Marshall Will Take Office Tuesday

To Be Drilled On Die In Accidents E-C Concho Block Over Weekend

An Ellenburger wildcat is to be drilled shortly in East-Central Concho County on a 6,000 acre block assembled by R. C. (Russell) ing for five deaths.

The exploration will be drilled by Hedrick Oil Company of Wichidrilling to be underway by May 1. to death Sunday at her home near It is expected that the project will have to go to around 2,500 feet to reach the Ellenburger.

Hedrick To Drill Well The block is on a magnetometer and sub-surface high and is in the Salt Gap area north of the Brady-San Angelo highway. Hedrick has a three-quarter interest in a twoling, Arick and Conkling have a quarter interest in that two sections. Hedrick is to carry the full cost of drilling the well.

The rest of the acreage is owned half and half by the two interests. The block includes the D. G. Bishop and J. A. Ables properties, along with several small tracts which adjoin and surround those leases.

Sun Oil Company No. 1-B Mc-Kinley, East-Central Lea County wildcat, between Hobbs and Lov-ingen and 2,310 feet from north and east lines of section 20-18s-38e, ran a two-hour drillstem test at 7,695-7,860 feet. There was a blow of air throughout the period.



Dangerous Clarity

It's not surprising that our prolonged industrial strife, which has had practically everyone talking to himself at one time or another, should have made itself felt in even the most academic precincts of our colleges. Among those affected is Dr. Rudolph Flesch of New York University, the man who devised the formula for measuring the readability of written material.

As his contribution to industrial peace, Dr. Flesch proposes readable union contracts. He boldly suggests writing these agreements in such a way that even union members and junior executives can understand what has gone on during negotiations, and what has come out of

Among his suggestions are these: Use sentences of less than 20 words; eleminate "whereases" and other legalistic jawbreakers; substitute "company," "union" and "workers" for "employer" and "employe"; analyze and describe in detail all procedures in the agreement; give practical examples of rules stated in abstract terms; use large type, headings and subheadings, and other visual aids to readability.

It's a grand idea, but we fear that it will get nowhere. For if we are to have readable union contracts, then why not readable contracts of all sorts? From there it would raids. be only a step to readable briefs and pleadings. But before that step was taken, we're sure the lawyers would be up in arms.

The Lawyers Guild might even accuse a union which signed a readable contract of betraying organized labor and creating unemployment. For think how much work the legal profession would lose if it were not permitted to take the straight and simple talk of two contracting doubtedly reached the hands of the parties, translate it into an English which only lawyers Franco authorities. undersand, then retranslate it so that the parties of the first and second parts could be sure that the contract actually said what they intended it to say.

That, we grant you, is a form of made work. But if the courts have decided that it's all right for Petrillo's union musicians to demand and get pay for services which their employers don't need or want, then why should lawyers be denied a similar privilege?

Nor are the lawyers the only ones potentially affected. If this readability thing really got started, it might even extend to the United Nations. No Time To Buy

The Agriculture Department's Bureau of Agricultural Economics has hoisted a storm warning which American farmers cannot afford to ignore. This is no time to buy farm land, says the bureau, and it goes on to tell why not in statistics of dire implication.

Farm land values went up another 14 per cent during the year ending last November 1, and they are now only 11 per cent below the 1920 peak. In 15 states they have more than doubled since the 1935-39 period, and in 11 others they have reached a point 75 per cent above what they were less than 10 years ago.

What this means is, of course, as Secretary of Agriculture Anderson points out, that unless the brakes are fast applied to credit buying, farmers are in for another land crash such as struck them in 1920-21. And this time the blow may be even more severe, for more people have gone into debt to purchase farms in each of the last four years than in any other year since 1920. Farm mortgages went up an additional \$80,000,000 in the first six months of 1946, with the result that the total indebtedness of

American farms now stands at \$5,000,000,000. Farmers now enjoying good incomes would do well to follow Secretary Anderson's advice by putting a little away for the rainy day when crop prices will come downand the value of the additional land they covet will slide proportionately—and by using excess money to retire debts and replace worn-out equipment.



Q. What educational benefits do I get under the GI Bill of Rights?

A. If you serve honorably on active duty for a period of 90 days, one day of which is served between September 16, 1940, and the date of termination of the present war, or you are discharged because of an actual service-incurred injury or disability incurred within that first 90day period, you are, upon discharge, entitled to one year of education in the college, trade or business school of your choice for which you can qualify. In addition, each month of active duty, including the first three, prior to the end of the war, entitles you to another month of post-service education, up to 48 months. Your tuition, laboratory fees, etc., up to \$500 per ordinary school year will be paid by the government. Also, you will receive \$65 a month living allowance; \$90 a month if you have dependents.

O. What about family allowances?

A. For men enlisting or reenlisting now, family allowances will continue until six months after the war is officially ended.

Q. What are my chances of going overseas? A. If you enlist for 3 years, you may select to serve in any overseas theater which has openings, especially Japan or Korea.

Can I still choose the branch of service Q. I want to serve in? A. Yes. You can pick any branch which has

A. Yes, you can, if you reenlist for a 3-year term within 20 days after your honorable discharge.
