Principal union demands were expected to include the same-pay for eight hours as now received for nine; a royalty increase for the miners' health and welfare fund of from five to 10 cents a ton mined and adoption of the new federal mine safety code. Far From Bright

All concerned with the discussions agreed that prospects were far from bright for agreement by the time the government's legal right to operate the mines expires on June 30. The 400,000 United Mine Workers have in the past usually refused to work without a contract







The only increase in taxes was in payroll taxes due to increased wage scales and an increase in the rate of the railroad retirement tax from 3 1/4 to 3 1/2 per cent."

That is a fine report of a healthy corporation which operates the only railroad in one of the most rapidly developing sections of the United States-an area rich in natural resources and outstanding in its record of production—the Permian Basin.

Only last month, the director of public relations of the T. & P. informed us the railroad is "a citizen of Midland and we want to be thought of as a good citizen."

He further stated "our railroad is vitally interested in preventing crossing accidents.

If ever in its long history the T. & P. was in position to do those things, it is now. It has the financial strength to go ahead with its program.

Yet, on the large map in the beautiful report, Midland is not mentioned. A person studying the map wouldn't even guess Midland is served by the T. & P.

And as far as adequate station facilities and gradeseparation projects are concerned, the T. & P. still doesn't recognize Midland as a point on its system.

Midland, without a single underpass or overpass, is not mentioned as a T. & P. railroad point and is not mentioned in the railroad's plans for the future, despite the large revenue which the carrier takes from this city and the Permian Basin area.

No Dale Carnegie

The Turkish press bureau director has accused the correspondent of an American newspaper of writing a story which charged that correspondents are subject to imprisonment in Turkey, that their freedom of action is restricted, and that unofficial press censorship continues

The story was full of inaccuracies, the Turkish press chief said. And just to prove how wrong it was and what a free, unfettered time newsmen have in Turkey, the official withdrew all the correspondent's press privileges.

This seems to us a wonderful way not to win friends -and loans for one's country. It's also a wonderful way to embarrass the Turkish government as it seeks aid from the U.S. as an eastern bulwark against the threat of dictatorship and restrictions.




