Gomez of Napa, Calif., won the calf roping contest with a time of 25.1 seconds. Sonny Edwards of Big Spring, Texas, was second in two events.

Winners in the bull riding event were Wag Blessing of Glendale, Calif., first; Tommy Cahoe of Newhall, Calif., second, and Johnny Spruell of Canadian, Texas, third.

His announcement followed the action of State Democratic Chairman Robert W. Calvert in recognizing Miss Edith Wemple, choice of the so-called conservative group as the legally elected national committeewoman of the youth group in Texas.

Neither faction of the Texas Young Democrats, who split into rival groups at the state convention in November, now possess a charter

Midland Council Adopts Ordinance For City Manager

The office of city manager of Midland was created Wednesday afternoon when members of the City Council meeting in regular session, adopted on the second and final reading a city manager ordinance which was passed on the initial reading at the December meeting.

The ordinance also prescribes the powers and duties of a manager. Mayor Fred T. Hogan and Councilmen John P. Butler, S. M. Erskine, Frank Stubbeman and Don Davis attended the meeting. Councilman Robert I. Dickey was absent.

The council for several months has considered the employment of a manager to administer the city's affairs which have become extremely heavy with the rapid growth and expansion of Midland.

No indication was given by council members as to when a manager would be employed.

Vocational Service Is Urged By Rotary District Governor

W. Aubrey Stephenson of Abilene, Rotary International district governor, Thursday urged Midland Rotarians to stress vocational service in their program for 1947. He addressed the Rotarians at their meeting in Hotel Schaubauer.

He declared America has become the leading nation of the world because of its great industrial machines and their large production. "This machine is stalled," he continued. "We have industrial unrest."

Stephenson also discussed problems of distribution. Lists Accomplishments.

He told of the part played by Rotarians in the United Nations conference in San Francisco and asserted Rotary has the greatest program of service in the world next to the church.

Stephenson said Rotary now has almost 6,000 clubs and 290,000 members and is in 84 nations of the world. He reiterated the aims and objects of Rotary.

The district governor was introduced by Fred Wemple, a past district governor. Richard Brooks was program chairman, and Guy Breneman, vice president, presided.

W. A. Thomas, a new member, was introduced by Percy Bridge-water. Breneman announced that Wallace Wimberly, Tom Sealy and W. H. Fryer would serve on the program committee in February.

Son Of Former Governor Elect Is Backed By National Guard, Police

ATLANTA—(AP)—Herman Talmadge, in a pre-dawn coup backed by National Guard officers and state highway patrolmen, seized Georgia's executive department Thursday and denied Ellis Arnall admission to either the governor's office or the official residence.

Arnall arrived at the executive offices Thursday morning to find Talmadge in the chambers Arnall had occupied all day Wednesday. Later when Arnall went to the executive mansion to the executive mansion for lunch, he was met by four state patrolmen, who blocked his entry.

"This completes, it seems to me, the capture of the state government as far as physical properties are concerned," Arnall told newsmen.

"It has been done by gradual military infiltration, so that at the moment storm troopers are in control. . . . You have seen a military coup d'etat seize the governor's mansion, private office and automobile."

Shortly after Arnall made his statement to newsmen and left the mansion, the troopers admitted Mrs. Herman Talmadge and her two children to the residence.

Arnall set up a personal office in the rotunda of the capitol building and announced that his secretarial staff would be quartered in a downtown office building.

Charges Dictatorship
He has been going on for the past four years and contends he is still the executive because of what he describes as illegality of legislative action in naming Talmadge to the term his father, Eugene Talmadge, was prevented by death from accepting. Had Eugene lived he would have been inducted Wednesday.

Arnall charged that Talmadge was attempting to rule the state under a "military dictatorship."

Talmadge attaches took over the executive chambers early Thursday after locks had been removed from the doors. Arnall had sat in the chambers Wednesday while Talmadge occupied another office in the executive suite less than 20 yards away. National Guard officers were stationed outside the chambers after Talmadge took over.

Both Arnall and Talmadge have appointed adjutants general. Arnall has R. W. Collins, former commander of the state guard, and Talmadge has Marvin Griffin, who resigned his commission under Arnall to accept the Talmadge appointment.

West Texas Crude Allowable Is Cut

AUSTIN—(AP)—The Railroad Commission Wednesday boosted the crude oil allowable for February 11,684 barrels daily above that of January 11, issuing a statewide oil proration order designed to produce 2,042,500 barrels daily in the coming month.

All districts, except number 8 in West Texas, received allowable hikes. District 3 on the Gulf Coast was granted the largest increase, 40,764 barrels more per day than on January 11.

The East Texas field proper enjoyed a raise of 31,141 barrels more per day.

Retention 22 producing days in the 28-day month will be the chief contributing factor to the increased production. The East Texas field also remains on 20 days.

Commission Chairman Ernest O. Thompson said District 7C in West Texas would be on the statewide schedule of 22 producing days, with its February allowable set at 35,060 barrels daily, an increase of 2,454 barrels over the January daily permissive.

Governor To Ask Emergency Laws

AUSTIN—(AP)—Gov. Coke Stevenson said he will send to the Legislature Thursday these matters for emergency legislation:

1. Redistricting.
2. Rural teacher salary raises.
3. Amendment of the aeronautics law.
4. Establishment of a negro university.
5. Additional appropriations for state departments.

Stevenson said he would also send up for Senate approval all the appointments he has made since the Legislature last met.

He said only three departments have applied for deficiency appropriations: the adjutant general's department, the industrial accident board, and the board of directors for A. and M. College.

Muldrow arrived for the visit Christmas Day and became ill about two weeks ago.

He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Perkins and Mrs. Ralph D. Young of San Antonio.

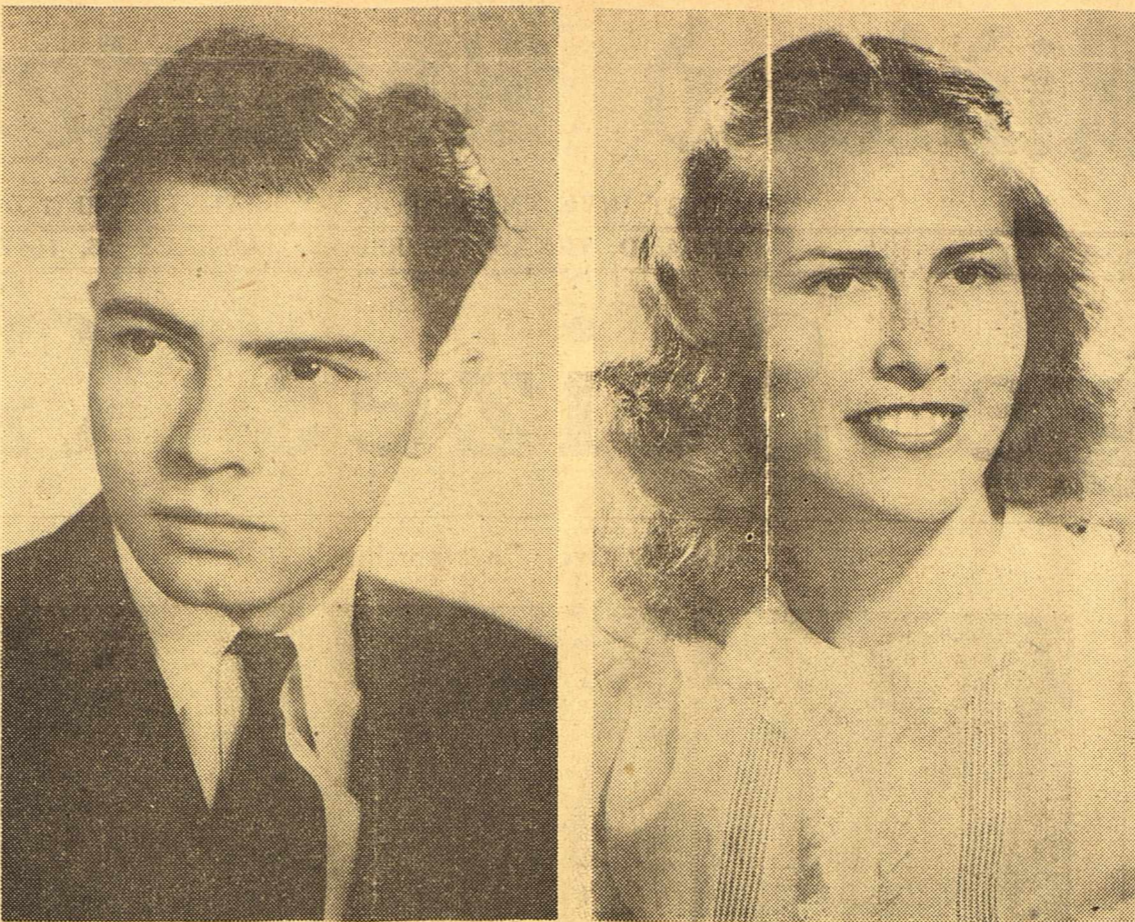

INDUSTRY IN CLOVER

In the Panama Canal Zone, a large industry has been built around the growing of four-leaf clover, most of which are shipped to the United States.

ture within one degree of 68 degrees during hot Summer months. This temperature control equipment assures uniform quality and fine grain results. **Film Still Scarce**—The Rubins think Midlanders' enthusiasm for photography is great. The shortage of cameras and films prevent more interest, they said. Professional film is still very scarce and all film and equipment are hard to get. The film situation has improved some recently and Rubin believes all types of films will be available by March. The Midland studio will stock every type film when it is possible.

Equipment not carried by the studio will be ordered for the customer. **Three Weeks Service**—The studio gives three weeks service on portraits and 24-hour service on photo finishing. During 1946 the studio did approximately 1600 sittings plus the photos for the Midland High School annual. The annual pictures have been made by the Midland studio every year since 1942. In 1941 the studio did a part of them. The Midland Studio and Camera Shop is the only one in Midland which offers photo finishing and identification and application service.

Midland Plumbing Company Busy

Swamped with previous requests and beset with new ones, brought on by the recent cold wave, one of the worst in the city's history, the Midland Plumbing Company with its staff of competent workers has been working day and night. The company, located at 203 South Main Street, is owned by C. E. Smith. Smith stated that the company was pushed to the limit for its services and the demand for aid reached the peak immediately after Christmas. "We started off the new year swamped with work," said Smith, "but we maintained an emergency crew throughout the cold period. The plumbers worked all hours of the day and under the most trying conditions, but I am happy to say that we came through with satisfactory results." Bursted pipes were the main causes of demands for plumbers the company reported. Some homes in the city still are without water even this week and the company is servicing at full speed. Texas Open Golf Match Reaches Big Money Class

SAN ANTONIO—(P)—The Texas Open, which 26 years ago brought golf into the "big money" class, finally has boosted the take to \$10,000—one of the last tournaments to reach what has been established by the PGA as a minimum.
It was in 1922 that the Texas Open blossomed forth with a purse of \$5,000, an amount unheard of in the field, this country, at that time. It has a warm spot in the hearts of the professionals because it brought the game out of the "chicken-feed class" where several hundred dollars top money was considered good.

Thus the open became the cradle of the winter links swing and that is why most of the big shots of golfdom show up here each year.
The Twentieth Annual Texas Open will be held February 7-9 and 350 players are expected to be in the field, this counting those who will shoot qualifying scores February 4. All former Texas Open, National Open, PGA championship and national amateur championship winners automatically qualify, also the first 30 in the 1946 Texas Open and the first 30 in the 1946 National Open along with the first eight in the PGA, the present national public links champion and the Texas amateur champion. There will be 50 places open to pros and amateurs who are not exempt from qualifying.

The reason it is the twentieth instead of twenty-sixth Texas Open is because the event missed five years since Bob McDonald captured the first tournament in 1922.
Last year, when the prize money was \$7,500, Wee-Ben Hogan snared the title. Hogan will be back, favored to win it again and become the second man in history to take top money twice. Bill Melhorn turned the trick in 1928 and 1929.

Texas A And M Council Considers Coaches Situation

COLLEGE STATION—(P)—The Texas A&M College Athletic Council is considering the coaching situation but says C. W. Crawford, council chairman:

"If anybody connected with the college, athletic department or athletic council has contacted anyone I do not know it."

Crawford issued the statement in connection with a report from Atlanta that J. V. Sikes, former A&M athletic and now assistant coach at the University of Georgia, might be named head coach of A&M succeeding Homer Norton.

There has been considerable agitation among the college alumni regarding replacing Norton, whose teams the past several years have failed to be consistent winners. Last season the Aggies won four while losing six.

Norton has a contract with more than three years to run. To dispense with his services A&M probably would have to pay him for that time.
Crawford said the council had met several times to consider what "might be worked out for next year but thus far nothing has worked out." He did not indicate what changes, if any, were being considered.
Sikes' name has been linked with the coaching situation here on several occasions but not from an official source.
