President Challenges Congress To **Restore Farm Appropriation Cuts**

KANSAS CITY -(P)- President Truman challenged Congress Saturday night to restore House cuts in farm and interior appropriations which he said presented a "grave danger" of weakening American worldwide resistance to aggression

Speaking to comrades of the 35th Division after an active day m which he led them on foot in a colorful parade, he declared a strong domestic economy was necessary to support the nation's global commitments.

VIENNA -(AP)- A high government official Saturday declared a leading Austrian Communist had

lemanded a new Communist-controlled regime in this country, with the threat that the Soviet Union vould never sign a peace treaty with the present moderate cabinet. 'The official said Ernst Fischer, one of the four Communists in the Austrian Parliament, had offered complete support of his party and generous assistance from Russia'

for a new government empowered to rule four years without parliamentary restrictions. The official, who could not be quoted by name, said Fischer warned also of "serious repercussions" if "Western orientation" continued unchanged in Austria. Western diplomats expresed considerable con-cern, in view of the pattern of pressure as disclosed in recent developments in Hungary and **Bulgaria**

Despite the warning, the propoal, made to two members of the Austrian cabinet, was turned down, SUSPECT CHARGED the official said. High government officials said they expect a colder mcre unyielding attitude on the part of Russia toward the Austrian Republic as an immediate result.

Floods And Tornadoes In Midwest And East Leave 16,000 Homeless

Floods and tornadoes made new destructive assaults Saturday which caused at least 17 deaths, left more than 16,000 homeless and brought many thousands of dollars of property damage.

While swollen rivers spilled over their banks in Iowa, Missouri, Illinois, Ohio, Indiana, Nebraska and Kansas, a tornado struck in Pennsylvania and Ohio.

The new tornadoes, which killed at least five persons and injured more than 100 others, came on the heels of similar twisters Friday night in Illinois, Colorado, Oklahoma and Missouri.

The flood danger continued to grow, meanwhile, with the U.S. weather bureau forecasting a major Mississippi River flood from Keokuk, Ia., to Quincy, Ill., and Hannibal, Mo. Flood warnings also were issued for the Missouri River from St. Joseph, Mo., to Kansas City and below.

A tornado which cut a path through the heart of Sharon, Pa.. killed three persons, injured many others and damaged 100 homes. The wind wrecked a bridge over the Shenango River. The twister struck a few minutes earlier near Youngstown, Ohio, injuring at least 33 persons. Two persons were killed in another twister at Warren, Ohio. Loan Companies Urged To Help Check Acre Price

WASHINGTON -(AP)- The Ag iculture Department, acting upon President Truman's expressed concern over a boom in land prices, is ready to ask banks and credit agencies to tighten down on farm loans. The request is expected to be made at a meeting of leaders of farm organizations and represen-tatives of lending agencies here Monday called by Secretary of Agriculture Anderson at Truman's uggestion.

Reporting in a statement last nonth that farm land prices have ncreased 92 per cent over pre-wai levels, the President said he fears many farmers, particularly veterans who buy land on credit at these prices may run into trouble when farm product prices return to normal

Anderson is expected to urge banks, insurance companies and other credit institutions to adopt the government's own rule on farm

What To Do About **Displaced** Persons Is Top Problem

WASHINGTON-(AP)-There are about 850,000 homeless people in Europe, living in displaced persons' camps in Germany, Austria Italy

The camps-run by the American and British Armies in their zones of occupation-mean a place to stay, something to eat, but no jobs.

The displaced persons are people of many nations. Perhaps 250,000 of 850,000 are Jews. About 550,000 are in American camps.

The United Nations considers them an international responsibility. And pretty soon UN's international refugee organization will run the camps.

Through fear, or some other reason, these people don't want to go back to their own countries.

Eut where can they go? What can they do? How can they get their lives straightened out and start over again? Can this country take some in?

A proposal to do just that has been made in Congress by Rep. Stratton, Illinois Republican.

Last April he offered a bill to let 400,000 of the 850,000 displaced





Two Hundred Employes Of WAA To Be Released

DALLAS —(P)— About 200 employes will be cut off the North Texas region staff of the War Assets Administration by June 27, according to WAA regional personnel director Bennet Boggess.

He said the El Paso center will be reduced about 20 per cent and the WAA customers' service center at Pantex ordnance plant in Amarillo, with 15 employes, will discontinue operations altogether at the end of the month.

He said this would mean a total of 900 government employes in six major agencies of the Dallas region who will be out of jobs as a result of the federal economy move.

The cutback, Bogess said, will affect commodity specialists who have directed disposal of various items as much as it will affect clerical and accounting help.


They were returning from Santa Catalina Island aboard their cabin cruiser recently when one of their guests cried: "Look, there's a seal!"





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

Russia's Intention To Be Tested In Two Meets

By EDWARD E. BOMAR (Associated Press Foreign News Analyst.)

Negotiations on opposite sides of the world, at Vienna and Seoul, bear watching for a sign whether Moscow wants improved relations with the United States and the other western powers just now. Thus far no such sign has come from Vienna, where for three weeks negotiations of a Big Four committee of experts have been deadlocked on the Austrian peace settlement. Some top American officials are about ready to write off the latest attempt and toss the Austrian problem back into the laps of the Big Four foreign ministers. Prospects appear more hopeful, however, for the attempt of the Soviet-American joint commission meeting at Seoul to agree on the basis for a temporary trusteeship regime for all Korea.

It is not impossible Russia and the United States might agree on Korea's future while remaining at odds on almost every other major postwar issue. Clark and some others who took

part in the Moscow and London efforts to frame a peace treaty for Austria are convinced, for the present, Moscow has no intention of concurring in any settlement except on terms which would make Austria a Soviet puppet. Knottiest problem involves prop-



By JAMES MARLOW WASHINGTON $-(\mathcal{P})$ — You may not have thought of it, but Wash-ington is the world's science capital. This city is the center of great cientific activity although the noise of the politicians and lawmakers drowns out the quiet scientists. Yet, you could rubberneck around

Washington a good while and still not see the work in science being done here.

Since World War I Washington has become more and more a scientific center. It spurted into first place under the drive of World War

The Washington Post, recently speaking of the scientific growth of the city, said:

"Growth has been topsy-like-a cylclotron here, a wind-tunnel there, medical research laboratories somewhere else, until you look about and suddenly realize that your own backyard is a treasury of scientific endeavor."

Plenty Of Organizations Probably more scientific organi-

zations, including some of the largest, have their headquarters here than in any other one city. For example:

The American Association for the Advance of Science, with more than 32,000 members all over the world; the National Academy of Sciencies, with a membership of 350 top scientists; the American Chemical Society; American Psychological Society, and so on.

The government, with its fingers in many pies, is doing most of the cientific work here.

The biggest non-governmental outfit is the Carnegie Institution of Washington which operates a great cyclotron, used in atomic research. Here are some of the government centers:

The National Cancer Instituteit investigates the causes of disease; and ways to prevent them. The National Canver Institute-it's doing research in cancer. The Agricultural Research Center-its great acres, just outside Washington are a swarm of scien-tific experiments with plants and animals.

Army Medical Department's research and graduate school-among other things, it is investigating tropical diseases.



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


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

While the war was on there was a good deal of talk about the tremendous task of de-educating and re-educating the Germans. One hears little of such talk today. This is not because the task is finished. On the contrary, it is bigger than ever; after two years, it is scarcely be-

There are several reasons why the subject has dropped out of general conversation. Our authorities in Germany have been in much the same fix as the postwar British government. Crisis after crisis has had to be dealt with, thus delaying a real start on a long-range plan.

Our military government authorities have had to cope with the grim and unforeseen struggle with Russia over the political shape of postwar Germany. On lower ad- Australian Spider Is ministrative levels there have been a number of bothersome problems: discontent in the occupying forces, lack of food for the Germans, too-easy fraternization, black marketing, stirrings of nazism, and increased grumblings over meager rations.

Here at home the public does not identify itself with a past master at camouflage. the problems of peace as it did during the war. This is unfortunate, though perhaps it is inevitable.

The war demanded common participation in the fight against a common danger. This unity quickened our na- for the gliding operation. tional conscience and sharpened our national vision in a manner scarcely possible under less tragic circumstances. STORES A BUSHEL We could see quite clearly then the immense job to be done on the collective Germán mind if another threat by German militarism were to be averted. Today? Well we seem to have lost interest in the whole matter.

In such an atmosphere it is particularly interesting to read a current appraisal of the German people by Dr. Thomas Mann. Dr. Mann, a German through and through, was one of the first non-Jewish writers to leave his country in protest against Nazi policies. He departed in 1933, the first year of Hitlerism-not under compulsion, but out of disgust.

As one of the world's most eminent novelists, Dr. Mann has a gift for probing an individual or national mentality.

"Germany," says Dr. Mann, "takes a morbid pride in her own tragedy, believing it to be unique. It is self-pity, part of the national egotism, which is preventing Germany

Water From Snow May Be Great Aid To India

CALCUTTA -(P)- Dr. J. E. Church, president of the International Commission on Snow, says that India has great wealth stored in the snow fields of the Himalayas. Water from these snows would be an important factor in the development of the country if it were properly used, he says.

The 78-year-old American has completed a two-months survey of snows in Nepal and Sikkim for the Indian government. It marked the 50th year of such surveys for Dr. Church. He was a professor of classics at Nevada University when he made his first snow survey on Mount Rose,

Himalaya snows start at 10,000 feet rather than at about 6,000 feet as they do in much of the United States, he says, because the Himalayas are nearer the equator.

From India, Dr. Church is going to the Andes to make a survey for Argentina.

The Germans, fancying themselves betrayed, still consider themselves the master race. They insist upon being waited on. They are arrogant in defeat as in victory.

A more active recognition of the attitude which Dr. Mann describes will not solve all the problems of Germany. But it might serve to help set a firm, consistent American policy and thus simplify the task that is still to be done.

Investigators Report Faulty Equipment Wrecks 27 Trains In Thirteen Months PART IN AUSTIN MEETING

PHILADELPHIA -(NEA)- It is supposedly impossible for a modern Pullman car to break off a crack train, roll backward down grade three miles and a half, tip over onto a rocky embankment, right itself, stop, and kill only one person.

Yet that happened, in February, near Gallitizin, Pa., to the Cascade Mirage, on the Sunshine Special, en route to Houston from New York. The Cascade Mirage was a modern sleeping car, built in 1940. It was used in the through service operated by the Pennsylvania and the Missouri Pacific.

The Sunshine Special stopped at the top of a stiff grade. While it stood there the Cascade Mirage broke off, made its wild run, and proved that the impossible can happen in railroading.

First, it broke off the train because some unknown workman, at some unknown time, when a coupler wouldn't lock, fastened it "permanently" with a cotterpin. If he notified superiors, the car had could have been scheduled for proper repair of the defective coup-If he had used a hard steel bolt for his trick job, it would have held. But the soft cotter pin wore off, and by mischance it gave just as the car was hanging on a bad grade


