## NEW WILDCATS SPOTTED IN SCHLEICHER AND LUBBOCK

Locations for wildcats in South-Central Schleicher County and in Northwest Lubbock County, have been reported.

The Schleicher County exploration will be Al P. Groebel, of San Angelo, No. 1 Jess Koy. It is located 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 34, block L, GH&SA survey.

Drilling to around 6,000 feet, to test for production in the Strawn-Pennsylvanian, will be started soon. Contract to dig the hole has been let to Western Drilling Company of Longview.

The project is about one and one-quarter miles north and northeast of nearest completed Strawn producers in the Page field, and it is eight miles southeast of Eldorado.

Stanford Oil & Gas Company is reported to have staked location for its No. 1 G. R. Flinn, to be an 8,000-foot prospector in Northwest Lubbock County, about three and one-half miles south-west of Abernathy.

The drillsite is to be 660 feet from south and east lines of section 10, block D, L&SV survey. That puts it one and three-quarter miles northwest of the one-well Cravens field which produces from the Clear Fork of the Permian at 6,050-6,170 feet.

The projected destination of 8,000 feet for No. 1 Flinn should allow it to test through the Permian and into the Cisco section of the Pennsylvanian, which is the pay section in the Petersburg field of Southeast Hale County, about 20 miles east and slightly north of the new wildcat.

SHELL'S POSSIBLE DISCOVERY IN WEST ECTOR IS DRILLING

Shell Oil Company No. 1-A Cochran, possible West Ector County wildcat discovery one and one-quarter miles west of the north side of the TXL field, and 1,983 feet from south and 669 feet from east lines of section 34, block 46, TP survey, T-1-N, was drilling ahead below 8,062 feet in chert, after taking a second drillstem test at 7,975-8,052 feet.

There was a blow of gas for a part of the period. Recovery was 30 feet of heavily oil cut drilling mud. The tool was open three hours.

A previous test of the same zone, for three hours, had a recovery of 630 feet of oil and 40 feet of heavily oil and gas cut drilling mud.

GULF GETS CLEAR FORK OIL SHOW IN NO. 1-A K-U

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1-A Kevane-University, Southwest Ector County exploration, 1,989 feet from north and 2,087 feet from east lines of section 8, block 35, University survey, and three-quarters of a mile southeast of a recently completed discovery from the Ellenburger at the same concern's No. 1-E-A University-Fogelson, was drilling ahead below 5,142 feet in Clear Fork-Permian lime.

A drillstem test was taken at 4,977-5,027 feet, for one hour. There was a strong blow of air during most of the period. Recovery was 132 feet of gas cut drilling mud with a rainbow show of oil. The development is projected to around 9,000 feet to test into the Ellenburger.

## STANOTEX PREPARING TO P & A MITCHELL WILDCAT

Standard Oil Company of Texas No. 1-W Mitchell, Northwest Mitchell County wildcat, about two miles west of the north side of the Westbrook field, and 660 feet from south and east lines of section 5, block 28, TP survey, T-1-N, drilled to 3,085 feet in lime and had 700 feet of sulphur water, and no signs of oil or gas. Operator is preparing to plug and abandon the prospector.

## Freight Derailment Delays Schedule Of T&P Passenger Trains

A derailment of a westbound Texas & Pacific freight at 11:20 p.m. Thursday, between Strawn and Ranger, has delayed the schedule of all westbound passenger trains at least seven hours.

Details of the derailment were lacking in Midland Friday, but it was learned that 25 freight cars jumped the tracks in the vicinity of Wiles, knocking down all telephone and telegraph wires of Western Union and Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. Communication lines had been repaired by midnight.

D. Davis, agent of the T&P Railroad in Midland, said that the west-bound passenger train, which was due here at 7:05 p.m. Friday, would probably arrive here about 2 p.m.

Ferguson Will Demand Wheeler Veto Action

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.), said Friday he will demand that Congress override President Truman's veto of a resolution to let Burton K. Wheeler act as special counsel for the Senate War Investigating Committee.

## Texas City Mayor Testifies Total Known Dead Is 433; 128 Missing

GALVESTON (AP)—Mayor J. C. Trahan of Texas City Friday told the coast guard investigation board that the explosions and fires that wrecked his city last week claimed the lives of 433 known dead.

Trahan said 128 persons are still missing. The board, seeking to determine the causes of the disaster, was told that 11 Texas City firemen were killed while fighting a fire that preceded the blast of the Grandcamp, first freighter to explode.

Trahan's known dead total is slightly higher than the latest figure released by the American Red Cross.

The Texas City mayor estimated that property damage resulting from the explosions and fires would total \$35,000,000 and that it would take two and one-half years to rebuild the city and restore the production facilities of its industrial plants.

He said it would be at least six months before water traffic at the port would return to its normal peak.

Trahan said he understood that various insurance companies had made a preliminary damage estimate of \$50,000,000 to \$55,000,000. He pointed out, however, that this estimate did not include the cost of restoring the waterfront and cleaning up the Texas City ship channel.

He said his own estimate was based on his personal knowledge of tax figures on the Texas City tax rolls.

The mayor said it probably would be two weeks before all bodies of victims of the disaster could be removed from the wrecked dock area.

House Committee Asks Rent Control Extension

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Banking Committee, after reversing itself to kill a 10 per cent general boost in rent ceilings, Friday submitted for House action a bill to continue rent controls at least until December 31.

A floor battle is likely, beginning next Wednesday, on other provisions of the legislation which would abolish government controls over building materials and construction under the Veterans' Housing Act.

OIL SUPPLY ADEQUATE

BIRMINGHAM (AP)—Col. E. O. Thompson, Austin, Texas, a widely known authority on the oil industry, said here Thursday night that there is no danger of America's oil and gasoline supplies running out in the near future.

Legislators Call For Report From Marshall

WASHINGTON (AP)—Legislators called Friday for a first-hand report on American-Russian relations from Gen. George C. Marshall.

Their call came as the secretary of state headed home from the Moscow foreign ministers' conference to tackle a crowded schedule that may involve picking a replacement for his top assistant.

Rep.'s circulated on Capitol Hill that Dean Acheson, who as under-secretary has shouldered State Department burdens at home since Marshall left Washington more than six weeks ago, has insisted anew that he be relieved of his duties soon to return to private law practice.

## Attlee Jumps On Churchill

ST. ANDREWS, SCOTLAND (AP)—Prime Minister Attlee accused Winston Churchill Friday of directing a "torrent of abuse" at his administration without offering a "drop of policy."

Addressing the Scottish Trades Union Congress here, Attlee struck back bitterly at the Conservative Party leader's Primrose League speech in London a week ago in which Churchill said "The Socialist Government is living upon the American dole."

"This," Attlee asserted, "from the man who again and again has paid tribute to the greatest assistance we received in the war from lend-lease."

"If the Labor Government is living on the dole, much more was the Coalition Government. It is incredible that he should stoop to such meanness."

"He says that the American loan could only be justified as a means of equipping our industries. What does he mean? Does he mean that we are wrong to use it to buy food from the only place we can get it?"

He does, let him say so," Attlee, replying to Churchill's criticisms of the policies of Chancellor of the Exchequer Hugh Dalton, charged that when Churchill himself was chancellor in the Stanley Baldwin Cabinet of 1924 he "inflicted untold misery upon the people of this country" with a program which led to the "crisis in the coal industry from which we are suffering today."

## Advertising Campaign For Midland Rodeo Is Planned By Committee

Plans for publicizing the 13th Annual Midland rodeo well in advance of the world championship event, June 5-8, were mapped at a meeting of the Advertising Committee of Midland Fair, Inc., Thursday afternoon at the Chamber of Commerce.

George W. Glass, chairman, presided. Others present were James N. Allison, Harry Murray, James L. Daugherty, Delbert Downing and Bill Collyer.

Window cards and folders advertising the rodeo will be printed and distributed over a wide area early next month. Several other plans of advertising were discussed.

Two aerocades and several motorcades will visit cities and communities of West Texas and Southwestern New Mexico late in May to publicize the annual celebration. May 31 and June 1 tentatively were set as the dates for the airplane advertising trips.

Rodeo officials have announced this year's rodeo will be the best ever staged here. Several new contests and special events have been booked for the 1947 performance.

## Bomb Blasts Echo Again In Tel Aviv

JERUSALEM (AP)—Bombs blasted a police billet, in a suburb of the all-Jewish city of Tel Aviv Friday, leaving at least two persons dead and seven missing.

British troops of the First Infantry Division, alerted against a "blood for blood" reign of violence threatened by the Jewish underground unit, Irgun Zvai Leumi, surrounded Tel Aviv as rescue workers dug in the debris of the billet at Sarona.

In Jerusalem, all incoming and outgoing traffic was stopped by heavily guarded roadblocks as the British checked on an anonymous "drop of policy."

Addressing the British officers had been kidnapped. The explosives which wrecked the orderly room and telephone exchange of the Sarona billet were planted in a mail truck driven by a man in police uniform, British authorities said. The driver disappeared. The blast came about 90 minutes after the van was driven through the gate and parked next to the orderly room.

## Nooncaster Resigns School Position Here

The resignation of Aubra Nooncaster, an assistant football coach and senior English instructor at Midland High School, was announced Friday by Frank Monroe, superintendent.

Nooncaster Thursday accepted a position as first assistant coach at Pampa High School, and will assume his new duties as soon as a replacement is provided here. Spring football training now is underway at Pampa.

He came to Midland two years ago from Brownfield High School, where he was head coach. He has a Master's degree in literature.

Nooncaster said he enjoyed his work in the Midland school system, and has enjoyed living here. He said the Pampa position was a definite promotion which he could not afford to turn down.

## Miller Installed As VFW Post Commander

Leonard H. Miller was installed as commander of the Harris Brothers Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars at a meeting in the IOOF Hall here Thursday night. He succeeds Pat McMullan.

John B. Colin, a past-post commander, was the installation officer. Plans for the VFW dance to be held May 2 at the Log Cabin Inn were perfected and tickets were distributed.

## Texas Seeks Jaycee National Presidency

FORT WORTH (AP)—John Ben Shepperd, 30-year-old Gladewater attorney, Thursday formally announced his candidacy for president of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce at the Jaycees' convention in Fort Worth.

He made his announcement before the directors of the Texas Junior chamber. The national president will be elected in June at the organization's national convention in Long Beach, Calif.

Shepperd is endorsed by the Midland Junior Chamber of Commerce. Several Midlanders are attending the state parley in Fort Worth.

## Supplies For Overseas Shipment Displayed Here

## Senator Ball Predicts Strict Bill For Labor

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Ball (R-Minn.), predicted Friday that the Senate will write more restrictions on unions into its general labor bill, and Senator Aiken (R-Vt.) said that would "assure" a presidential veto.

# Truman And Cabinet Study Phone Strikes

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman and his cabinet discussed the nationwide telephone strike Friday.

There was no indication, however, of prospective government action other than federal conciliators' moves for new union-management negotiations in the 10-day-old tie-up.

Cabinet members told reporters that the strike "came up" during their 35-minute session with the President.

Secretary of Interior Krug said the "only new thing" is that "they are starting all over again."

He referred to the union-management meetings arranged here by federal conciliators seeking to end the strike.

The government began its new attempt to force a break in deadlocked wage negotiations as the strikers' defense fund swelled with gifts from labor union allies, and the companies reported mounting instances of cable-slashing and tampering.

Friday's separate conferences—arranged under federal pressure—were between union representatives and officials of the long lines division of American Telephone and Telegraph Company at one session and the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, largest of the more than 20 Bell subsidiaries, at the other.

Meanwhile, the eight-year-old independent union reported it had received outright gifts totaling \$57,000 from both CIO and AFL unions, in addition to the \$100,000 loan from John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers.

## New Wage Scale For Auto Unions

Acceptance by the CIO United Automobile Workers of the General Motors Corp. wage offer and another agreement in the steel industry left the 19-day-old telephone strike Friday as the nation's only major wage dispute.

The UAW settled Thursday night for the offered 11 1/2-cent hourly wage increase, pay for six holidays a year and new vacation benefits which union President Walter P. Reuther said actually was "a total economic package well over the 15 cents" which the union had demanded. Originally the UAW demanded a boost of 23 1/2 cents an hour for the 220,000 General Motors production workers.

The terms were viewed as the new pattern for other wage negotiations in the auto industry this year.

At the conclusion of the negotiations, Reuther said "we were up against a tough bargaining situation." He indicated the contract was the best possible that could be obtained.

Bethlehem Steel Co. followed U. S. Steel in agreeing to general terms of a new contract providing an increase of "at least 15 cents" an hour for 70,000 workers.

## Agent Young Talks To Midland Jaycees

County Agent V. G. Young described the set-up of the Texas Extension Service to members of the Midland Junior Chamber of Commerce at its luncheon meeting Friday noon in the Scharbauer Hotel.

Young outlined the history of his service area and gave some of his personal experiences in 10 years with the service. He said, "It is inspiring to work with farm and ranch people. Perhaps our greatest investment is in boys' and girls' club work. Last year 35 millions of people attended farm and ranch meetings in the United States."

Frank True was program chairman. Tanner Laine presided. It was announced Jaycees will purchase special shirts to wear at the Midland World Championship Rodeo this year.

The auditing committee of Midland Jaycees was reported making an active study of the organization's finances.

## Bi-Partisan Bill For Elections Up Monday

WASHINGTON (AP)—A bi-partisan bill redrafting all laws regulating federal elections and making the sky the limit on spending in presidential campaigns will be introduced Monday by Senator Ellender (D-La.).

Ellender said Friday the measure will have the backing of both Republicans and Democrats on the 1946 Senate campaign Expenditures Committee, which he headed.

Ellender told a reporter the bill will (a) tighten existing provisions calling for reports of campaign contributions and expenditures, but (b) relax those limiting expenditures and restricting donations by individuals.

## Thomason Nominated Federal Judge; Winfield Seeks Congressional Post

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congressman R. Ewing Thomason of El Paso Thursday was nominated by President Truman to be U. S. District Judge for Western Texas.

If confirmed by the Senate, he will succeed Judge Charles A. Boynton of El Paso who is retiring May 1.

The nomination was received by the Senate Thursday afternoon and now goes to the Senate Judiciary Committee. Thomason expressed appreciation of the confidence placed in him by the President.

They have been close friends a number of years. Thomason, veteran representative from the El Paso district, is the ranking Democrat of the House Military Affairs Committee. He formerly was speaker of the Texas House, and mayor of El Paso.

Reports had circulated earlier among Thomason's colleagues that Mr. Truman would nominate him as the congressional district judge to include El Paso, Hudspeth, Culberson, Reeves, Loving, Jeff Davis, Presidio, Brewster, Pecos, Ward, Winkler, Ector, Crane, Terrell, Crockett, Upton, Midland, Reagan, and Glasscock.

Proclamation for the special election to fill a congressional vacancy must be issued by the Governor of Texas within 20 days after the vacancy occurs, with date of the election to be fixed not less than 30 days nor more than 90 days after issuance of the proclamation.

Several other El Pasoans also were mentioned as possible candidates.

AUSTIN (AP)—Rep. Woodrow Bean of El Paso announced Friday that he will enter the race for United States congressman from West Texas' 18th District.

Bean said he will seek the position vacated by the presidential appointment of Rep. Ewing Thomason (D-Texas) to be United States District Judge for the Western District of Texas "upon Thomason's confirmation by the senate."

Bean, who is serving his second term in the Texas House, has been known by his tireless and enthusiastic battle for new taxes on natural resources.

## Town Sponsoring Price Reduction Is Swamped

NEWBURYPORT, MASS.—(AP)—Sponsors of this Atlantic seaport's anti-inflation campaign reported Friday they were "swamped with queries" from communities across the nation considering adopting the plan which they said lifted dollar volume of sales as high as 110 per cent.

Under the 10-day experiment, now in its fourth day, more than 90 per cent of the retail merchants cut prices 10 per cent.

After more than a score of cities from coast to coast reported they had adopted a similar plan, Norman Randall, executive director of the Newburyport development council, said:

"We're swamped. We've got queries from all over. It's so bad we've got out form wires to give a general outline of the plan. We don't have the staff to handle them individually."

The response to the inquiry was "take an inventory and then cut prices 10 per cent all the way along the line."

## Willa Cather, Author, Dies Suddenly In N. Y.

NEW YORK (AP)—Willa Cather, Pulitzer prize-winning novelist, died of a cerebral hemorrhage late Thursday at the age of 70.

Her works included "My Antonia" (1918), "Death Comes for the Archbishop" (1927) and her last, "Sapphira and the Slave Girl" (1940).

The Pulitzer award was given for "One of Ours" in 1923.

Although born in Virginia, Willa Sibert Cather was reared in Nebraska, and many of her novels had Midwestern settings.

## Gunshot Victim Taken To El Paso Hospital

### Texas Wildlife Bills Up For Legislative Action

**SWEETWATER**—(AP)—Restoration of hunting and fishing in Texas would be shoved forward 20 years if the State legislature passes bills now pending, Grady Hill, of San Angelo, said here Thursday.  
The president of the Texas Wildlife Federation declared that the 50th legislature could go down in history as "savior of wildlife in Texas" if it enacts the four bills.  
The bills listed by Hill were measures giving the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission regulatory powers, assuring adequate financing through sportsmen-paid general hunting and fishing licenses and permitting the establishment of State hunting and fishing preserves.

STRASBOURG, FRANCE—(AP)—A Strasburg beer hall is the target of Communist wrath in its new all-out attack against Gen. Charles de Gaulle's bid for French political power.

In that beer hall a few weeks ago, de Gaulle's supporters met and formed the "Rassemblement du Peuple Français"—Rally of the French People, a new political party which de Gaulle hopes will "restore and reform the state."

That includes quick destruction of the Communist Party in France, according to de Gaulle.

The meeting was held in great secret, but word of it leaked out and the Communists immediately pointed an accusing finger at the beer hall origin of the party and cried "Hitler."

De Gaulle's supporters denied there was any significance whatsoever in the location of the first meeting. It was, they claim, a spur-of-the-moment affair called in the emotional aftermath of a stirring speech in Strasburg by de Gaulle.
