

Italy Signs Peace Treaty With Allies

Shows Indicate Second Producer In N-W Coke Area

The second producer from the crinoidal section of the Pennsylvanian has been indicated in the Silver area of Northwest Coke County.

That development is Sun Oil Company No. 1 Fred Jameson, one quarter of a mile south of the initial producer in that region.

Located 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 15, block A-1, H&TC survey, the prospector topped the crinoidal at 6,136 feet, on an elevation of 2,065 feet.

High To Discovery

According to some geologists, that puts it 49 feet high to the same point in the discovery well, Sun No. 1 Allan Jameson, which completed from pay at 6,225-45 feet.

No. 1 Fred Jameson had good shows of gas from 6,141 feet to about 6,170 feet. A core at 6,170-90 feet, recovered only three feet of lime. The material showed some indications of oil. Operator was taking a drillstem test Monday morning. Packer point for the investigation had not been reported.

Santa Fe Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Wheeler Central-East Winkler County wildcat, about 12 miles east and slightly south of Kermit, and 660 feet from north and west lines of section 21, block B-6, psi survey, which had been shut down at 11,010 feet in the Simpson lime and shale, for about a week, is being deepened.

Will Go To Ellenburger

It is to be carried to 12,000 feet, unless it gets the Ellenburger at a higher level. Drilling had reached 11,054 feet, at last report, and was continuing.

Texas Gulf Producing Company No. 1 Rio Bravo Oil Company fee, extreme Southeast Crane County prospector, in section 7, block 31, H&TC survey, entered the Ellenburger at 5,801 feet, on an elevation of 2,390 feet.

It is drilled to 5,836 feet and took a one-hour drillstem test at 5,801-36 feet. Recovery was 160 feet of drilling mud with no shows of oil or water. Operator plans to drill ahead a short distance and try another test.

Found Water

Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Company No. 14-E Jackson, Devonian discovery on the Fullerton field, in Northwest Andrews County, and 810 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 17, block A-32, psi survey, was drilling ahead below 8,413 feet.

A 75-minute drillstem test was taken at 8,310-8,413 feet. Recovery was 4,950 feet of oil and gas cut water. Apparently the exploration reached the water table in the Devonian. It is slated to continue to the Ellenburger at around 10,000 feet.

May Be In Silurian

Fullerton Oil Company No. 324-A Wilson, 1,980 feet from west and 810 feet from south lines of section 15, block A-32, psi survey, and another deep prospector on the north-west side of the Fullerton field, was making hole past 8,500 feet, in a lime, thought by some geologists to be the upper Silurian.

A drillstem test was taken at 8,565-90 feet for 25 minutes. Recovery was 30 feet of drilling mud, with no shows. The exploration is scheduled to dig to the Ellenburger.

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Mary Ellis, 440 feet from south and west lines of section 9, block 63, Midland County School Land survey, and two miles north of Whiteface, in East Cochran County, is a new stepout from production in the northwest Slaughter field area.

It is to drill to 5,000 feet, starting at once.

Andrews Advises Economy Bent GOP Members To 'Go Slow'

WASHINGTON — (P) — Without taking sides in the widening Republican fight over tax cutting, Chairman Andrews (NY) of the House Armed Services Committee flashed a "go slow" signal Monday to his economy bent GOP colleagues.

Andrews urged specifically that the Senate-House Budget Committee hold off any possible slash in National defense funds until it hears directly from Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Army chief of staff. Taking note of reports that Republican members of the joint congressional group are considering a \$2,000,000,000 reduction in President Truman's \$11,200,000,000 Army-Navy allotment, Andrews told newsmen: "I am against any such fix cut. We've simply got to look at this thing carefully. So I am suggesting that the Budgetary Committee consult General Ike."

The Budget Committee's report is due Saturday, under terms of the Congressional Reorganization Act.

Millions Of British Workers Idled; Electric Power Cut To Conserve Coal

LONDON — (P) — Half of all British industry closed down Monday because of a shortage of coal from the socialized mines. Four million workers became idle, many going back on the dole, as electric service was drastically reduced.

Prime Minister Attlee prepared to face Commons during the afternoon and be questioned there by Winston Churchill, leader of the conservative opposition. Attlee scheduled a radio broadcast Monday night to plead for cooperation. The prime minister and his cabinet met at his unlighted Downing Street residence.

Rescuers Recover 81 Bodies From Dance Hall Ruins

BERLIN — (P) — Rescuers, working in near zero temperatures, Monday had recovered 81 bodies from the ruins of the Karlshof Dance Hall, razed by fire at the height of a Saturday night costume ball. Another 39 persons were in hospitals.

Capt. Frank Walten, British fire chief, said he did not expect the dead toll to climb much higher. A check of British rosters showed seven soldiers missing, the British Provost Marshal's office said. Four British soldiers were hospitalized with burns.

Meanwhile German authorities were attempting to identify the bodies. Only three of the 81 have been identified so far, they said.

Big Spring, Abilene Airports Are Listed For CAA Safety Aids

WASHINGTON — (P) — Thirteen Texas airports are included in the Civil Aeronautics Administration's nationwide program for installation of air safety aids.

C. E. Wright, administrator of the agency, reported to Congress this week that the program would be completed within approximately two years.

The Texas program: Big Spring—Installation of both types of beams, markers, compass locators and approach lights planned by August 1. No ground control approaches planned.

El Paso—Installation of both types of beams, markers and approach lights already completed. Compass locators to be installed by October 15. No ground control approaches planned.

British Prosecutor Demands Severe Penalty

JERUSALEM — (P) — A British military prosecutor demanded a severe penalty Monday for four Jews arrested on December 29, the night a British major and three sergeants were kidnaped and flogged by Jewish underground members in Palestine. The prosecutor, Maj. W. E. Stubbs, said the defendants had been found in possession of a rawhide whip, a submachine gun, three revolvers, ammunition and four bombs.

Five Convicts Escape Prison; Three Captured

PHILADELPHIA — (P) — Three convicts had less than three hours freedom early Monday after fleeing over a wall of the Holmesburg State Prison, but two other dangerous, long-term robbers remained at large.

It was the second mass escape attempted by the men in less than two years. On April 3, 1945 they tunneled out of the Eastern State Penitentiary with four others—and it took police almost a week to get them all back in custody.

Monday morning they overpowered guard William Skelton as he was making a pre-dawn check on the cell blocks, Warden Robert J. Beveridge reported.

Use Knife, Wooden Gun Using a small knife and wooden gun—Skelton was stabbed slightly in the hand—they obtained the keys to a prison storeroom and scaled the 20-foot wall with a stolen ladder, Beveridge said.

But an immediate police alert alerted authorities in the Quaker City and three of the men were picked up several miles from the prison as "suspicious" characters.

Beveridge said guards on the tower shot at the escapees as they sped up a ladder and over the wall "but none apparently were hit."

Settle Question By War

CAIRO, EGYPT — (P) — Haj Amin El Hussein, expelled Mufti of Palestine, has told the leaders of the Palestine Arab youth, that there is no way to solve the Palestine question "but by bloody revolution," a member of the Najada said Monday.

Conservative newspapers demanded Attlee shake up his labor cabinet, which commands a two to one vote in Parliament. The influential Manchester Guardian and London's Daily Mail and Daily Telegraph demanded Emanuel Shinwell resign as minister of fuel and power.

Weekend Violence Toll Stands At Thirteen Persons

By The Associated Press The weekend toll of Texans dead through violence stood at 13 Monday.

Fire accounted for three deaths, accidents involving trains four, and automobile accidents five. One man apparently died to death.

Miller County Coroner N. L. Winchester reported that Marvin Lee James, 47, was found in a hotel room in Texarkana Sunday, apparently dead from loss of blood from a slashed right arm. A razor was found nearby.

Jack H. Mays, 78, died as a result of burns received in a fire Friday afternoon at the Princess Theater in Texarkana.

Frank Daniels, 39, was burned to death Sunday in an early morning hotel fire in San Angelo. Five others were carried to safety by firemen.

The blaze was confined to the third floor, where Fire Chief Tom Biggs said it apparently started in Daniels' room from a lighted cigarette.

Train Hits Car Dr. Frank A. Carlise, 77, was killed Saturday when a passenger train struck his automobile at a crossing at Italy, Texas.

In other train accidents, Roy Watson, 51, was killed in Dallas Saturday while walking along the tracks and the same day R. A. Landstrom, 36, died after a train struck his automobile in San Antonio. At Victoria, John Marvin Duggan, 31, died Friday night in a train-car collision.

Mrs. Max Anderson, 30, died in Dallas Saturday of burns received Tuesday when her house caught fire from a heater.

F. D. Youngblood, 49, was fatally injured in an automobile collision near Nacogdoches Friday night.

In a second crash on the same highway, Mrs. Dewitt Smith, 53, of Douglas, was killed and four other members of her family injured.

Son's Car Hits Mother Mrs. Johnnie F. Burwell, 62, was killed at Port Arthur Friday night when struck by an automobile driven by her son, W. M. Burwell. She was walking on the highway and her son, driving to meet her, was blinded by the lights of an approaching car.

Pilar Medina, eight, was fatally injured Saturday night when she was struck by an automobile as she started across a street in Laredo.

Walter M. Boone, of Dallas, died in an automobile accident near McAllen Saturday night.

WASHINGTON — (P) — James F. McHugh, of Beverly Hills, Calif., composer of "Coming in on a Wing and a Prayer," Monday received the Presidential Certificate of Merit.

Stripped Of Colonies Indebted And Reduced To Third Rate Power

PARIS — (P) — Italy signed sadly and silently Monday a peace treaty reducing her to a third rate power, stripped of colonies, indebted by reparations, her homeland reduced and her army and navy cut to a relative shadow.

Yugoslavia, which will obtain a slice of the coveted Venezia Giulia but not the port of Trieste, reversed herself and signed the treaty after protests.

Italy, paying for the crimes of Mussolini and Fascism, was the first of five Axis nations to sign treaties which, when ratified, will end World War II for all the world except Germany, Japan, Austria and Korea.

Following Italy, the schedule called Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary and Finland to sign treaties with up to 20 allied nations. The United States had a part in all the accords except that of Finland.

Italy observed a 10-minute period of silence at the 11 a. m. (4 a. m. CST) hour of the signing of her treaty, which the Italian Constituent Assembly and the major allied powers still must ratify. Silent groups gathered at the tomb of the unknown soldier in Rome, a monument to bolder days when Italy fought against Germany in the first World War alongside the nations now her conquerors.

Workers stood idle. Merchants shuttered their stores. Count Carlo Sforza, the Italian foreign minister, will broadcast Tuesday.

Italian troops were strengthened at the American and British embassies in Rome and stood armed with machineguns and rifles. Traffic was diverted.

Contrasted to the silent demeanor of the Italian signatory in Paris, the Yugoslav foreign minister, Stanoje Simic, declared Premier Marshal Tito's Russian-backed government was "roundly disturbed" at the treaty with Italy.

He specified the Canale River Valley, the region of Gorizia, Venetian Slovenia, Trieste and the northern section of Istria as areas which should have been awarded to Yugoslavia.

Italy lost Eritrea, Somaliland and Libya, her Italian colonies, and was forced to recognize the independence of Ethiopia and Albania, which Mussolini had added to the empire. The Dodecanese Islands went to Greece. Small areas on her western frontier went to France.

She was ordered to pay \$360,000,000 in reparations, \$200,000,000 of it to Russia. Her armed forces were trimmed to a total of 97,500 men; her navy to 67,500 tons.

Spokesmen for American industry, from which some \$4,800,000,000 is sought in portal claims, generally commended the ruling. Many felt, however, that revision of the Fair Labor Standards (Wage-Hour) Act still was "urgent."

1947 License Plates Go On Sale In City

The 1947 Texas automobile license plates officially went on sale Monday at Assessor-Collector J. H. Fine's office in the courthouse.

The plates are not to be put on the vehicles until March 1. Mrs. Raynee Carroll, deputy assessor-collector, pointed out.

Persons are required by law to buy the licenses and have the plates on their vehicles by March 31. Citizens were instructed to bring their 1946 certificates of title when applying for their 1947 licenses. Owners of cars with out-of-state licenses are to bring all registration papers in addition to the title certificate. Mrs. Carroll said. If the owner is from a state not requiring a certificate of title, he must bring both the 1945 and 1946 license receipts.

Bonus Bill For Rural Teachers Sent To Governor

AUSTIN—(AP)—The House Monday unanimously passed Senate bill granting a \$300 "bonus" to rural aid school teachers.

The bill now goes to Gov. Beauford H. Jester for final approval. Rapid passage of the measure apparently assures rural aid teachers that an additional \$75 will be tacked on their February pay checks.

The \$300 will be paid out in \$75 increments during the last four months of the current school year. Gov. Beauford Jester Monday asked the Senate to confirm three new appointments to the State Finance Commission. His nominees are Walter S. Ryder of Ennis, Charles C. Pool of Jasper, and Meredith Queen of Corpus Christi.

B-29 Turret Guns Make Big Hit

NEW YORK—(NEA)—Herbert Hoff is an expert on the question of who won the war.

Each night, as he roams through his "penney arcade" in the heart of Broadway's bright lights, he hears a hundred versions. A half dozen discarded, war-surplus B-29 gun turrets are Hoff's source of information on the battles of every theater of the war.

Most of Hoff's knowledge comes in conversational snatches like this:

"Look here, honey. I'll show you how I broke up the Battle of the Bulge. It was in a B-17, but this will do. Member me telling you..."

Or, "Let me show you how those zombies ran us right into the caves on Palau."

In the days when GIs thronged Times Square for a last fling before shoving off for overseas, any substitute "battle" gave them a thrill of anticipation, and Hoff's shooting gallery was jammed with men firing electric guns at flying ducks.

But returning veterans, who had had a tough taste of the real thing, turned up their noses as they passed the arcade's "shooting" apparatus.

Scorning the theory that the veterans were tired of shooting, Hoff dug up the six B-29 gun turrets, complete with sighting stations and remote-control systems. Hoff's turrets fire only an electric eye beam; the "enemy" plane dances on a screen a few feet away, but it looks real enough to men who have seen the real thing. They line up to pay 10 cents for the privilege of firing 100 shots. A gong rings if they hit the target.

Most of Hoff's customers are GIs and veterans; many of them are as interested in showing their girls how they won the war as they are firing the guns.

"Human nature," Hoff observes sagely, "is a funny thing."

Two-Minute Trick Helps Tired Neck

If you "get it in the neck"—where muscles are tightened by desk-slump fatigue—there's a speedy way to chase out tensions. Two minutes taken out of a working day to untie knots where they reduce efficiency or cramp your style could not be better spent.

The trick of loosening up muscles, say salon experts, is to grasp your shoulders with your hands, dig fingers in deep, and squeeze. Continue the squeeze play as you inch your fingers over the whole tension area. Repeat the routine two or three times, if tightness persists.

Here We Go Again

Hold your hats folks, we're going for another ride. Down in Big-D, in a large building which headquarters officials of the railroad which serves Midland, is being brewed another safety program. That is well and good. We are for safety—first, last and all the time. But we don't want this program in lieu of a program to eliminate railroad grade-crossings in Midland and other communities of the Permian Basin area.

We want underpasses at important crossings, viaducts, adequate lighting at railroad stations and crossings, paved platforms and modern depots and facilities along the railroad for citizens of this important area.

Only recently, a prominent Midland businessman asserted, "Midland has hick-town railroad facilities for passengers of dollars are taken out of Midland each week for the railroad. This also is true of Odessa, Monahan and other Permian Basin points.

Odessans are on the march to obtain improved railroad facilities. It is for Midlanders to band together and obtain some action. Trains are running on faster schedules. Grade-crossings remain the same.

Is Midland going to calmly await more years for modern underpasses and adequate railroad facilities? Let every Midlander with civic pride get a letter, note, or card off immediately to officials of the railroad. Promises are out. It is time to demand action.

Marcantonio's Reconversion

At a \$10-a-plate testimonial dinner for Rep. Vito Marcantonio—whose notable guests included the occupants of a table reserved for the Communist Party—the guest of honor made an illuminating remark in the course of his address.

Said the ALP congressman from New York, "I will not appear in the war against the monopolists and those who seek to plunge America into another imperialist war."

It is clear from Marcantonio's reference to "another imperialist war" that he considers the recent conflict to have been of the same description. Somehow it doesn't seem very long ago that he was using these very same words. Yet it's going on six years since that day in June of 1941 when Marcantonio discovered, with the Nazi invasion of Russia, that this was not an imperialistic war at all but a battle for the survival of democracy which America immediately should prepare for.

As a matter of course, Marcantonio had voted against every piece of legislation whose aim was to strengthen us against possible attack. Now we find him right back where he started.

We can't say that the designation of World War II as "imperialist" is a switch in the party line, for Marcantonio isn't a Communist. He denies any such insulting charge with vigor. He says it is simply coincidence that, in his years as a legislator, he has always managed to see eye to eye with the Communist Party through all the devious ramifications of its policy.

Experts Will Attempt To Save 'The Last Supper,' Leonardo da Vinci's Noted Painting, From Restorations

MILAN—(AP)—Leonardo da Vinci's most noted painting, "The Last Supper," is about to be restored from restorations. Experts have finally decided that much of the grime that hides the original glorious colors of the masterpiece has been caused by the efforts of experts to "save" the painting.

Although still beset by hazardous theories for removing the entire work from the wall on which it was painted and transferring it to canvas, the modern experts are taking a page from American home building books and look to "air-conditioning" as the most likely preservative.

The masterpiece barely survived the war.

Two walls of the refectory of the convent church of Santa Maria delle Grazie—where Leonardo chose to paint "The Last Supper" nearly 500 years ago—crumpled under the Allied bombing of August 15, 1943. But, at the war's end, when the sacks of sand that were piled against the painting were removed, the great work was found to be intact and, in fact, only a little more grimy than it was before the war.

Aside from the impulsive cutting of a door through the bottom of the painting by Napoleon's troops—who used the refectory for a stable—continuous changes in temperature have caused most damage to the great painting. The soldiers cut away the feet of the figure of Christ to enable horses to enter the refectory.

One of the projects now being considered is an elaborate system of air-conditioning, calculated to eliminate quick changes of temperature, the painting has been plagued by the fact that the master, instead of painting it in fresco as was then the custom, tried a new medium of tempera. Only ten years after the masterpiece was completed, Vasari, a noted critic and contemporary of Leonardo's, noted that deterioration had already set in and predicted it would last only a short time.

The painting, however, has endured better than that. The Coats Is Not Nitrous. The murky coating that covers the entire painting, said Prof. Guglielmo Pacchioni, superintendent of the Belle Arts for Lombardy, is not a nitrous formation—which would have long ago damaged it beyond repair—but a coating resulting from continuous processes of restoration.

These restorations consisted of injections of fastening material between tempera and wall—gums, wax and resin. In time the materials oxidized and together with micro-organisms formed a sort of cloud over the once brilliant colors.

The painting today, however, is little worse for wear than it was ten years ago.

Prof. Pacchioni told The Associated Press that an alternative to air-conditioning would be to cut the painting away from the wall and transfer it to canvas. This would involve:

1. Cutting away of the wall that holds the painting with tools similar to those used in cutting marble.
2. The wall would then be cut into squares and placed horizontally.
3. And here real work begins. Dentists' drills would drill away the stone until the plaster was reached.
4. Still slow work, the plaster would be gently scraped away until only the tempera film remained to be glued to canvas.

Another Risky Proposal. Still a third method—but not considered practical for tempera—would be to "pull" away the painting by gluing a canvas over it, then ripping it off, carrying the tempera with it. A second canvas would then be glued to the back of the painting and the first canvas removed with hot water.

This method has been used with frescos, but it is feared that the hot water part of the process would dissolve the tempera.

Prof. Pacchioni estimates that air-conditioning will preserve "The Last Supper" for many years, while the piecemeal cutting and transfer to canvas might preserve it for centuries.

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Blackeyed Pea Looms As Plant Most Likely To Succeed In Texas

Some people think about the blackeyed pea once a year—around New Year's. But if any member of the agriculture class of '47 was given the "most likely to succeed" title, B. Pea would be a strong contender.

Texas farmers have found they can help pocketbooks and land, too, by planting the pea with the eye in the middle. Dawson county agent T. A. Barfield is the latest to report big cash dividends from this crop.

An average of \$110 per ton in the hull was paid for the 1946 crop of green field peas in West Texas, he said, reporting that in Dawson County alone, acreage was between 20,000 and 25,000 acres. A yield of 400 to 2,000 pounds per acre was realized.

And just to show that B. Pea is gaining quite a reputation is the report of buying at Lamesa. Barfield said the minimum price in Lamesa was \$80 per ton, with competitive buying boosting it to a top price paid of \$130 per ton.

A second factor that makes the blackeyed pea important is in its aid to land. It helped restore much needed nitrogen to the soil in Dawson county.

AUSTIN—(AP)—Your nerves on edge? You can very likely blame modern civilization—or perhaps yourself.

Those are the views of State Health Officer George W. Cox, who says high speed living, with its cruel exactions upon human nature, is putting a lot of patients into hospital beds.

"Fifty per cent of all hospital beds are filled by persons suffering from mental or nervous diseases," Dr. Cox declared.

"It thus appears that modern civilization is exacting a terrific toll.

"But improper personal conduct must also shoulder much of the blame," he admonished. "The fact is that nearly 50 per cent of the patients entering hospitals for mental disorders are there because of organic toxic causes.

"The excessive use of alcohol is responsible for a number of mental disorders, at least in males. Alcohol and syphilis combined are responsible for approximately one-fifth of the hospitalized insanities."

Dr. Cox said that improper living habits also continue to impair many brains.

"Insufficient sleep, neglect of bodily care and an over forcing or nervous energy are the pitfalls to avoid in this connection," he said, adding:

"Nature demands that her fundamental laws be at least reasonably observed. A constant outraging of the physical economy takes its toll not only in bodies but in minds also. Insanities and lesser nervous disorders could be spectacularly reduced if this fact was more generally respected.

"Training for mental health must be started in childhood as that is the time when corrections can be to the best advantage."

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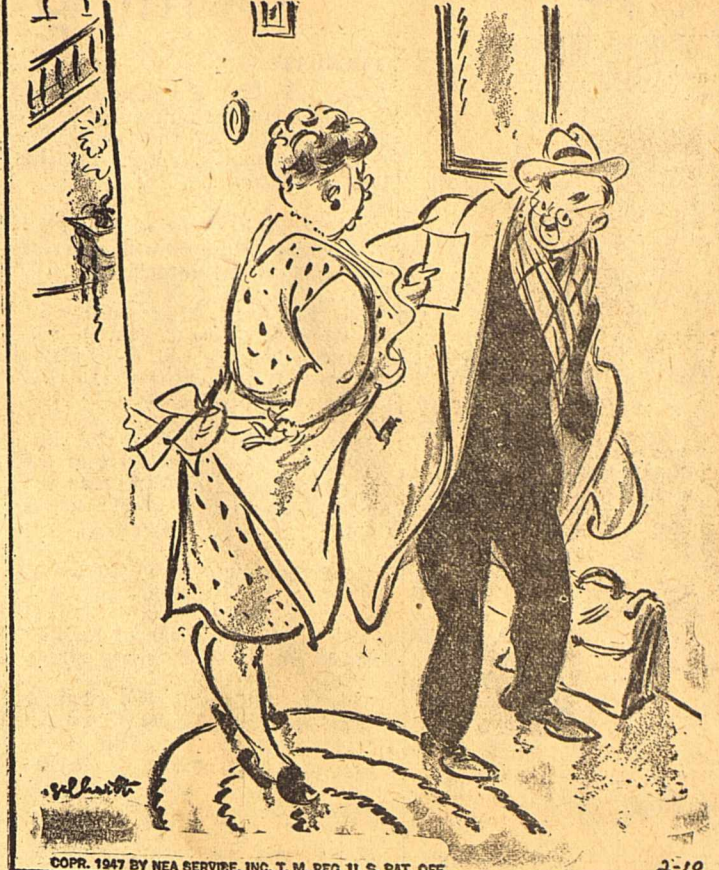

BRENHAM—(P)—The Church of England pastor who married King Edward VIII and twice-divorced Wally Warfield Simpson ten years ago has become a Texan.

The Rev. R. Anderson Jardine and his wife have moved to Brenham and plan to open a Bible institute.

The vicar is now 69 and is small, portly, ruddy-faced and white-haired.

"I could have led a revolt and possibly restored King Edward to his throne at the time, had I been so minded," he said here. He said the people of England were stirred up by the treatment given their former king, who gave up his throne for "the woman I love."

Jardine said he gave up his position as vicar of St. Paul's Church,

Darlington, England, after the ceremony because his position became "untenable."

They have lived in Hollywood, Calif., for the past ten years. He said they expect to live in the United States for the rest of their lives.

"Fighting Parson"

He said he was nationally known in England as "the fighting parson" for his tilts with the archbishop of Canterbury. He said after the famous marriage he was ostracized. He finally resigned and came to America.

He said he has no regrets and is very happy here. In his book "At Long Last," Jardine says many persons believe he received a large sum of money from the Duke of Windsor for his services. He said this is not true.

"I simply did a job that needed doing by some one. For that job I

received a fee and later a gift. The whole amount did not exceed \$1,500."

He and his wife are guests here of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Shauffer. They said they plan to open a bible institute. Meanwhile, he has been preaching at various churches.

Next Sunday he plans to speak at the century-old Baptist church at independence, where Gen. Sam Houston and other famous Texans once worshipped.

He said the only way he would return to England would be if Edward should regain his throne and invite him back. He said this is unlikely.

Texas Construction Rate Million Dollars Daily

AUSTIN—(P)—Texas started 1947 off at a construction rate of more than \$1,000,000 a day, but there appeared little hope in the month's activity for apartment-hungry Texans.

Statistics reported by the Texas Contractor, weekly publication of the construction industry, showed construction actually begun in January total \$33,331,473. In all Texas, it included one duplex and one small apartment house of four units.

Small one-family unit dwellings, costing \$7,000 or less, numbered 912. There were 11 contracts for larger type homes costing more than \$7,000.

Total residential construction in January was reported to cost \$6,505,730. Other construction included \$7,716,053 in engineering and \$19,109,990 for non-residential projects.

January's overall total fell below figures of last fall but, was well above previous January totals. In January of last year \$26,125,765 were spent and the year before that the figure was \$10,261,978.

Heehler will get a chance to explain all three charges to an Oak Park justice.

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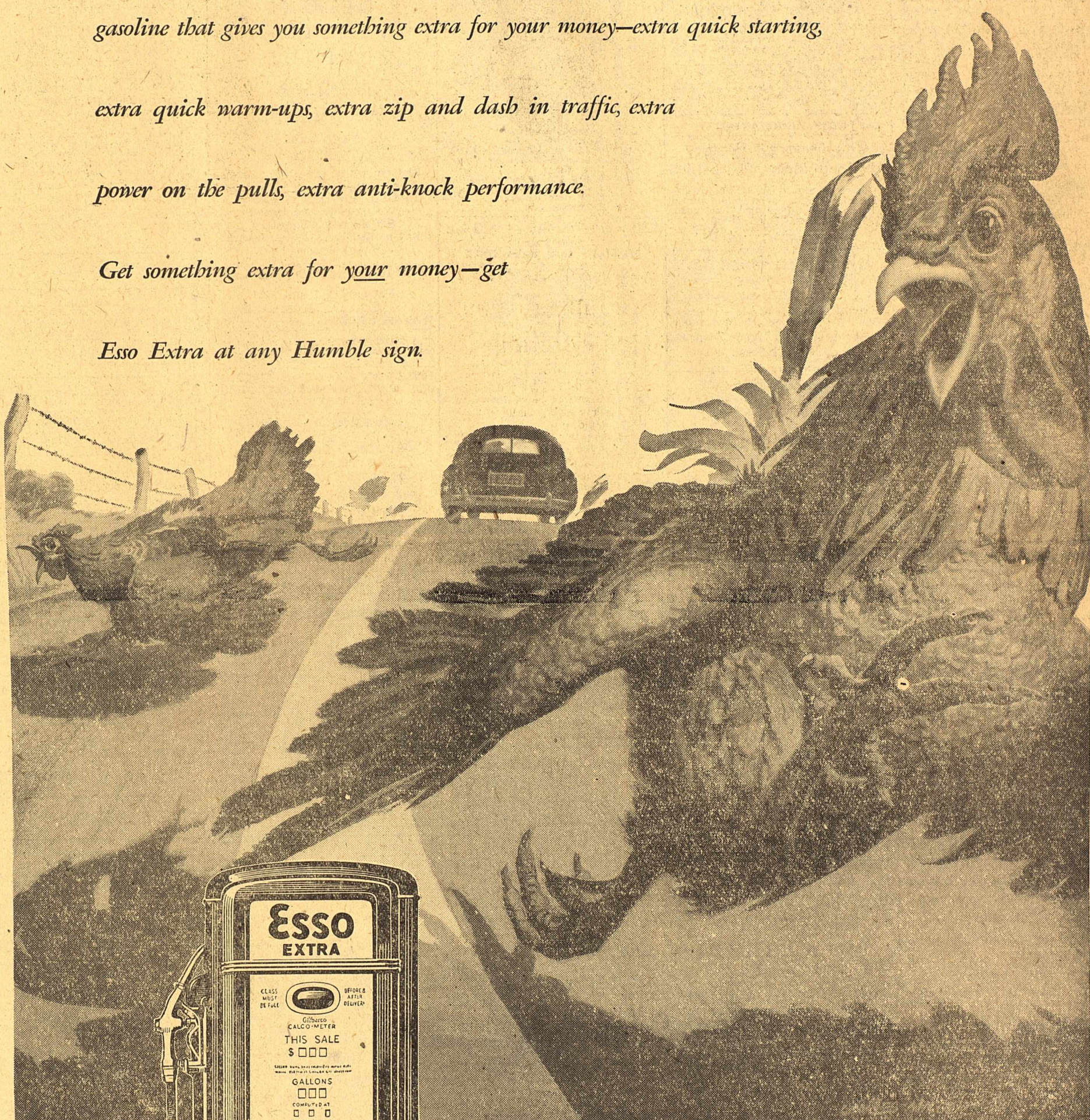
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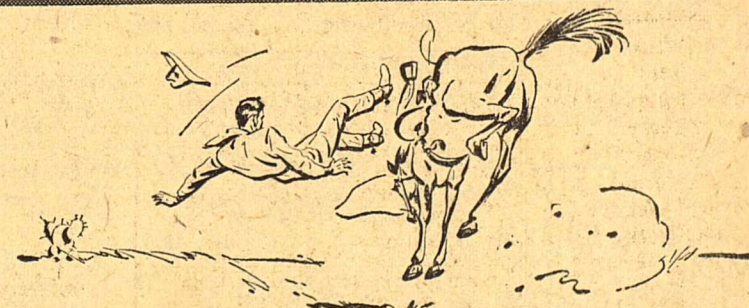

He loves to play with different partners and makes a surprisingly good showing with his assorted partnerships.

Fishbein told me that he and Mrs. Ralph H. Schellenberg had redecorated and refurbished the club, and when I dropped in to see it, he got out the "little black book" and gave me today's hand.

I would like to have you cover up the East and West hands, and see how you would play for six clubs. The first diamond trick has to be won in dummy with the ace, the king of hearts is cashed, then two rounds of trumps, which must be won with the ace and queen. Dummy's two losing diamonds are discarded on South's two high hearts.

Declarer must hope for a four-two break in spades, which it is reasonable to expect, so he cashes the ace and king of spades and leads a small spade. If East refuses to ruff, declarer ruffs, goes over to dummy with the king of clubs and leads spades until East trumps.

Looking at all four hands, the play may appear rather simple, but it involves some important principles of play especially where to win the two trump tricks.

Leni and Parker, and Sid were like three children. Their laughter and gaily filled the house, laughter and music.

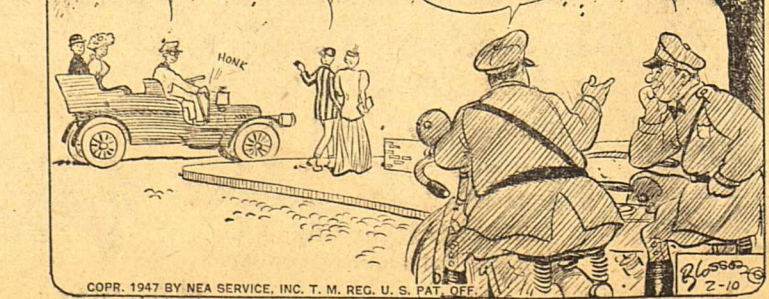
And once Leni and Parker made an unexpected trip to Indianapolis. They stayed all day, and when they returned had presents for everyone.

SMU Is Only Likely Obstacle Between Title Determining Series Of Texas, Arkansas In Southwest Conference

Undefeated Arkansas and Texas have entered the second half home stretch of the Southwest Conference basketball chase and only the Southern Methodist Mustangs seem likely obstacles to prevent a title determining series between the two perfect record leaders the last two days of the season.

Arkansas moves into Dallas Friday and Saturday to meet the Mustangs who last Saturday bowed to Texas for their second loss of the campaign. The two setbacks, both to the speedy Longhorns, all but eliminate the Ponies from the championship picture but a split or sweep of the Arkansas series would put the SMU five in excellent position to complete the season in the runner-up slot.

The Dallas tilt will be the Porkers' most serious tests of the campaign and will match teams playing a similar type of game, slower and more deliberate than the speedy Longhorns. Both depend on height and the deadly accuracy of individual scorers, such as Arkansas' Al Williams and George Kok and the Ponies' Tommy Tomlinson.

Texas counteracts its lack of all-around height with a fast break attack that spelled defeat for SMU. In Austin last month, the speed was fatal in the early minutes of play. In Dallas, however, the Ponies brought out a tight defense and all but matched the speed for three quarters of the game before succumbing to the fleet footed Steers.

Despite the outcome of the Porker-Mustang game, Texas looms an even stronger favorite because of a schedule advantage. The Longhorns meet Texas A&M at College Station Saturday in their final road trip of the year. After that they play four straight home games, entertaining Baylor and Rice before an Arkansas invasion.

Texas drew a half game ahead of Arkansas last week by taking three games.

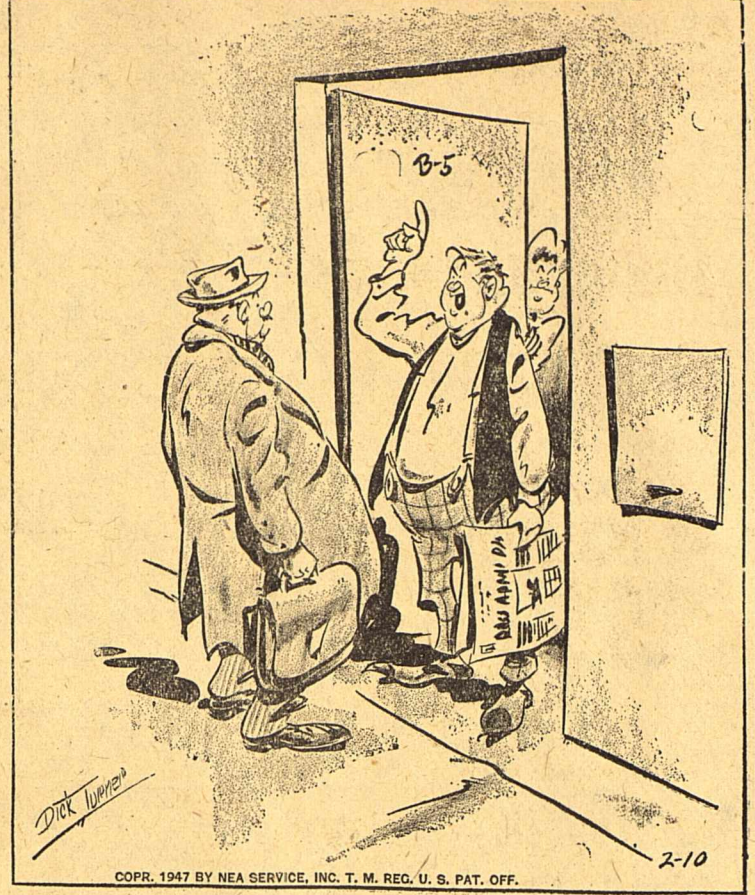
