

## Record Is Set; 820 **Cast Votes**

By an almost two to one majority, voters of the Midland Independent School District Saturday approved the issuance of \$1,000,000 worth of bonds for school expansion and improvements, and also approved an increase in the maximum school tax rate from \$1 to \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. A total of 820 ballots were cast in the special election in the City-County Auditorium. Holt Jowell was election judge.

The vote on the proposed bond ssue was 518 for and 273 against, while the tax rate increase proposal was 508 for and 274 against. School trustees plan to use the ulk of the tax money in providing new, modern and completely equipped high school plant at the present junior high school location. The present high school building and gymnasium will become the unior high plant. The new high school will include adequate classcom facilities, shop building, band hall, library, laboratories, cafeteria auditorium and gymnasium. Additional classrooms also will be added to elementary schools as needed Officials plan to issue only \$750,000 worth of the bonds at present.

ROCKFORD, ILL.—(P)—The War Department is worried about the growth of ill-feeling and distrust between Regular Army officers and hose of the National Guard and Organized Reserves.

Maj. Gen. Edward S. Bres, War Department executive for reserve affairs, made this known in an address prepared for the Reserve Officers Association meeting here. Bres quoted from a recent letter sent by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, chief of staff, to all key officers of the department. The letter said

"During this critical period of re-organization of the civilian components of the Army, there is nothing more important than coopera-tion and coordination between the officers of the Regular Army and the officers of the civilian com-ponents. Mutual trust and confidence are fundamental.

"Unfortunately there have been far too many reports of unwarranted distrust and lack of confidence in the other components among of-National Guard, and the Organized Reserve. These unwise and unpatriotic actions must be stopped

at once. "The Regular Army must take the initiative to secure the desired cooperation and coordination of effort. We must make a sympathetic approach to National Guard and Organized Reserve problems of organization, training, supply, and administration. The National Guard and Organized Reserves corps are just as much a part of the Army of the United States as is the Regular Army.'



## Depression Pessimism Scarcely Noticeable

Dogs, Dr. Sadler pointed out, invariably begin to show symptoms of hydrophobia within days, and usually the animals die within that length of time after they are first infected with the dis-

Meanwhile, at Odessa, police have silled a total of more than 200 stray dogs to forestall a feared epidemic of hydrophobia. Forty-five dogs have been destroyed there this week, it was reported Friday, and Odessa Chief of Police Cowser Friday warned Oddessans that all persons owning dogs without licenses will be prosecuted after 10 days.

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

## First Responsibility

America's first responsibility in world affairs, says Commerce Secretary Harriman, "is to meet our responsibilities to ourselves . . . our primary task is to maintain the productivity and health of our own economy."

Few Americans or friends of America will care to quarrel with that statement. It is to the world's interest as well as our own that we maintain a sound economy, high production, and a living standard that promotes health, contentment and industrial peace. For, as Harriman pointed out, we are about the only nation today that can provide a good life for its own people and still help other peoples of the world to help themselves.

What we should do, then, seems clear enough. But how we should do it, and to what extent, is not simple. At what point can we say that our first responsibility is safely discharged? Perplexing questions like those are at the root of some of the current disagreements in Washington. Since separation seems doubtful, it will be necessary for Congress to develop bipartisan agreement on politicaleconomic policy and operation. This, in turn, will require a better understanding with the executive department on specific steps which must be taken.

Few, if any, congressmen would deliberately withhold food from hungry people because their government is Communist-dominated. At the same time, few would care to see American food and funds misappropriated to further that domination.

America must agree either to risk misuse of American aid in Russia's neighboring countries, or to hazard bad feelings and a tighter closing of the iron curtain by staying out of them. The most expert opinion available must contribute to the decision of how much money is needed to ease the world's economic plight and restore the world trade which is necessary to continued American prosperity

If these questions are decided on a basis of personal prejudice or partisan politics it can scarcely fail to do this country and the world great damage. The American government can best meet its first responsibility by giving this problem some straight, realistic thinking.

They haven't much competition. Discourtesy seems to be the order of the day in big cities and small. This is especially apparent to the cross-country traveler who thinks a little courtesy ought to be included in his bill-

But too often when he pays for his food and lodging, he doesn't even get a smile or "thank you." Even filling station attendants who used to kill their customers with courtesy aren't bothering much to speed the tired traveler on his way.

Too often rest rooms are dirty, and the motorist who has his tank filled has to ask to have his windshield wiped. If the citizens of New Orleans can get other cities interested in trying to outshine them in everyday courtesy, perhaps the sloppy, indifferent service which swept the nation during the war years will be on its way out of the

Here's a good race for every city in the country to enter. Why not make the competition tough for New Orleans?

## Butcher Boy

There is something both apt and ironic in the news that Vittorio Mussolini, a bomber pilot in the Italian-Ethiopian war, has been offered a job by a wholesale butcher in Buenos Aires.

As a teen-age kid, Vittorio was a pioneer of modern bombing. The missiles that he dropped on musket-bearing Ethiopian soldiers and unarmed civilians set the pattern of warfare that was to take hundreds of thousands of lives in the 10 years that followed.

Being an esthetic sort of kid, Vittorio loved his work. We seem to recall that he wrote a little book about it, in which he compared the bursting of the bombs to the sudden unfolding of brilliant blossoms.

Naturally, being high in the air, he was spared the messy consequences of this pretty picture. That's why we wonder whether he would like the meat business. It isn't a very esthetic calling.

Yet we hope that President Peron won't be so inconsiderate as to put any obstacles in the way of his distinguished visitor's following his chosen profession. Off hand, we can't think of any young man better fitted, by nature and training, to be a wholesale butcher.



members of the Hitler Jugend.

Officials said no disciplinary action would be taken against Sergeant Moriarty, but the paper would not be permitted to resume publication until suitable censorship by Army officers was provided.

## Tarpon Are Caught As Far North As DAR Opposes Private North Carolina, But Not With Rods

MOREHEAD CITY, N. C.—(NEA) —People usually think of a tarpon as a game fish of Florida waters. Because of this popular belief it is newsworthy that one measuring 52 inches and weighing 49 pounds was caught near Cape Lookout, off Morehead City. They are, as a matter of fact, plentiful at this season in North Carolina waters. They come to Pamlico Sound and other waters to spawn.

There are no definite records of catches with rod and reel since, but, as related, tarpon are common off North Car-olina this time of the year, and are frequently taken in purse seines and pounds nets.

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
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


