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**Electric Brush Is Lazy Gal's Dream**

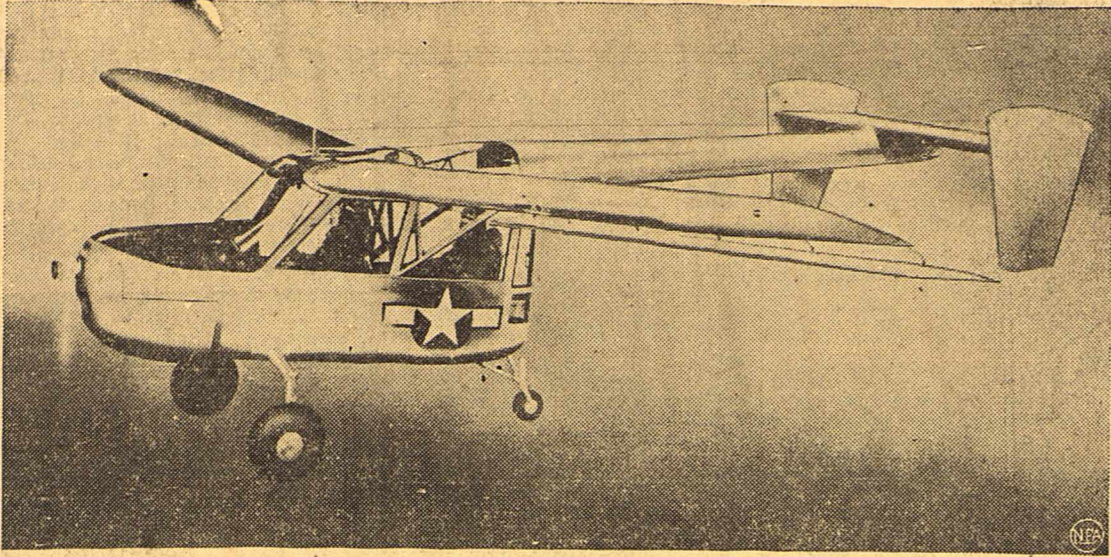

When attached to its motorized top and plugged in to an electric outlet, the brush goes into high-speed gyration that permits every tuft to rotate individually for scalp massage.

**USES Head Foresees High 1947 Employment**

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Robert C. Goodwin, director of the U. S. Employment Service, said he foresees continuing high employment for 1947.

Goodwin told a reporter his agency's survey of year-end job conditions shows slight rises in unemployment in a number of sections. But he said he was confident these are mostly seasonal and to be expected.

"I believe employment will remain high throughout the year," he said. "There is no indication in the labor market of a drop in total employment."

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**U. S. Army Ski Instructors Return To Civilian Jobs Of Teaching Winter Sports Fans At Famed Sun Valley**

SUN VALLEY, IDAHO —(AP)— The men who taught a fighting army how to ski are on their way back to fun jobs—instructing winter sports fans at famed Sun Valley.

The resort's ski teachers were prominent among Army instructional staffs that in seven months trained and later put into action the Tenth Army's specialized Mountain Division, which fought in Northern Italy on skis and snowshoes.

Virtually every member of the pre-war teaching staff saw action—most with the Mountain Division. Friedl Pfeifer, director of the resort's ski school and national open slalom and downhill titleholder in 1940 and 1941 was technical adviser for the Division during upland maneuvers in Western states. He taught skiing and rock climbing and tested war equipment under simulated battle conditions.

**Overseas In 1945**  
He went overseas in January, 1945 as an assistant squad leader after declining an assignment to officers' candidate school. The Mountain Division went into the front lines at once at Mt. Belvedere and was in action almost continually until April, when Pfeifer was among the wounded in the final drive to push the Germans from Italy.

Sigi Engl, 1942 national slalom champion, reached Italy that winter with the division. His first glimpse of the front line after moving up during the night, was of the Abetone, Italy terrain where he had won his last ski race before coming to the United States in 1936. A native Austrian, he twice was all-around champion of his country; won the Italian Open; the French slalom, and at Abetone took the Prince Umberto cup.

**First Instructor To Go**  
Karl Hinderman, of Montana, first of the resort's instructors to don a uniform, became the first ski instructor in the Army. He went overseas in time to participate in the final push at the Po River Valley.

Freddy Pierron, formerly private instructor for King Leopold of Belgium and a Swiss by birth, saw American service both as a frontline instructor of mountain combat troops and as a special agent with the Counter Intelligence Corps.

He won the Austrian slalom and downhill championships last winter in a meet open to American troops and then competed throughout Europe as a member of the U. S. Army ski team.

Andreas Hennig, a veteran teacher and the first sportsman ever to climb Mt. Ranier on skis, taught at Camp Hale, Colo., and then went to Italy as a combat instructor.

**Won Two Medals**  
He won both the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star for dragging a wounded man to safety while himself injured by the same direct shell hit. He recovered and saw more action with his outfit, and after the war climbed Austria's highest mountain, Grossglockner.

A Marine staff member saw service in the Pacific. Floyd Dupuis served with a fighter squadron in the Solomons and Marianas.

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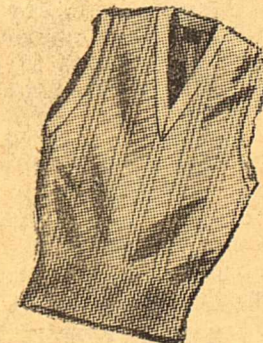

# McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

That carelessness is a definite weakness in a player's game is a remark often made by B. Jay Becker of New York, winner of the national open pair championship with Sidney Sidor of Philadelphia. He refers to the fellow who says, "I pulled the wrong card" or "I meant to play a club." Becker is a slow, deliberate player, avoiding carelessness in any form.

In connection with today's hand, Becker pointed out that it is easy to count the East hand and failure to do so is simply carelessness.

The careless player would trump the third diamond, pull two rounds of trumps, take three rounds of clubs and then take the spade finesse. When it loses, he would go down one, as he still must lose a spade trick.

Becker points out that the hand can be counted down easily, because West shows out on the third round of diamonds, indicating that East had six diamonds. East follows to three rounds of clubs and two rounds of hearts; therefore he cannot have more than two spades. The correct play is to lead a spade and go up with dummy's ace, return to the South hand with a trump and lead a small spade. When West plays low, dummy's queen is played. West has the king, the queen will win; if East has the king, which is the case, he will not have another spade to return and must give declarer a stiff and a ruff.
