

## Midland's Rodeo Is Success In Finances, Attendance, Thrills

### Committee Recommends Housing Expediter Office Be Liquidated

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Foreseeing early saturation of the building materials market and many price reductions "in the offing," the House Appropriations Committee Monday recommended the office of Federal Housing Expediter be liquidated at the end of this month.

The committee took the action in the annual government corporations supply bill in which it also (A) called for sharp curtailment of the National Housing Agency activities and (B) asked Congress to require the Tennessee Valley Authority to repay during the next 40 years \$348,239,240 in appropriations for power-producing facilities.

The bill carries direct appropriations for six federal agencies in addition to setting out how much of their revenues 21 others may use for administrative expenses during the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Total new appropriations recommended are \$36,097,550, a reduction of \$14,039,920, or 28 per cent, below budget estimates. Total administrative expense limitations are \$41,649,700, a cut of \$14,847,550 or 26 per cent, from what the 21 agencies had requested.

Of the total recommended cut in direct appropriations, \$9,225,920, or almost 66 per cent, was directed at the housing agencies.

The budget request for the office of housing expediter was \$7,765,000, which contemplated liquidation next January 1. The committee cut this to \$3,539,080, which it said would be the cost of liquidation as of June 30, 1947.

Legislation to ratify extension of the oil states compact for another four years was approved Monday by the Senate judiciary committee.

Sixteen states are signatory members of the compact, under which oil producing states agree to carry on research and conservation programs on a voluntary basis. The present compact expires September 1. The extension legislation was introduced by Senator Hatch (D-NM).

## Hungary Reds Tell American Oil Company 'Sell Or Get Out'

### Miners Walk Out In Protest Of New Labor Bill

UNIONTOWN, PA. — (AP) — Protests over a labor-curbing bill passed by Congress were blamed Monday for a spreading walkout of bituminous coal miners which already had idled nearly 10,000 diggers in Southwest Pennsylvania.

Some 6,600 miners quit work or voted to quit work over the weekend and Monday they were joined by an additional 3,600 miners in the rich coal producing fields of Fayette, Greene and Washington Counties.

William Hynes, president of United Mine Workers District 4 embracing the Uniontown coal fields, declared the walkouts "unauthorized."

"The only thing I know is the miners are protesting the labor bill," Hynes said.

The district UMW head said he understood a number of miners' meetings are scheduled for Monday but declined to say whether there would spread or halt the work stoppages.

At Washington, the Hartley-Taft labor bill, which would restrict strikes in essential industries and provides new mediation machinery, was expected to reach President Truman for action in a few days.

Fourteen mines shut down, most of them captive pits owned by large steel companies — U. S. Steel Corp., Weirton Steel, Jones and Laughlin and Republic Steel.

The walkouts came just three weeks before the miners begin a 10-day vacation called for officially under their government contract and a month before a general strike threat.

The government must return the mines to private operation July 1 but the vacation, beginning June 27, would delay any strike until July 7.

However, the 300 members of one AFL United Mine Workers local returned to work when their president, Andrew S. Rayner, warned against any violation of the federal anti-strike injunction which was sustained by the Supreme Court.

The government gives up jurisdiction over the mines July 1, when they return to their private owners.

### New Methodist Church Here Re-Named Asbury

At the first quarterly conference of the new Methodist Church in Midland, held Sunday night, name of the congregation was changed from Wesleyan to Asbury.

The change was made when it was found that there is a religious denomination operating in the United States which uses the name Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Dr. O. P. Clark, superintendent of the Sweetwater district of the Methodist Church presided at the Asbury conference and complimented the pastor, Rev. J. Lennox Hester, and the members of the church on the progress the church has made since it started.

A total of 72 members have been enrolled. Of that number 19, were received at the Sunday services. Previously 53 others had placed their names on the church roll.

The charter membership list of the Asbury Church will be closed July 15, Mr. Hester announced.

The Sunday night quarterly conference elected the following as members of the Board of Stewards: J. P. Carson, Jr., W. C. Gwyn, Allen D. Hall, O. M. Pulliam, and Elvis Hughes.

Trustees named were: E. H. Peyton, W. C. Gwyn and Holt Vineyard.

Peyton was designated district steward; Mrs. Ruth E. McGraw was selected recording steward, and Mrs. R. E. Reising was elected director of the Golden Cross.

The conference voted to delegate to the board of stewards the power to elect additional officers for the church.

Dr. Clark said the Asbury Church likely had set a record for the denomination in this area in enrolling 72 members for the new organization in two services.

## Republicans Consider Ways To Call Congress Back To Session

WASHINGTON — (AP) — With a wary eye on tense international developments, Republican leaders are considering a plan whereby they, as well as the President, could summon Congress back into session later this year.

It has become apparent the lawmakers have no intention of acting this session on any major additions to foreign economic aid such as that embodied in the Greek-Turkish project just getting under way.

Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich.) of the Senate Foreign Relations committee has indicated the Republican position on this. And the State Department, evidently taking its cue from him, is concentrating on drafting an over-all program for consideration next year.

One viewpoint is if Congress adjourns in the regular way to meet the reorganization law's July 31 deadline, the GOP majority would have no effective check on President Truman's Democratic administration for five months until the legislators return for the regular session in January. Truman could call them back, however, any time he chose.

Hence to keep their hands on both the domestic and foreign spheres, the Republicans may propose a recess under which leaders of both houses could summon members back. There is precedent for such action in the wartime agreements by which Congress quit subject to recall of (A) the Senate president and House speaker, or (B) joint action of either the majority or minority leaders of both houses.

## Soil Conservation Exhibit To Feature Texas Electric Show

A specially designed soil conservation exhibit will be one of the feature attractions in the farm and ranch electrical exhibit, a part of the Texas Electric Show of '47 which opens Friday at Midland High School, according to R. L. Miller, manager of Texas Electric Service Company. The show will be in the high school gymnasium, the auditorium, and in a large tent on the school grounds.

Two relief maps, one showing the effects of soil erosion on neglected land the other, the results of carefully planned conservation efforts make up the major portion of the soil conservation display.

"Soil conservation is one of the most important problems confronting the Texas farmer and rancher today," Miller said, "and Texas Electric Service Company realizes it also is a problem in which everyone in the community should be interested. According to government statistics, more than 90 per cent of Texas' cropland and grazing land is affected in some measure by lack of proper soil conservation practices. Leaving the soil to the ravages of nature can and does result in declining productivity of the land, lower farm income and reduced rural living standards."

A comprehensive booklet covering both the effects of soil erosion and neglect and the benefits of applying approved soil conservation methods has been prepared by Texas Electric Service Company. This booklet and other literature will be available free of charge in the farm and ranch exhibit at the electric show, Miller said.

**GULF SPOTS 10,100-FOOT WILDCAT IN CRANE**  
Gulf Oil Corporation has filed an application with the Railroad Commission for a permit to start drilling at once on a 10,100-foot wildcat in Central-North Crane County.

It will be Gulf No. 1-E-A Hattie Connell, et al. and is located 661 feet from west and 1,985 feet from south lines of section 26, block 22, 1st survey.

The projected depth is calculated to take it into the Ellenburger. The wildcat is between recent deep discoveries made by Gulf in the Jordan field in Southwest Ector County, and at its No. 1-E-HH University in East Crane County.

**JAL AREA OF S-W LEA GETS 10,000-FOOT EXPLORATION**  
The R. Olsen Oil Company of Oklahoma City, has staked location for its No. 1 Wimberley, to be a prospector to 10,000 feet, or the Ellenburger, at a lesser depth, in extreme Southeast Lea County, New Mexico, about three and one-half miles due east of Jal.

It will be at center of the Southeast quarter of the northeast quarter of section 23-23s-37e.

Informed sources say that this prospector is on a large sub-surface structure. It is one and one-half miles south of an Ellenburger test drilled to 9,522 feet by the same company in 1943, which had several interesting shows in deep zones, but none of them could be converted into commercial production, and the exploration was finally plugged back and completed as a gas well from above 4,797 feet.

The wildcat is being supported by Amerada Petroleum Corporation, Anderson-Prichard Oil Corporation, The Atlantic Refining Company, Cities Service Oil Company, El Paso Natural Gas Company, Gulf Oil Corporation, Skelly Oil Company, Stanolind Oil & Gas Company, Sunray Oil Corporation, Western Gas Company, and Guy Mabee Drilling Company. The latter company has the drilling contract and plans to start actual operations immediately.

**SCURRY PROSPECTOR FOUND TOP OF SAN ANDRES HIGH**  
M. H. Crabb of Snyder No. 1 Fred Bower, 3,000-foot wildcat in the China Grave area of South Scurry County, about seven and one-half miles east of the Sharon Ridge field, and 330 feet from south and 2,310 feet from west lines of section 27, block 3, H&TC survey, topped the San Andres at 1,205 feet, on an elevation of 2,345 feet, according to operator.

The project has progressed below 1,250 feet, and was due to continue drilling. It is said by some geologists to be checking high structurally. It is on a block of about 1600 acres owned by Crabb in that area.

The Midland Geological Society will hold its regular every-other week luncheon Tuesday in the Crystal Ballroom of Hotel Scharbauer.

Curtis Cannon, general manager of the Frontier Chemical Company will describe the processes used at that concern's new plant at Denver City, where hydrochloric acid and caustic soda is manufactured from brine, developed from the underground salt section in that area.

Much of the output of the Denver City plant is being used in various operations of the petroleum industry in the Permian Basin.

**JAMESON OUTPOSTS HAD NO OIL SHOWS IN DBTS**  
In the Jameson field of Northwest Coke County, Sun Oil Company No. 2 Allen Jameson, one-half mile north of the initial producer in that area, had reached 6,740 feet in lime and was drilling ahead.

It took a drillstem test at 6,670-95 feet, for one hour. There was a light blow of air during the period. Recovery was 30 feet of drilling mud with no shows of oil, gas or water. It is 3,300 feet from south and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 253, block 1-A, H&TC survey.

Sun No. 1 Tubb, a northwest steep-to in the Jameson field, and 660 feet from north and east lines of the Anthony survey No. 253 1/2, was bottomed at 6,375 feet in lime and was to run a drillstem test.

**Ninety-Eight Oil Well Completions Last Week**

AUSTIN — (AP) — The Railroad Commission Monday reported the completion of 98 oil wells in Texas last week, bringing the year's total to 2,265 leading last year's figure for the same date by 247.

There were 14 gas well completions for the week, totalling 248 for the year, lagging last year's equivalent period of 45.

Two wildcat oil wells and two wildcat gas wells were reported drilled. There have been 1003 wildcat oil and 28 wildcat gas wells drilled this year compared to 58 oil and 21 gas wells in the wildcat category drilled during the comparable period last year.

Total average calendar day oil allowable as of June 7 was 2,438,937 barrels, 8,901 barrels above the allowable a week earlier.

## Subsidies Cost Billions

Government subsidies to U. S. domestic airlines are of three different kinds. Mail pay subsidies to scheduled airlines. Maintenance of airways with aids to navigation, safety inspection, and traffic control. The building and maintenance of airports.

Taken together they have cost the taxpayers several billions of dollars, and they will cost more, in spite of cuts in the Civil Aeronautics Authority budget. Some things like airport construction and safety aids may be postponed, but they can't be stopped forever.

There are about 40,000 miles of airways in the U. S. today under federal control. The cost of installing all beacons, radio signal, communications, and traffic direction devices is now put at \$40 million.

Total cost of operating this system, including the weather reporting service, is estimated for this year at just under \$40 million. Since there are approximately 80,000 non-military planes now licensed to fly today, that means the government has invested \$500 per plane to set up the airway system and is spending another \$500 a year per plane to keep navigation aids and traffic control in operation.

If this cost were assessed against each plane owner, he couldn't afford it. Of course, many small plane owners don't use all this service. But if the cost were all assessed against the 1,000 commercial charter, and non-scheduled cargo-carrying planes now in operation, they'd have to go out of business.

Today the U. S. has 3,000 airports. How much money state and local governments have invested in buying land and building airports is unknown, but it is well over a billion dollars.

The federal and local governments are now embarking on a 10-year, billion-dollar program to provide 2,500 new airports, improve 1,900 existing fields. Costs will be split, as on the federal-state matching funds highway programs.

About 4,000 of the 5,500 airports which the country hopes to have in 1957 will be small fields of limited commercial use. They would be direct subsidies to encourage private flying. They look forward to the day when it is believed there will be 400,000 planes in the U. S. air, instead of today's 80,000. There are already 400,000 licensed pilots. By 1957 there may be a million.

In this development of private flying, the government has been unsuccessfully trying to force a few subsidies on the personal aircraft manufacturers to induce them to develop a better small plane. What's wanted is a family-size plane that will sell for around \$2,000. But the manufacturers have steered clear.

The rate of subsidy payments to U. S. commercial airlines for carrying the mail has been reduced as the operators' receipts from passenger and other cargo have picked up. In 1940 mail pay gave airlines 22 cents of every dollar they took in. In 1946 mail pay gave the airlines only seven cents of every dollar.



## Ambassador Koo Tells Why China Needs Cash

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Chinese Ambassador Wellington Koo said recently China wants financial aid from the United States "to hasten her economic and increase her agricultural and industrial production."

His speech was a broadcast, NBC's "our foreign policy" program, with Asaf Ali, Ambassador of India.

Koo was asked whether reasons similar to those "we advanced for the Greek-Turkish loan apply in the case of China."

Stating the need for economic recovery and increased production as the principal reasons, Koo added:

"Only with such increased production can trade between China and the United States be more rapidly developed and a valuable contribution be made by her to world property."

## House Group To Seek Post Office Economy

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The House investigation of the Post Office Department will concentrate on seeking economies in 156 of the 42,000 post offices, Rep. Rees (R-Kans.) announced Saturday.

These are mostly the post offices in big cities which employ 70 per cent of all postal workers. Of all the department's expenses, 78.11 per cent is for payrolls.

Rees is chairman of the post office committee. The House authorized it this week to explore the possibilities of economy and efficiency in the postal department—among other things.

The other things probably will include a look at the holding down of two big jobs by the man who runs the agency. Postmaster General Hannegan also is chairman of the Democratic National Committee.

## Factory Stocks Set New Peak In April

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The total value of manufacturers' inventories increased during April to a new record of \$22,000,000,000 while their shipments into trade channels again declined slightly, the Commerce Department reported.

The value of stocks held in the nation's factories rose about \$450,000,000 while shipments were dropped by \$22,000,000 from March, the Department said.

Because of higher costs of goods currently going into inventories, the Department said, the upswing in value does not indicate a corresponding expansion of physical stockpiles.

## Transportation Head Sees Car Shortages

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Director J. Monroe Johnson of the Office of Defense Transportation said production of new freight cars is still lagging although the steel industry has more than made good on deliveries to manufacturers.

The bottleneck, he told a news conference, appears to be in the car-building industry, adding that "the explanation is not yet forthcoming."

Sufficient steel for an output of 8,000 new cars this month was made available, Johnson said. But he estimated the railroads will get deliveries on only about 4,000 cars—the same as in April.

The railroads have placed orders for nearly 100,000 freight cars.



He would have tried first to run the club suit, and when that did not work, he would have resorted to the diamond finesse. This would have worked and the contract would have been made.

Of course this deceptive play should not be made every time you hold the ace-queen, but if you remember the play, it will prove a valuable asset to your game.



They had heard reports Hal Newhouser and Bob Feller, the two premier pitchers in baseball, were nearing the end of their trail. It had been bruited about the redoubtable Detroit lefthander and crack Cleveland fireballer were not the same pitchers they once had been.

Newhouser turned in his best mound effort of the year Sunday in shutting out the Red Sox 5-0, allowing four hits.

Feller went Newhouser one hit better by limiting the Athletics to three singles in blanking them 2-0 in the second game of a double header. The A's, behind Phil Marchildon's four-hit hurling, won the opener 4-0.

The heretofore redhot New York Yankees were lucky to break even with the St. Louis Browns, losing the first game of a doubleheader, 9 to 2, and winning the nightcap, 5 to 4, in a late game rally.

Washington and the Chicago White Sox played through 18 innings before the Senators emerged with a 1-0 victory in the first game of a double header at Chicago. The White Sox won the second game, 8-2.

Not only was the opener the longest game of the 1947 season, but it tied the major league record for the longest 1-0 game ever played. Only three others have been played. They were won by Providence over Detroit Aug. 17, 1882, in the National League, Washington over Chicago May 15, 1918, in the American and New York over St. Louis July 2, 1933, in the National League. Dutch Leonard pitched the Phillies to a 5-2 win over Pittsburgh in the first game of a twin bill, but the Pirates roared back to take the second game, 5-4.

Other National League games were rained out.
