



> WASHINGTON - (AP) - President Truman Saturday night ordered a purge of all government employes where there are "reasonable grounds" to doubt their loyalty and set up sweeping new standards to test it.

His executive order directed a "loyalty investigation" of everyone who applies for a job in the executive departments and agencies, without exception, where now only questionable applicants are tested. It instructed the agencies to submit the names of all their present employes to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a check wherever this has not already been

Truman Signs Bill To End OTC And OPA

WASHINGTON -(A')- President Truman Saturday signed a \$179,-645,668 deficiency appropriation bill, which calls for complete liquidation of the Office of Temporary Controls - including the OPA - by June 30.

In a statement. Truman emphasized that his approval does not mean that rent control and sugar rationing will end by midyear.

"On the contrary, the Congress is now considering legislation to extend sugar rationing beyond March 31 and rent control beyond June 30, 1947," his statement said.

Truman announced he is issuing order immediately transferring CPA's controls over building materia's and commercial construction to Housing Expediter Frank R. Creedon.

"These few but essential controls will be maintained by Creedon as long as they are necessary and will be fully enforced," Truman said.

Bell also announced he would press Tuesday for a showdown vote on the open shop constitutional proposal. It was passed on second

reading 85 to 52, which left it 15 votes short of the necessary 100 before it can be sent to the Senate. The Senate's amendment exempts all organizations included in the National Railway Labor Act. Teacher Bill Before House



Next: A World Trade Policy

The development of a bipartisan foreign policy is certainly one of America's major postwar achievements. Tested under fire, it has withstood some sharp attacks and emerged strong and with a promise of enduring. Yet its scope is more limited than the name suggests. Our unanimity is confined to the political side of

foreign relations. In the field of international trade and finance there are still some sharp divisions. They are not so much between Democrats and Republicans as between groups within each party. And so long as they exist it annot truly be said that we have bipartisan agreement on foreign policy.

The question behind these differences is: Can the United States combine political internationalism with economic isolationism? That question has been sharpened by the election of a Republican majority in Congress, even though the answers are not divided on a strictly party though the answers are not divided on a strictly party basis. And the Republicans, realizing this, are facing the issue.

Discussion of tariffs and reciprocal trade agreements is starting up among Republican congressmen. A lot of debate, much of it hot, is inevitable before they reach an agreement. Some senators would like to go back to the Smoot-Hawley days of high tariff right away. Some want to give the trade-agreement job back to Congress. Others want to avoid this step with its "inevitable log-rolling". Still others would han tariff reductions for a mettor of Still others would ban tariff reductions for a matter of vears.

Harold E. Stassen, who never fears to stick his neck

out, had some interesting things to say on the subject.
