

#### MAGNOLIA TO DIG WILDCATS IN MIDLAND AND WINKLER

Magnolia Petroleum Company has filed applications with the Railroad Commission covering the immedi-ate drilling of wildcats in South Midland County and in East Winkler County.

The Midland County prospector will be Magnolia No. 1 Roy Glass, located about 25 miles south of Midland. It is 660 feet from east and 1,980 feet from south lines of section 30, block 40, TP survey, T-4-S, and is to start making hole by March 30. Magnolia has a considerable block in that region. The project is to drill to at least 5,000 feet.

Magnolia No. 1 R. A. Wheelen the new wildcat in East Winkler, will be five miles west of the Wheeler field, 12 miles east of Kermit and 18 miles north of Monahans. The location is 660 feet from east

and south lines of section 13, block 40, psl survey. It is contracted to 12,500 feet to explore into the Ellenburger. Operations are to start by March 31.

Location for an extra-important petroleum exploration on the north side of Dollar Hide field, in extreme Southwest Andrews County has been reported for immediate drill-

It will be The Pure Oil Company No. 1 E. P. Cowden, located 1,980 feet from west and 660 feet from south lines of section 24, block A-52, psl/survey. The drilling application, filed with the Railroad Commission, requests a permit to drill to 10,500 feet.

That depth is calculated to take the prospector into the Ellenburger. It is understood, from informed sources, that regardless of what may be shown in the Permian, in the Devonian and in the Silurian, this project likely will go ahead to investigate the lower Ordovician zone.

It is three-quarters of a mile north and one-half mile east of nearest producer from the Devonian on the northwest side of the Dollar Hide field, that being Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1-C Cowden, completed the first of the week for a good flowing production.

The new exploration, together with the lease on which it is located, along with remainder of section 24, and all of 25, 16 and 17, are understood to be owned jointly by The Pure Oil Company and Humble Oil & Refining Company. # **122 Die In** line Blast

CENTRALIA, ILL. -(P)- Amid rapidly dwindling hopes of relatives and official belief that 122 men had perished, rescue crews struggled against lethal fumes Wednesday for possible survivors of a mine explosion in the heart of the Southern Illinois coal fields.

Eighteen hours after the blast trapped virtually a complete shift at 3:30 p. m. (CST) Tuesday as it was about to leave work, rescuers, wearing gas masks, were held back by poisonous fumes halfway along the three and one-half-mile passageway.

Soldiers from Scott Field, Ill., joined state police in controlling the throngs of relatives and sightseers gathered at the tipple as the squads of workmen toiled to seal off side entries and improve ventilation.

Of a total of 131 miners trapped by the blast, nine were brought out alive, one was brought out dead, and 14 were counted dead by that official at the bottom of the 540-foot shaft.

That left 107 unaccounted for, and the man who did the checking, Chief Electrician Fred Hellmeyer, said he had no hope of finding them alive.

But not all hope had been abandoned, and rescue teams, on the job through a

freezing night, still were trying to get through poisonous gas and fallen timbers to save any who might have survived the fumes. Other experienced mine men at

the scene shared Hellmeyer's pessimistic view of the situation.





#### **New Orleans Feels Shortage As Armed** Men Halt Milk Train

NEW ORLEANS - (P) - New Orleans began to feel the pinch of a dairymen's strike Wednesday as armed farmers sought to choke off the city's supply of milk from the Florida parishes by seizing train and truck shipments.

Already many thousands of gal-lons had been spilled by strikers, who set up highway blocks to prevent motor deliveries and forced the conductor of an Illinois Central passenger train to sidetrack a tank car so that the contents could be dumped. New Orleans distributors said the

blockade had cut about half the normal milk supply of the South's largest city. The Florida parishes -the section of Louisiana which lies east of the Mississippi Riverhave been producing about 58 per cent of the state's milk supply. Baton Rouge and other cities also were being affected.

Men Carry Rifles, Pistols

The strike began Monday night after distributors served notice that they planned to cut the price paid for milk with four per cent butterfat from \$5.75 per hundredweight to \$5.

The Illinois Central train was delaved 20 minutes at Amite Tuesday by about 250 men, many of whom were armed with shotguns, rifles and pistols. The band accosted Conductor George Crisler of Mc-Comb, Miss., and told him: "We want that milk car."

"Those men looked like they meant business," Crisler said. "I didn't protest, not with those pistols staring me in the face.'


