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## Single Military Head Is Favored

### Senate Committee Says Full Merger Of Forces Not Needed

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Senate Armed Services Committee Wednesday unanimously approved legislation to put the nation's military and naval forces under a single secretary of national security.

The bill specifies the Army, Navy and a separate Air Force are to be under "unified direction" to provide for their "authoritative coordination," but are not to be merged.

### Russia-Hungarian Air Lines Barred Over U S Zones

BUDAPEST—(AP)—The U. S. legislation Wednesday informed the Hungarian government planes of the Russian-Hungarian transport company no longer are being permitted to fly over the American zones of Austria and Germany because of lack of American civil aviation rights in Hungary.

The announcement was delivered to the new premier, Lajos Dinnyes, and to acting Minister Erno Mihalyfi, both pro-Communist members of the Small Holders Party. It constituted an American response to Russian and Hungarian hindrance of American air activities in Hungary during the last two years.

### Work Started On Big Building For Woolworth Store

A \$100,000 building permit was issued Tuesday and construction was started on a two-story building at the corner of Main and Texas streets in Midland, to house an F. W. Woolworth Company store.

The announcement of the new building was made by Bert Cole, Jr., owner. David L. Harmon is the contractor.

The building will be of brick, tile and steel construction, and will be faced with light cream pearl of brick. It will be 75 by 140 feet. Construction is to be completed within eight months, Cole said.

Cole said the Woolworth building will occupy the entire building under a lease.

### Ross Murder Charges Pending Girl's Health

NEW BRAUNFELS—(AP)—Sheriff W. A. School Wednesday said the preliminary hearing of murder charges filed against Dr. Lloyd I. Ross of San Antonio in the May 25th slaying of four members of the Williams York family will be held as soon as Ann York recovers from bullet wounds suffered in the shooting.

Ann York, 13-year-old daughter of York, prominent San Antonio investment company executive, is now under treatment in a San Antonio hospital.

### Flood Isolates Vermont City; Four Missing

RUTLAND, VT.—(AP)—At least four persons were missing—three of them children—and this city of 18,000 was virtually isolated Wednesday in the wake of a roaring flood which caused damage estimated at more than \$2,000,000 and left upwards of 500 persons homeless.

This city—second largest in Vermont—was without water, gas and electricity.

While the worst appeared over with clearing weather, business was virtually at a standstill as everyone pitched in to clear debris and help the homeless.

More than 1,000 persons were evacuated as the flood waters swirled on this city after breaking through the West Pittsford dam, five miles to the North.

Both water mains leading from a city water-supply reservoir burst. Public works commissioner William Kallie estimated it would be between two and seven days before water could be restored.

### Southern Coal Union Talks Are Suspended

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Contract negotiations between John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers and Southern Coal operators broke down Wednesday.

Ten minutes before the talks were scheduled to resume, the UMW representatives notified operators they would not attend because the mine owners had made public their wage proposals. These included an offer of 75 cents daily pay increase in return for abandonment of port-to-port pay time for underground travel in the mines.

Similar negotiations between Lewis and operators from the North and West were suspended last week after the two sides disagreed on the issue of wages.

### Youths Arrested For Break In Of Softball Stadium

Police reported Tuesday the arrest of two youths in connection with the breaking in and taking of equipment at the Midland Softball Park Saturday.

The youths, ages 12 and 14 years, were turned over to juvenile authorities.

Several hundred dollars worth of equipment was taken from the softball park, officers said.

Other articles besides those taken at the park were found in the boys' possession.

### Commissioner Murray To Attend Rodeo Here

William J. (Bill) Murray, Jr., of Houston, a member of the Texas Railroad Commission, will arrive in Midland late Wednesday to attend the opening performance of the 12th Annual World Championship Midland Rodeo Thursday. He will be accompanied by Mrs. Murray and by Jack K. Baumel, chief engineer for the Railroad Commission.

Commissioner Murray will be among the dignitaries riding in the horsemen's parade at 4 p. m. Thursday. He also will attend the Thursday night rodeo performance. It is his first official visit to Midland since he became a member of the commission early this year. Murray succeeded Gov. Beauford Jester as a commission member.

Mr. and Mrs. Murray, Baumel and railroad commission personnel of the Permian Basin area and their wives, will be honor guests of the Petroleum Committee of the Midland Chamber of Commerce at a buffet dinner in the Crystal Ballroom of the Scharbauer Hotel at 5:30 p. m. Thursday. V. C. Maley is chairman of the Petroleum Committee. It will be an invitational affair.

### Otis Conner Is Injured As Tractor Runs Wild

Otis Conner, dairy farmer west of Midland, was seriously but not critically injured Tuesday when he was run over by a tractor at his farm.

Conner was driving the tractor across pasture land and hit a ditch. He was thrown from the tractor and it circled out-of-control and ran over him. About an hour and a half later he was found by his wife.

He was rushed to Western Clinic Hospital in Midland and his injuries include lacerations, and possible fracture of the pelvis.

### Greyhound and Union Agreement Reached

FORT WORTH—(AP)—Officials of the International Association of Machinists and the Southwestern Greyhound Lines Tuesday night reached agreement here on terms of a new contract which is expected to end a two-month strike of the bus system's mechanics.

T. F. Morrow, U. S. labor conciliator, announced Wednesday the agreement yet must be approved in union meetings at Kansas City, Dallas, Houston and Amarillo, local union centers.

### Senate Confirms Appointment Of Ewing Thomason

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Rep. R. Ewing Thomason of El Paso was unanimously confirmed by the Senate Tuesday to be Federal District Judge for Western Texas, without a word of debate.

He will take the bench after adjournment of the present session of Congress, succeeding Judge Charles A. Boynton who resigned recently.

Thomason's appointment was sponsored directly by President Truman and had the approval of both Senators Tom Connally and W. Lee O'Daniel. Thomason and Truman have been close friends a number of years.

The new judge is a veteran member of Congress and is the ranking Democrat on the important House Military Affairs Committee. He is a former mayor of El Paso and formerly was speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

### Training Legislation Requested By Truman

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman Wednesday asked Congress to give "early consideration" to the subject of universal training.

He made the request in sending to the legislators the report of his advisory commission on universal training. The report, made public by the White House earlier this week, recommended universal training and said the United States must strengthen its defenses or invite "extermination" in atomic warfare.

The President, in a letter to speaker Martin and Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) presiding officer of the Senate, described the report as "excellent" and said it is significant that members of the commission "unanimously recommend the adoption of universal training."

### Father Of Midlander Is Buried In San Angelo

SAN ANGELO—Funeral services were held here Wednesday morning for Isaac Andrew Herring, 73, San Angelo resident, and father of Miss Glyneth Herring of Midland, who died suddenly at his home here Monday. Interment was in Fairmont Cemetery.

### President Asks Action On Certain Power Bills

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman Wednesday asked congressional leaders of both parties to speed action on his requests for extension of certain war powers due to expire June 30.

Truman called on them to hurry enactment of bills, now pending, to:

1. Extend the maritime commission's authority to charter oil tankers. Speaker Martin said the President asked this especially to avoid a possible oil shortage in Eastern states this winter.
2. Extend for one year the Export-Control Act. This would apply to certain articles still in short supply.
3. Extend certain allocation and priority controls under the second war powers act. This applies to foods, fertilizers and other scarce commodities.

A gigantic and highly colorful horsemen's parade through the streets of downtown Midland at 4 p. m. Thursday will officially open the 12th Annual World Championship Midland Rodeo. The rodeo will continue through Sunday night.

### Mabee Has Spudded At SW Andrews Wildcat

Guy Mabee Drilling Company No. 1 L. C. Heydrick, Southwest Andrews County wildcat, between the Martin and the Block 12 fields, and 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 6, block A-41, psi survey, spudded on June 1, and was due to set and cement surface casing on Wednesday. It is contracted to drill to 8,500 feet, or the Devonian, whichever comes first.

### Texaco Completes Good Producer In Block 12

The Texas Company No. 3-Q University, 660 feet from south and 1,994 feet from east lines of section 15, block 12, University survey, and a stepout from production from the Tubb-Permian in the Block 12 field, completed for a 24-hour flowing potential of 887 barrels of 35.5 gravity oil, from pay at 6,970-7,230 feet, which had been treated with 14,000 gallons of acid.

The completion flow was through a 32/64-inch tubing choke. Gas-oil ratio was 575-1.

### Shafter Lake Flanker Looking For Pay Zone

City Mabee Drilling Company No. 1 Williams, stepout from the Shafter Lake field, in North-Central Andrews County, and 660 feet from south and east lines of section 10, block A-36, psi survey, drilled out plug in 5 1/2-inch casing, which had been cemented at 4,315 feet, and had progressed to 4,350 feet in dry lime, using cable tools.

Interested observers expect the project to encounter signs of production in the near future.

### SO&GC Completes New Well In Yellowhouse Region

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 2-B Tom Cobb, flanker to the Yellowhouse field, in Northwest Hockley County, and 351 feet from west and 1,389 feet from north lines of 1/4 Sec. 4, C. W. Goodman survey, completed for a daily pumping potential of 108.08 barrels of 31 gravity oil, with small gas volume, from pay at 4,584-4,647 feet, which had been treated with 2,500 gallons of acid.

### Dies From Gun Wounds

EASTLAND—(P)—E. L. (Ray) Faircloth, 60, Ranger trucker, who shot his wife, Mrs. Etta Smith Faircloth, about 45, to death in the office of a lawyer handling her divorce suit, then turned the gun upon himself, died Wednesday after a bullet was removed from his brain. Justice of the Peace E. E. Wood returned an inquest verdict that Faircloth shot his wife and himself.

**UNION RELEASES REPORTS ON COKE PROSPECTOR**

Union Oil Company No. 1 McCutchen, Central Coke County wildcat, about three miles east of Robert Lee, has been abandoned and will be plugged on total depth of 6,746 feet, in Ellenburger dolomite and sand.

This prospector found top of the Ellenburger at 6,304 feet. Top of the reef lime was called at 5,000 feet. Elevation is 1,921 feet.

A drillstem test was taken at 6,308-27 feet, for one hour. There was a steady blow of air throughout the period. Recovery was 120 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud.

Drillstem test No. 2 was at 6,310-70 feet, with the tool open four hours. Recovery was 60 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud and 215 feet of salt water.

The third drillstem test was at 6,694-6,746 feet. The tester was open one and one-half hours. Recovery was 4,070 feet of salt water, with a sum of dead oil.

The foregoing reports are from the owner of the wildcat. No information has been released by Union representatives regarding any further developments which may be planned for that concern's large block on which No. 1 McCutchen was drilled.

This exploration was located 1,990 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 44, block 1-A, H&TC survey.

### Petersburg Field Stepout Is To Be Abandoned

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Sims, Hale County State Bank, northwest stepout from the discovery for flowing production from the Cisco-Pennsylvanian, in the Petersburg field, of Southeast Hale County, and 650 feet from south and 1,958 feet from east lines of north half of section 6, block CL, EL survey, has been abandoned and will be plugged on total depth of 7,528 feet in shale.

This development failed to find any indications of oil or gas, and it is understood that it also failed to find any Cisco lime, up to the time it was abandoned.

Standard Oil Company of Texas and Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Hunt, 660 feet from south and east lines of section 6, block CL, EL survey, one-quarter of a mile due west of the initial producer in the Petersburg field, had reached 7,151 feet in lime and shale, and was drilling ahead. At that point it had not reported having found any Cisco lime.

Southern Minerals Corporation No. 1 Heard, about four miles northwest of the discovery well of the Petersburg field, and 660 feet from south and west lines of section 13, block R, EL survey, had reached 2,395 feet, and was drilling ahead in anhydrite.

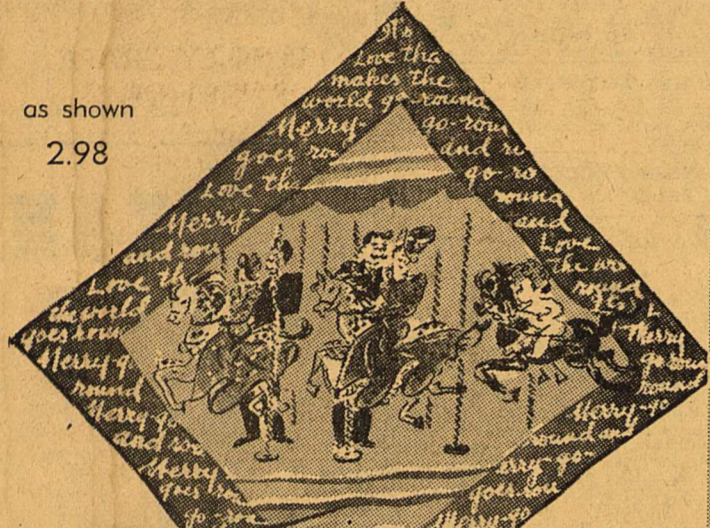

## Midland Wins, 5-3, As Odessa Protests

Could we talk you into going out Wednesday night and watching them battle again if we told you that Tuesday night the Midland Indians beat the Odessa Oilers, 5 to 3, in 10 innings—a game which the visitors protested loudly and long?

The two teams meet at 8:15 p. m. Wednesday in the Indians Park.

It wasn't the rain which delayed the start of the game. It wasn't exactly the score. But it was the sparkling and close baseball which ended in the last half of the 10th inning with Odessa protesting twice that is the story of Tuesday night's game.

It was a slam-bang Midland-Odessa battle all night. You had a feeling it was going to produce something. It did.

Midland got two runs in the second inning with Eddie Melillo hitting and scoring Nipp and Keon. Odessa didn't scratch until the fourth when Roussos, a thorn all night, hit a home run over the left-field fence.

Both went scoreless until the ninth when Odessa tied up the game in the first half. Womack hit a double scoring Roussos who had hit.

Then came the terrific 10th. Odessa got ahead in the first part of the frame with Jakes hitting a home run over the right centerfield fence.

**Come The Protests**  
Midland won the game in the last half of the 10th when Keon doubled and scored three runs ahead of him by Prince, Ramsdell and Nipp.

The protests came in this inning. The first in the first half of inning was this: with one out, Pearce of Odessa had two balls and one strike against him. On the fourth ball pitched, he hit to third base and the ball was "errored" and he ran to first base. However, Base Umpire Holcomb had called time because a warm-up pitcher's ball had trickled into right field and the right fielder was trying to retrieve this extra ball. Apparently the pitcher and head umpire did not see Holcomb call time. After "discussion," Pearce, was recalled to the plate to resume batting with the count the same as before the play. Odessa protested and the game continued under protest.

In the last half of the 10th was the other protest: Odessa was leading, 3-2, and with Prince on second and Ramsdell on first, Nipp bunted. The Odessa pitcher Embrey fielded the ball throwing to third base Willingham, who was off base and failed to make the force out. Umpire Holcomb called Prince out but later "realized" he was safe because the third baseman gave himself away by attempting a second time to put out Prince, who had over-run third. On this second attempt the third baseman dropped the ball. Umpire Holcomb did not see the dropped ball on the second

play. McClain, head umpire, ruled safe. Odessa protested. The game continued and Keon broke it up soon with his double scoring Prince, Ramsdell and Nipp.
