# Ship Attempts **To Rescue 22** From Tanker

HONOLULU-(AP)-A rescue ship reported Saturday that bulkheads were/weakening on the stern sec-Dearborn and it was attempting to rescue the 22 crewmen aboard by launching a liferaft.

WASHINGTON - (P) - Senator Taft (R-Ohio) called Saturday for an official size-up on whether Russia may declare war if the United States gives financial and military

aid to Greece and Turkey. "I want to know what our top military people think of the possibility that Russia will go to war if

we carry out this program," he said, "just as we might be prompted to go to war if Russia tried to force a Communist government on Cuba.

# Phone Operators Testify About Odessa Conditions

ODESSA-(AP)-Odessa telephone employes Saturday gave conflicting testimony before Gov. Beauford Jester's fact finding board, one saying a night supervisor struck an operator and another denying knowledge of such an incident.

The board is studying the cause of the Odessa dispute which led to a statewide walkout of union telephone workers, silencing thous-ands of phones throughout

Texas.

It was appointed by Governor Jester Thursday night to investigate union charges that a supervisor was abusive, had used physical violence on operators, that she did not know her job properly, and had not distributed Christmas candy fairly. Both the union and the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company management have agreed to abide by the board's findings. Mrs. Elizabeth Allen, storm cen-

ter of this week's statewide tele-phone walkout, told the board, "I tried to do everything to get along with the girls" at the Odessa telephone exchange. She denied complaints by Odessa

union members that she was abusive, had used physical violence on operators and did not know her job properly.

Asked about an assertion by Miss Hallie Shattuck, an operator, that Mrs. Allen had pushed her chair closer to the switchboard, hurting her knee, the supervisor said she had found that sitting with the knees on the board takes strain off the back and shoulders. Miss Jean Bowes, another oper-

The incubation period (the time the person has been exposed until the symptoms arise) is short, usually 20 to 48 hours. Fever, cough and pains in the head, back and limbs are almost always present The fever usually lasts three days and causes the weakening effect of influenza. Fever lasting longer usually means a complication, that is, bronchitis or even pneumonia he said. Plenty Of Rest Needed

The termination of the acute

symptoms does not indicate complete recovery, the doctor added Many persons believe this to be true and prematurely return to their daily routine, thus usually suffering relapse. Others plod along in a weakened state, continuing to lower their resistance, thus inviting prolonged trouble. Others treat themselves and return to their duties too soon; while those under

a physician's care will be properly advised as to treatment and aft ercare.

"In preventing influenza," Dr Sadler stated, "I wish to give four simple rules to observe: "1. Keep away from persons who


