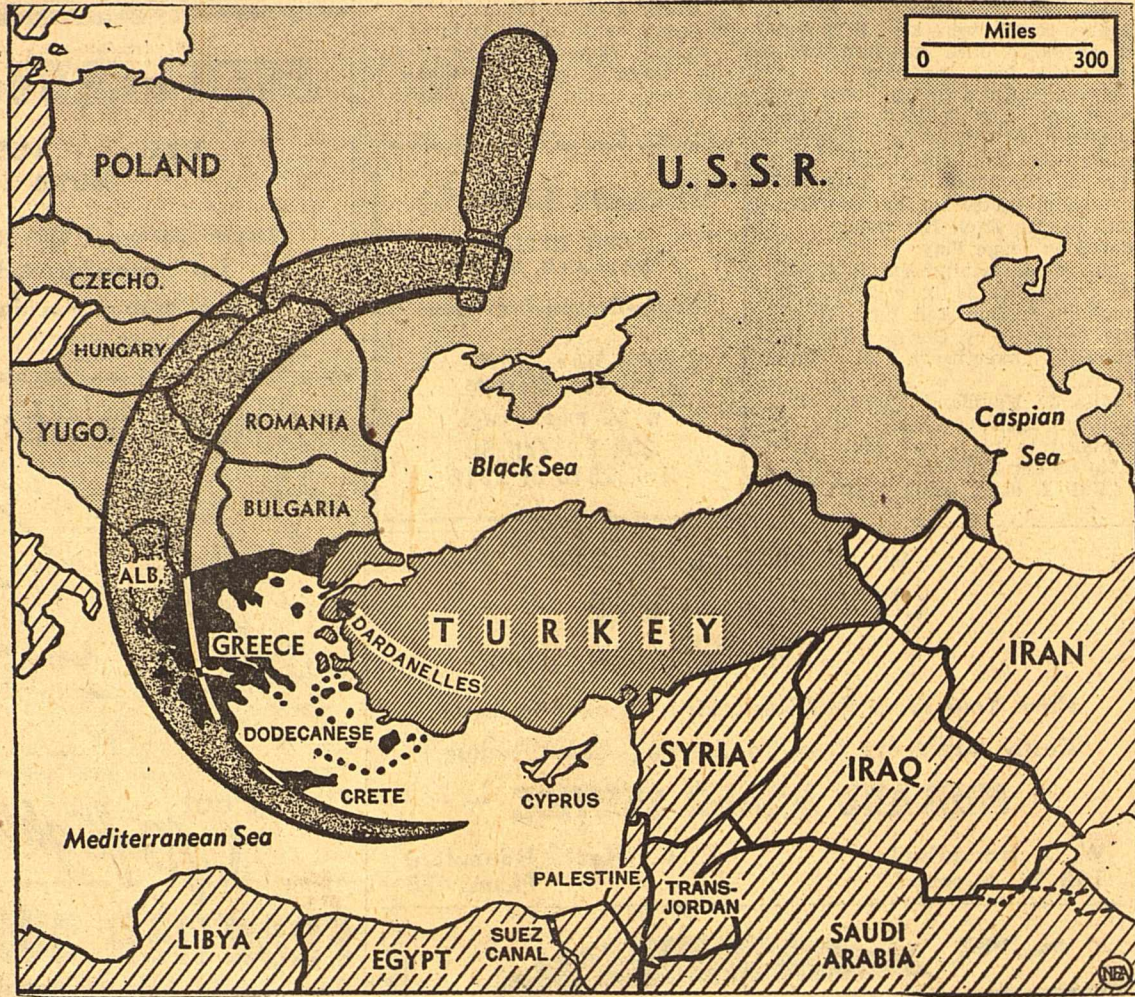

Bascom, lay on a roadside for an hour before an ambulance could be summoned. The boy, victim of a hit-run driver, was dead when the ambulance, finally summoned by a neighbor when no telephone call could get through, arrived at the scene.

Other points reporting resumption of service are Amarillo, where 217 employees had been out; Beaumont, with 600; Denison and Abilene where Mrs. Bessie Shelton, traffic union vice-chairman, for the Northwest Texas Division, said that as far as she knows all the division is back in operation.

Union and Company Agree

Governor Jester stepped into the controversy after telephone service had partially closed down as telephone workers over the state joined in sympathy action with Odessa union members.

Company and union officials agreed to abide by the decision of a five-man fact finding commission appointed by the governor after he had invoked the State Industrial Act.

Since the Odessa union went into continuous union meeting last Friday, it had been joined in sympathy by thousands of workers in numerous Texas cities. The first big-scale movement away from work started Wednesday and Thursday when continuous union sessions were called in Dallas, San Antonio, Fort Worth and Austin.

Jester is pleased. "The fact finding commission is scheduled to begin its investigation into the dispute at Odessa Friday afternoon.

"That's wonderful," exclaimed Jester when informed Thursday night in Fort Worth of the telephone workers' return to work, pending the inquiry by the commission. "I'll sleep a lot better knowing that!"

Earlier in the evening Jester had told the rodeo audience at the Southwest Exposition and Fat Stock Show, "The interest of the people in general will be served" in reference to the telephone situation.

The governor appointed three citizens to represent the public, one to represent the employers and one to represent labor.

Names Citizens

Named to board were: C. V. (Cap) Lyman, an independent oil operator at Midland, for the employers; Rene Schroeder, of Houston, a member of the sheet metal workers' union, for labor; and Ernest Coker, Livingston, attorney; Lloyd Steinberg, Harlingen attorney; and Eugene Thompson, Breckenridge hardware merchant, for the public.

In appointing the commission, Jester said:

"The interest of the public are first and paramount. As governor of Texas, acting in behalf of the public interest, I am employing the best apparent legal advice we have on the statute books for the purpose of getting together the labor unions and the industry in an effort to prevent the further disruption of telephone service and communication in this state."

Odessa union members went into continuous meeting after the company refused to demote Mrs. Allen, night supervisor. The union demanded Mrs. Allen's demotion on various grounds, all of which she has denied.

The work stoppage soon touched almost every portion of the state, disrupting long distance and manually operated service. Only emergency crews remained on duty.

The work stoppage had not affected the Southwestern States Telephone Company, company officials announced at Brownwood.

Southwestern States workers are affiliated with the same union as those who had left their jobs, but under a different contract.

March, DeHavilland Win Top Oscars; Handless GI Steals Academy Show

HOLLYWOOD —(AP)— Frederic March was chosen as the best actor of the year. Olivia de Havilland was named the best actress—but handless Harold Russell stole the show at Thursday night's 19th annual presentation of awards by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

Russell, the veteran with the hooks in "The Best Years of Our Lives," which won the "best picture" award, went home with two Oscars tucked under his arm.

His "Best Years" role, his first in motion pictures, brought him Academy acclaim as the best supporting actor, and a special award by the Academy's board of directors. The board did not know he would win the supporting award, because results were kept in a sealed envelope until announcements were made from the stage.

It was March's role in "The Best Years of Our Lives," depicting problems of returned veterans, which won him the Oscar, while Miss de Havilland took home the coveted statuette for her performance in "To Each His Own."

March in Stage Play
March was not present to receive his Oscar. He is in a New York stage production and his statuette was accepted by Cathy O'Donnell, Russell's sweetheart in "Best Years."

Miss de Havilland, gowned in a strapless light blue tulle, said she intended to place her oscar on a table in her bedroom.

"But I don't know," she said.

"Whether my husband (Novelist Marcus Goodrich) will object to having another man in my bedroom."

Other major awards went to Anne Baxter, for her supporting role in "The Razor's Edge," and to the director of "Best Years," William Wyler.

Applause and cheers rent the air each time Russell accepted an award. Russell's few, embarrassed words were doubly poignant to the few who knew that "Best Years" was not only the ex-Paratrooper's first movie—but his last.

Russell, manager of a chain grocery in Cambridge, Mass., before the war, lost his hands when a half-pound of TNT he was carrying exploded at a Paratroop training camp June 6, 1944—the day Allied troops invaded France.

"I won't continue in pictures as an actor," Russell said Thursday night. "After tonight, any movie I could make would be anticlimactic."

Officers Will Be Elected At Meeting Of Women Voters

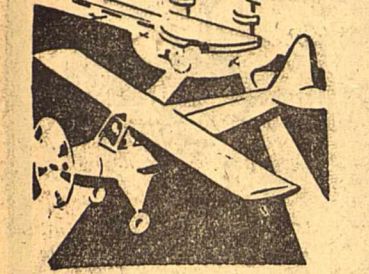

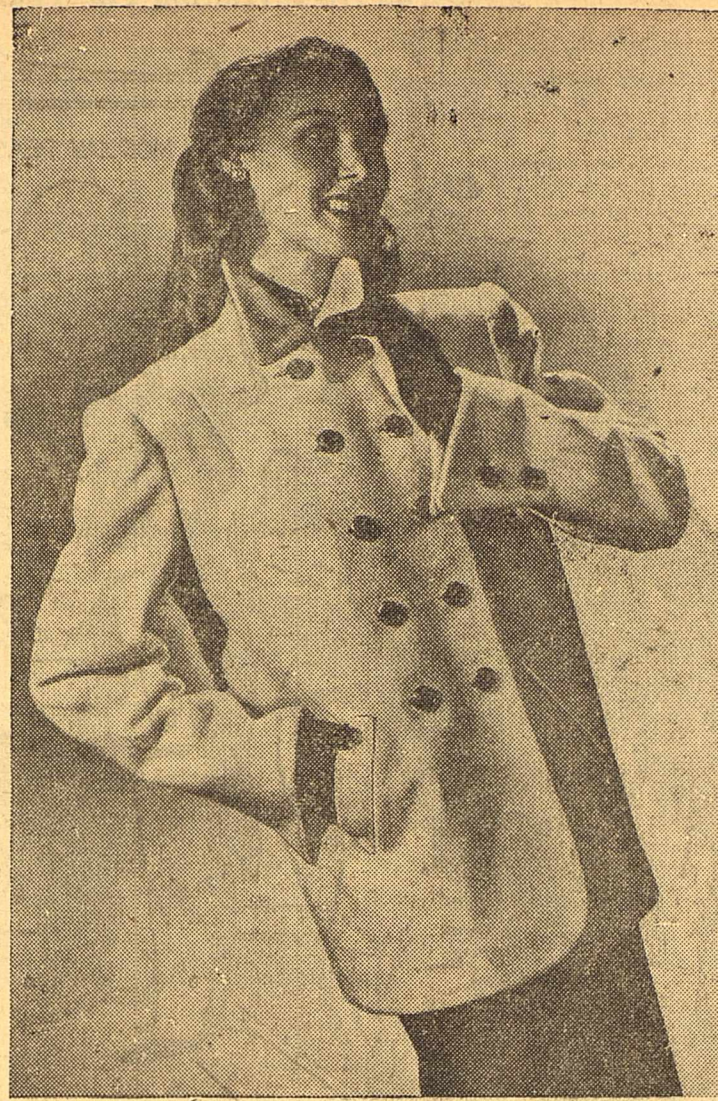

Advice, Not Negation

The venerable William L. Green, AFL president for 22 years, told a familiar story to the Senate Labor Committee.

Green said he opposed all "restrictive" labor legislation. He warned that an attempt to outlaw the closed shop, jurisdictional strikes, and secondary boycotts would create "such great industrial confusion and undermine the present world position of the United States". He offered such comments as "propagandistic hogwash" on proposed labor bills.

This performance has been notably successful in the past. Any threat of change in labor's status—what Green calls restrictive legislation—has been countered by threat of a wave of strikes. That, plus the thought of what union members might do with their votes, has helped to make congressmen think twice and usually forget the whole thing.

But Green's audience was different on this visit. One new face belonged to Senator Irving Ives, whose record in the New York State Legislature had shown him consistently sympathetic toward labor's viewpoint. Freshman Senator Ives threw Green something new to think about.

"Bear in mind," he said, "that the public is demanding that something be done, and in all probability something will be done before this Congress gets through. The problem is what to do. You can't just sit there and say 'this won't work and that won't work'. Don't you agree something has to be done?"

Now, congressmen don't usually talk like that to Green or to Murray of CIO either. They have customarily heard one side of the story from business and industry, the other from union officials, and then accepted the fact that never the twain would meet.

This time, though, another voice was being listened to. It was the voice of that public which Ives referred to, a classless majority which obviously wants to see things done a little differently, and so change the complexion of Congress.

Green, then, was up against a stronger political force than his own. He faced a fact which Senator Ellender of Louisiana put to him rather bluntly: "We want your help. We don't want a negative attitude."

That might serve for a motto above the Labor Committee's door where all special pleaders could read it during these hearings. There is no point in having Green in there one day saying "It can't be done", and a delegate from the National Association of Manufacturers in there the next saying "It must be done".

Help is needed from both sides in dealing justly with a situation that has to be dealt with. Green may talk about the constitutional right of protection against forced labor. But there are other rights involved, too.

Members of some of Green's rival trade unions have no constitutional right to throw hundreds or thousands out of work while they squabble over who shall do some small job of carpentry or plumbing or furniture moving. The real objective of Congress is not to outlaw strikes but to halt some indefensible practices which injure the public welfare.

1,500 Physicians To Attend Dallas Clinic

DALLAS —(AP)—Physicians will catch up with medical progress in Dallas next week.

Fifteen distinguished professors from North American medical schools will serve as instructors when 1,500 physicians gather here for four days of intensive study.

The Dallas Southern Clinical Society, a group of 150 Dallas doctors, is spending \$20,000 this year on the program of its sixteenth annual Spring clinical conference. From Monday through Thursday, the professors will present new methods, trends and techniques and their audiences will include physicians from Canada, Mexico and every section of the United States.

"These conferences are designed mainly for general practitioners who may need instruction in a variety of fields," a spokesman for the Dallas society said. "And this year we will have on hand many doctors recently out of service who will need quick courses in some branches of work."

FORT WORTH —(AP)—Henry D. Young, 60, postmaster of Fort Worth since 1935, died late Thursday night after being stricken at his desk in the postoffice earlier Thursday.

Young died eight days after the death of his brother, Judge Bruce Young.

"It was just a bad case of shock resulting from the death of my father," Robert B. Young, his nephew said. Robert B. Young is scheduled to take the oath of office Friday as judge of 48th District Court, succeeding his father.

Bill To Redistrict State Progresses In House Session

AUSTIN —(AP)—A bill to redistrict the state for House representation made considerable progress Thursday before the House joined the Senate in adjournment until Monday.

The redistricting proposal by Rep. Harley Sadler of Sweetwater was passed on second reading by a vote of 68 to 55, but its backers could not muster the necessary 100 votes to set aside the rules and bring it up for final consideration.

That means the House will have to take it up again and give it another majority vote before the measure can move on to the Senate for action. This was expected to take place early next week, possibly Monday.

For 26 years the Legislature has failed to redistrict the state as directed by the Constitution. It provides that redistricting take place every 10 years following the federal census' reflections on population shifts.

Would Follow 1940 Census

The pending measure would follow the 1940 census figures. Under the redistricting plan district 102 would consist of Howard, Glasscock, Martin, and Dawson Counties; 114, Ector, Midland, Upton, Andrews, Crane and Winkler Counties; and 116, Reeves, Jeff Davis, Crockett, Pecos, Loving and Ward.

Reps Sheffy Mahan of Childress and William Craig of Miami had ready for introduction a bill remitting to all counties all ad valorem taxes collected for general revenue purposes during the taxable years 1948 and 1949.

Their measure provides for total remissions because of conditions of "calamity" existing in every county. Conditions mentioned are loss of teachers, damaged public roads, loss of available water supply, soil erosion, and droughts.

Other bills ready for introduction included one by Rep. Davis Clifton of McKinney to raise the occupation tax on gasoline from 4 to 6 cents on the gallon.

The bill, which Davis said was sponsored by the County Judges and Road Commissioners Association, is designed primarily to provide more funds for the building of rural roads.

The Blackwood four-five no-trump slam convention is used today by practically all groups of players. Eastern experts avoid using it to some extent because they claim that the convention is abused by too frequent use. They say that four no-trump is not Blackwood unless it is an obvious four no-trump bid, and most of them do not consider four no-trump a slam conventional bid over a bid of three no trump.

Today's hand brings out another abuse of the Blackwood convention. It is generally conceded that the four no-trump bidder should make the decision in regard to the slam. North bid four no trump and found out that his partner held three aces.

However, the bidding also had indicated that South probably held four spades, and if he did not have the spade king, he would have to risk everything on the spade finesse.

There would have been no harm in bidding five no trump, asking for kings. If South responded with six hearts, showing two kings, then seven could be bid with safety; but if South bid six diamonds showing only one king, North could let the hand play at six diamonds.

It is true that if South had the ace and king of hearts, a grand slam could be made, but it is not worth the risk.

President Overrules Military Experts In Urging End Of Draft

WASHINGTON —(AP)— President Truman overruled his top military manpower experts in advising Congress to let the wartime Draft Act expire at the end of this month.

This became known Friday after Chairman Gurney (R-S. D.) made available to a reporter the transcript of a closed door session of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

Gurney previously reported a committee decision to urge a delay of at least three months in the transfer of draft records from local boards to state capitals because of the troubled world situation.

The recorded testimony of Tuesday's committee meeting disclosed that both Maj. Gen. W. S. Paul, Army chief of personnel, and Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, Selective Service director, concurred under questioning that they had recommended continuance of the draft even though there have been no induction calls since October.

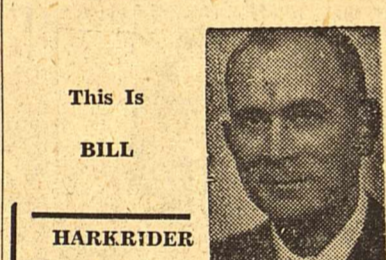
Lineups Listed

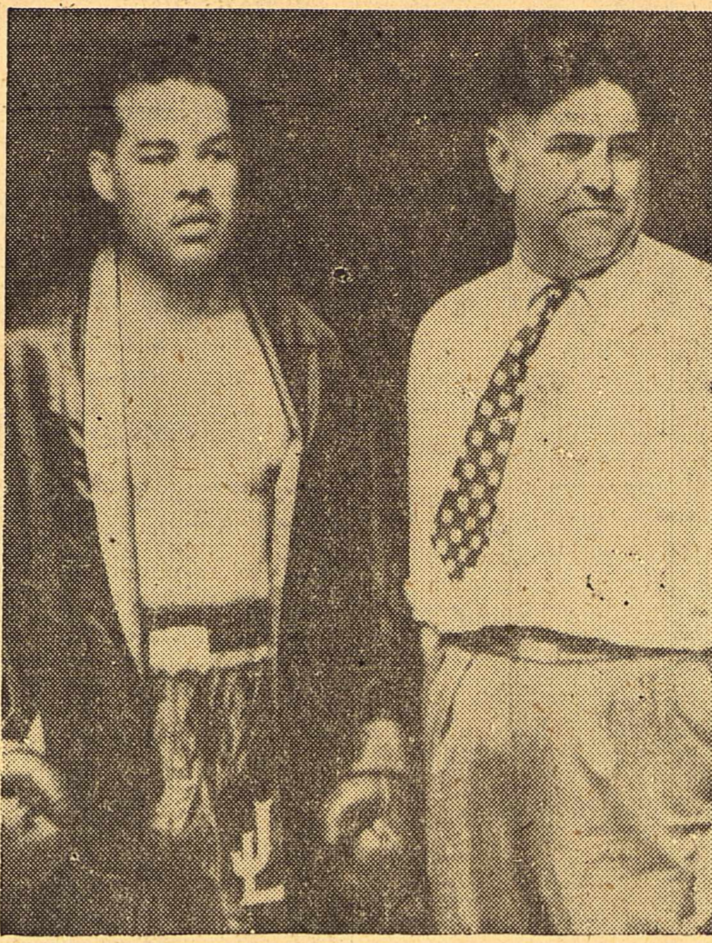
