Amerada No. 2-A Jones, deep prospector in the Jones Ranch area of extreme Northwest Gaines County, and 1,920 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of section 3, block A-6, psi survey, was running a test on perforated section at 11,740-810 feet, in lime of unreported age.

Sun Oil Company No. 2 Fred Jameson, southeast stepout to the Jameson field, in Northwest Coke County, and 1,980 feet from south and east lines of section 315, block 1-A, H&TC survey, perforated with six shots to the foot at 6,306-51 feet, and was to make a production test.

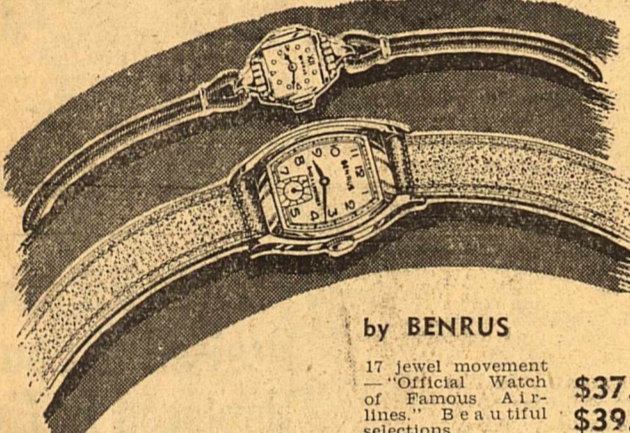

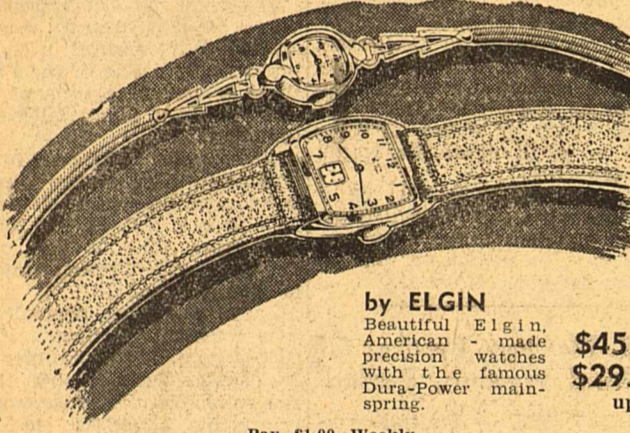

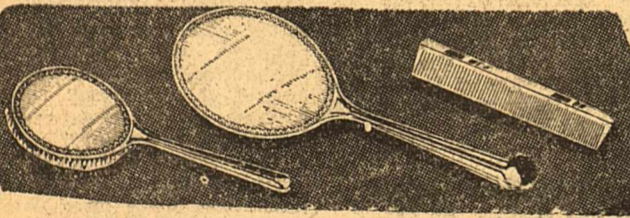

Continental Airline Gets Safety Award

Continental Air Lines was the winner of the National Safety Council's 1946 award in the airline group operating less than 80,000,000 passenger miles during the year, James C. Carlson, Continental station manager here, said Tuesday.

With a record of 200,830,365 accumulated passenger miles, Continental was one of 16 U. S. airlines which completed 1946 scheduled passenger operations without a single fatal accident, the report of the safety council indicated.

Continental has completed 12 years without loss of life or injury to a passenger. The airline was among seven who received special citations from the council for sustaining safe operations for periods of more than one year.

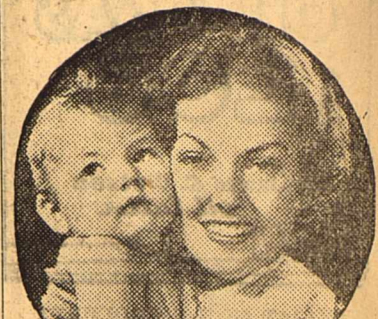

Universal Military Training

The two branches of Congress soon will begin hearings on bills which would establish universal military training. The outcome is in doubt. But at least it seems certain that the question is finally going to come to a vote.

The bills under consideration are based on the so-called American Legion plan. This is a long-considered program which reached its final form only after exhaustive conferences and meetings throughout the country, in which all manner of suggestions and objections were received and studied.

The final plan does not meet all objections, of course. There will be strong opposition to any such bill. And the reasons are substantially the same as those which for 20-odd years have kept the question of universal training from advancing beyond the talkative stage.

It has been argued that universal military training will warp the character and corrupt the morals of our youth; that it will interfere with work or education and sever home ties; that it will make this an aggressive, militaristic country whose trained body of civilian defenders will invite rather than discourage war.

Under the American Legion program the planning and supervision will be in the hands of civilians. Rules of conduct and discipline will be included in civil, not military, regulations. These regulations give due consideration to the moral welfare of those in training.

The youths will be Army and Navy trained, but they will not be in the Army or Navy unless they choose to join the end of their basic training period.

Basic training is for four months—during the Summer vacation period for those who intend to continue their education in the Fall. Boys will be sent to training centers as near their homes as possible. After the basic course there is an advance training period of 36 weeks or longer. The type of training depends on the qualities and wishes of the young man, within quota limitations. He will have a wide variety of choices.

Advance training may include special studies in colleges or industrial schools. It can mean service in the ROTC, National Guard, Organized Reserve or National Security Training Corps. Requirements may be met through special training in vocations, skills and services of value to national security.

Those are some of the basic points of the American Legion plan. It is a carefully thought-out approach to a vital program, and deserves sensible consideration. Of course universal training is something that this country would never choose except at the juncture of necessity. It goes against American tradition.

So, unfortunately, do many of the trends of world affairs today. Opposition cannot be based on traditional grounds in defiance of reality. It must answer some very definite questions.

Is the world in a state of peaceful stability? Are the other great powers rapidly disbanding their armies and giving no thought to trained reserves of manpower and production? Is America free from any threat of future wars? If war should come, would continental United States again escape attack while we built up a military force and the means of supplying it?

If the answer to those questions is yes, then universal military training is not necessary to national security.

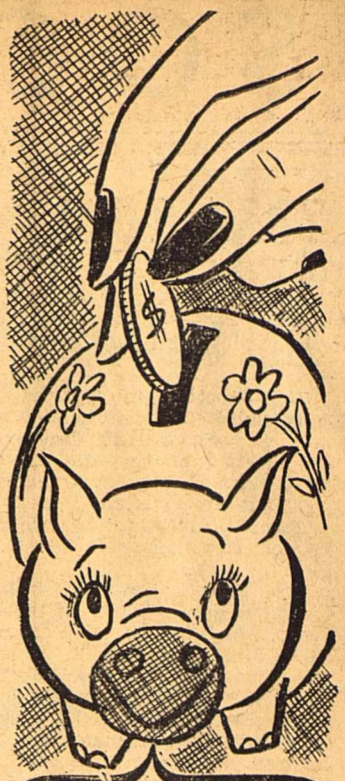

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

The Canadian-American Tournament, discontinued even before we entered the war, is being revived this year and will be held at the Hotel Niagara, Niagara Falls, N. Y., May 23-25. The finest players from Cleveland, Erie, Buffalo and Pittsburgh always compete in this tournament, and a large delegation is expected from New York and Detroit.

Canadians have done very well against American players. Back in 1936 a Canadian team won the national team-of-four championship in Chicago. P. E. "Shorty" Sheardown of Toronto will be on hand with a group from the Toronto Whist Club.

"Shorty" knows all the tactics of duplicate play. He found himself defending a four spade contract on today's hand, and after winning the first two tricks it looked as if he and his partner were not going to get any more.

East's two spade bid over one heart showed at least a five card spade suit, and there were five good heart tricks in dummy. East also would have to have the ace of diamonds to justify his bidding.

But Sheardown did not give up. At trick three he led the five of spades. The eight was played from dummy, North put on the jack and declarer won with the king. East went over to dummy by playing the four of hearts and led the ten of spades. When North played the six, figuring that nobody would lead away from the queen and one spade and that North must have the queen. And of course Sheardown won with the queen.

True, declarer still made his contract of four spades, but nevertheless he received a bottom score on the board. Every other declarer laid down the ace and king of spades, catching South's queen, thus making five-odd. In tournament bridge it is the extra trick that counts.

At the rate boisterous Bobo Newsom, Washington's self-styled 20-game winner is going along this season, he may be lucky to collect the necessary six triumphs he needs in order to join the select list of pitchers who have won 200 or more games in the major leagues.

The garrulous right-hander has yet to gain his first mound win this season. Newsom was hardly at fault Monday night as he failed in his third attempt to register his initial win. He gave up only five hits and one run in eight innings. Philadelphia came up with four runs in the top half of the 11th to whip the Senators, 5-1.

Bobo has had some tough luck this year. In his first start his mates were blanked by the Yankees, 7-0, and in his second time out the Chicago White Sox beat him, 5-2.

Each league got a new runner-up tenant as Brooklyn moved into second spot in the National by defeating the Boston Braves, 8-3, at Ebbets Field, and the Boston Red Sox nipped the New York Yankees 4-3 at Fenway Park to move behind Detroit in the American.

The Dodgers made good use of 11 hits to clip the Braves, who dropped to third place by nine percentage points.

No other games were scheduled, as most of the teams were preparing for their second inter-sectional series of the campaign. The Eastern teams in the National League engage the Western clubs on the latter's home grounds while the Western teams begin their invasion of the East in the American League.
