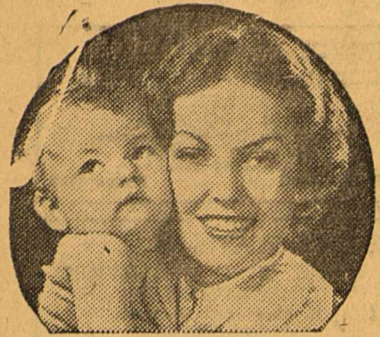


LUNCHEONS CANCELLED

West lost no time in returning the six of diamonds, which South won with the king. But declarer could not prevent Bayless from winning the lead with the ace of hearts and cashing a diamond. Thus East and West took two heart tricks, two diamonds and two clubs. . . . and remember that in tournament bridge, it is just as important to beat a part score contract as any other.
