## Intoxication Test Is Ruled Out In Texas

AUSTIN — (P) — The proposed reclassification of Texas traffic laws is constitutional as a whole, but certain sections, including phases of the breath test for intoxication are not, the Attorney General ruled Monday.

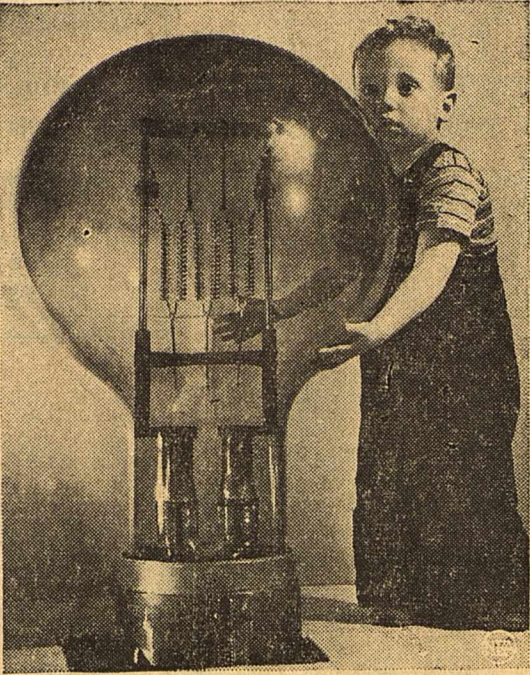
The measure, passed by House and Senate in varying forms, is in a free conference committee to adjust the differences. Chairman Fred Harris of the conference committee requested the opinion.

The bill was written to codify and modernize Texas traffic regulations. It was widely sponsored by safety and police organizations. Referring to the intoxication test, the opinion by Assistant Attorney General Charles D. Matthews, and approved by Attorney General Price Daniel, said:

"Section 52 of the bill requiring an accused against his consent to submit to blood, urine, and breath tests for the purpose of determining intoxication, and the introduction in evidence of such tests without the consent of the accused, violates Article I, Section 10 of the Constitution of Texas."

## Midland Telephone Service Again On 'Emergency' Basis

### Jester Again Asks Laws For 'Middle Road'

AUSTIN — (P) — Gov. Beauford H. Jester Monday renewed his plea to the 50th legislature to enact middle-of-the-road labor legislation providing for voluntary mediation of some types of strikes, and compulsory arbitration of others.

He formally submitted as a matter of emergency legislation a bill by Rep. George Nokes of Corsicana, suggesting that its scope be widened.

Jester also formally submitted as an emergency matter a bill which would set up a separate state boxing and wrestling commission, apart from the Department of Labor and Commerce. Boxing and wrestling supervision is now under the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

It was the third time this session the governor has asked the legislature for action on laws of this type. The session has approved and he has signed several labor regulatory bills opposed by union forces.

### Western Electric Workers Sent Back To Picket Lines

Midland's telephone service, restored Saturday afternoon when approximately 150 workers of the Southwestern Bell system returned to their jobs following settlement of the 42-day strike, again Monday morning was on an "emergency only" basis when four Western Electric employees established a picket line at the exchange building here.

The picketing started at 7 a. m., with Southwestern Bell workers respecting the picket line. Western Electric is reported to have 29 workers stationed here. They previously did not maintain picket lines.

H. F. Fox, manager of the telephone company's Midland district, said Midland and Odessa are the only cities in his district with curtailed service. Telephone service is normal at Big Spring, Monahan, Kermit, McComb and other points, he said.

### Texas Police Alerted After Felon Escapes

PARIS — (P) — Police of Texas have been alerted to apprehend a young armed convict identified by Sheriff Max Osborn of Rains county as William J. Isom, 22, who escaped from the Emory jail Sunday by digging through bricks of the building.

Sheriff Osborn said the man, held on burglary charges, was armed and was fleeing in a stolen car.

Sheriff Osborn said the pistol was his own, taken from his car early Monday. The convict was said to have stolen a car from the outskirts of Emory and abandoned it at Commerce where he stole a second car.

Isom was described as being 22, five feet nine inches tall, weighing 166 pounds, and has brown hair and blue eyes. He made his escape about 5 a. m.

## President Truman Again Asks For Federal Health Measure

WASHINGTON — (P) — President Truman asked Congress Monday to give "immediate attention" to enactment of a federal health and disability insurance program.

In a special message to the legislators, Truman declared such legislation is "crucial to our national welfare."

Under the type of program he asks, a worker unable to work because of injury or illness would receive government payments.

Truman told Congress:

"Of the four basic risks to the security of working people and their families—unemployment, old age, death and sickness—we have provided some insurance protection against three.

"Protection against the fourth—sickness—is the major missing element in our national social insurance program."

The message asked, in addition:

1. Adequate public health services, including an expanded material and child health program.

2. Funds for research and medical education.

3. More hospitals and doctors, especially in sparsely-settled areas.

"The total health program which I have proposed is crucial to our national welfare," he said. "The heart of that program is national health insurance.

"Until it is a part of our national fabric, we shall be wasting our most precious national resource and shall be perpetuating unnecessary misery and human suffering."

The President asserted an insurance plan is the Democratic way of coping with the menace of serious illness which requires expensive care and services.

In Kansas City, his press secretary, Charles C. Ross, disclosed Truman began work on the message last Saturday. He signed the final draft Sunday in Grandview, Mo., as he sat with his ill mother, Mrs. Martha Truman.

## Accidents Claim Lives Of Twelve Texans In Week

At least 12 persons met violent death in Texas over the weekend, six in traffic accidents, two by shooting and one each by fire, lightning, drowning and a plane crash.

A truck-passenger car collision a half mile south of Robstown on Highway 77 Sunday resulted in three persons being killed and six others injured.

Two other traffic fatalities were Johnnie Lee Frank, 19, and J. L. Densman, 14, both of Marlin. They were killed at Waco Sunday when a motorcycle they were riding threw them into an automobile.

Charles Starnes, 38, of Whitesboro, was killed when an automobile in which he was riding was struck by a freight train at a crossing in Gainesville Saturday.

A hunting trip ended in accidental death for Victor Andrew Wegert, 40, of Houston.

J. T. Thomas, Jr., 15, died of shots from a .22 revolver Sunday at his home in Brookshire community, 25 miles northwest of Ballinger.

Earl Lee Mayor, 19, a messenger for the Southern Pacific Railroad at Beaumont, was killed when struck by lightning while working in the railroad yards Saturday night.

J. P. Hahn, a soldier from San Antonio, was drowned at Lake Buchanan near Austin when a sudden squall came up Saturday night.

M. E. Van Valkenburg was killed in a plane crash five miles northeast of Luling Saturday.

Five-year-old Sylvia Frazier of Senora burned to death Saturday night as she slept by a truck while her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lee Frazier, were fishing on Lake Buchanan.

## State Newsmen Are Not Guilty Of Contempt, Supreme Court Rules

WASHINGTON — (P) — The Supreme Court Monday ruled three Texas newspapermen were improperly convicted of contempt of court for publication of several news stories and an editorial.

Justice Douglas wrote the court's 6-3 majority decision. Justice Jackson wrote a dissent and Justice Frankfurter wrote another. Chief Justice Vinson concurred in Frankfurter's dissent.

The decision was given on an appeal by Conway C. Craig, publisher of The Corpus Christi Caller-Times; Bob McCracken, managing editor, and Tom Mulvaney, reporter.

Judge Joe D. Browning of the Neuces County court in Texas, adjudged them guilty of contempt after the publication of items dealing with an eviction case which he tried. The newsmen were sentenced to three days' imprisonment each, but the sentences were stayed pending the Supreme Court's decision.

In the eviction case, an array of state attorneys sought to hold possession of a building where he operated a cafe.

Justice Browning said the news stories and editorial were "calculated . . . to prejudice and influence the court in its ruling" on a request for a new trial of the eviction proceedings. He finally denied a new trial.

The Supreme Court's ruling overturned a ruling of the Texas court of criminal appeals which had upheld Browning's contempt findings.

Justice Douglas, for the majority, wrote "the law of contempt is not made for the protection of judges who may be sensitive to the winds of public opinion. Judges are supposed to be men of fortitude, able to thrive in a hard climate."

## Man's Body Found By Farmhouse; Is Billie G. Smith

The body of Billie Glenn Smith, 23, was found Sunday near the barns of his farmhouse, about 18 miles Southwest of Midland. A .22-caliber rifle was lying by the body.

Smith had been dead several hours, according to investigators. He had a bullet wound in the head.

A neighbor, Jack Merritt and his son, found the body when they visited Smith's place to see what was wrong because Smith had not been seen since Friday afternoon. His car had been parked in front of his house all this time.

Smith lived alone. He was unmarried.

The sheriff's department, police department, and Justice of the Peace B. C. Girdley investigated.

Girdley said "I have no coroner's verdict to render to the newspaper."

Funeral arrangements for Smith were indefinite at noon Monday.

Survivors of Smith include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Smith, who live northwest of Midland.

## Midland Post Office Remains Overcrowded Pending Appropriation

Although Midland's post office is terribly crowded and inadequately equipped to cope with tremendously increased mail shipments, nobody knows when the situation will be relieved, Acting Postmaster N. G. Oates commented Monday.

Application for enlargement of floor space has long since been made to the Post Office Department and to the Federal Works Agency, which has charge of disbursing funds for such purposes.

Chamber of Commerce Manager Delbert Downing has written the Federal Works Agency regarding the disposition of the request. He recently was informed that the agency asked for an appropriation to care for a number of such situations in September of 1945; \$190,000 was asked for use on the Midland post office. However, the appropriation has not been granted, not as far as known here even been considered, Oates said.

## Midland Performs Good Neighbor Act

Midlanders Sunday did a good neighbor project for the little stone-arched town of Lenora.

Junior Chamber of Commerce workers sprayed the town with DDT after a request from Martin County Judge B. F. White.

The Midland senior Chamber of Commerce furnished \$40.82 worth of DDT and the JayCees did the work.

In Lenora, which was struck by a tornado May 11, all premises where there were dead animals, rubble heaps, and other places where there were spoiled foodstuffs, were sprayed.

Mayor R. H. Gifford of Midland furnished a truck to transport the DDT and he worked on the project. Directing it was W. M. Howard, senior sanitarian of the City-County Health Unit and of the Midland - Martin - Ector Counties Health Unit. Other workers included: Pat Stanford, Frank True, H. L. Schlichting, James Mims, Delbert Downing and Floyd Owens.

## Will Tour Central American Countries

Taylor Cole, of Midland, president of the International Junior Chamber of Commerce, will tour Central America in the interest of International Trade Week.

Cole and his wife left by plane Monday and will return about June 17.

Countries to be visited include: Mexico, Guatemala, Salvador, Honduras, Costa Rica, Nicaragua and Cuba.

SEOUL — (P) — Bad flying weather may delay the resumption of American-Soviet negotiations on Korea scheduled for Tuesday.

The Russian delegation was due from the Soviet North Korean zone Sunday but failed to arrive. American military sources said unfavorable weather will delay the joint commission meeting possibly one or two days.

## School Bonds Necessary Abell Tells Kiwanians In Discussing Election

Midland's inescapable need for expanded school facilities was cited at the Monday luncheon of the Kiwanis Club by George Abell, trustee of Midland Independent School District.

With schools already crowded far beyond their intended capacity, increases in scholastics based on Midland's present population make it certain present facilities are not adequate, he said. If Midland's population continues to grow as it has during the last few years, existing school buildings and equipment will be even more inadequate, he observed.

Many Will Profit

In the event the coming bond election carries, and the proposed new high school building constructed, Midland will profit from its superior advantages to its youth; Midland business will profit, directly and indirectly, from construction of the building; and the taxpayer, by taking immediate steps to forestall what seems certain to be a critically crowded condition in the schools, should profit, Abell declared.

For example, he said, the proposed new auditorium might well prevent Midland taxpayers from being called upon, within the next few years, to vote bonds for a municipal auditorium.

In conclusion, he listed the two broad responsibilities of a school trustee: responsibility to provide proper education for youth; and responsibility to the taxpayer.

Both these responsibilities were considered, Abell said, by members of the board of trustees when they voted unanimously to call the bond election for the proposed new high school.

## OHIO'S SCURRY WILDCAT SHOWED A LITTLE OIL

The Ohio Oil Company No. 1-C Neal, wildcat in Northeast Scurry County, about 11 miles northwest of Rotan, and in northeast corner of R. N. Miller survey 1, abstract 368, ran a drillstem test for an unreported period of time, to total depth of 7,270 feet in Ellenburger lime.

Packer point was not learned. It was probably at about 7,225 feet, which is understood to be near the top of the Ellenburger.

Recovery was 250 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud, with a little free oil on top of the mud.

Operator was to drill ahead to 7,200 feet and take another drillstem test. The oil recovered in the latest investigation is the first show of petroleum developed by the possible discovery.

## HONOLULU 1 W & S MADE O & G CUT MUD IN DST

In West Gaines County, Honolulu Oil Corporation No. 1 White and Shelton, wildcat to test the Clear Fork of the Permian and located 600 feet from north and east lines of section 40, block G, CCS&RGNG survey, ran a two-hour drillstem test in the middle Permian at 6,590-6,640 feet.

Recovery was 90 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud. No water was developed.

Operator was slated to drill a little deeper, and then take another test.

Honolulu No. 1 Kirschner, another West Gaines exploration, in southeast corner of section 430, block G, CCS&RGNG survey, had reached 4,060 feet in lime, and was drilling ahead. It also is due to explore the Clear Fork.

## UNION'S COKE PROJECT CONTINUES TO DRILL

Union Oil Company of California No. 1 McCutchen, in northwest quarter of section 444, block 1-A, H&TC survey, three miles east of Robert Lee, in Central Coke County, was reported to have progressed 4,680 feet in lime, and was drilling ahead. It also is due to explore the Clear Fork.

## SOUTHEAST JAMESON OUTPOST STILL TESTS

Union Oil Company No. 2 Fred Jameson, southeast outpost to the Jameson field in Northwest Coke County, and 1,980 feet from south and east lines of section 315, block 2, H&TC survey, flowed 278.55 barrels of oil in 24 hours, through a one-quarter-inch tubing choke through perforated section between 6,306 feet and 6,351 feet. That horizon had been treated with 5,000 gallons of acid.

Operator is now trying to kill the flow so that a lower zone can be perforated and tested. Total depth is at 6,420 feet.

## HONOLULU TO ABANDON STONEWALL PROSPECTOR

Honolulu No. 1 Baugh, South Stonewall County wildcat, 10 miles southwest of Aspermont, and 2,080 feet from south and 440 feet from east lines of section 375, block 2, H&TC survey, drilled to total depth of 6,914 feet, in an unidentified formation.

Operator has reported that it will be plugged and abandoned. No shows of possible production were reported from the exploration.

## FOSTER STAKES STEP OUT FOR MITCHELL DISCOVERY

To be Foster No. 1 D. M. Womack, 2,310 feet from west and 330 feet from south lines of survey 22, block 26, H&TC survey, is a new development for the Northwest Mitchell County region two miles west of the north end of the Westbrook field.

It is to go to 2,900 feet, using cable tools, to try to find the pay which is showing for a pumping discovery in same owner's No. 1 Brennam, one location southeast, and 330 feet from north and 1,650 feet from east, lines of section 4, block 28, TP survey T-1-N.

## Phillips Petroleum To Open Plants To Workers

BORGER — (P) — A spokesman for the Phillips Petroleum Company said here Monday that all six of its strike-bound plants may be reopened Tuesday for employees who "want to come back to work."

The company estimated that about 400 men reported for work Sunday at two plants reopened Saturday. These are the Plains plant, which makes butadiene, and the Alamo refinery.

Meanwhile, pickets of local 351 of the AFL operating engineers union remained on duty.

The return-to-work movement started despite a statement by the striking union that its members not to return to work until an agreement is reached with the company.

According to company estimates, about 100 men reported to the Plains plant with another 300 reporting at the refinery.

## Week Of Action Faces Texas House, Senate

AUSTIN — (P) — A week promising to be action-packed started Monday for the 50th Legislature, going into the 126th day of its session.

Sen. Jim Taylor of Kerens, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, expected the first of the conference committee reports should be ready for Tuesday, although there was some prospect of earlier action.

All the major money bills, essential to the conduct of state services during the next fiscal biennium were in the conference committee stage except that on higher education. Preliminary work was underway on it.

Before quitting for the weekend, both House and Senate sent the judiciary appropriation bill to a free conference committee.

Action of conference committee reports on appropriations bill can be called for at any time, since these measures have a preferential status.

Meanwhile, it was expected there will be a renewal of pulling and hauling over a possible date for final adjournment. Several resolutions calling for such adjournment have been defeated in the House recently, with the trend apparently of lessening opposition to a move to set a date.

## Defense Resists In S. C. Murder Lynching Case

GREENVILLE, S. C. — (P) — The defense rested Monday in the trial of 28 white men accused of lynching a South Carolina negro, without offering any witnesses in its behalf.

The dramatic climax to the week-long trial came a few minutes after Circuit Judge J. Robert Martin, Jr., had directed full acquittal of three of the original 31 defendants, and given acquittal on two of four counts to seven others.

The court, at the same time, announced statements allegedly made by the 26 defendants at the time of their arrest would be admitted in evidence only against the persons making them. Judge Martin said he would instruct the jury to disregard the allegations as applying to any co-defendants.

## One Dies In Another Texas City Ship Fire

TEXAS CITY — (P) — Flames from the burning of the gasoline tanker Pan Massachusetts Sunday took the life Monday of Louis Homme, 40, of Galveston.

Homme was a crewman on the tug Richard Clark, which caught fire from the Pan Massachusetts.

Homme and another crewman, John Burchick, 49, of Logan, Pa., jumped from their blazing vessel and swam through burning gasoline. Burchick was treated for critical burns at the United States Marine Hospital at Galveston.

## FUNERAL SERVICES TUESDAY FOR PIONEER DALLAS MAN

DALLAS — (P) — Funeral services will be held Tuesday for Laurence S. Kahn, 59, longtime civic leader of Dallas and head of the E. M. Kahn & Company, who died Sunday at his home.

Kahn, born here September 4, 1887, was the son of the late E. M. Kahn, pioneer Dallas merchant who died in 1923. When his father died, the younger Kahn became president of the firm which at that time was observing its forty-ninth anniversary.

## ECHOES OF WALLACE SPEECH RESOUNDING

AUSTIN — (P) — Echoes of Henry Wallace's speech here Saturday night were still being heard Monday among high state Democratic circles.

Bob Calvert, Hillsboro, state Democratic chairman, declared Wallace was "out of step" while Myron G. Blalock, Marshall, Democratic national committeeman, commented "it doesn't sound like he (Wallace) has much respect for Democratic leadership."

Gov. Beauford H. Jester, contacted at Olney, commented briefly: "Wallace is talking while he is at bat."

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## President's Mother Is Reported Better; Son Stays At Her Bedside

GRANDVIEW, MO. — (P) — President Truman cheered up a bit Monday as he reported his 94-year-old mother, fighting for her life against a "very tired and weak heart," as better.

Truman refused to make plans for a return to Washington after his mother "slipped" in the afternoon after an unexpected rally Sunday.

## Snyder Says Time For Tax-Reducing Is Near

WASHINGTON — (P) — Secretary of Treasury Snyder told Congress Monday that "a period of tax reduction is approaching." But he made no recommendations as to what taxes should be cut or when.

Snyder further told the House Ways and Means Committee Congress should "consider" how to reduce taxes at some later—and unspecified—time.

The 5,000-word prepared statement by the Treasury head made no mention of the \$4,000,000,000 tax reduction bill passed overwhelmingly by the House despite Administration opposition. The bill is now awaiting Senate action. Nor did Snyder's statement say whether President Truman might veto this tax-cut bill if it reaches him.

Chairman Knutson (R-Minn.) of the tax-writing House group said the general revision should result in substantial tax cuts next year, beyond the \$4,000,000,000 measure now pending.

That bill awaits a decision in the Senate late Monday or Tuesday on a Democratic drive to lay it aside until June 10 at least.

## U. S. Plan For Freedom Of Press Before U. N.

LAKE SUCCESS — (P) — An American proposal for world-wide elimination of censorship topped the calendar for the United Nations Sub-committee on freedom of information and of the press Monday.

The U. N. General Assistant Secretary-General Henri Laugier to welcome representatives from 12 nations for the first meeting. Two-day sessions are expected to continue for two weeks.

The principal item of business will be drafting of plans for an international conference on freedom of information. To be held early next year.

BRUNSWICK, GERMANY — (AP) — Twelve persons—a British soldier and eleven German employees—were killed Monday when an explosion ripped a munitions dump here.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Supreme Court Monday ruled that plant guards deputized by local police are "employees" under the National Labor Relations Act and may join unions which also represent production employees.

## Step Toward Freedom

It cannot be assumed that the stroke of a pen by India's Constituent Assembly has abolished forever the institution of "untouchability" in that caste-ridden land. How well a new law will serve to destroy an ages-old religious custom remains to be seen.

Yet it is encouraging to note that this emancipation proclamation for 50,000,000 untouchables is one of the first legislative steps on the road to India's independence. It might seem that this Hindu assembly has concluded that a debasing inequality among individuals has no place in a country which aspires to equality among nations.

## New Type Of Car Racket Is Being Worked In U. S.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Complaints are piling up against a racket being worked by some new and second-hand car dealers.

New car buyers are the victims, because new cars still are scarce.

The racket outlined here doesn't mean all new or second-hand dealers are taking part in it. But some seem to be doing so.

It goes like this:

1. A very low trade-in allowance on your old car.

2. Or, with a new car, you must buy costly but unwanted accessories.

3. Or, pay a second-hand dealer far above new car price for a practically new car.

To show what's meant, here's a paragraph from a front page story in the Philadelphia Inquirer Sunday:

"Forced to wait 12 to 16 months for new car deliveries, and in some cases victimized on trade-in prices or accessory overloading, businessmen and others who needed automobiles have been driven to the 'curb market' where the cost of 1947 cars ranges from \$500 to \$1,000 above list prices."

What AAA Found

Checking on the problem, the American Automobile Association (AAA) has gathered information from a number of its members around the country. (The AAA is a federation of about 700 motor clubs working for the interest of motorists.)

Here's an example of what the AAA found:

A new car buyer ordered accessories costing \$36. He got the car with \$260 in accessories. It was taken them all, or no car at all.

With all government ceilings on cars wiped out, this is the only restraint on a new car dealer, besides his conscience:

He must sell a new car at the price listed by the manufacturer, or lose his right to handle that make of car.

A tricky dealer can still sell at list price, but add the accessories to boost his profit.

There's no restraint on a used car dealer. He can charge whatever he can get.

This writer asked the National Automobile Dealers Association (NADA) about all this. Its members are new car, not used, car dealers. This was the answer:

"It depends on what you call accessories. A large part of them are put on at the factory. Some accessories possibly are added by the dealers. We have heard this is being done.

"It's a new type of black market. But the NADA has a policy that no customer has to take accessories he doesn't want."

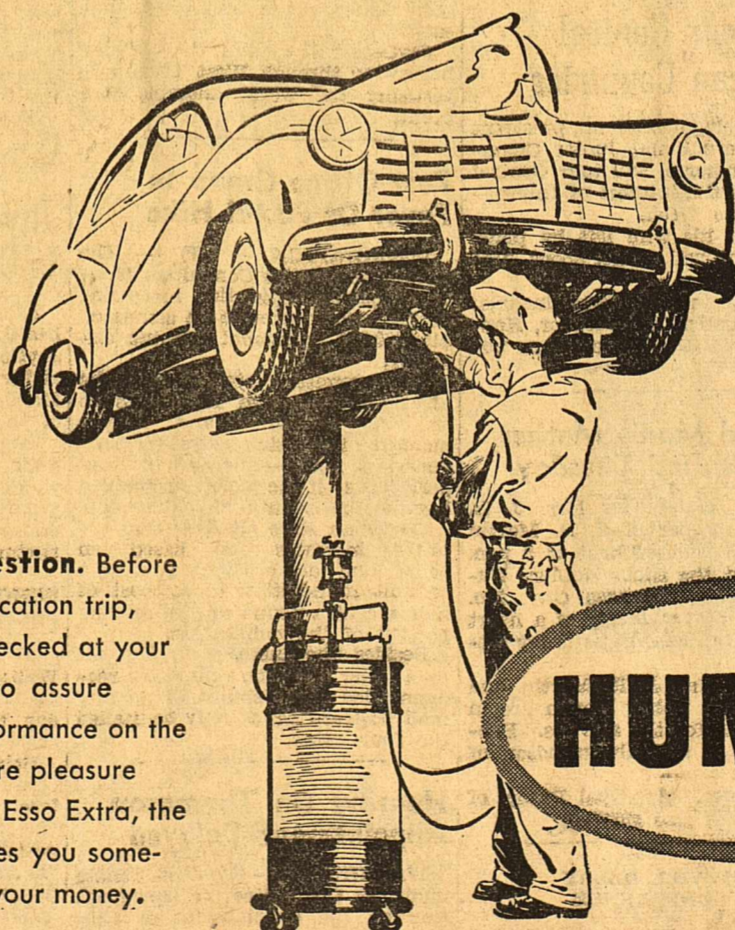


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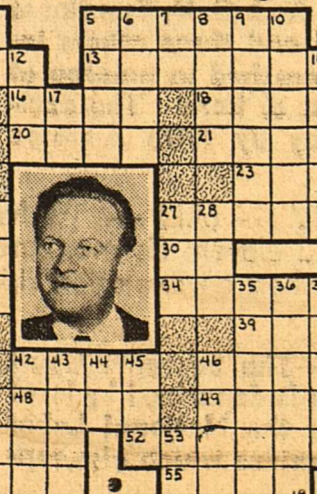

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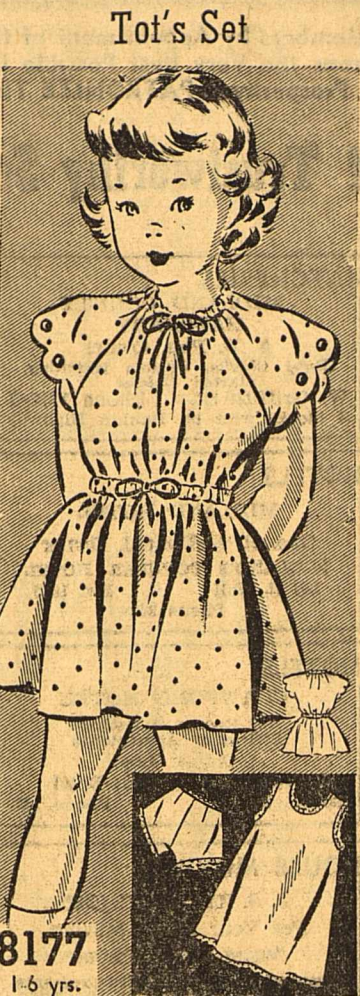

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### Health Director Urges Biting Dogs Be Kept From Escaping Bonds

After biting the child last week, the animal was tied up, but managed to free himself. Before he could be recaptured he was run over by an automobile. The animal's head was mashed so badly that examiners at Austin were unable to determine whether there was rabies infection.

Dr. Sadler Monday urged that when a dog bites a person, the animal be tied or caged in such a way that there is no possibility of escape during the observation period.

Teams in the Longhorn League broke loose for 65 runs Sunday, with Odessa, Vernon and Big Spring coming out on top in the spree.

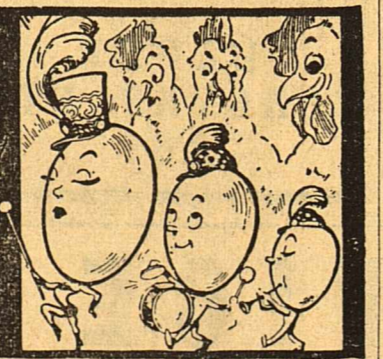

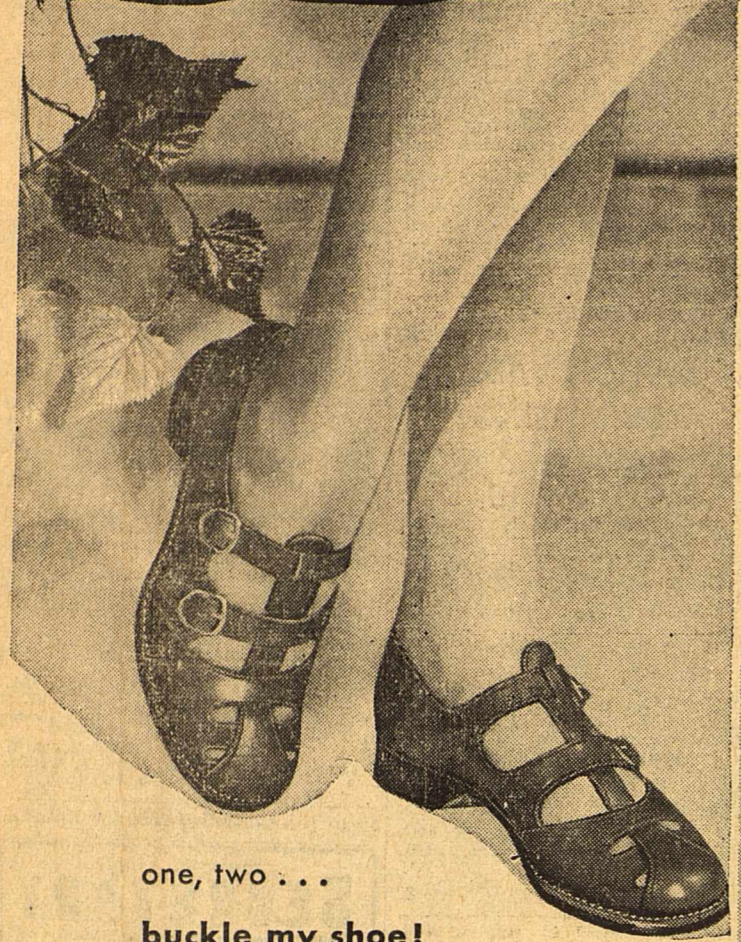
