### An Old British Custom

The story of Sir Anthony Joseph Henry Doughty Doughty-Tichborne is worth repeating for any who happened to miss it. They might even find in it, without straining too hard after symbolism, a significance broader than the immediate anecdote.

It seems that Sir Anthony, a loyal subject of his Britannic majesty and a product of this enlightened, atomic 20th century, appeared recently before the British Food Ministry with an odd request. He needed a large allocation of flour in order to avert an 800-year-old curse.

The curse was pronounced by one of his ancestors, a certain Lady Tichborne, from her deathbed back in 1150. She directed her miserly husband, her children, and their heirs forever to give each year on Annunciation Day (March 25) a gallon of flour to every adult in their village of Alresford, Hampshire, and a half gallon to every child.

If they failed to do this, said Lady Tichborne, a lot of dire things would happen. Their house would fall down. There would be a generation of seven sons and after that a generation of seven daughters. Then the name of Tichborne would die.

Well, according to a later legend, all this came to pass. In 1796 the Tichborne family was in France and the gift was not made. The house was pulled down in their absence. The generations came along as prophesied. The name disappeared, to be restored after a generation by royal decree.

Came 1947, and Sir Anthony had no flour to spare. Neither did the Food Ministry. Sir Anthony's request amounted to 14,000 bread units by today's rationed reckoning. But after due consideration, Sir Anthony got the

Maybe the Food Ministry's members believed in the Tichborne curse. But even if they didn't, we can imagine some considerations that might have moved them to allocate a portion of their meager food supply so that a superstitious old custom might be maintained.

Sir Anthony's veneration of an ancient pledge is typical of the British national spirit. The Briton's devotion to old practices and customs sometimes seems ridiculous to practical-minded Americans. But it is also an essential part of that pride and sense of destiny conspicuous in the admirable, durable British character.

Today the United States stands in about the same relation to Great Britain as the Food Ministry did to Sir Anthony. Without our assistance Britain stands to lose much of her strength, her pride, and her national entity.

The American people are not interested in preserving the British empire intact, even if that were possible. But are they interested in seeing this brave and ancient nation, cradle of so many civil liberties and mother of so many immortals, retain at least a place in the sun?

This question, as well as the momentary actions of her present leaders, will surely be weighed by our government in deciding how much of Britain's traditional burden we will assume in future world affairs.

#### Our New Neutrality

President Truman has requested changes in our neutrality acts of the 1930s as they apply to the shipping of arms and other military equipment to foreign countries. Under those acts we were required to treat aggressor and aggrevied, peacemaker and troublemaker alike, as Truman pointed out.

That seems an unusual form of neutrality, since obviously it must have strengthened our future enemies. Therefore, Truman proposes that the government be allowed some discretion in permitting arms shipments ..

Some may think that in doing this he is again "by-passing the United Nations." For the UN Charter gives the Security Council authority to impose sanctions of various kinds, including arms embargoes, in the event that peace is breached or threatened. But there is nothing in the charter to regulate arms shipments when no threat is

Some such peacetime control seems necessary for us, for it is doubtful that we can ever again be "neutral" in the prewar sense. So long as the struggle between freedom and oppression continues, America seems destined to take sides.

#### Tough Assignment

Eric Johnston, the movie industry czar, plans a European trip in June on which he hopes to break down the opposition which is blocking American films from many countries. We don't envy him the job.


Johnston lists two main obstructions: The "extreme left," like the Russians, who object to democratic ideology; and the "extreme right" conservatives "who argue that foreign exchange, instead of being spent for entertainment, should be conserved for food, machinery and other essentials.'

The Russians will be tough enough to convince. But what is Johnston going to do with those reactionary old fuddy-duddies who prefer bread to circuses, and who are unimaginative enough to think that it takes more nourishment than Hollywood's spiritual sustenance of boy-getsgirl to rebuild a war-ravaged country?

If you have no intention of paying back, borrow nothing but trouble.
