

CRANE WILDCAT MAKES OIL FROM SIMPSON

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1-HH University, East - Central Crane County wildcat, about 11 miles north of Crane, and three and onehalf miles north of the Block 31 field, ran a drillstem test in the lower Simpson at 9,995-10,070 feet, for one hour and 45 minutes. The investigated was sandy section shale

There was a steady blow of air the first 35 minutes, and a blow of gas for the remaining one hour and 10 minutes of the test.

Recovery was a total of 852 feet of fluid. There was 282 feet of that mud which was 80 per cent oil and 20 per cent drilling fluid. Another 188 feet of mud was 10 per cent oil and 90 per cent drilling fluid. Gravity of the 'oil recovered was 43.6 degrees.

Operator was to drill ahead. The project is contracted to go to the Ellenburger. It has shown for production from the Devonian and the Silurian. Location is 1,980 feet from east and 2,054 feet from north lines of section 3, block 31, University survey.

CSOC COMPLETES GOOD TWO-PAY WINKLER WELL

Cities Service Oil Company No. Wheeler, northeast stepout from the Wheeler field, in East Winkler County, and 1,992 feet from north and 668 feet from east lines of section 10, block 46, TP survey, T-1-S, has been officially completed as a flowing producer from both the Devonian and the Ellenburger.

The Devonian section at 8,415-8,565 feet, made a 24-hour natural potential of 298 barrels, flowing a 20/64th-inch tubing through choke.

Gas-oil ratio was 991-1. Gravity was 38.8 degrees. That production is through casing perforations.

The Ellenburger zone at 10,658-705 feet, treated with a total of 5,000 gallons of acid, and made a daily flowing potential of 397 barrels of oil, through a 14/64th-inch tubing choke. Gas-oil ratio was 852-1. Gravity

was 46.2 degrees.



Gulf No. 1-E-A University-Fogelson, Ellenburger discovery in the Jordan shallow field in Southwest Ector, and 680 feet from west and 662 feet from north lines of section 7. block 35, University survey, flowed 30.5 hours, through a 15/64thinch tubing choke.

Recovery was 285.66 barrels of oil, with no signs of sediment or water being developed. The production is coming from section at 8,925-35 feet, where one treatment of 500 gallons of acid had been used. Testing was cntinuing.

FULLERTON OUTPOST FLOWED FROM REGULAR PAY ZONE

Gulf No. 1-D-AA University, on the southeast side of the Fullerton field, in Northwest Andrews County, and 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from east lines of section 42, block 13, University survey, ran a drillstem test at 6,935-7,010 feet on the Fullerton pay section.

The tool was open one hour and 20 minutes. Gas showed at the surface in five minutes. Drilling fluid flowed at the top in 45 minutes and the tester started flowing oil at the end of 50 minutes.

Five barrels of muddy oil were flowed to pits and then the well flowed 30.36 barrels into tanks during the remainder of the test peri The section showed a gas volume of 621,000 cubic feet per day. This prospector is contracted to around 8,600 feet to explore the Devonian. It will test the intervening sections as it goes down.

There is something disquieting about Russia's sud-den acceptance of the American trusteeship plan for the former Japanese-mandated Pacific islands. The general press reaction has betrayed a fear of the Greeks bearing gifts. Even Russia's belated admission that the United States had something to do with winning the war brings only passing satisfaction.

This government certainly has justice on its side in asking strategic control of a UN trusteeship over these islands. They are neither populous, progressive, nor a source of great wealth. They are principally valuable as military outposts. As such, they offer this country one avenue of protection against air attack from the Far East.

There is no reason to charge us with aggressive or imperialistic intentions. Even if we did not have a proud record as colonial governors of the Philippines, the nature of these islands and their inhabitants would pretty we'l rule out any accusation of imperialism.

U. S. Likely To Win Fight On **Atomic Issue**

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y .-- (P)-Despite expected Russian opposition, the United States appeared certain ruesday of winning its fight to refer the controversial atomic report back to the United Nations Atomic Energy Commission. Renewal of the atomic debate

highlighted a heavy week ahead for the Security Council as UN del-egates faced these possible developments:

1. Great Britain was expected to file formally with the United Nations the explosive problem as a result of an American request for clarification of the Holy Land issue. 2. The Security Council was expected to accept the U.S. plan to place the Japanese-mandated is-lands in the Pacific under a UN

strategic area trusteeship which would give America control of the Marshalls, Marianas and Carolines. 3. A three-nation council subcommittee prepared to report its findings on Great Britain's mine-laying complaint against Albania. 4. Before UN delegates was a petition from the native leaders of Western Samoa for complete selfgovernment with the protection of New Zealand, which now administers the territory under a trust agreement
