



Jester Lashes Reds, Supports Truman's Plan

DALLAS -(P)- Gov. Beauford H. Jester Saturday night lashed Communism as a menace to humanity and urged Americans to stand behind President Truman and the doctrine which he pro-nounced in asking Congress for material aid to Greece and Turkey.

"The Truman doctrine is Jeffersonian Democracy on a global pattern," Jester declared in a speech prepared for delivery at the Texas Jefferson Day dinner at the Adolphus Hotel in Dallas.

"His bold concept of world justice is a challenge to the soulless dogmas of Communism. The truman doctrine does not belong to the Democratic Party; it belongs to humanity."

The governor predicted that historians of future years would say that America came of age in the

"The United States and all of the free world must rally behind President Truman in this decisive hour," he told his audience. x x x "We must see to it that Jeffersonian Democracy and justice shall prevail in the community of na-

Turns To Texas Politics The speaker commended the President's action in moving to expunge disloyal employes from the government, then turned the spclight briefly on Texas politics when

he declared: "Texas Democrats can be proud that they determined last Summer that our state should not be made the spawning ground for alien radicalism. Texans demonstrated that they could not be stampeded by synthetic revolutions.

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

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ministers agreed tentatively Saturday night on establishing seven administrative agencies for Germany and adopted a timetable under which a provisional government would be created 12 months after the agencies come into being.

The ministers bogged down, however, on issues connected with the makeup of the agencies, which would administer on a national basis such matters as food, transport communications, industry, finance and foreign trade.

The United States, Britain and Russia were agreed upon creation of the agencies. France wanted the Saar excluded.

Agree On Advisory Council There was four-power agreement however, on suggestion from British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin that an advisory council should be et up three months after establishing the agencies and that nine months later the provisional German government should come into

Meanwhile, in a committee meeting outside the council Soviet Dep-uty Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky charged angrily that U. S. Ambassador Robert D. Murphy was distorting the Soviet viewpoint when Murphy asserted that the Russians were seeking to create a strong central government in Germany similiar to that which existed under Adolph Hitler.

The brief flareup, ended with calm response from Murphy and an apology from Vishinsky.




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A telephone strike cannot be justified

Encouraging News From China

During the past year-and-a-half Americans have learned to take good news from China with a grain of cautious optimism. There was that announced truce between Nationalists and Communists that didn't halt the fighting. There were various democratic resolutions by the government that came to nothing. And so on.

So we give two restrained cheers at the news that the Kuomintang has announced a reorganization which will include minor parties in the government, and that Russia has at last agreed to pull out of Dairen, Manchuria.

The former step came as a result of a nine-day meeting of the Kuomintang's Central Executive Committee. The sessions seem to have been marked by bitterness and by clashes between right and center. But it is somewhat encouraging to read that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek took a stand against the extreme right and scolded the committee for allowing many of its good resolutions in the past to be forgotten.

It was also encouraging to read the committee's manifesto which promised the end of the Kuomintang's one-party "political tutelage".

It is unlikely that the Kuomintang was thinking particularly of the U.S. when it promised again this longneeded reform. Surely it must have occurred to the generalissimo d the top party leaders that such action could benefit m in the field of international relations.

The Chiang government has long been a source of official and unofficial embarrassment to the U.S. Even those who longed for peace in China and disliked the prospect of Russian domination there have had serious reason to doubt that a Communist dictatorship would be any worse for the Chinese people than the present dictatorship of the right.

The complexion of the Chiang government has split American public opinion. It raises essentially the same question, in regard to American support, as the present Greek government.

The fact remains, however, that if the American government is embarking on even a limited program to check the expansion of communism, the Chinese situation must be faced and a decision must be reached. If the Kuomintang really means to relax its dictatorship and. and in good faith, install even a limited representative democracy, the decision will be simplified.

As for the promised Russian move out of Dairen, there, too, Americans must wait and see. But if the Soviet government does honor its agreement to turn the port over to China, perhaps Washington will have reason to

think that its firmer policy toward Russia is taking effect. It is true that Russia's conciliatory answer to the American note on Dairen was announced on the same day that Russia, in the UN, was vetoing a U. S.-backed resolution holding Albania responsible for mine-laying in the Corfu Channel. From this one might guess, until proven wrong, that the Soviet government is refusing to budge in regions where its dominance is secure, but is pulling in its horns in places where the issue is still in doubt.

Other sponsors plead for Congress to legalize Freedom Day (for former slaves), Good Friday, Pulaski Day, Patriot's Day (for the Lexington Minute Men), Shut-In's Day, American Indian Day, Dedication Day (for the Gettysburg address), Edison Day, Marine Corps Day.

We, too, love Grammy. We'd like to please her.
But how about Sweethearts' Day? After all, most of us

had at least twice as many sweethearts as we had grandmas, and we loved them, too, didn't we? Or can we drop the whole business and agree with that congressman, himself a grandfather, who snorted: "If we keep on we'll have more holidays than wash days."


