

Status Of New Labor Bills In One, Short Item

By JAMES MARLOW WASHINGTON-(A)-You've been hearing for months about Congress

and bills to curb labor unions.

Are you wondering: Where does it all stand now? What happens? You won't know the final answer for some weeks. Here's an ABC explanation, up to date and of things to come.

A couple of weeks ago the House, after months of work, passed a bill to restrict labor unions. This was the toughest labor bill ever passed by a House of Congress. And the Senate this week or next

will pass its own bill to restrict This bill, too, is tough, although less tough than the House bill.

Because the two bills differ in many ways, when the Senate passes its bill this will happen:

Compromise Bill A joint committee-made up of members of the House and Senatewill be appointed. The committee members' job will

be to agree on one single bill. In short: a compromise bill. Which means: They'll take big chunks of the House bill and big chunks of the

Senate bill and put them in one This means keeping some of the Senate bill, dropping some keeping some of the House bill

dropping some of it. When the joint committee has agreed on this single, final bill, it will send it back to the House and Senate for final approval. House and Senate, as usual in

such cases, are pretty certain to okay this single bill agreed upon by the joint committee. Then, after all the work that went into it, the labor bill will begin what may be its death march

It will be sent from Congress to President Truman for his signature before it can become law. There's This bill coming out of Congress will be tougher, much tougher, than any bill Truman wanted to curk

So Truman seems pretty sure to try to kill this labor bill, sent him by Congress, with a veto It will then stay killed unless both House and Senate—by a two-

Corporal Punishment In 30 Forms Abolished

AUSTIN-(A)-The Senate Tuesday voted to abolish corporal punishment in approximately 30 forms at the Gatesville state school for boys and the Gainesville state school for girls.

Voice vote gave final passage to the bill by Sen. Fred Harris of committee reported it had found Texas' facilities for caring "for the state's unfortunates are far below vision of a civilized nation.'

The committee report also had related a specific instance at Gatesville where two boys had been struck in the face with bare fists strap across their bare skin, then hidden away from investigating committee.

Harris' original bill had sought to abolish corporal punishment in all forms at the schools but Senate amendments left spankings within the law and barred only specific acts such as whipping, flogging, strapping, beating with fists, bats, clubs and other objects, confinement in stocks or in cramped quarters, long deprivation of sufficient light, ventilation, food or exercise essential to maintain physical and mental health, cold tubbings and knee-bends.

Salesmanship Of Democracy

The much-heralded showdown between democracy and communism brings up the matter of what the U.S. proposes to do about selling its particular brand of freedom in a misguided world.

It is generally agreed that the Russian Commies are better at this propaganda racket than anybody else. There is no breakdown of the Russian budget to show what the Soviet government spends on its "educational" activities in other countries. It has been estimated as high as \$100,-000,000 a year-more than all the rest of the world put together spends on informational and cultural relations.

About 30 leading governments now indulge in this national good-will building in other countries. That the Russian propaganda builds more ill will than good will is beside the point. The point is that they seem to get their line across in ways that do the most damage to democracy, which is their purpose.

On purely informational programs to tell Greek and Turkish people about the U.S., the American government is this year spending \$115,000 in Greece and \$192,000 in

Crime And Punishment

These two items out of New York seem to us to be of more than local interest. Johnny Torio, one of Chicago's most infamous prohibition gangsters, now lives in New York. Six months ago he got a threatening letter 'demanding \$10,000. He asked the FBI for help. The other day, after a half year's work, G-men caught the alleged persecutors. One was an 18-year-old drugstore clerk.

Almost six months ago Joseph Scottoriggio was brutally beaten on a New York street on election morning and died four days later. He had been an active campaigner for Rep. Vito Marcantonio's political opponent. Police arrested a few material witnesses, including a couple of ex-gangsters, and later released them. Nobody called in the FBI. The investigation is apparently at a standstill. And a merciless, obviously political murder remains unsolved
