**Building Continues At Lively Clip In Midland As Permits Climb To \$580,945**

Midland construction continues at a lively clip, and the year's building permits Saturday amounted to \$580,945.

Last week's permits totaled \$60,000, a new high for recent weeks. This is compared to \$35,000 for the previous week.

Phillips Petroleum Company received four permits to build four residences at 1400-1402-1404-1406 West Tennessee Street. The total amount of the project is \$20,000. Each house will be 27 by 46 feet and material will be lumber. Each will be a six room dwelling.

Fred F. Kotzka will build a \$12,000 residence at 1204 West Storey Street. It will be a brick-veneer structure with a two-car garage attached. The building will be 69 by 38 feet.

Several business-building permits were issued. R. A. Robinson and F. M. Dale received a permit for a \$4,000 building at 1910 West Front Street. It will be a body and paint shop, 26 by 46 feet, of concrete and tile.

S. J. Robertson was issued a permit for \$4,000 to build a washateria at 2010 West Front Street. The size will be 26 by 50 feet, and materials, tile and stucco.

Banner Creamery took a \$3,500 permit to build a warehouse and garage at 110 North Weatherford Street. The size will be 36 by 140 feet, and materials, brick and tile.

Wilkinson Estate was issued a \$2,000 permit to alter a brick business building at 100 North Main Street. The front will be re-modeled and the interior renovated.

F. L. Key took out a permit for \$2,000 to build a cabinet shop at 415 South Baird Street. The shop will be 40 by 60 feet and built of corrugated iron on frame.

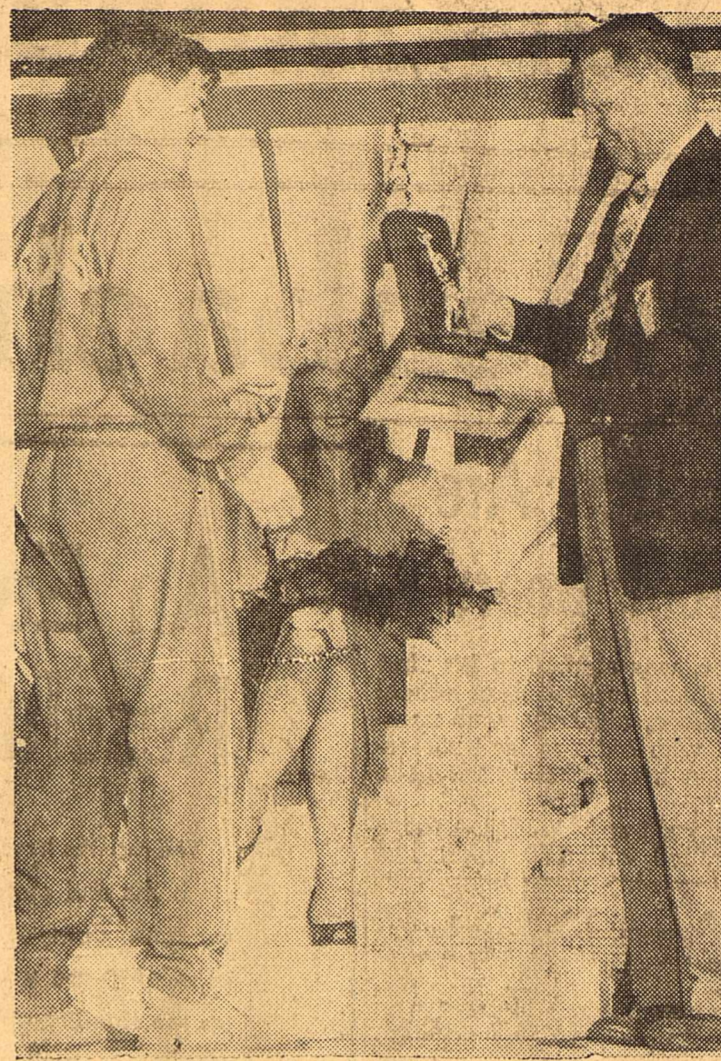
**Texas Wins Southern Traffic Safety Award**

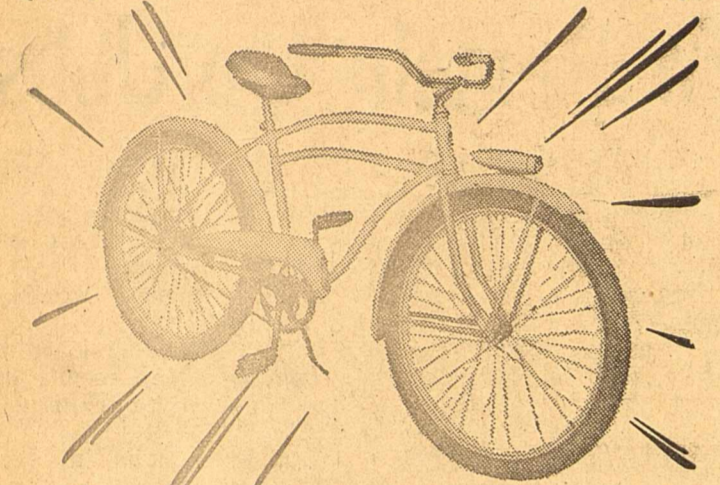

**Jester Lashes Reds, Supports Truman's Plan**

DALLAS — (AP) — Gov. Beauford H. Jester Saturday night lashed Communism as a menace to humanity and urged Americans to stand behind President Truman and the doctrine which he pronounced in asking Congress for material aid to Greece and Turkey.

"The Truman doctrine is Jeffersonian Democracy on a global pattern," Jester declared in a speech prepared for delivery at the Texas Jefferson Day dinner at the Adolphus Hotel in Dallas.

"His bold concept of world justice is a challenge to the soulless dogmas of Communism. The Truman doctrine does not belong to the Democratic Party; it belongs to humanity."

The governor predicted that historians of future years would say that America came of age in the Truman Administration.

"The United States and all of the free world must rally behind President Truman in this decisive hour," he told his audience. x x x "We must see to it that Jeffersonian Democracy and justice shall prevail in the community of nations."

**Turns To Texas Politics**

The speaker commended the President's action in moving to expunge disloyal employees from the government, then turned the spotlight briefly on Texas politics when he declared:

"Texas Democrats can be proud that they determined last Summer that our state should not be made the spawning ground for alien radicalism. Texans demonstrated that they could not be stampeded by synthetic revolutions."

"And I would like to predict that Russia-firsters of the Henry Wallace stripe will get very little aid and comfort in Texas next year. There may be an appropriate place for Henry Wallace and his appointment crowd, but I maintain that it is not in the Democratic Party."

Expressing regret at the absence of United States Sen. Tom Connally, who had been sought as speaker for the celebration, Jester said, "No man has done more to advance the ideals of Jeffersonian Democracy and justice throughout the world than has Tom Connally."

## Ministers Agree On Administrative Agencies In Reich

MOSCOW—(P)—The foreign ministers agreed tentatively Saturday night on establishing seven administrative agencies for Germany and adopted a timetable under which a provisional government would be created 12 months after the agencies come into being.

The ministers bogged down, however, on issues connected with the makeup of the agencies, which would administer on a national basis such matters as food, transport, communications, industry, finance and foreign trade.

The United States, Britain and Russia were agreed upon creation of the agencies. France wanted the Saar excluded.

There was four-power agreement, however, on suggestion from British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin that an advisory council should be set up three months after establishing the agencies and that nine months later the provisional German government should come into being.

Meanwhile, in a committee meeting outside the council Soviet Deputy Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky charged angrily that U. S. Ambassador Robert D. Murphy was distorting the Soviet viewpoint when Murphy asserted that the Russians were seeking to create a strong central government in Germany similar to that which existed under Adolph Hitler.

The brief flareup, ended with a calm response from Murphy and an apology from Vishinsky.

## U. S. Commitments Total Seven Billions

WASHINGTON—(P)—Senator Byrd (D-Va) Saturday added up the money to be laid out by the United States under its international commitments in the next 15 months and announced a total of \$7,043,100,000.

This is an addition to the \$400,000,000 requested by President Truman for Greece and Turkey to halt the spread of Communism.

Byrd based his total on Budget Bureau figures compiled at his request.

The largest item is \$2,850,000,000 still available to the British as of March 1 out of their \$3,750,000,000 loan.

## Chinese Reds Kill Five Marines In Raid On U. S. Ammunition Dump

TIENTSIN, CHINA—(P)—Ammunition hungry Chinese Communists killed five U. S. Marines and wounded 16 Saturday in a smartly planned raid on the Marines' principal North China depot, at Hsinho, 22 miles east of Tientsin.

Most if not all of the Marine deaths occurred when the raiders blew up part of the dump. The Communists left six of their own dead on the scene of the four-hour and 15-minute battle and carried away an estimated 100 wounded. No prisoners were taken on either side.

Four hundred Chinese government troops took up the pursuit northward while Marine observation planes kept the retreating raiders under surveillance.

The Marines themselves organized a heavily armed convoy under Col. Julian N. Frisbie, commandant of the Fifth Regiment.

A Marine statement said identification of the dead Chinese left no doubt that they were Communists.

Fourteen of the wounded Marines required surgery and three were critically hurt. However, the First Division's surgeon, Dr. Eugene V. Jobe, expressed hope that all would recover.

Marine accounts gave this description of this bloodiest brush to date with the Communists:

Presumably goaded by a shortage of ammunition and other supplies, the Communists closed in on the 5-square mile dump area shortly after midnight.

One hundred attackers struck from the North and a second group of 100 raced in from the East, followed by two waves of 100 each.

The first shot from the diversionary force on the North was heard at 12:20 a. m. The others penetrated the dump and began loading an undetermined number of artillery shells onto pack mules.

## First Golden Era Of Sports—Tilden Moved Tennis Out Of Country Club Class

NEW YORK—The United States Lawn Tennis Association organized in 1881 when Richard Sears won his first of seven straight championships. But it wasn't until 40 years later that Big Bill Tilden came along and the sport moved from the leisurely country club class to national prominence.

It was Tilden's playing that helped the game thrive during the first Golden Era of sports following World War I. While experts are predicting another such era in sports, Tilden was to tennis what Babe Ruth was to baseball, Bobby Jones was to golf and Jack Demp-

sey was to boxing. They constituted the Big Four of the first Golden Era.

From 1920 through 1928 William Tatem Tilden 2d dominated the tennis courts and was ranked No. 1. He participated in 11 Davis Cup matches and won two singles tests in this international competition six straight years from 1920 through 1925.

Tilden also helped the United States win the 1926 Davis Cup tests, and during the next four years, with France each time beating American netmen, he scored victories in at least one of his two singles engagements, twice averting American shutouts.

From 1919 through 1925 he swept all competition before him to win six consecutive national singles crowns. He won his seventh in 1929 before turning professional in 1931. Twice before Charley Pyle attempted to convert Big Bill into a pro, Tilden turned down the chance in 1920 and again in 1926.

The greatest tennis player of all gained much of his color with a cannonball service and a backhand stroke that served an offensive weapon as well as a defensive one. Off the court he often became involved in stormy battles with the USLTA over his appearance in plays and his syndicated stories on tennis. He said he violated none of the amateur codes and often won his point.

Tilden began playing tennis at the age of five. He worked on an all-court game at the age of 18 despite warnings of experts. It took him six years to perfect an all-around game but when he finished experimenting he could return a ball from the baseline equally as well as he could deliver his famous volley from the net.

In 1920 at the age of 27 he was the first American to win the British title. In 1930 he won the crown for the third time.

Tilden's most famous tennis battles were those with Little Bill Johnston. They met six times in the finals of the nationals with Tilden taking the honors in the last five.

Tilden, born Feb. 19, 1893, at Germantown, Pa., was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1922. That was a year that nearly ended his career.

Playing an exhibition match at Bridgeton, N. J., Tilden ran into a wire back of the court and cut the middle finger of his right hand. Blood poisoning developed and surgeons said there was only a remote chance of recovery without amputation. Big Bill took that chance and recovered.

When he turned pro in 1931 he beat the best in the field, including Vinny Richards, with whom he won three national doubles titles. Ellsworth Vines, now a pro golf star, was the first pro racket wielder to take the measure of Tilden in an extended series of matches.

The angular Tilden wasn't the most popular tennis player in the world for he often aroused the ire of linesmen by his tactics.

Put On Good Show  
When he thought a linesman made a bad call on a shot close to the line Big Bill would freeze his motion and grimace like a ham actor. He put on a good show, though, even when he extended Wayne Sabin to five sets before bowing in the professional tournament at Forest Hills last summer.

At the age of 59 his tennis effectiveness had dulled but gallery-ites who could look back 20 years still recalled that he was Mr. Tennis. But his career has been ended—or at least interrupted—on a different note.

Tilden recently received a nine months jail sentence on his own plea of guilt to a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a 14-year-old boy in California.

Francois Vidocq, famed French detective who died in 1857, started his career in Paris as a paid spy for police and became so successful that he was made chief of its detective department.

## Sailor Held In Strangulation Of South Texas Girl

CORPUS CHRISTI—(P)—Billie Rust Brown, 21, daughter of Mrs. C. M. Rust of Haslet, was strangled to death in her bed here early Saturday, police reported.

A 22-year-old sailor, veteran of war service in the South Pacific and Philippines, was held in the county jail in connection with the crime.

Justice of the peace B. A. Carter returned a coroner's verdict of murder by strangulation.

Miss Brown came to Corpus Christi last January and had been employed by a local title company.

Two cab drivers said they found the sailor, a Ward Island aviation radioman, wandering the streets in a dazed condition just before dawn. They called police and the man, officers said, led them to the apartment where they found the young woman's nude body.

The victim was born at Saginaw, February 28, 1926. Besides her mother, she is survived by a brother, Noble Lee Rust, and a sister, Mrs. Georgia Chappalear, both of Fort Worth.

The body was sent to Fort Worth.

## Judge Dismisses 92 Portal Pay Suits

DALLAS—(P)—Federal Judge W. H. Atwell waved his legal wand Saturday and when he was through, the number of defendants in a portal-to-portal pay suit had dwindled from 93 to one.

In sustaining a motion to dismiss actions brought against the Lone Star Cement Corporation, Judge Atwell singled out the claim of Owen Carter as having some merit, and kept it legally alive. Carter contended he spent nearly 30 minutes of his own time each working day warming up a company machine.

Judge Atwell dismissed 92 actions which claimed overtime pay by reason of time spent in changing clothes and washing.

## LARGE AIRLINER LANDS SAFELY IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—(P)—American Airlines said Saturday night that a trans-Atlantic Constellation which ran into trouble after taking off from New York for London landed safely here at 7:15 p. m.

## Damage Heavy When Freighter Jumps Rails

AMARILLO—(P)—Twenty cars of a 92-car Westbound Santa Fe freight train were derailed and smashed at Panhandle, Saturday. None of the five-man crew was injured.

Santa Fe officials made no estimate of the damage, but it was evident that it would run into thousands of dollars. Included in the damaged cargo were a number of new automobiles, car parts, refrigerators, tractors, heavy construction pipe, other items of heavy equipment and groceries.

Between 300 and 500 feet of rails were ripped out by careening cars which piled up on the Panhandle main street crossing. Main line traffic was held up about five hours while wrecking crews cleared a path through the wreckage and replaced rails.

Railroad officials expressed belief a broken journal on one of the cars caused the wreck.

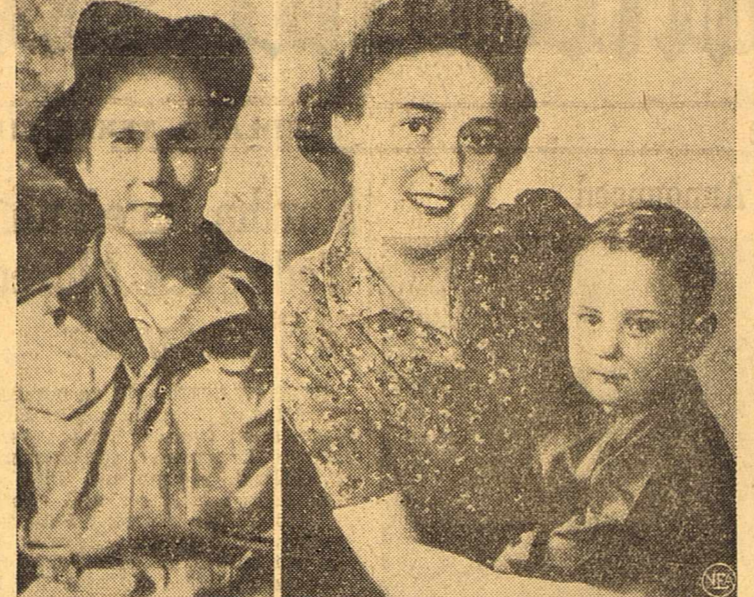

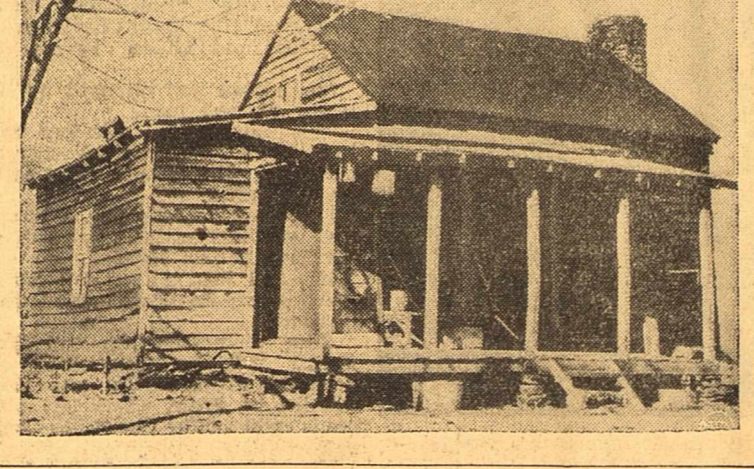

### Complete Seeding On Two Pastures

Seeding of range and pasture land was completed last week on the farm and ranch of Earl Ray and Herd Midkiff, cooperators with the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District. Ray seeded 7 1/2 acres of retired cultivated land with a mixture of blue grama, buffalo grass, weeping lovegrass, sand dropseed and Hubam clover. This mixture was seeded with a special grass seeding drill to provide a permanent cover of desirable pasture grasses.

Midkiff, using a mixture of locally adapted grasses, such as buffalo and blue grama, and other promising grasses such as yellow bluestem, weeping lovegrass and slender grama, seeded five acres of range land with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service.

**Farm Plans Approved**  
Thirteen farm plans were approved by the supervisors at their monthly meeting at Stanton last Tuesday, Herd Midkiff, district supervisor, reported Saturday. Included in the plans were A. C. Teinert, W. C. Bell, Herman Dunn, J. H. Lay, and W. M. Bramlett.

The complete soil conservation program planned by these cooperators include such measures as crop residue management, crop rotation, soil building crops, cover crops, and contour cultivation. The conservation measures adapted by the farmers are based on surveys made by the Soil Conservation Service to determine the capabilities of the soil, the degree of erosion and the slope of the land.

### Albania Mine Case May Be Sent To World Court

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y.—(AP)—The 15 men sitting in the \$1,500,000 peace palace in The Hague may have a case to work on shortly.

The International Court of Justice, legal arm of the United Nations, has been in operation a year without any cases. Now the Security Council appears ready to toss a job to the \$18,000-a-year judges.

Britain set the machinery in motion to refer her mine-laying charges against Albania to the world court with a resolution in the council. Several nations immediately supported the step and close observers of the council's work saw a possible Russian veto as the only barrier.

Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet deputy foreign minister, exercised the veto to kill an earlier council verdict finding Albania "had knowledge" of the laying of the mines which wrecked two Royal Navy destroyers and killed 44 sailors last October 22 in Corfu Channel. However, there was doubt whether Gromyko would use the veto again to block a reference of the complaint to the court.

### Chinese Nationals Capture Two Cities

PEIPING—(AP)—Government capture of two cities in rugged Northwest China was reported Saturday as Nationalist forces moving from North and South threatened to squeeze Chinese Red troops in Central Shensi Province in the jaws of a vise.

The Shensi cities reported taken were Wayaopao, 50 miles north of fallen Yen-an, and Tingpien, in the Northwest.

Government troops which advanced from Yen-an to take Wayaopao formed the South jaw of a vise which Chinese reports said might soon close on Red forces. These reports said a Northern column, moving down from Yulin, was only 13 miles away, separated by a stretch of easy terrain.

### Natural Gas Tax Bill Is Passed

AUSTIN—(AP)—Most Texas legislators were gone from Austin Saturday, enjoying Easter holidays at home after a stormy, fast-moving session that saw the House accomplish more major work than any previous day of the session.

When representatives called it quits, they had disposed of bills that:

1. Levy a new tax on natural gas to the tune of an estimated \$29,000,000 per year.
2. Prohibit mass picketing.
3. Restrict picketing of public utilities to the extent that continuous service may not be disrupted.
4. Establish a policeman's and fireman's civil service system for cities of 10,000 or more population that wish to adopt such a plan.
5. Provide a secret ballot for elections in Texas.
6. Revise and modernize Texas laws regulating state highway traffic.

**To Governor And Senate**

The labor bill dealing with picketing of public utilities now goes to the governor's desk. The others go to the Senate for approval.

The gas bill levies a tax of one and eighty-five one-hundredths cents on each 1,000 feet of gas gathered in Texas. Recycled or reprocessed gas which returns to the earth is exempt, as is gas used for fuel in connection with plant and lease operations and development for oil and gas, gas lawfully flared and vented, and gas used in the production of carbon black.

### Giant Backfield Star Ousted From Gridiron

PHILADELPHIA—(AP)—The door barring Merle Hapes and Frank Filchock from professional football—probably forever has swung shut.

Bert Bell, commissioner of the National Football League, suspended them indefinitely for their roles in the attempted fix of last year's championship game.

Bell said the New York Giant's backfield stars were found guilty of "actions detrimental to the welfare of the National Football League and of professional football."

Only 24 hours earlier three men had been sentenced to prison terms for their parts in the attempt to fix last December's game.

Testimony at the trial of Alvin Paris and the three others, Harvey Stemmer, David Krakauer and Jerome Zarowitz, disclosed that Hapes and Filchock had refused the bribe offers.

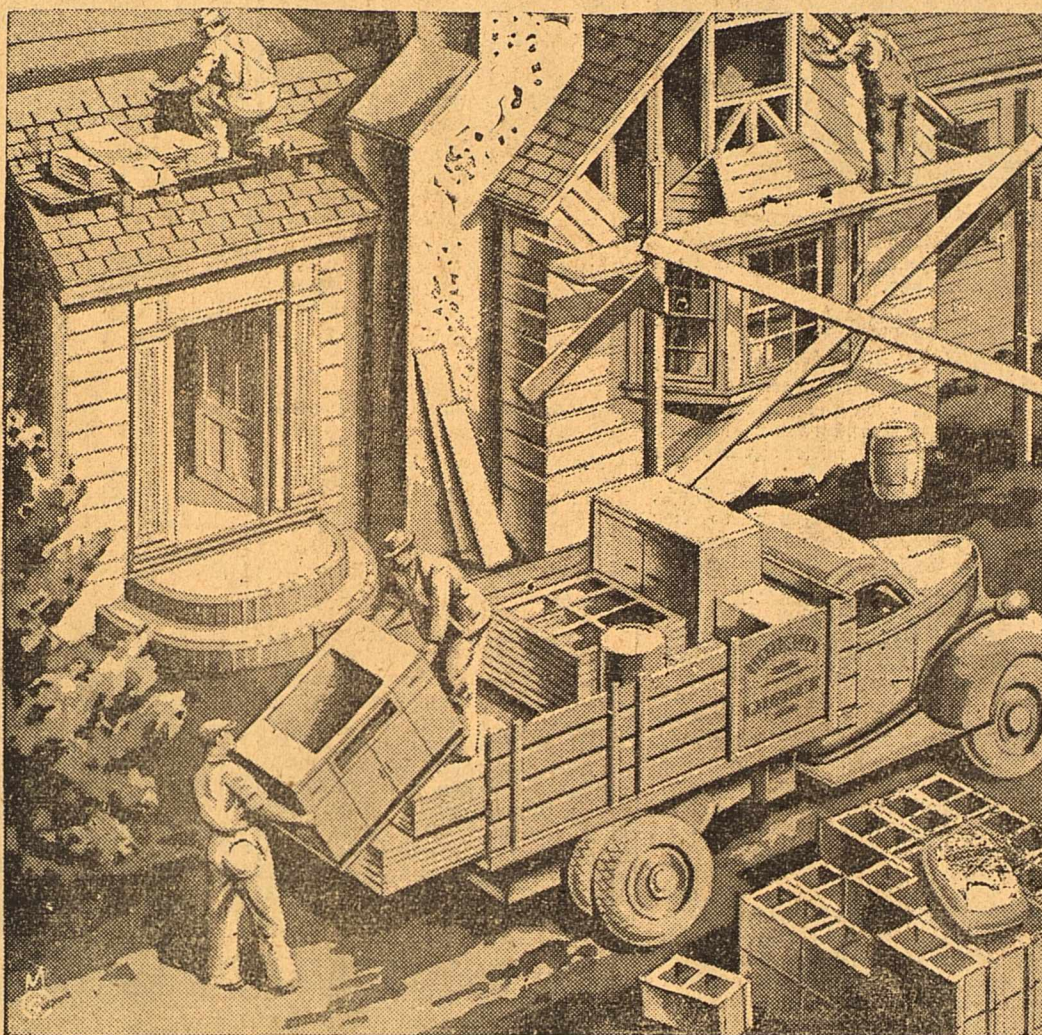

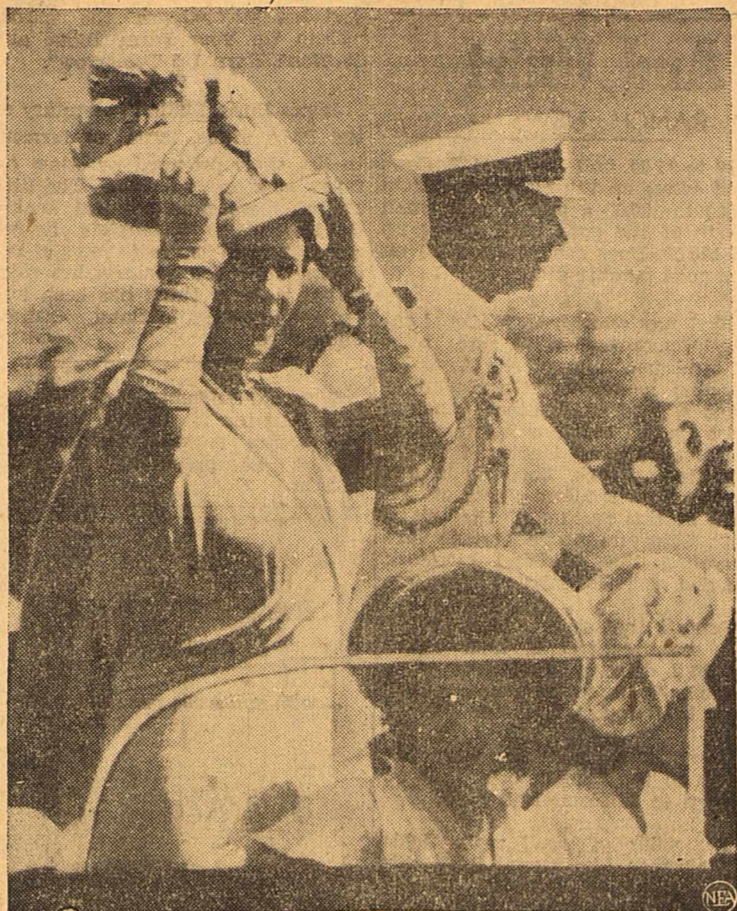
The Rev. Lee Bailey, pastor of the Greenwood Baptist Church, will lead the services at that church, and J. C. Brooks will have charge of the music.

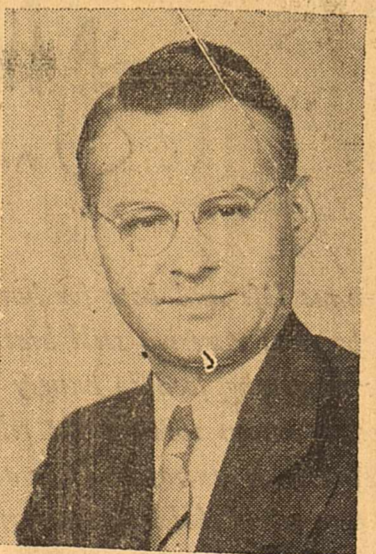

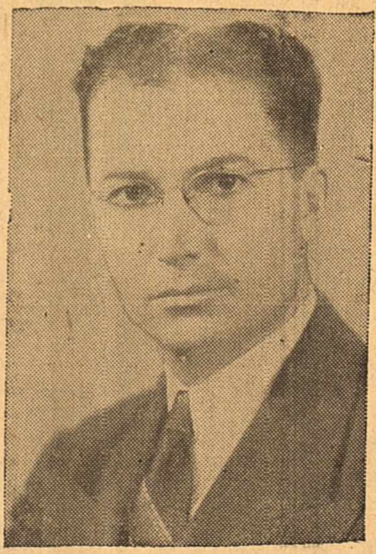

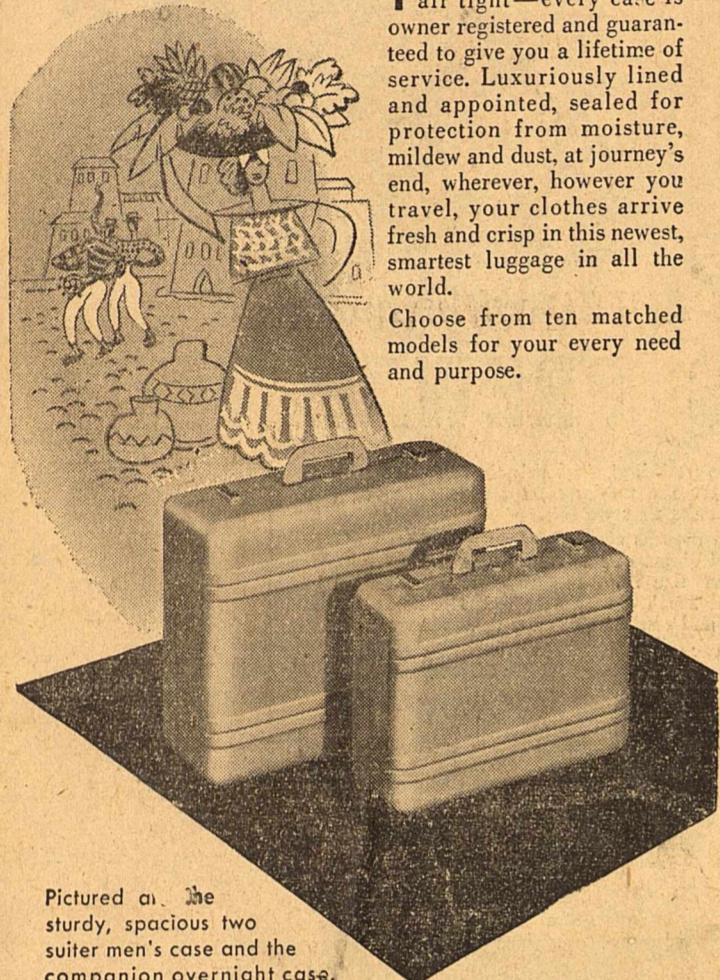
