

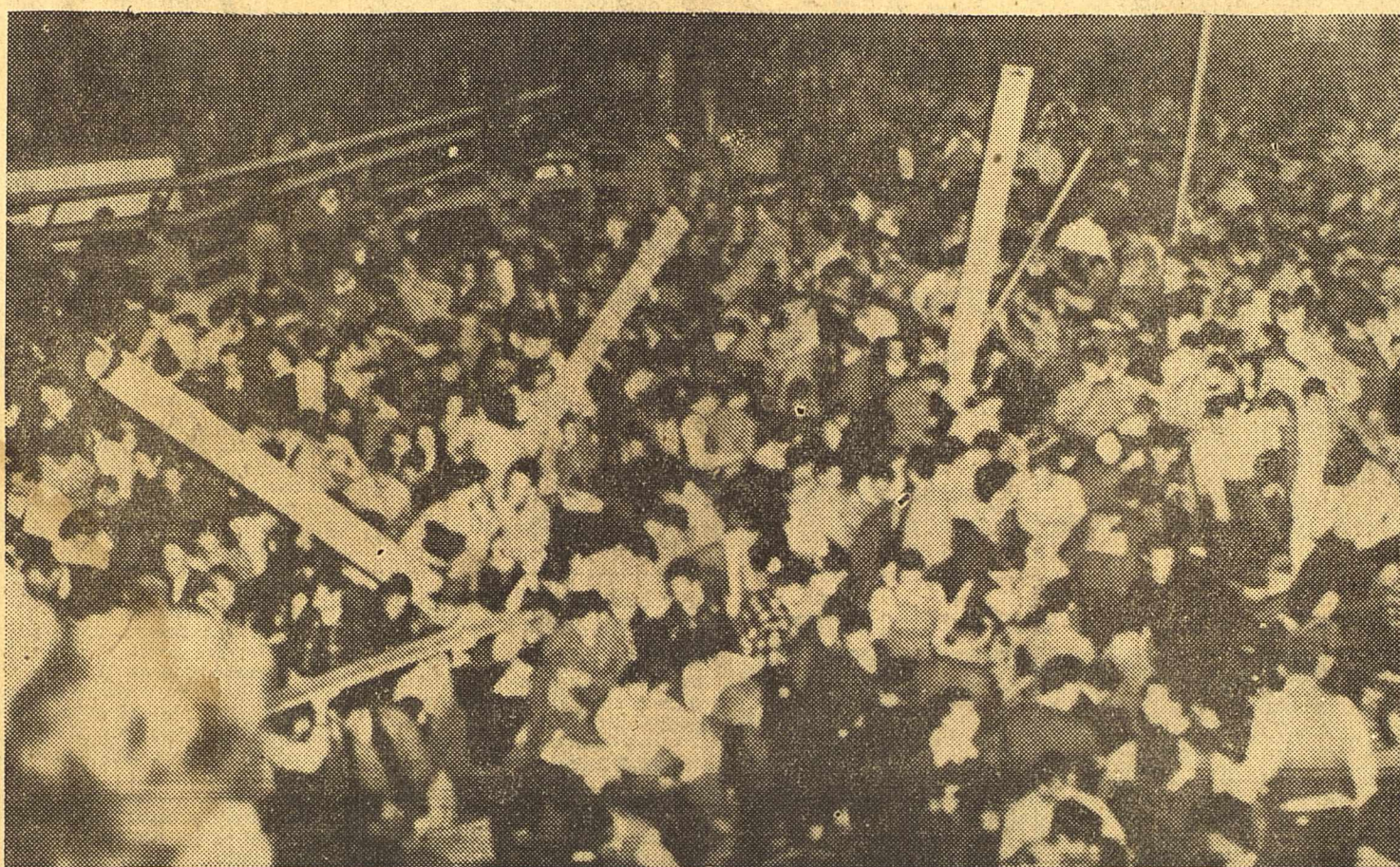

## Sweets To The Sweet

The estimated Cuban sugar crop for 1947-48 is 5,500,000 tons. This is an increase of some 1,500,000 tons over last year. A House food investigation subcommittee "insists" that the United States take this entire increase for itself. That would give us 3,300,000 tons, and leave 2,200,000 for the other 26 nations in the international sugar pool for whom we buy in Cuba.

This would add 15 pounds to our per capita domestic quota, bringing it up to 40 pounds. Industrial users would get a 33 1/3 per cent boost in their allocations. And what about the rest of the world?

Rep. August Andresen of Minnesota, the subcommittee chairman, says that this windfall of sugar to the United States would be offset by an estimated increase of 1,183,000 tons in European production. But he admits that European consumption would still be below ours.

That is undoubtedly true. Europeans will enjoy an estimated increase of a little over a million tons, as against the 1,500,000 which we plan to take for ourselves from Cuba.

Let's see how the various countries fared for sugar last year. The round per capita figures for both home and industrial use show that, the United States had 74 pounds; Canada and the United Kingdom, 81 pounds; France, 38; Norway and Belgium, 44; The Netherlands, 51; Switzerland, 41; Finland, 20; Spain, 10; and Germany, 12. Albania, Austria, Greece, Italy and Yugoslavia, lumped together under UNRRA, average out 10 pounds apiece.

So the United States, besides eating better than any of the countries listed, had more sugar than most of them. Only Britain had a larger consumption than we, but the rest of her diet was of wartime austerity.

We don't know how many Americans will agree with the sugar refiner who told the subcommittee that this country has been "a mighty good neighbor" and that "we should look to ourselves now". But the whole business seems a little coldblooded to us, if not downright greedy.

Nowhere in all the debate on the subject could we find any indication of reluctance or compassion. Nobody said anything about millions of sugar-hungry—and blameless—youngsters in Europe. Rather more typical were these remarks, made on the floor of the House by Rep. John Jennings of Tennessee:

"Who is it that will comply with that demand of this international setup that we should take sugar from our people and send it to countries that have not been any too friendly to us within recent months?"

We keep remembering the glowing words about gallant France, gallant Belgium, gallant Norway, that have resounded through the halls of Congress. We keep recalling the expressions of pity and admiration that their citizens evoked from our congressmen.

But that was back in the days when these gallant people were fighting for their existence, not threatening to rob us of an extra spoon of sugar for our coffee.

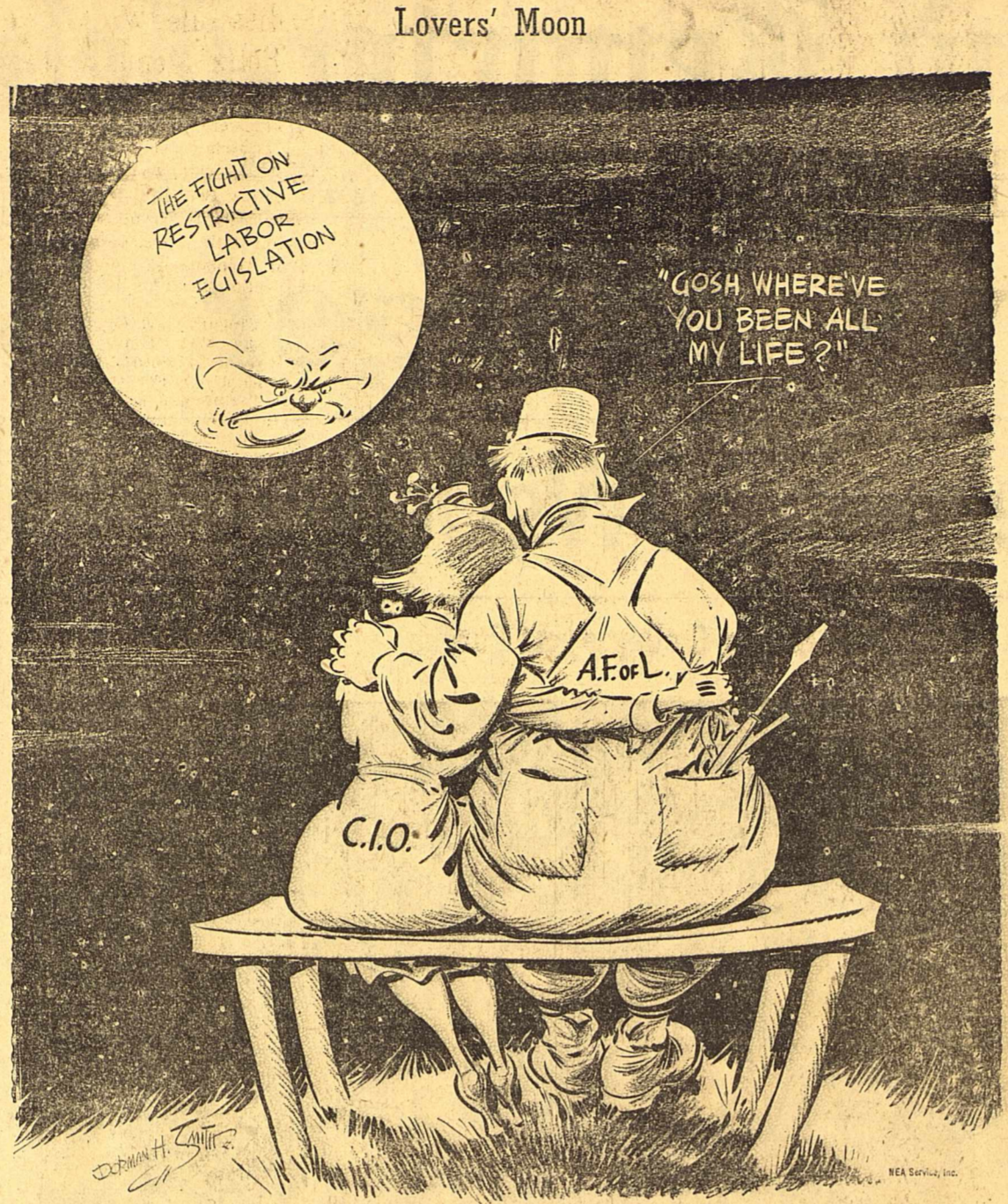

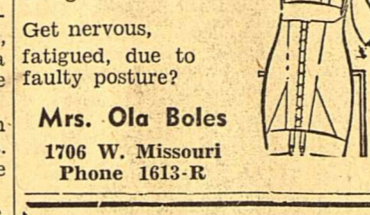

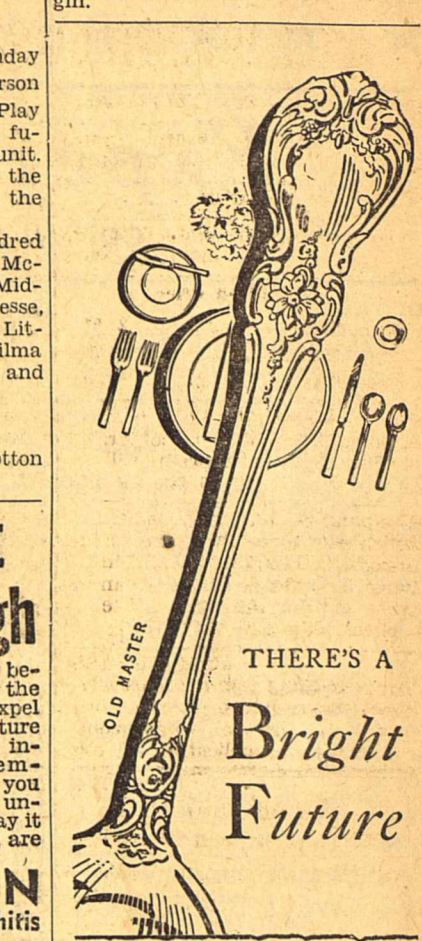

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**Lubbock Veteran Sparks Legislation To Aid Paraplegics**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A young veteran in Lubbock, confined to a wheelchair, is sparking the move which provides hope for some 2,000 similar paralysis victims of World War II that they may someday walk again.

He is James L. Qualla who suffered a crushed vertebra when his plane crashed in Italy.

After three months hospitalization in Italy he was transferred to McCloskey Hospital at Temple. He received physiotherapy treatments during 15 months there, and at-

tempts were made at using leg braces and crutches, but all to no avail.

Several weeks ago, when Rep. George Mahon of Colorado City was in Lubbock, he met Qualla and was so favorably impressed by the young man's attitude that he determined to do all possible to forward some ideas of the disabled veteran.

What Qualla has in mind is set forth in his own words in a letter he wrote January 1 to A. C. Jackson, commander of the 19th Texas district of the American Legion:

"It has occurred to me that since World War I brought about a great advance in brain surgery, it could be that we might get the federal government to finance research this time on the little known spinal cord and possibly bring about a great advancement in this phase of neurological injuries.

**Speak For All Victims**  
"I am sure that I speak for all paraplegics, victims of spinal injuries, when I say that we are all living with the hope that our great nation will not forget us in our wheelchairs.

"We are willing to serve in the experiments that may be necessary in the research. We understand that we may not ourselves profit by this research. It may even be too late for us, but if we can bring about increased knowledge of spinal injuries by a well financed program of research under federal auspices, we feel that our own sacrifice shall not have been in vain."

The Allen Brothers Post of the Legion at Lubbock then adopted a resolution requesting the federal government to intensify research in this field. The executive committee of the Texas Department of the Legion, acting on the Allen Brothers Post recommendation, adopted a similar resolution.

**Texas Hatcheries Renewed Operations In January**

AUSTIN—(AP)—Increased seasonal farm demand prompted many Texas hatcheries to renew operations in January, and output for the month was estimated at 3,500,000 chicks, the United States Department of Agriculture reported.

Output was about 4 per cent above the 1941-45 average for this season of the year and was the same as that of January, 1946.

February 1 prices to Texas hatcherymen averaged as follows: \$13 per hundred for straight run, heavy breed chicks; \$20 per hundred for sexed pullets, and \$10.30 for sexed cockerels.

**British May Begin Trade With Germans March 4**

LONDON—(AP)—The Board of Trade announced recently that British firms will be permitted to trade with Germans beginning March 4 through a revision of Britain's trading-with-the-enemy regulations. The revision was timed to coincide with similar action by the United States, the board said.

**Leopold Stokowski Released From Bowl**

HOLLYWOOD—(AP)—The Hollywood Bowl Association announced that Conductor Leopold Stokowski has been released from 1947 concert commitments in the bowl to conduct programs in Europe this summer under State Department auspices.

**Investment Commitment**

DALLAS—(AP)—Sharp gains in investment commitments in all major classifications of construction were made in Texas in January, it was reported by O. O. Paulsell, district manager of F. W. Dodge Corporation.

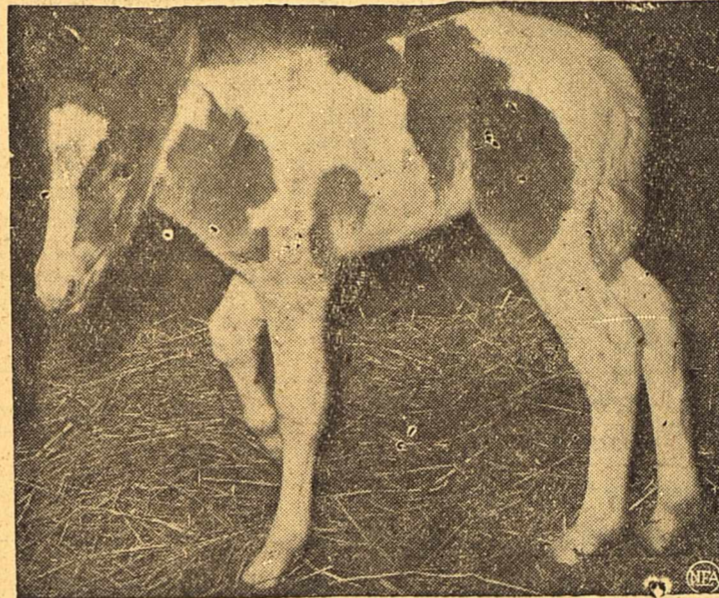

**U. S. May Sell Cotton To Foreign Consumers Four Cents Under Par**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Government's policy of making American cotton available to foreign users at four cents a pound less than domestic consumers pay may be reviewed soon as a result of a growing shortage of the fiber.

This special price concession to foreign buyers is made under an export subsidy program of the Agriculture Department. Since last August, the Department has spent nearly \$23,000,000 in financing the price cut on exports of 1,133,000 bales.

Domestic manufacturers of cloth and other cotton products contend the export program is having two adverse effects on consumers of cotton goods in this country:

1. A shortage of some grades of cotton needed by domestic manufacturers.
2. Higher cotton prices and a prolonged period of relatively high prices for cotton goods in this country.

Cotton supplies in this country are at the lowest level in more than 15 years. Stocks dwindled during the war as farmers shifted to the production of food crops. Department officials agree that a "good" argument can be made against continuation of the export subsidy at this time.

There is a possibility, they say, that domestic supplies may continue tight for another year or so. The Government has asked farmers to plant 26 per cent more land to cotton this year than last year's abnormally small acreage, but there is serious doubt that this goal will be reached.

Unofficial reports from the South say the acreage may be increased no more than 10 per cent because of a continuing shortage of farm labor and machinery.

**British Mission To U. S.**

LONDON—(AP)—Minister of Works Charles W. Keys announced in the Commons recently that a British mission would leave for the United States to "investigate the possibility" of purchasing machinery for hydro-electric developments and building trades purposes.

**Blind War Vet Runs His Own Dude Ranch**

CHAMA, N. M.—(AP)—The story of the 4 Tumble F dude ranch in this remote mountain region of northern New Mexico is the tale of a seeing eye dog, a dream, a little cash and an option.

The seeing eye dog is "Missie," a new pair of eyes for Monroe L. Fox, 32, who was blinded by a bomb explosion while a member of a naval underwater demolition team at Iwo Jima. The dream was that of himself and his wife that someday—somehow—they'd own and operate a dude ranch.

The little cash came from Fox's disability pension; and the option was one taken by Mrs. Fox to purchase a ranch house, six cabins and 30 acres of land.

Now after a year and a half in permanent darkness, the former Seabee figure he has done "fairly well."

"Considering that I had no capital with which to begin, and that I was newly blind, I'm satisfied with my progress," he says cheerfully. "I've got the 4 Tumble F ranch in my own name. I've fed and clothed my family, and I know how I'm going to make payments on my property."

Fox's other accomplishments since he became blind are also "not too bad." His book, "Blind Adventure," (Lippincott) is selling well. He milks his own cow twice a day, using the sound of the milk to judge direction and distance—and processes his own butter, cream and cheese.

He saddles his own horse, and guides parties to remote trout streams.

He fly-fishes a great deal, has done a lot of fence building, ditch digging and rough carpentry. Fox painted his house "with someone to touch up after me, as I seem to miss an occasional spot now and then." He handles a hay fork like an old-timer. He does his own typing and bookkeeping.

A native of Trinidad, Colo., Fox attended the University of Colorado after high school at Walsenburg.

He gives most of the credit for his rapid rehabilitation to his wife, the former Shirley Dagget, member of a pioneer New Mexico family, and to his 7-year-old son, Arthur.

**Newspaper Circulations Reach All-Time High**

PHILADELPHIA—(AP)—Circulation of daily newspapers in this country reached a record 50,751,000 last year—a gain of nearly 2,000,000 over the previous year, the 1947 edition of N. W. Ayer & Son's Directory of Newspapers and Periodicals disclosed.

The Directory, which said it was the fifth consecutive year that daily-newspaper circulation gained, reported the number of United States dailies now at 1,872, with weekly papers totaling almost 10,000. Periodicals number more than 6,400, an increase of 400 over last year.

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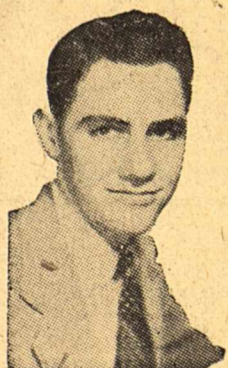


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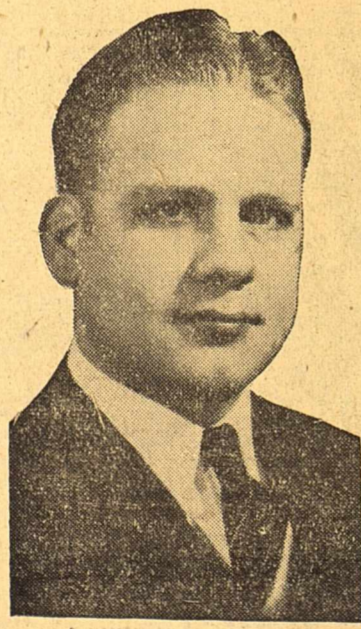
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# Love Has Two Faces

Scheuer ruffed the diamond return with the king of hearts and led back his last club. Declarer trumped this with the seven of hearts, North overruffed with the eight, and of course the ace of hearts still had to take a trick.

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### Swiss Government Studies Possibility Of Keeping Refugees

BERN, SWITZERLAND — (AP) — The federal justice and police department is studying the possibility of granting permanent asylum to between 4,000 and 5,000 refugees in Switzerland.

During the war, temporary asylum was given to a total of 283,000 refugees from 28 countries. Many of these were persons who came into Switzerland in fear of imprisonment or death. Some of them were remnants of Axis armies routed by Allied victors.

The bulk of the refugees have been repatriated.

Approximately 5,000 who remain consist mostly of aged persons, children, or individuals too ill to move. Most of them are in internment camps or in homes. Some children are in Swiss homes where they have become almost foster children in Swiss families. The question of granting Swiss citizenship to these children is under consideration.

ROANOKE, TEXAS — (NEA) — Byron Nelson meant it when he hung up his tack following the PGA Championship in Portland, Ore., last August.

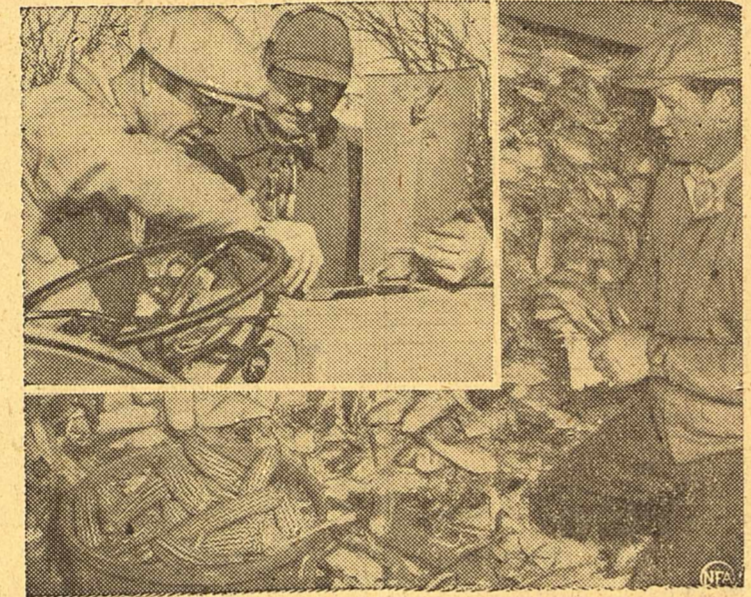
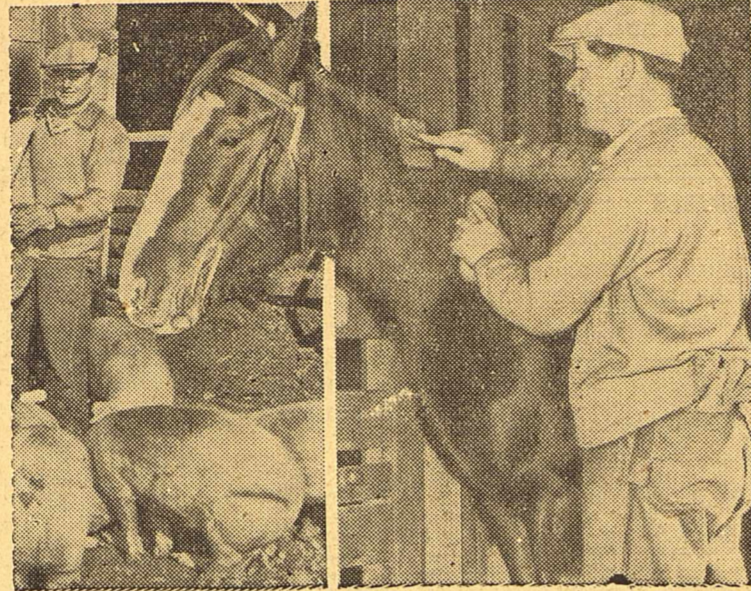
