The FPC will take up at the hearing Texas Eastern's request to be allowed to build about 66 miles of lateral lines to connect the big lines with systems which distribute gas in the Philadelphia and New Jersey areas.



All Midland north of the railroad now has been treated with spray or fog, W. M. Howard, health unit sanitarian and supervisor of the Saturday. Monday, Reeves and his powerful fog machine will treat Cloverdale Park, the sewage farm and other city areas. The baseball parks probably will be sprayed dur-

The machine being used to treat Midland is the same one which was employed at Texas City and at Higgins following the recent disasters in those cities—and Reeves operated the machine in those places. 

# Why Do Trains Have Mishaps? Survey Reveals 57 Out Of 89 Wrecks Are Due To Human Weaknesses

train accidents are caused by the carelessness of railroad workmen, expert investigators find.

An engineer "runs the yellow, and can't stop when the train ahead does Or he ignores signals warning of danger ahead. Or he misreads orders, in haste or because he assumes he knows what they will say. A switchman locks a switch, or changes it, without looking at the points to make sure it is set right Or he just plain forgets to change the switch when his train is

An inspector glances casually at foreman doesn't think it rained hard enough to cause trouble on shipper did not load a freight car

Then there's a wreck. People are killed-more are injured. And the first to be killed is a railroader—an engineman, a fîreman, a flagman.

Careful study of 89 Interstate Commerce Commission reports on accidents that have taken place during the past 13 months shows that 57, in which 149 were killed and 2,448 injured, were caused by the carelessness of train crews, switchmen, dispatchers and other railroad personnel.

**Equipment Failures** Only 27 were caused by faulty rolling stock, road bed, rails and the like. These killed 28 and injur-

The most common manpower fault is the failure to obey safety signals It caused 19 accidents in the period studied, killing 77, injuring 1,001. The Exposition Flyer ignored signals, entered a siding at 45 miles an hour, was wrecked. Twenty days later the same train ran the yellow -the engineer took it for granted the signal would change in time, but it didn't-and the Naperville wreck, the worst during the period, resulted.


The Red Arrow's engineer, tired after 14 hours on duty, overlooked hurt. caution signals on a detour, crashed the rear of the Clevelander. A Jersey Central engineer (71 years old) ran through a light, crashed a stopped passenger train, killed one, hurt

### Arid Land May Be Fertilized With Pellets Shot From Airplanes

WASHINGTON-(AP)-Dr. Lytle S Adams says the arid lands of the West could be made green without irrigation through air sowing of seed felleted with fertilizer, insecticide and other chemicals.

He estimates the use of pellets lowers the amount of seed required by 90 per cent and in row crops saves the grower \$14 or \$15 an acre by reducing or eliminating thinning

Already, he says, Australia, New Zealand, Chile and Argentina are negotiating to apply the new method to their deserts.

Adams, a retired Seattle dentist developed the seed and the planting method. He persuaded the Interior Department to give his invention a trial on more than 50,000 acres of arid Indian lands in Arizona. In Texas, he has air-planted more than 10,000 acres for private

"We think we've got something, but we don't want to go out on a limb and say it's-wonderful," says Edward N. Kavanagh, director of soil and moisture conservation of the Interior Department. Time Will Tell

"Time alone will tell. We should have a better idea this summer as to the results of the seeding of 10,-000 acres of the Papago Reservation (near Sells, Ariz.) Which was done seeded grass looked pretty good. There's an extreme drought in the area now, and the real test is under wav.


When she added the leased wire of the Associated Press to her paper recently she became the only woman in Texas with such a set-



So how can the FBI, a federal agency whose job is to investigate violations of federal laws, investigate lynchings?

Here's an explanation: The U. S. Constitution says no state shall deprive a person of life, liberty or property without due pro-

So, before a state can take away a man's property or take his life by executing him, he must be given a

Labor Day Ropings The first rodeo and stock show was staged by Midland Fair, Inc., in the Fall of 1935. The Labor Day date then was adopted, and threeday rodeos, ending on Labor Day, were staged from 1936 to 1941 when the war halted temporarily such celbrations.

The annual one-day calf roping contests were started Labor Day 1942, with the 1942, 1943 and 1944 events being planned and staged primarily for the entertainment of the soldiers stationed at Midland Scharbauer, James N. Allison, and Army Air Field. Another Labor Day event already is arranged for

# Anthropologist Finds 'Missing Link' Skull

PRETORIA, SOUTH AFRICA—
Dr. Robert Broom, anthropologist and palaentologist of the Transvaal Museum, Pretoria, believes a skull he found at Sterkfontein will show more definitely than ever that man is closely linked to the ape. He says it is the best-preserved skull of the pre-man period ever found Dr. Broom has removed from the skull part of the rock in which it was imbedded. He says it is that of a female and is about the same age as the skull of the Sterkfon-

tein man. The new skull, says Dr. Broom. is much more valuable than the original since it is all in one piece The skull of the Sterkfontein man

had to be pieced together. Unfortunately, the bone is very rotten and the stone in which it is imbedded is very hard. "Enough of the face has been cleared," he said, "to show that it is remarkably human, apart from the small brain. The eyes are large and rounded and the eyebrows wide and overhanging. The cheeks are wide and the front of the jaw projects, but not more than in some

human beings. "The brain is small and will probably not be bigger than 400 cubic centimeters. In structure there are a number of typically human and non-anthropoid characteristics.

"Though the teeth are lost, the scckets, by human standards, show, with hardly a doubt, that it is the skull of a woman perhaps 50 or 60 years of age.'





One of the weirdest was today's hand, board No. 9 of the fourth session. Most of the East-West players in the national champion ship section arrived at a six-heart contract and made six. However when Ralph Kempner of Chicago played the hand in the world championship section the bidding frown was the way it hap-pened. Kempner was rather surprised when South opened the bid-



ding with two spades. However North and South were using weak two-bids. But when North re-sponded with three hearts, that was little too much for Kempner, so

he doubled. West correctly doubled South's three spade bid. Kempner had quite a problem now, but he decided that if his partner could dou-ble three spades, North was on an out-and-out psychic, and therefore he bid six hearts. With three aces West was justified in going to seven hearts, which neither North nor South bothered to double.

Kempner realized that in order to make the contract he had to find South with the king of diamonds. If he won the first trick with dummy's ace of spades, he would have to discard a club or a liamond from his own hand, so instead, he played a low spade from dummy and trumped with the three of hearts.

The queen of diamonds was led, South covered and dummy's ace won. Three rounds of hearts were cashed, then the jack of diamonds and when South's ten-spot fell, Kempner ran off the balance of the hearts. He was left with the diamond seven and the king-teneight of clubs, while dummy had the ace of spades and three clubs to the ace. North held the diamond nine and the queen-jack seven of clubs.

Kempner led the eight of clubs to dummy's ace, then cashed the ace of spades. If North let go the nine of diamonds, Kempner would throw his losing club, while the discard of the jack of clubs made Kempner's king and ten good.







# Expert Testifies Heat Could Fire Ammonium Nitrate If Hot Enough

GALVESTON, TEXAS -(A)-Although the Coast Guard reported in Washington its investigation of the Texas City explosions failed to disclose any specific cause for the disaster, an explosives expert testified here during the initial hearing that intense heat could have caused the ammonium nitrate to explode. William T. Butler of Washington, civilian advisor to the Coast Guard for explosives, testified May

"If heat is applied to it (ammonium nitrate), at approximately 350 degrees, it begins to decompose If heating continues to a temperature of about 450 degrees, the critical point is reached. At this temperature, it is likely the mass would

He listed various mistakes he thought had been made, including the closing of hatches and introduction of steam into No. 4 hold where the nitrate was stored during the fire on the Grandcamp. Withholding of water was criticized

The investigation began here April 18, two days after the initial blast that razed nearby Texas City and continued through April 29. The recent report in Washington was based on the findings of this

### SOME PLANT SPRAYS CUT FROST RESISTANCE

WCOSTER, OHIO - (AP) - Plants sprayed in summer with fungicides containing copper apparently become more sensitive to frost damage than those treated with zinccontaining organic materials, J. D. Wilson of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, reports.

The reason is not clear, he says, but it may be that zinc-treated plants were in better foliage condition before the frost. Plants sprayed with Bordeaux mixture were mostly severely injured by October frost, he adds.



# Kermit C Of C Gets More Housing Units

KERMIT-Two additional buildings from the Pecos Army Air Field have been allocated to the Kermit Chamber of Commerce to be used in its veterans' emergency housing program, according to notification this week from Federal Public Housing Authority, Fort Worth, to Charlie Green, Chamber of Commerce manager.

One of the structures is a visiting officers' quarters and will be converted into four-family apartments The other, which will be two separate buildings when it is moved is an L-shaped building which for-merly was the WAC library and officers' quarters. The latter building is more than 87 feet long and 25 feet wide, and this part will be made into five apartments. Remainder of the structure, which is composed of nine individual rooms with adequate bath fixtures, probably will be used as dormitory units or the time being.

These buildings will be a part of the latest housing project of the Chamber of Commerce, which only recently has been completed. This project, known as Sandy Acres, was made from 10 buildings from the Pecos Field and nov houses approximately 40 families, and is in addition to the Kermit Veterans' Housing, a 20-family unit project which the organization has perated since August of last year

Authorization to move the buildings has been received from FPHA. and plans are rapidly being completed to have the units ready for When these units are completed the Kermit Chamber of Commerce will have approximately 70 dwelling units occupied by veterans who have been unable to find living quarters for their families.

Saddle horses are loaded into the pickup, or trailers, and transported in jig time to whatever part of the ranch is to be "worked." The cowboys unload their ponies, still fresh, from the mechanical conveyance, do whatever horseback work is necessary, again load the horses, and speed homeward.

Any cowpuncher who has punched many cows will agree this system is a country mile ahead of the old method. In former days, half the time away from the home bunk would have been spent in riding to or back from, the work. Horseback riding is fun. In cities a lot of people pay one to three bucks an hour for it. But after you've done it for 100 times a month for seven or eight years, you get so you'd just as soon not sit in a saddle for more than 15 or 20 hours a day. Chuckwagon Picture

The pickup truck has changed the old chuckwagon picture, too. While regular, old-time wagons still are used occasionally by a crew living night and day out under the stars, most chuck boxes nowadays are installed on pickups.

There are manifold advantages in this new arrangement: the cook can speed grub to hungry men anywhere on the ranch within a short time; there is no team of mules or horses to feed and water; in a country where wood and water are scarce, the pickup-driving cook can make quick side trips to procure these necessities; if there is an accident among the crew, an injured man can be rushed to a doctor via the rubber-wheeled kitchen. However, with pickups to transport horses and men to various parts of the ranch, there is not so much use

for the chuckwagon as before. On some of Texas' largest cattle outfits, of course, wagons still are used by crews out on the range. Where a bunch of men must stay on distant areas of the ranch for long periods of time, it sometimes is found a wagon or two to haul the chuck box, bed rolls, and feed for the remuda is more economical than use of a large truck.

And, on such ranges, the crew gathered around the chuck wagon presents a picture which hasn't changed much, except for the dates on the magazines and newspapers which the hands may have stowed away in their bed rolls, since the days when cowmen and sheepmen took a very dim view of each other because their vision often was obscured by gunsmoke.





You think the 1947 cowgirl spon-sors are pretty and quite some riders with their breath-taking ridng suits. Well, sir, we have somebody to put up against them for beauty and riding ability. And she still lives in Midland. We write of Mrs. Mollie McCormick, then Mollie Vest. She was given the spon-sor's first prize in 1898 when she was 15 years old. She was not a sponsor then, she was a cowgirl. She was voted and judged the most popular girl at a cowboy carnival in 1898. This is the forerunning of the modern sponsors. The taffeta blouse she won for first prize

is in the Midland County Museum. Judges at Midland rodeos have always been the best. There is an official badge of 1898 in the Midland museum. It was quite a decorative thing and authoritative looking. And where there are now numbers or plain badges to indicate the contestants, in 1898 they had fancy badges, like the one owned by C. A. Taylor.



#### Army Seeks Bonus To Encourage Enlistees

WASHINGTON -(P)- The Army may ask Congress to approve a new bonus plan to keep men in uniform. The plan was disclosed to the House Appropriations Committee during hearings in the House on the 1948 War Department supply

Maj. Gen. St. Clair Street of the Quartermaster Service said it calls for a reenlistment bonus of \$100 for each year of a new enlistment and a bond bonus of \$1,000 for each five-year hitch up to a maximum of 30 years, or a top bonus of \$6,000 Street said the Army also favors better living quarters for enlisted men and their dependents and more liberal quarters' allowances.

CANBERRA, AUSTRALIA—(A)— Prime Minister J. B. Chifley Thursday said U. S. action to raise the wool tariff during trade talks in Geneva was "almost internationally provocative."

The prime minister made the most critical Australian government statement to date on the U.S. wool bill. He spoke in the House of Representatives after R. G. Menzies, opposition leader of the Liberal party, declared responsible Australian opinion was "alarmed and indignant" about the American at-

titude on wool duties.

(Australia is one of the world's leading producers and exporters of wool. The United States, also a major producer, is the world's

greatest consumer.)







#### Skyrocketing Prices Of Farm Land And Food Worry Federal Officials

var meant a big demand for food The price of farm products jumped. So, farm land prices jumped, too. The war ended in 1918. Food needs still were great. Farm food prices continued up. So, farm land orices continued up.

Between 1914 and 1920 farm food prices went up a little over 100 per cent and farm and prices went up

The 1920 depression hit. Down went farm food prices. Down, too, went farm land prices. Farm food prices recovered a bit in the mid-1920s. Not so with farm

Continual Drop Once they started to slide in 1920. they continued sliding into the depression years of the early 1930s. Not only was the 70 per cent in-crease in farm land prices over 1914

wiped out, but prices fell 27 per cent below 1914. About 2,000,000 farmers lost their farms in this crash. They had gone heavily into debt to buy farm land while farm food prices had been

The drop in farm food prices meant their farm land was worth far less than they had paid for it. So, unable to pay what they owed on their farms, they lost them.

As this country edged out of the depression, farm land prices picked up a bit in the 1935-39 period. Even so, by 1939 they still were 15 per cent below 1914. In 1939 World War II started.

With the war came another big demand for food. As farm food prices started upward, farm land prices started upward, too. Since World War II started in 1939, farm food prices have gone up

Land Prices Up 92 Per Cent (They went up only a little more than 100 per cent between 1914 and the crash of 1920.) Since 1939, farm land prices have

risen 92 per cent. (As noted, they went up only 70 per cent between 1914 and 1920.) A lot of farmers in the 1939-47 period-although not so many as

in 1914-20—have gone heavily into debt to buy farm lands. For many of them a bad crash now would be a repetition of what happened to farmers after World


## Hollywood's Gain Safe Crackers Use Soap To Make It Clean Job





Civil disturbances provide a fine breeding ground for Communism, and Red organizers have been la-boring in India for years. Former Under-Secretary of State Sumner Welles says "Communism has recently strengthened its hold in all of the cities and is now rapidly spreading into the rural areas."

May Become Two States While this Communist crusading is going on, the signs are that the all-India Congress, which is pre-dominantly Hindu, and the Moslem League may agree to divide British India into Hindu and Moslem states —Hindustan and Pakistan. Britain finally has acquiesced in this re-luctantly, after having fought for a united country under a federal government. The Hindus also wanted this, but the Moslems refused on the ground that they are outnumbered three to one by the Hindus and wouldn't get a fair deal in a central government.

Under such an arrangement it is possible some 600 princely states might group together and ask for outright independence or, what seems more likely, request dominion status in the British common-

wealth of nations. The princes had been prepared to join in a federal government with the provinces of

What eventually will come out of this bickering and confusion remains to be seen. Sumner Welles says a solution to India's problem "will only be found if and when the Indian leaders are willing to think in terms of India, rather than in terms of their own com-munities." He maintains that these leaders also must be "willing to enter an agreement upon a federto that which we evolved here in the United States." Observers generally hold that a federal government is the only logical solution.
