Western Electric Strike Over

CROCKETT WILDCAT TO TEST ELLENBURGER OIL SIGNS

Tests of indications of possible production in the Ellenburger are due to be started soon at Amerada Petroleum Corporation's No. 1-C-T-A University, Northeast Crockett County wildcat.

That venture is bottomed at 8,490 feet in Ellenburger topped at about 8,102 feet, according to unofficial reports. Elevation is 2,613 feet.

No drillstem tests were run by operator in the Ellenburger. However, it is understood that some rather thick streaks showing possibilities of oil and gas production were drilled through.

A string of pipe was to be cemented on bottom, and the oil showing zones were to be tested through perforations. The wildcat is 665 feet from south and 1,987 feet from west lines of section 23, block 42, University survey.

HONOLULU TRYING FOR DST AT GAINES PROSPECTOR

Honolulu Oil Corporation No. 1 White and Shelton, West Gaines County exploration, about 12 miles west of Seminole, and in northeast corner of section 404, block G, CCSD&RNGG survey, was at total depth of 6,732 feet in the Clear Fork lime, making the second attempt to get a packer to hold so a drillstem test of the lower zone could be taken. The packer slipped on the first effort.

Honolulu No. 1 Kirschner, in the southeast corner of section 430, block G, CCSD&RNGG survey, and one mile west and a little north of same company's No. 1 White and Shelton, had reached 4,235 feet, in anhydrite and lime, and was drilling ahead.

UNION'S CENTRAL COKE PROJECT GOING ON DOWN

Union Oil Company of California No. 1 McCutchen, Central Coke County prospector to test the Ellenburger, three miles east of Robert Lee, had progressed past 6,317 feet in an unidentified formation—and was understood to be making more hole.

SCURRY WILDCAT DUE TO TAKE ANOTHER DST

The Ohio Oil Company No. 1-C Neal, Northeast Scurry County, in northeast corner of R. N. Miller survey 1, abstract 368, was reported to have drilled to 7,280 feet, in Ellenburger topped at between 7,224 feet and 7,230 feet, and was slated to run a drillstem test to check for possible production.

The section above 7,270 feet showed a little free oil on top of 250 feet of oil and gas cut mud, recovered in a one-hour drillstem test.

PETERSBURG FLANKERS ARE STILL DRILLING IN SHALE

Stanford Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Stine, northwest flanker to the discovery well of the Petersburg field, in Southeast Hale County, and 660 feet from south and 958 feet from east lines of north half of section 6, block CL, EL survey, had drilled below 7,050 feet, in black shale, and was drilling ahead. No shows of oil or gas have been reported from the prospector. It has already gone further below the surface than the same company's No. 1 Fisher, the initial producer, was when it bottomed up as a flowing producer.

Standard Oil Company of Texas and Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Hunt, one quarter of a mile due west of the Petersburg discovery, and 660 feet from south and east lines of section 6, block CL, EL survey, was making hole below 6,160 feet in shale.

It ran a drillstem test at 5,995-6,033 feet, for one hour. There was a very weak bubbly blow of air for 15 minutes and it then died. Recovery was 15 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil or gas. This project is to go to around 7,000 feet to explore the Fisher pay section in the Cisco zone of the Pennsylvania.

BLOCK 31 STEP-OUT IS TO TREAT ELLENBURGER ZONE

On the southwest side of the Block 31 field in East Crane County, The Atlantic Refining Company No. 1-W-31 University, one and one-half miles southwest of the discovery for production from both the Devonian and the Ellenburger, and 660 feet from north and east lines of section 41, block 31, University survey, topped the Ellenburger at 10,450 feet. It drilled to 10,470 feet. Operator is preparing to treat that section with 1,000 gallons of acid, and then make production tests on the 20 feet of the deep pay that has been cut up to now.

Darger Union Reaches Tentative Agreement

ECRGER—(P)—Members of the striking Local 351, International Union of Operating Engineers, AFL, were to meet here Tuesday to consider a "tentative agreement" which the union's strategy committee reached Monday with the Phillips Petroleum Company on issues which resulted in a 19-day walkout.

The "tentative agreement" was announced in a joint statement by the company and the committee, but no details were given.

A company official said about 500 men reported to work during Monday at six company plants in this area.

First Billion Bushel Wheat Crop In Nation's History Soon To Move

CHICAGO — (P)—Railroads which soon will start to move the first billion bushel winter wheat crop in the nation's history Tuesday reported their boxcar supply situation was improved over last year.

However, they agreed transporting such an enormous amount of grain will present a "tough problem."

Within the next 10 days harvesting of this fabulous crop—believed to be the largest any nation ever produced—will start in Texas.

Harvesting will progress northward through Oklahoma, Kansas and Nebraska, and when it is over around mid-July a whopping store of wheat will have been added to the food supply of a world desperately in need of bread.

In this rich agricultural territory railroads now are girding themselves for a job unmatched in peace-time history.

Explaining that the Association of American Railroads had ordered Eastern lines to supply 777 cars a day to western roads, the Santa Fe said, "the eastern lines have been co-operating better than last year and we have stored some cars in the grain territory. Last year we had none stored."

The Burlington said, according to present indications, wheat harvesting should begin about May 25 in the Wichita Falls, Texas, region.

Transportation cost is \$9 per person, which makes the trip an exceedingly economical opportunity to see a lot of country in jovial company while rendering valuable service to one of Midland's biggest events of the year, Downing observed Tuesday morning.

From Midland Wednesday, the bus-load of rodeo publicists will go west to Pecos, south to Fort Stockton, and into San Angelo Wednesday night. Thursday morning, the dinerary is cast to Abilene and then back toward Midland by way of Sweetwater, Colorado City, Big Spring and Midland, with stops at towns along the way.

CHINESE STUDENTS RIOT; MORE THAN 15 INJURED

NANKING — (P)—An estimated 15 students and several policemen were injured Tuesday in an abortive attempt by some 6,000 striking students to march to the conference hall of the People's Political Council.

The clash occurred as the college youth, in defiance of a ban against public demonstrations, sought to present their demands to the council. They called for increased food allowances, allotment of 15 per cent of the national budget for education and immediate cessation of China's civil war.

Greece Says Trio Of Neighbors Are Aiding Soviets

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y. — (P)—The Greek government Monday charged Albanian, Yugoslav and Bulgarian liaison officers with the United Nations Balkan inquiry commission engaged at Athens in "interferences designed to aid those who would bring Greece by forceful means into the Communist camp."

Greek Ambassador Vassili Dendramis made the accusation before the Security Council in opposing a Russian demand that the U.N. Balkan border watch group move its headquarters to Athens from Salonika, near the troubled frontiers. Dendramis said his government had protested unsuccessfully against what he called "the abuse by the liaison officers and agents of the disputant countries of their privileged status."

Midland To Get Post Office Improvements When Funds Available

As further information regarding efforts to get Midland's Post Office enlarged, Delbert Downing, Chamber of Commerce manager, Tuesday reported receipt of an encouraging letter from the Post Office Department.

The letter, written May 14 by Walter Myers, fourth assistant postmaster general, informed Downing that, while no funds for public construction have been authorized by Congress, Midland has been listed as eligible for such construction and will be considered in the distribution of "any construction funds that may later be made available."

Midnight In Morning During Sun's Eclipse

BOCAIUVA, BRAZIL — (P)—A total eclipse of the sun occurred here Tuesday in clear weather, which promised success for the preparations of a large group of American scientists gathered on a wooded plateau at Bocauiuva to witness the phenomenon.

The eclipse began about 8:22:36 a. m., became total at 9:34:48, remained in totality, three minutes and 48 seconds, and continued in partiality until 11:03:36.

The eclipse was not visible to the naked eye, however, at a similar observation station at Araxa, 275 miles southwest of Bocauiuva because the sky was cloudy and overcast.

The eclipse was not seen in the northern hemisphere.

(A broadcast heard in Rio De Janeiro quoted Prof. C. C. Kiess, of the U. S. Bureau of Standards, as saying "the total eclipse observations at Bocauiuva were 100 per cent successful, pending of course, development of the films.")

The broadcaster remarked during the period of totality: "It is deep night here; even the sun is black. The sky is midnight blue, and there are brilliant stars."

NEW SCHOOL TAX LAW DOES NOT UPSET AD VALOREM

AUSTIN — (P)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester has the assurance of Attorney General Price Daniel the new \$55 per capita school apportionment will not upset the state ad valorem tax structure, in an opinion given Monday.

The opinion, addressed to and requested by the governor, said the new school legislation contains no language to prevent the levy of the ad valorem tax for school purposes.

School's Vocational Program Is Curtailed By Inadequate Space

Pointing out that activities of the Vocational Agriculture Department of Midland High School now must be curtailed because of inadequate classroom, shop and demonstration space, Frank Monroe, superintendent of schools, Tuesday said the contemplated high school building program will provide space and facilities to meet the needs of students in VA work.

The VA course here is built around the farm and ranch problems in Midland County. The department now is unable to perform demonstrations, construct and repair farm and ranch machinery and to engage in other basic activities, Monroe said.

More than \$200,000 worth of shop equipment, obtained last year without charge from the WAA, is stored in a warehouse since there is no place to install it in the present school plant.

The present VA classroom, a 70 by 30-foot room, is located in the basement under the stage of the high school auditorium. The room was designed for an athletic dressing room, and is poorly lighted and ventilated. Monroe said the department now is limited in what it can accomplish due to the lack of space.

A shop building with adequate space and facilities for various types of vocational training is provided in the proposed high school plant, the superintendent said.

Greece Ready To Help Interim Commission

LAKE SUCCESS — (P)—Greece was ready Tuesday to pledge her full cooperation to a United Nations interim border commission keeping a vigil over the troubled Balkans. Two neighbors, Albania and Bulgaria, prepared to dispute the authority of the investigators.

All three nations were on the speakers list as the Security Council was called to act on a Russian resolution which would curtail sharply the powers of the subsidiary group.

Another Balkan state—Yugoslavia—assailed the validity of the commission last week.

PARIS, TEXAS — (AP)—William J. Isom, 22-year-old escaped convict fleeing in a black sedan, dodged a roadblock Tuesday on Highway 11 but is still being pursued by Sheriff Fayt Clifton of Hunt County.

AUSTIN — (AP)—For the third time in recent weeks, the House refused Tuesday to revive a veterans' bonus proposal.

AUSTIN — (AP)—The first of the big-money bills, a \$36,000,000 appropriation for rural aid schools, was finally approved Tuesday by both House and Senate and sent to Gov. Beauford H. Jester.

NANKING — (AP)—An Associated Press correspondent was beaten and three score students and Chinese police were injured Tuesday as groups of striking students demonstrated before the People's Political Council.

Phone Service In Midland Is Being Revived

The strike of Western Electric workers here was officially terminated at 2 p. m. Tuesday and the picket line at the Midland exchange of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company was removed at that time. The plant had been picketed since 7 a. m. Monday.

Switchboard operators and other workers were being notified of the strike's end, but it will take several hours to contact all employees, company officials said.

H. F. Fox, district manager of the telephone company, said it likely will be Wednesday morning before telephone service here is back to normal. He urged citizens to continue to restrict calls to "emergency only" until Wednesday morning.

NEW YORK — (P)—The last big outstanding dispute in the telephone strike which began April 7 was settled Tuesday when agreement on a new contract was reached between the National Association of Communication Equipment Workers and the Western Electric Company in Washington, D. C., a union official said by telephone from Washington.

The Western Electric Company, against which the union has been striking for six weeks, announced it will be ready to resume work Wednesday.

W. D. Barry, president of Local 69, New York, said the 20,000 members of the union, an affiliate of the National Federation of Telephone Workers, would go back to work at 3 a. m. Wednesday.

Barry said the basis of the settlement was an increase of \$4.40 in basic wages, with an additional 35-cent boost weekly in some fringe cases, an increase in transfer allowances, an increase for split and changed shifts and an increase for early starting time.

The new settlement was announced by U. S. Conciliation Commissioner John Murray at the Labor Department.

"The complete negotiations of this new contract with its many points in dispute was made possible only by the 100 per cent co-operation of both company and union representatives," Murray said. "It was in the best tradition of free collective bargaining."

The settlement left only one union still officially on strike against the Western Electric Company.

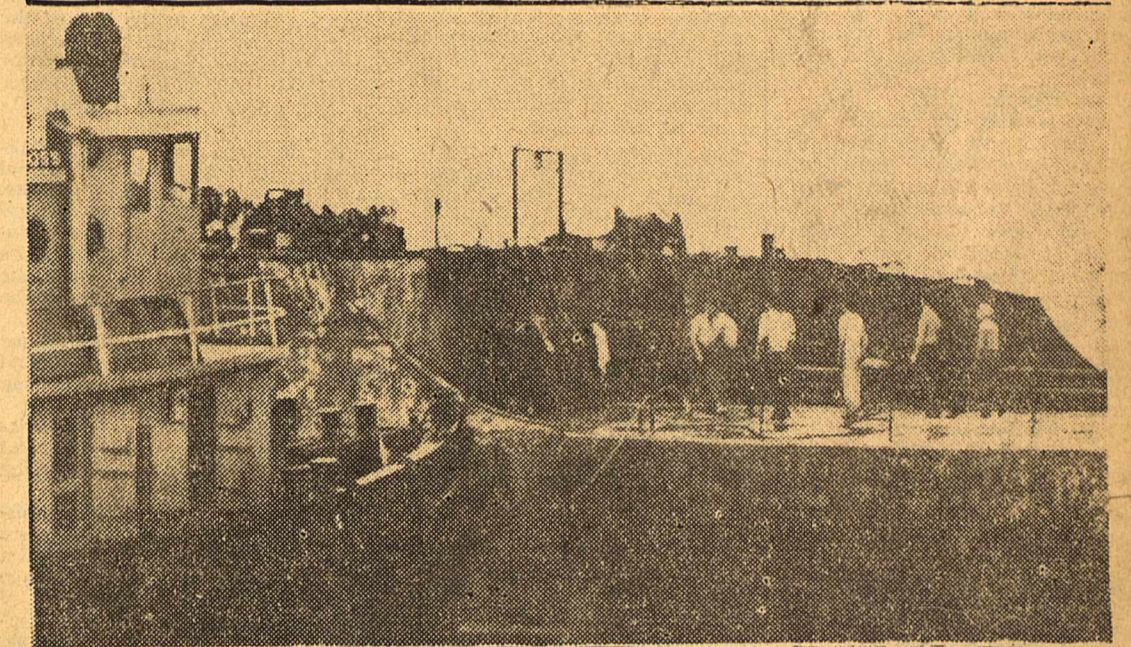
That union, the National Association of Telephone Equipment Workers, with a national membership of approximately 66,000, has reached a tentative agreement with the company on the basis of an hourly wage increase aggregating 11 1/2 cents subject to ratification of the union membership.

MARSHALL FORESEES NO FURTHER 'AID' NEEDS

WASHINGTON — (P)—Secretary Marshall said Tuesday he does not foresee any further appropriations for such purposes as the \$300,000,000 Greek-Turkish and the \$350,000,000 foreign relief programs.

The secretary told a news conference, however, he is not prepared to say what may be required in the future.

Representative Sees Big Personnel Cut If Navy's Appropriations Are Reduced

May Testifies He Purposely Posed As Lumber Owner To Avert Labor Strife

WASHINGTON — (P)—Former Rep. Andrew J. May testified Tuesday at his war fraud trial he purposely represented himself as the owner of a lumber company in Kentucky to avoid labor trouble.

The wartime head of the House Military Committee told the jury munitions makers Henry and Murray Garsson, his co-defendants on a bribe conspiracy charge, actually owned the Cumberland Lumber Co., at Prestonsburg, Ky.

The government contends the Garsson brothers used the firm to "cover up" payment of \$55,000 in alleged bribes to May for favors in getting contracts for Garsson plants. In testifying he had represented himself as the lumber company owner, May said:

"I wanted to keep the impression that I owned the property so it wouldn't disturb the labor situation."

Defense Attorney Warren Magee asked May if he had felt public knowledge of Garsson ownership of the Cumberland company would have prevented the concern from obtaining workers.

Federal Justice Henry A. Schweinhaut suggested this question was "just a little bit leading" but let May answer it.

May chuckled and then said soberly: "I hesitate to inject this answer into this case. But I had the experience that if it was known down there that this company was owned by outsiders who were Jews, we couldn't get anybody to work in the woods or around the mill."

"I regret to say that. But it's a fact."

Delbert Downing, manager of the Midland Chamber of Commerce, will meet the El Pasoans at the West city limits Thursday afternoon and will take them on a brief sightseeing tour before they leave their bus at the Scharbauer Hotel. Members of the Wranglers' Club will be on hand to greet the visitors at the hotel.

The El Paso Boosters will be hosts to Chamber of Commerce directors, Wranglers, city officials and other civic leaders at a dinner Thursday evening. The tour is sponsored by the El Paso Chamber of Commerce. W. J. Hooten is chairman.

Defense Begins Debate In Greenville Trial

GREENVILLE, S. C. — (P)—A defense attorney for 28 white men declared the federal government sought to use a lynch-trial "to get votes in the North in a crucial election" and added: "Willie Earle (the negro lynch victim) is dead, and I wish more like him were dead."

Judge J. Robert Martin, Jr., thundered "you confine yourself to my ruling (against racial issues) or I'll stop you from arguing to the jury."

"I didn't refer to Willie Earle as a negro," protested defense counsel, John B. Culbertson.

"I don't care what you referred to. I'm warning you," said the court, "it is highly prejudicial."

Police Car Was At Right Place At Right Time

The police car was at the right place at the right time Monday. A cruising patrolman saw two men fighting at a service station in Midland just as he drove by. He stopped. The men were arrested for affray.

WASHINGTON — (P)—Rep. Albert Thomas (D-Texas) said Tuesday the Navy and Marine Corps will have to discharge 82,000 men if Congress accepts the 11 per cent cut the House Appropriations Committee recommended in funds President Truman asked for the Navy.

In a prepared speech at the House started debate on the \$3,469,761,100 bill, Thomas said the Navy gave him that information.

Proposed cuts in pay and subsistence items, he contended, will cause a reduction of 70,000 in the average enlisted strength of the Navy during the coming year and 12,000 in the Marine Corps.

The effect will be a force "entirely insufficient to carry out the Navy operating force plan," Thomas said, adding:

"During these troubled times I doubt the wisdom of these substantial cuts. Maybe 12 months hence, after world conditions are clarified, these cuts can be substantiated by even going deeper. But, at this particular time, I do not approve of the chances we are taking."

A&M Packing Company Petition Referred To Bankruptcy Referee

EL PASO — Hearing on the application for reorganization of debts by the A. & M. Packing Company of Midland was conducted before Federal Judge C. A. Boynton here Monday.

The petition was referred to Joseph G. Bennis, referee in bankruptcy, who fixed a hearing in Midland at 10 a. m., May 29, on the question of secured claims. Objections were presented to present reorganization plans as submitted by trustees.

Gromyko Says Atomic Control Temporary

NEW YORK — (P)—Andrei A. Gromyko, USSR delegate to the United Nations Security Council, said Monday night that an atomic weapons monopoly by any one country can be only of a temporary character and "in reality, such monopoly is an illusion."

"Who knows?" Gromyko asked. "The time may come when the country, at present occupying a more favorable position in this regard than other nations, will find itself in the same, or maybe even in a less favorable position in comparison with other states in the field of the development and perfection of certain dangerous kinds of weapons if such weapons are not prohibited."

Gromyko emphasized three points: 1. That prohibition of atomic and mass-destruction weapons must be undertaken promptly by United Nations action.

2. That after atomic weapons are outlawed, Russia will agree to international control and inspection.

3. That this inspection must be limited to assuring development of atomic energy for peaceful purposes only, and must not infringe on the internal economy of the USSR.

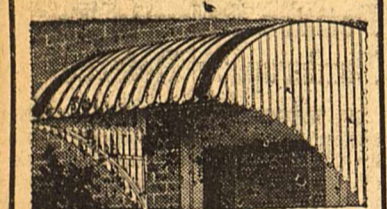

A resolution expressing appreciation for the work during the past year by Rev. Howard H. Hollowell, pastor, and Mrs. Hollowell, was passed unanimously at the fourth quarterly conference of the First Methodist Church Monday night.

The same resolution also carried a request that Rev. Hollowell be returned to the church by the 1947 annual meeting of the Northwest Texas Conference of the denomination which will be held in Amarillo, May 28-June 1.

Rev. J. Lennol Hester, who has served as associate pastor of First Methodist Church for 10 months, was also complimented by resolutions passed at the quarterly conference. Hester is scheduled to be appointed pastor of a new Methodist Church in Midland, now in course of organization.

The Monday night meeting was conducted by Dr. O. P. Clark, of Sweetwater, district superintendent, in this area for the church.

Reports covering the work and activity of the congregation for the conference year which will close with the Amarillo meeting showed a total of \$37,990 had been raised by the church.

Building Fund Of that amount \$25,990 represented local expense, general church benevolences and missionary work payments. The remaining \$12,000 covered actual cash raised during the period for the organization's building fund.

It was reported the building fund now stands at slightly more than \$85,000, in cash and pledges. Goal for that fund is a minimum of \$50,000.

A major portion of that money, when secured, is to be used to pay for the erection of an addition to the First Methodist Church's educational building.

Rev. Hollowell's report revealed the congregation now has 1,371 members, a net gain of 45 persons for the church roll in the last seven months.

The church school, according to the report of J. W. Thorne, general superintendent, has an enrollment of 842 persons, an increase of 11 per cent. Average attendance has been 402 persons, Thorne reported, which was an increase of six per cent over average attendance in the church school during the preceding year.

The Women's Society for Christian Service has 106 members at this time, Mrs. J. L. Tidwell, president of that organization said in her annual report.

It is doubtful if opposing teams ever ganged up on any player the way they have on Williams. Every time he strides to the plate, they start a troop movement toward the right side of the diamond.

Of his league leading home run output of nine, four have come in the ninth or extra innings to turn the tide in favor of the Red Sox. His circuit clout Monday came with one aboard in the last of the ninth to save the American League champions the ignominy of dropping both ends of a double header to the league leading Detroit Tigers.

The Bengals had won the 12-inning opener 3-2 and were ahead 4-3 with one away in the Red Sox half of the ninth of the second game. Up stepped Williams and blasted his two-run homer into the right field bleachers to give the Sox a 5-4 win and a split in the twin bill before 28,269 fans.

The third place Indians remained hard on the heels of Detroit and Boston by taking a 5-4 decision from the New York Yankees.

The Chicago-Cubs took undisputed possession of the National League's third place by out-slugging the Brooklyn Dodgers 8-7.

Marking the 11th successive game in which they failed to score more than two runs, the Washington Senators bowed to the Chicago White Sox 4-1 in 12 innings.

Catcher Del Rice and First Baseman Stan Musial provided the big blows as the St. Louis Cardinals finally broke the spell the left handed pitchers have held over them this season to give the Redbirds a 5-3 victory over Philadelphia.

Good Man In Our Corner

For Americans there is at least one positive result that can be salvaged from the disappointing Moscow conference of foreign ministers. That was the demonstration, by Secretary of State Marshall, that the direct conduct of our foreign affairs is in strong and capable hands.

Marshall may have gone to Moscow as an untried diplomat. But he took with him the high qualities of intelligence, determination, and tact which distinguished his brilliant military career. Even at this distance it could be seen that those qualities were making some headway against Russian resistance.

Credit is due the new secretary for most of the small comfort to be found in the Moscow meeting. It was largely through his efforts that American newspapers received adequate coverage of the conference. He proposed and engineered the agreement to reduce Big Four occupation forces in Germany. And, though it was not a scheduled item of business, he persuaded Molotov that the joint Soviet-American commission in Korea should resume discussion of the thorny problem of that country's independence.

Otherwise, Marshall had a close view of developing Soviet policy. Molotov demonstrated, perhaps more clearly than ever before, that this is a two-sided policy. One effort is aimed at getting compensation from the former enemy for Russia's war-devastated land and economy. The other is directed toward advancing communism.

Russia suffered severely in the war and certainly deserves reparations. But the Soviet plan would, in effect, force the U. S. to support Germany while the product of German industry went to strengthen Russia. It would also disregard an earlier Moscow agreement on independence for Austria.

The Soviet government realizes that the American people would never agree to support Germany indefinitely so that Russian strength might be built up. It realizes that, without such support, a reparations-paying Germany would collapse, making Communist conquest incredibly easier.

To carry out this program, which by now is well known to her wartime allies, Russia has adopted some familiar tactics. They are obstinacy, argument, and delay—always delay, while Russia's recovery increases and the hope, patience and temper of the western powers grow shorter.

Marshall grew to know this style of diplomatic boxing in his six weeks in Moscow. He stood up to it well. As a soldier, Marshall knows that military science has always found a defense for every type of attack. As a statesman, we hope he may be able to discover a parallel truth in diplomatic science. Meanwhile, in what now is frankly a struggle between two powers, he has held his own. No unanimity was achieved at Moscow. But at least Marshall saw to it that Russia gained nothing at America's expense.

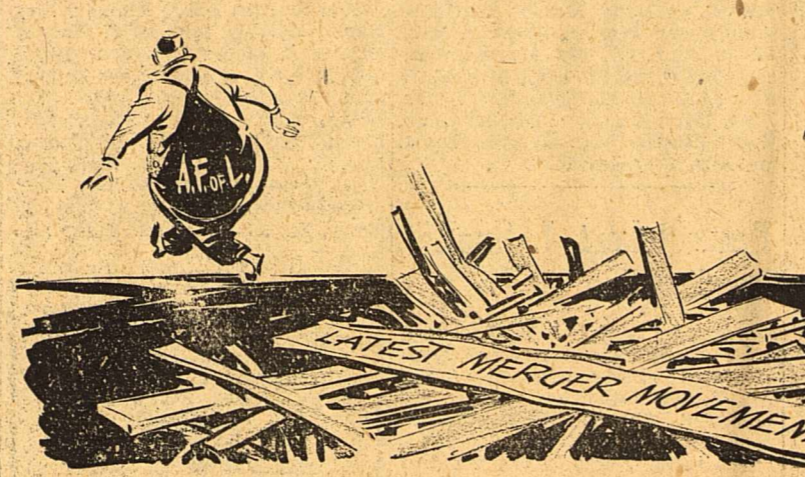

Health Department Film Includes Many Scenes From Midland

Several Midlanders had an opportunity Monday afternoon and Tuesday to demonstrate their acting talents—for the movies yet.

Occasion for the screen debuts of citizens was the filming of the Texas Department of Health picture, "Guardians of Health." M. F. Burchard, of the Division of Health Education, did the camera work. Members of the Midland Community Theater under the direction of Art Cole took many of the acting parts.

The film, which will become a part of the State Health Department's library, outlines the story of a typical health unit, showing such a unit's daily routine of activities. Personnel of the Midland-Ector-Howard Health Unit, of which Dr. E. E. Sadler is director, assisted in the "shooting."

Scenes in the educational movie include shots of children being immunized, health hazards being inspected and eliminated, food handlers being examined and sanitary laws being enforced.

Portions of the film already have been made in Austin and San Angelo, and other parts of it will be made in various other Texas cities. When completed, the movie will be available to schools, civic clubs, parent-teacher associations and other organizations which might find it useful.

Workers of the health unit are not given parts in the picture, the roles of directors, sanitarians and nurses being taken by persons not employed by the State Health Department, it was announced.

ers, and just recently they defeated an equally strong team to win at New Orleans.

In New Orleans, after a bridge tournament you have to have a cup of coffee, and it was then that Julius Rosenthal gave me today's hand. He said it is one of the greatest hands in bridge, a dummy reversal plus a squeeze play, but he had never seen it made in a tournament—it is always made over a cup of coffee.

On the face of it, it appears that a diamond trick must be lost. Incidentally, North's bid of three spades was a slight stretch, but South could not be blamed for bidding seven.

The opening diamond lead was captured by South's ace. The jack of trumps was played and overtaken by dummy's queen, after which a club was ruffed by declarer's ace. A small trump was overtaken by dummy's ten-spot and another club ruffed by declarer's king.

(Three trump leads to the board had been made, and three clubs ruffed.)

Now the board was re-entered with a heart to the king, and dummy's deuce of trumps was laid down. East was squeezed. If he threw a heart, South's ace-queen-nine would all be winners. If East discarded a diamond, dummy's king-nine of diamonds would become winners.

The success of the contract hinged on East's having both the hearts and diamonds, and it took really topflight play to bring it home.
