Pure To DST On Slight Oil Shows In Pecos Wildcat

By JAMES C. WATSON Oil Editor

Slight oil stains and slight signs of porosity were logged at The Pure Oil Company No. 1 Oates, Central-West Pecos County wildcat, about 20 miles southwest of Fort Stockton, in a section at 1,230-70 feet, and operator was to run a drillstem test to check that formation for possible production.

Bender Proposes 25 Per Cent Slash In US Spending Jester Asks Budget Hike

WASHINGTON -(AP)-Representative Bender (R-Ohio), proposed Tuesday that Congress slash spending for "normal government functions" 25 per cent below the 1932 outlay.

"I want to do what President Roosevelt promised to do in his first campaign for president," Bender told reporters as he announced that he is preparing legislation to carry out this latest economy sug-

Bender did not make clear immediately how much of a saving his proposal might effect if adopt-

Appropriation Increase Of \$88,140,789 Is Urged In New Governor's Program

AUSTIN —(A)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester Tuesday recommended to the Legislature increased appropriations of \$88,140,789 in the next two years for expanded state services in many fields, to be financed without new taxes from the present general revenue fund surplus and from anticipated increases in all state revenues.

Jester, holding firm to his campaign pledge not to ask for new taxes, said he estimated there would be \$100,-897,807 in new money available for expenditure by the 50th Legislature.



Place strips so that pattern motifs jibe correctly and glue down with regular wallpaper paste. For a final eye-catching touch, you can line cabine lrawers to match. Refurbish Room

Take that room which needs allout refurbishing from the bed to the wastepaper basket. What will do the trick with little strain on a budget are motifs cut from boldly patterned paper, decal-fashion and used as professional decorators do to smarten up tables, head-boards, lampshades, et al. A room that has been freshly repapered with a floral pattern can go rug-less indefinitely if matching cutout motifs are clustered to simulate scatter rugs, garlands are casually strewn on the floor.

Cut-outs will cling like the proverbial paper on the wall to painted, varnished or linoleum-covered ed off with steel wool before the
