

MABEE TO DRILL DEVONIAN WILDCAT IN SW ANDREWS

Guy Mabee Drilling Company of Midland has staked location for a new wildcat test in Central-Southwest Andrews County, on which operations will be started immediately.

It will be Mabee No. 1 L. C. Hey-Cirick, and is 660 feet from west and 1,980 feet from south lines of section 6, block A-41, psl survey. That puts it about midway between Martin, multi-pay field, and the Block 12 field.

Contract calls for the prospector to drill to 8,500 feet, unless it finds the Devonian at a higher level. The wildcat is on a 160-acre lease taken on a farmout by R. R. Herrell of Midland, from The Atlantic Refining Company. Herrell made a deal with Mabee to drill the well The lease contract calls for drilling to be started by June 5.

Cities Service Oil Company, Stanolind Oil & Gas Company, Atlantic, Phillips Petroleum Company and Lion Oil Company have acreage adjacent to the new exploration. Mabee will use his own tools to dig the development.

#### NW MITCHELL DISCOVERY COMPLETES AS A PUMPER

Tobe Foster No. 1 Brennand, Northwest Mitchell County wildcat discovery, about two miles west of the north side of the Westbrook field, and 330 feet from north and 1,650 feet from east lines of section 4, block 28, TP survey, T-1-N, has been officially completed for a daily pumping potential of 152 barrels of 26-gravity oil, from pay at 2,703-75 feet, in the Clear Fork zone of the Permian lime.

The pay had been shot with 260 quarts of nitro glycerin. There was not enough gas to measure. No water was produced with the oil during the official Railroad Commission potential test.

### Gromyko And The Atom

It would seem, from Andrei Gromyko's speech before the American-Russian Institute in New York, that the Soviet government considers the difference between atomic weapons and other weapons to be one of degree lambs 17.00-21.50; medium to good rather than kind. At least his allusion to the international shorn lambs 15.00-19.25; ewes and convention outlawing poison gas points to that conclusion.

Gromyko referred to that convention in implying that the U.S. does not really want a similar international prohibition of atomic weapons. But the analogy is not entirely apt.

Poison gas was strictly an anti-personnel weapon. Its behavior was somewhat capricious, depending on wind and other atmospheric conditions for full effectiveness. Some warning and defense against it were possible.

The atomic bomb, at its present stage of development, brings sudden death, lingering death, and great Allied power. property damage. Only its failure to detonate or to hit a desirable target could destroy its effectiveness, and there is no known defense against it.






