

Henry Ford Dies In Dearborn Home

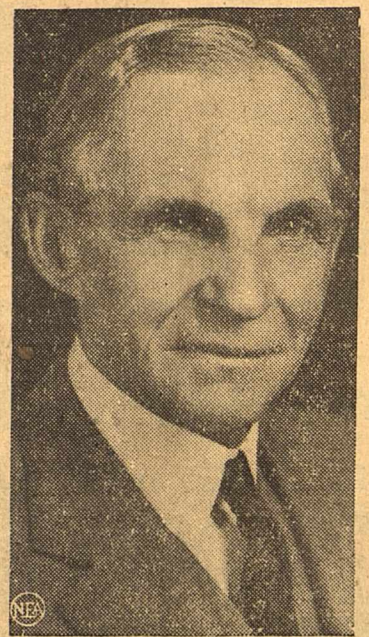

DETROIT—(P)—In the flickering light of kerosene lamps and candles Henry Ford, famed pioneer of the automobile industry, died at 11:40 p. m. Monday night in his home in nearby Dearborn.

He would have reached his 84th birthday next July 30.

High flood waters of the River Rouge running through the Ford estate had cut power and heating services at the residence—and a wood-burning fireplace warmed the room.

Death Came Suddenly

Ford's death was due to a cerebral hemorrhage.

It came after the noted industrialist had spent a vigorous day inspecting flood-water damage around the Ford plant and was making plans for another inspection Tuesday morning.

Friends said he had never appeared in better health.

At his bedside were his wife, Mrs. Clara Bryant Ford, and a member of the household staff.

A family statement said he had retired at 8 p. m. and had awakened at 10:15 p. m., complaining he felt slightly ill. Mrs. Ford gave him a drink of water. He died 25 minutes later.

The statement said that even telephone service from the residence was out of commission because of the flood waters and that an employee had to go to the company's engineering laboratory, nearly half a mile from the residence, to summon a physician.

Funeral Set Thursday

Funeral services will be held from St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral in Detroit on Thursday at an hour to be announced later.

The body was taken to a Detroit funeral home Tuesday morning and will be returned to the Ford Greenfield Village to lie in state all day Wednesday.

All Ford operations throughout the world will be suspended on Thursday. Flags on all Ford property will be at half staff until after the funeral.

Ford's death marked the passing of not only one of the world's most noted industrialists but of an individual who developed one of the most colossal family fortunes the world has known out of what often had been ridiculed as "a lot of crazy ideas."

Described in numerous citations as "of the select company assured of perpetual fame," Ford, a one-time obscure farm youth, was also credited with having "brought into being an industry that changed the course of the world."

Billion Dollar Empire

He developed his great industrial empire for which he was once said to have refused \$1,000,000,000 out of an idea for a cheap automobile and an initial capital investment, mainly by his friends, of \$28,000.

That was in 1903, and at his death, the great empire belonged exclusively to his family and had manufactured more than 31,000,000 vehicles.

Ford returned only a week ago from his annual visit to the Ford estate in Georgia and was said to have been in excellent health at that time.

He had been planning to celebrate his wife's birthday and their 59th wedding anniversary next Friday.

The passing of the elder Ford ended a career that had many facets. He was an ardent pacifist, a prohibitionist, deeply interested in sociology and in the development of agriculture as an adjunct to industry.

For a long time in World War II he refused to believe the German invasion of Poland meant a real war; he often referred to the conflict in its early stages as a "phony war."

Once it engulfed the United States, however, Ford entered wholly into the production of war weapons. "I want peace," he said, "and I'm fighting like hell to get it."

Nine Killed As Bus Plunges Into River

SEATTLE—(P)—Eight bus passengers and an oil truck driver lost their lives Monday night when a heavy Seattle-bound North Coast Lines bus collided with the tanker at the south city limits and then plunged into the Duwamish River, running alongside the Pacific Highway.

Twelve other passengers and the bus driver, Melvin D. Long, 22, of Olympia, survived, some with severe but none with critical injuries.

Heroic rescue work by eye witnesses and passing motorists, who waded into the river and climbed atop the two-thirds submerged bus, prevented a heavier death toll.

The first rescuers at the scene hacked holes into the roof to pull to safety frightened passengers who were fighting for air inside the wreckage.

The bus driver escaped by kicking out the windshield while a number of men got out without assistance and clung to driftwood in the river until rescued.

Thirty minutes afterward the scene was one of confusion as deputy sheriffs, police officers and state patrolmen worked in a heavy rain with artificial respiration and pulmotors to revive passengers as they were removed from the river.

Smiling Texan Riding Scooter To Alaska

LOS ANGELES—(P)—A jovial, round Texan, bound for Alaska, started from Brownsville two weeks ago with only one passenger aboard his three-wheel motor scooter.

Now D. A. Gregory, whose home is at Harlingen, has four passengers on his tiny northbound vehicle. His pet fox terrier, Pooch, became a mother before reaching Los Angeles.

Gregory named the puppies Scooter, Toboggan and Klondike and they ride in a wire basket.

"We're just going for the trip," explained the Texan. "I'm an oil field worker and a preacher—a kind of good will ambassador, passing out a good word here and there. People smile when they see a big fat man like me riding this little scooter on such a long trip. And I like to see them smile."

"I hope we get a million smiles on our trek."

REPORT FROM MOSCOW—American Sources Say Stymied Meet May Close Soon

MOSCOW—(P)—American sources said Tuesday that unless the Russians ceased what the Americans called obstructionist tactics in the Foreign Ministers' Council the whole conference could end very soon.

These informants said a showdown was taking shape within the four-power council between Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov and the ministers of the Western powers.

The basic issue is whether the four powers must continue long discussions on current German problems which have proved fruitless, or whether they can go on to frontiers and other matters, with the possibility of eventual agreement on the Austrian treaty.

All Viewpoints Known

An American official said the German subject had been talked out and that all views were known. He said nothing new could be said, and that if the Russians were unwilling to go with other matters, the conference might as well end.

The Russian proposal to permit Germany to choose by plebiscite the form of her future government was regarded by Western diplomats as an effort to offset the effect upon the German people of the insistent Soviet demands for \$10,000,000,000 in reparations.

These demands, thus far blocked by U. S. Secretary of State Marshall, British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault, have created a problem for Russia in German politics. This was regarded by some delegates as the underlying cause for the plebiscite proposal, rejected by the Western powers Monday night.

Jester To Broadcast Open Shop Decision

AUSTIN—(P)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester's office Tuesday confirmed an announcement broadcast Monday night that he would go on the air at 6:45 p. m. to tell the people whether he will sign or veto the open shop bill.

UNIONS SETTLE DOWN FOR LONG SHUTDOWN—

Conciliator 'Hopes' To End Long-Distance Walkout

A federal conciliator declared the government was "hopeful" of a settlement Tuesday in the long distance phase of the nation-wide telephone strike as the American public adjusted itself to sharply curtailed telephone service.

Federal Conciliator Peter G. Manno told newsmen as negotiations were resumed in Washington between spokesmen for the American Union of Telephone Workers representing long distance employees and the American Telephone and Telegraph Company's long lines division.

"We are hopeful that a settlement will be effected in the long lines today," Manno emphasized, that settlement of long lines disputes would not end the entire walkout of 294,000 telephone workers. Long distance service has hit telephone users hardest in the two-day old strike.

Meanwhile, two new breaks in ranks of striking upstate New York telephone employees developed Tuesday as Schenectady members of the Empire State Telephone Union returned to work and the union's Binghamton council refused to participate.

Local Accepts Nine Per Cent

The development followed action Monday by members of the Albany-Troy council who had refused to join the walkout and by the Jamestown Federation of Telephone Workers who accepted a company offer of a nine per cent wage increase locally and returned to their jobs.

Calls between dial telephones continued without interruption, but calls over manual phones, or traveling the long distance lines of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, parent organization of the Bell System, generally were limited to emergency calls. Of the nation's 31,600,000 telephones, 18,700,000 are dial-operated.

Negotiations to end the coast-to-coast strike by the independent National Federation of Telephone Workers, were resumed Tuesday in Washington and in many other cities over the nation, but Joseph A. Beirne, NPTW president, said the unions were settling down for a long shutdown.

By using supervisory personnel to take over strikers' jobs, the AT&T said it was able to handle 22 1/2 per cent of usual long distance traffic. The company spokesman said in New York that while the company had announced it would accept only emergency calls, it also was handling "necessary calls" which he described as of a serious rather than a social nature.

Eight A&M Students Will Testify Tuesday Night Before Legislators

AUSTIN—(P)—A joint House and Senate investigating committee Tuesday night begins a probe of Texas A&M College, torn by dissension for years. The chairman of the probing group, Senator Fred Harris, Dallas lawyer, has declared that he'll try to stop the investigation if it's determined that the dissension does not involve the Legislature.

Five More A&M Cadets Dismissed From Corps

COLLEGE STATION—(P)—Five more cadets were removed from the Texas A&M College cadet corps Monday after hearings before military tribunals.

The hearings against senior members of the corps on charges of disobedience resumed Monday after a recess over the Easter holidays.

Eight other cadets were assessed lighter punishment and two found innocent. To date, 32 cadets have been dismissed from the corps, 50 have received lesser punishments and 19 have been absolved.

A legislative hearing Tuesday night in Austin is scheduled to air troubles of the cadet corps among other matters being looked into at the college.

There was little outward notice of the controversy between students and the administration when classes resumed Monday after the Easter holidays.

Cadets dismissed from the cadet corps last week have moved into non-regulation dormitories and appeared on the campus in shirts and slacks, instead of smart military uniforms.

States Dire Concern Over U.S. Inflation

WASHINGTON—(P)—President Truman Tuesday called a special session of his Cabinet for Wednesday to explore the price situation.

Presidential Press Secretary Charles G. Ross said that Chairman Edwin G. Nourse of the President's Economic Advisory Council has been asked to submit a report at that time.

Truman, who has repeatedly expressed concern over rising prices, declared in a speech Saturday night he hoped industry would not go "whole hog for profits."

Ordinarily the Cabinet meets on Friday.

The economic council has been making a continuous survey of the price situation.

Nourse and his council colleagues went to the White House Tuesday morning for a preliminary discussion with Truman.

The President told Democratic Party leaders at the Jefferson Day dinner Saturday night that unless prices are held down an inflationary spiral will result. He said this might price industry out of its markets and lead to widespread unemployment.

Ross disclosed plans for the special cabinet meeting at his morning news conference.

He said it will be a "special meeting" to hear an economic statement from Nourse relating to prices.

It will not be a formal report, Ross said, but rather a statement for the information of the cabinet and discussion.

"You might call it a seminar," he added.

Ross, under further questioning, emphasized that the meeting will not be concerned with either the nationwide telephone strike or the safety walkout in the coal mines.

Lewis Tells Miners To Enter Certified Pits

WASHINGTON—(P)—John L. Lewis Tuesday expressed "gratification" that coal production Monday was "substantial" and instructed miners to resume work as fast as each mine is certified as safe.

Lewis, president of the AFL United Mine Workers, made public a telegram he sent to each district president of the union. It said:

"This office expresses gratification that production Monday for reexamined and re-certified mines and strip pits were substantial."

"I confirm policy of immediate resumption of production of each mine as fast as it is certified by federal mine inspectors as being in conformity with federal mine safety code."

"Let us all hope that the belated efforts of the federal government to establish safety in the mines will not prove to be a spasmodic gesture and will pave the way for mandatory safety legislation by the federal congress."

Monday's production was estimated by the coal mines administration at about 32 per cent of a normal day's output.

Two Pedestrians Hit By Automobile

Two pedestrians, Dan Bizzell and Robert Webb, were hit by an automobile at Wall and Colorado Streets Monday, without serious injury.

Police reported the car was driven by Cordelia Taylor, who carried the boys to the hospital for observation. They were not seriously injured.

The accident occurred at a traffic light, officers reported.

Fruitless Argument

KANSAS CITY—(P)—Southwestern Bell Telephone Company plugged automatic phonograph devices into switchboards here which informed callers:

"Because of a strike, we are accepting only emergency calls. If your call is an emergency, please flash your receiver hook until an operator answers."

Said one irate customer, who finally got an operator:

"I listened to that man (the receiver) for 20 minutes, and then he took my nickel."

The company then changed the record so that it began:

"This is a recorded announcement x x x."

Russia Will Allow UN To Supervise American Financial Aid To Greece

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y.—(P)—Delegates to the Security Council hurriedly cabled their governments for instructions Tuesday on Russia's surprise proposal which would give the United Nations the right to supervise American aid to Greece.

Soviet Delegate Andrei A. Gromyko laid the proposal before the council Tuesday night after he had vigorously attacked what he called the "unilateral" action of the United States and declared that President Truman's program to aid Greece and Turkey constituted interference in the internal affairs of those countries.

Although the Soviet resolution, calling for creating of a special Security Council commission to supervise aid to Greece, did not mention the U. S. program specifically,

it was pointed out by some delegates that this was the only aid in sight at present.

The first reaction to the Soviet proposal was that the kind of supervision it envisaged would definitely rule out the use of the American funds for any military purposes. Since this was one of the primary aims set forth in the U. S. program, there appeared to be little likelihood that the United States could accept it.

Russia's resolution will be taken up Thursday when the council resumes discussion of the Greek question. At the same time the council will consider a United States resolution proposing that the UN Balkan Investigating Commission keep representatives in Northern Greece while the commission's report is being drafted in Geneva.

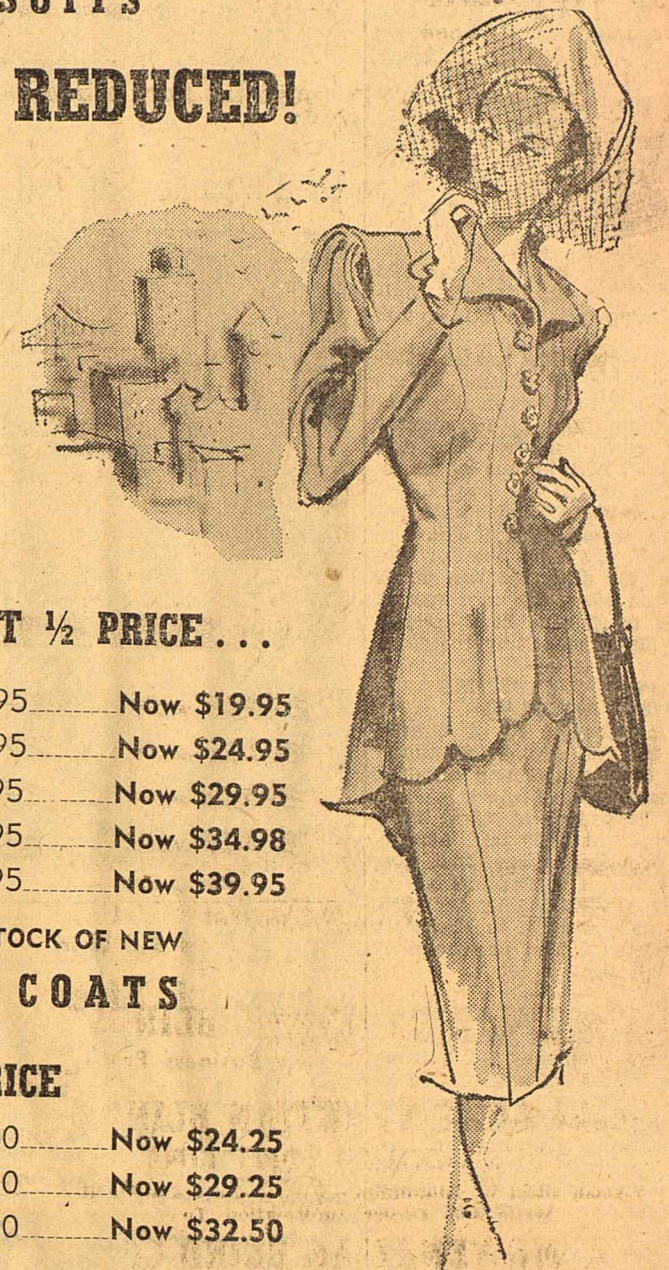

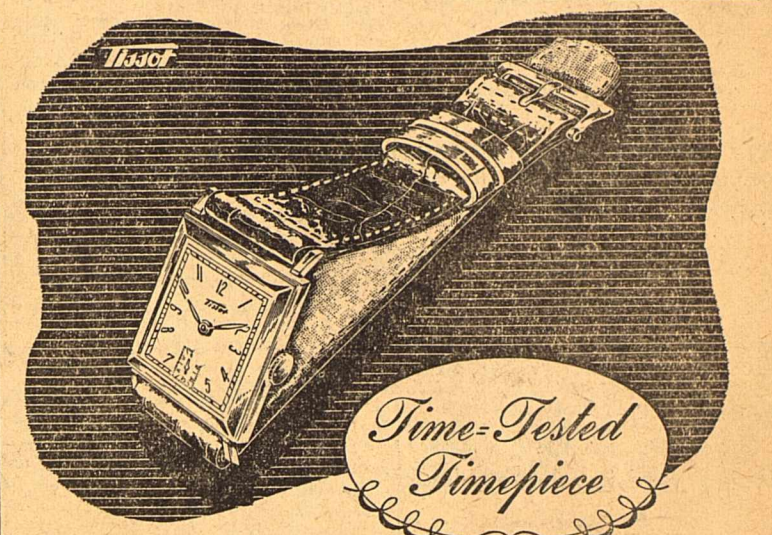

Gives Company's Viewpoint

H. F. Fox, district manager for the telephone company, Tuesday outlined the company's viewpoint in the following statement:

"Throughout the series of events leading up to the present strike, the telephone company has sought with every reasonable means at its command to avert an interruption in its service to the public. Now that this interruption has come the company will do its utmost to give as much service as possible under the circumstances.

"The company appreciates the cooperation of the public and regrets the inconvenience and hardship which this strike is causing many telephone users.

"In the belief that the principal demands of the striking union centers around wages, the company has offered to submit the wage issue to a panel of five impartial citizens, appointed by Governor Jester, and the governors of the four other states in which the company operates. This offer still stands and the company urges its consideration by the union officials.

Says Wage Scale Fair

"The union declares the present wage scale is low. The company believes this scale compares favorably with wages paid for equal skills and training in the various communities it serves. In fairness to the public, the employees, and the company, we believe these differing viewpoints can best be resolved by the arbitration panel of five men acquainted with conditions in this territory. Such a panel should be able to arrive at an equitable finding on whether or not present telephone company wages should be adjusted.

"The company further has offered to broaden the subject for arbitration so that they include not only basic wages but other such demands as length of time for employees to reach top wage rates, wage differentials between different communities, longer vacations, and leaves of absence for union officers. Other issues raised by the union such as union shop, check off, jurisdiction of work and the like are in the company's opinion not proper subjects for arbitration.

"It is our hope that the union's leadership still will accept our offer to join with us in a request for arbitration to the governors of the five states in our area. In the meantime, recognizing our responsibility to the public welfare, we reiterate our pledge to do our utmost to provide as much service as possible in this emergency."

Minister's Adopted Son Held In Slaying

ST. JOSEPH, MO. —(AP)—Stuart B. Allen, 16-year-old adopted son of an Episcopal minister, was arraigned Tuesday on a charge of murdering the sexton of his father's church and smiling wilyly when he was ordered held without bond for trial in the juvenile division of criminal court.

The slightly built youth who police say has signed a confession that he followed "an urge to kill some one" and slew John Frank, 58, in the undercroft of Christ Episcopal Church, last April Fool's Day, nonchalantly leaned against a post as Magistrate A. J. Biely read the state's charge.

A shy smile crossed his face several times during the reading of the details of the prosecuting attorney's information.

He showed the same calm indifference that he has maintained since he was arrested Monday at Central High School where he is an honor student. If he was troubled by the charge, which could bring a possible death penalty upon conviction, he gave no outward sign of it.

Reinforcements For The Endless Fight

American medical science, freed from the necessity of trying to salvage human life from the wreckage of war, has turned with new energy to the constant campaign against the destructive forces of natural disease. Last week brought news of the founding of two new research groups and new grants for 1947 by the Life Insurance Medical Research Fund.

One research group is asking \$2,000,000 in public contributions for its efforts to conquer Hodgkin's disease, presently an incurable, inevitably fatal malady. The other, financed by a group of Cleveland businessmen, will seek the cause and cure of that prevalent but still mysterious disease, high blood pressure, and other blood diseases.

Grants of \$500,000 from the life insurance companies' fund will permit further purse research in the field of heart disease through fellowships and grants-in-aid for hospitals, colleges, and students.

Thus the inspiring and endless fight goes on. The humanitarian combination of men of scientific genius and men of public spirit already has conquered many once fatal diseases. As their work continues they bring the world further promise of happiness by removing more and more the fear of painful and premature death.

Democratic Sweepstakes

Any time in the next 16 months you hear some prominent Democrat speaking on what a great man Harry Truman is, watch out. What you probably will be listening to is a man who has been bit by the viperous vice-presidential virus. It's very contagious.

For now is the time for all good men to come to the aid of their party by letting it be known that they are modestly and at great personal sacrifice available to become Harry Truman's running mate on the Democratic ticket of 1948.

First political gossip after Democratic National Chairman Bob Hannegan first tossed Truman's hat in the ring mentioned the cabinet officers as the most likely to win second place on the ticket. That's now considered all wet.

Only two members of the cabinet—Secretary of Agriculture Clint Anderson and Secretary of Labor Lew Schwelmbach—have ever been elected to any public office of importance. And it is going to take somebody with lots of vote-appeal and campaign know-how to get this vice-presidential nomination.

Widow Of Thomas A. Edison Says Phonograph Was Favorite Invention

FORT MYERS, FLA.—(AP)—Among the hundreds of Thomas A. Edison's inventions the phonograph remained his favorite.

"He loved music," said his widow. Now in her eighties, Mrs. Edison still winters here as she has done annually since her famous husband brought her as a bride more than sixty years ago.

"It was all very crude then," she recalled, "and the houses were all on stilts to keep us out of the water. There were only 200 people in Fort Myers then—but plenty to tell Mr. Edison that this was a great place to live."

The inventor selected a site a mile and a quarter out of town and, because there were no carpenters available, he ordered a house built in Maine and shipped here in sections.

"The schooner was sunk," said Mrs. Edison, "but that didn't discourage him. He never gave up on anything he started. He just ordered another house."

Some Of Best Work There
Some of the inventor's best work was done in his old winter laboratory here. In the evening after dinner he "would jot down fifty new ideas" to try the next day.

"He never was bored and never had a regret," said Mrs. Edison. "And he never was despondent. He'd just pick up and do something else. He was always taking money from one business to help another. He was always poor. But money as such didn't mean anything to him. He would be as happy in a hut as a house."

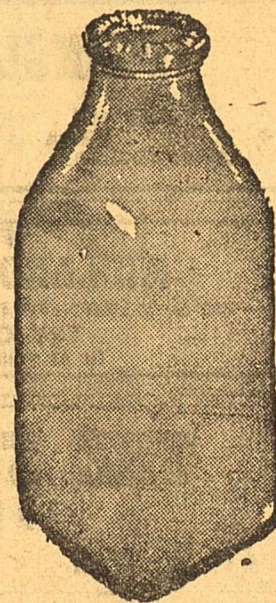

Crime In Texas Rises 13 Per Cent

By TEX EASLEY

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A crime was committed in Texas every eight minutes in 1946.

A report just released by the Federal Bureau of Investigation enumerates 60,145 crimes last year in 53 Texas municipalities with a combined population of 2,045,786. That figure compares with 52,978 crimes recorded in 1945, a 13 per cent increase.

Texas was grouped with Arkansas, Louisiana and Oklahoma in the report. The urban population of all four states is 3,743,059. The increase in crime in these four states was 11 per cent over 1945. For the nation as a whole the increase was 7.4 per cent.

A breakdown of Texas crimes last year shows: 394 murders and non-negligent manslaughters; 124 manslaughters by negligence; 264 rape offenses; 1,251 robberies; 2,560 cases of aggravated assault; 14,034 cases of burglary, breaking or entering; 34,701 cases of larceny-theft, and 6,817 auto thefts.

AROUND THE CAPITAL

Former Texas Lt. Gov. Edgar E. Witt of Waco, head of the expiring American-Mexican claims commission, has been appointed by President Truman as chief of the new Indian Claims Commission.

Confirmation of the appointment has been held up in the Senate because of a proposal by Senator Moore (R-Okla.) that Congress repeal its act of last year creating the new Indian affairs agency.

Okinhomans had sought to have a Sooner put on the 3-man commission. A prime reason why Witt

was selected as commission chief was the fact that Texas has a negligible Indian population—a man from such a state consequently should be free from bias and undue pressure. The other two men nominated as commissioners are from Nebraska and Wyoming.

The Texas Society of Washington has decided to stage an official welcoming breakfast or luncheon for distinguished Texans.

Says X-Ray Would Rule Out Appendicitis Cases

DALLAS—(AP)—A simple X-ray plate of the abdomen, made previous to abdominal surgery, would rule out as many as 50 per cent of the so-called chronic appendicitis cases, Dr. Paul Atterberry, Milwaukee, Wis., declared here.
Dr. Atterberry, member of the American College of Osteopathic surgeons, was here as a featured speaker for the 47th annual convention of the Texas Association of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons.

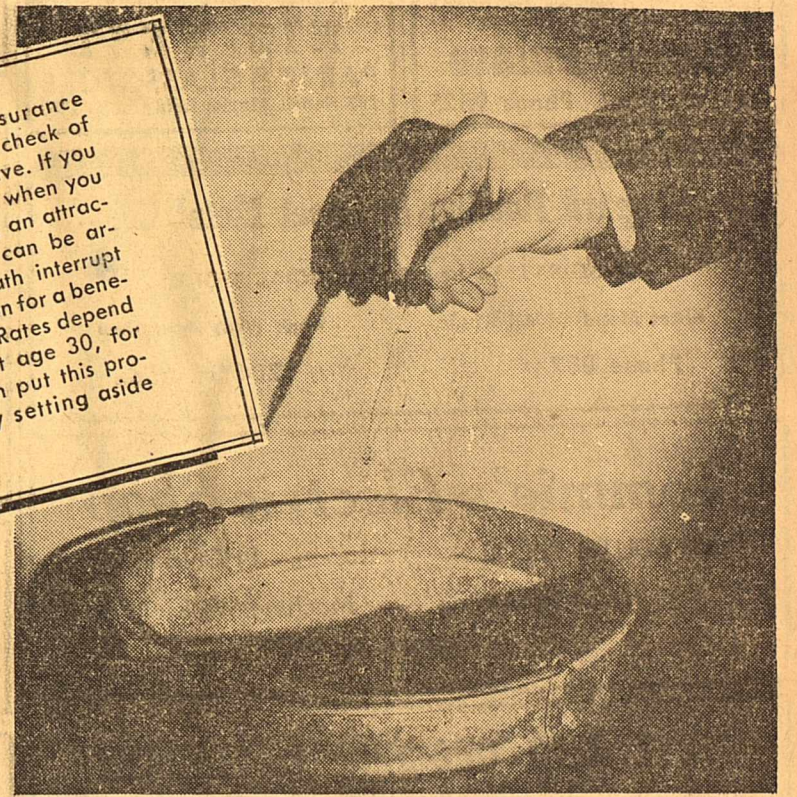

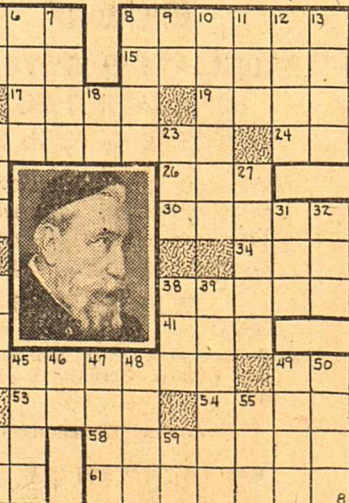

Low and Larry Hirsch of New York, Harry Feinberg of Cleveland and David Claren of Minneapolis.

For three-quarters of the final match the team of Bertram Lehtar Jr., Lee Hazen, Peter Leventritt and Samuel Katz had maintained the lead—then along came this hand. There was a swing of 2510 points on the board.

At one table, Lehtar sat West and Leventritt East. The first two rounds of bidding went the same at both tables, but at table No. 1, when Leventritt (East) bid five clubs, South bid five spades and North passed.

Lehtar (West) doubled. He got off to a heart opening and South (Claren) made five spades doubled for a plus score of 550 points.

The bidding shown in the box is the way it went at table No. 2. Feinberg (East) went to six hearts. If a heart had been opened, won with the ace and a heart continued, Feinberg might have lost the contract because he might have taken the club finesse. With a diamond opening he had an interesting play to make. He ruffed the diamond and cashed the ace and king of clubs. South's queen dropped, establishing the whole club suit.

If Feinberg had made the mistake of leading a trump, let us say a small heart to dummy's king, North would have won, returned his third club and South could have overtrumped dummy with the ten-spot, defeating the contract.

But Feinberg did not make that mistake. After cashing his two high clubs, he led the ten of clubs, and no matter what South did then, the hand was safe. If South trumped with the four of hearts, dummy could overtrump with the eight. If South discarded, dummy would discard.

Now the trump lead was made without danger as North had no club to return.

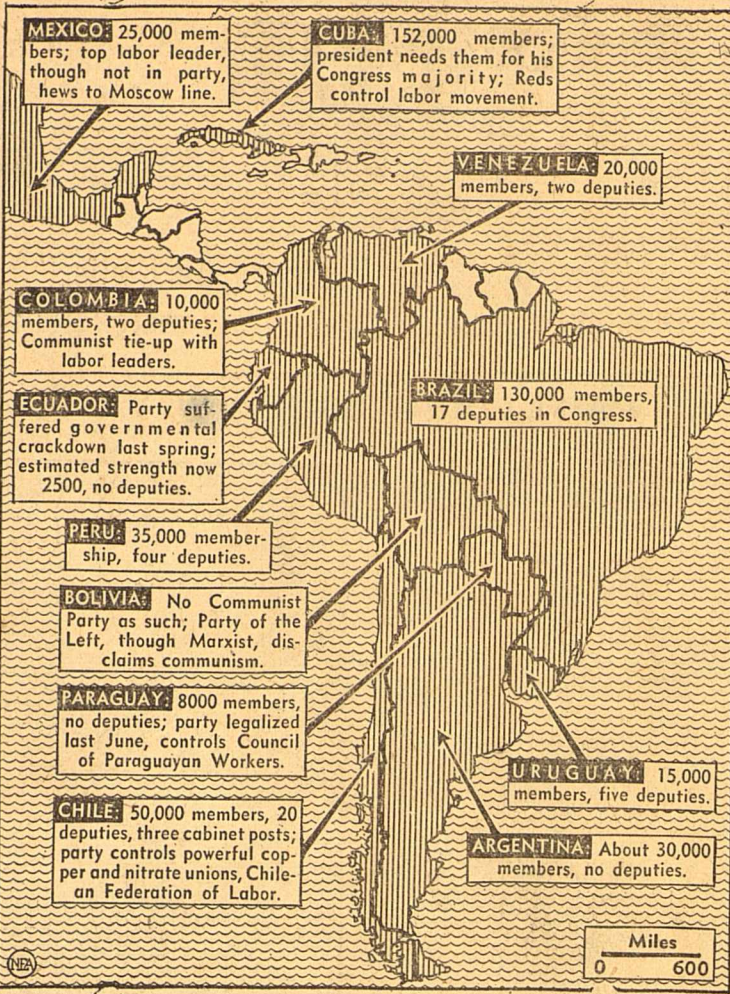

Chances are the Bucs will get more competition inside the district than out of it—at least until the finals. Thomas Jefferson of San Antonio, 1946 finalist, is back with the nucleus for a very good team; Austin will be tough as usual.

Townsend Great Athlete

The spearhead of the Odessa team—and the schoolboy football player we'd want above all others if we were a college coach—is Byron Townsend. A remarkable athlete is this 180-pound fullback who has among his 1946 accomplishments these items: averaged 7.4 yards per try carrying the ball, gaining more than 1700 yards for the season; threw a 65-yard pass (on the fly) to Billy Moorman for a touchdown, and kicked the ball a mile.

Townsend is a great all-around athlete. He is a hurdler, dashman, broad jumper, discus thrower, shot putter, sprint relay man and high jumper in track—a 6-foot 3-inch high jumper being among his accomplishments this season; he is a guard in basketball, a sport at which he lettered two years; is an excellent boxer and a great swimmer and diver, and they say around Odessa he'll be an outstanding baseball player, too. Townsend has been confining his diamond activities to softball, in which he is a star second baseman and pitcher.

Just what college Townsend is going to isn't even problematical right now. He has another high school year and the college coaches, so far as known, haven't been coming around his domicile as yet. But he reportedly has said he'll go to a college in Texas.

New State Liquor Scandal In Ohio Fermenting Hopes Of Prohibitionists

CLEVELAND, OHIO—(NEA)—Ohio, birthplace of the Anti-Saloon League, is once more in the throes of a liquor scandal.

And hundreds of Ohio drys see in it a ready-made wedge for a new drive for nation-wide prohibition.

A three-pronged investigation has been launched after persistent probing by The Cleveland Press. It appears destined to result in drastic alterations of the present form of Ohio's monopoly control of liquor.

Second In Volume

Second in volume among the 17 monopoly states, Ohio for years has been a bellwether for the nation in matters of legislating man's right to a legal swig of liquor. Large distillers, as well as organized drys, are keeping a sharp eye on current developments.

For approximately 13 years, the state government here has been in the business of buying and selling alcoholic beverages, wholesale and retail. It also controls permits to sell liquor by the drink as well as by the bottle.

The business altogether amounts to about \$150,000,000 gross a year, netting between \$40,000,000 and \$50,000,000 profit annually.

The present scandals began fermenting in 1943, when all bar and night club permits to sell liquor by the drink were "frozen." This skyrocketed the blackmarket value of such permits and increased the temptation to find means for thawing the "freeze."

It was the great rush of liquor permits to so-called private clubs which have proved to be one-man commercial ventures—that started The Cleveland Press on its probe. It sent reporters searching in the records of the last weeks of the administration of former Gov. Frank J. Lausche, Democratic victim of the Republican tide which put Gov. Thomas Herbert into office this year.

The revelations this investigation turned up inspired Gov. Herbert to order a statewide investigation of the spurious clubs by his attorney general. About the same time the State Senate—with but one dissenting vote—set up a special investigating committee of its own to look into all phases of the state's monopoly.

So far, these two inquiries have disclosed:

That nearly all the "private clubs" granted permits in Decem-

ber and January were "phonies," with faked minutes and no membership. Some had named as officers men who had been dead for years.

That at large profits to favored sales agents, the state had become saddled with large inventories of cordials and other slow-selling items.

That state enforcement and policing of the liquor business has been ridden with politics in Democratic as well as Republican administrations.

Latest of the charges tossed into the scandal were those of a former Cleveland state enforcement chief. Among other things, he revealed that he was led to a rendezvous with a slot machine man by a Federal employee where a \$1000-a-week bribe offer was made.

Federal Probe, Too

As a result of these allegations, the Federal government has moved into the Ohio situation from two directions—a check-up on its personnel and an inquiry into tax returns of principals whose names have been put into the record.

Gov. Herbert has found the liquor mess the hottest potato thus far in his administration.

Democrats are determined that any investigation of the Lausche administration of liquor control will not halt there.

They declare they will force the probe back into the administration of former Gov. John W. Bricker, Ohio's junior Senator. They contend they will find things which will equal the odors now arising from current testimony.

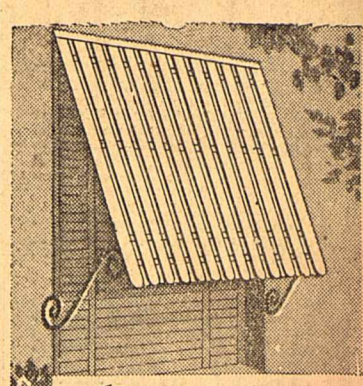
During all the headlines and sizzling allegations, the organized

drys have been quiet. The liquor interests consider the silence ominous.

The drys are supporting a measure which would take the liquor business away from the state and put it into private hands. They have made very substantial advances in local option elections in Ohio during the past 10 years, and feel the present scandals will soon ripen Ohio for a statewide test.

"We have organization and patience," said one at a Cleveland hearing the other day. "We dried the country up county by county before. These investigations are producing information we couldn't buy for any price."
