Walk-Outs Spread To 22 Mines

U.S. Steel Plants Affected; 14,800 Miners Now Idle

UNIONTOWN, PA. —(AP)—Work stoppages among soft coal miners protesting labor legislation before Congress Tuesday spread to 22 mines employing 14,800 men as AFL-United Mine Workers officials pondered their strategy in the idleness they termed "unauthorized."

The stoppages were scattered through the three counties which comprise the heart of an extremely rich Southwestern Pennsylvania bituminous section.

Reds, Marks Said To Cost U. S. Millions

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Three Republican senators Tuesday called for a full-scale investigation into reports the United States has redeemed millions of dollars worth of German occupation money printed by Russian authorities.

The three lawmakers — Bridges of New Hampshire, Ferguson of Michigan and Knowland of California—told a reporter in separate interviews they understand the plates to print the German marks were given to the Russians by American officials.

Among other uses for the occupation money was to pay Allied troops.

Earlier reports have said the Russian soldiers drawing large amounts of back pay—paid fabulous black market prices to American GIs for such items as wrist watches and trinkets.

The GIs, in turn, converted the occupation marks into dollars.

Trade Was Risk

The trade became so brisk American authorities resorted to several methods for discouraging the marks-to-dollars conversion. Finally a script system was devised to replace the occupation currency.

Bridges, chairman of the Senate appropriations committee, said "my information is that between \$400,000,000 and \$900,000,000 worth of this money has been, or is being redeemed with American dollars."

"I have been told that this redemption is being carried as a hidden deficit and some Senate committee certainly must look into this," he added.

Ferguson, a member of the Senate's special war investigating committee, said he had been unable "to get all the facts regarding this from either the War Department or the Treasury."

"We did learn that the plates to print this invasion money were turned over to the Russians," Ferguson said; "but we have not been able to learn how much money was made, how it was distributed and how much is to be redeemed."

Display Arrangement Underway For Texas Electric Show Of '47

Crews will be busily engaged Wednesday and Thursday at Midland High School setting up displays and moving in electrical equipment in preparation for the opening at 6 p. m. Friday of the Texas Electric Show of '47. By Thursday afternoon the gymnasium will take on the atmosphere of a giant electric appliance establishment, and by the time of the opening Friday, everything will be in readiness for the biggest show of its kind ever staged in Midland.

The feature attraction of the two-day electric show will be two presentations each evening in the high school auditorium of General Electric's famous "House of Magic," a demonstration of uncanny tricks that can be done with electricity.

This show at 7:30 and 9 p. m. is the modernized version of similar shows presented by General Electric to the millions of visitors at the New York World's Fair, and since then to military personnel in all parts of the country. This show is non-technical, and is interesting and entertaining to children as well as adults.

Of particular interest to farmers and ranchers will be the farm-ranch exhibit in the large tent on the school grounds. Here visitors may see the latest types of electrical equipment for the farm, including walk-in freezers, milkers, water pumps, milk coolers, and dozens of other useful appliances to make farm work easier. One of the major attractions in this tent will be the hourly feedings of three baby pigs, being raised on bottles. These pigs are named Reddy, Teddy, and Freddy, but even the folks in charge of the farm tent can't tell which is which.

The Texas Electric Show of '47 is being presented by the Texas Electric Service Company, in co-operation with retailers of electrical equipment, distributors and manufacturers. The show is free.

Further 'Purge' Is Developing In Hungary

LONDON —(AP)— Dispatches from Budapest Tuesday suggested the Communist-dominated Hungarian government was widening its purge against dissident elements on several fronts.

The Communist newspaper Szabadnag said the "resistance certificates" of nearly 200 persons, including government and church officials, would be reviewed by a special committee under the prime minister's office.

Among those facing loss of these certificates — which indicate that the holders opposed the Germans during the war—were Deszo Sulok, head of the Freedom Party whose newspaper recently was banned; Assembly Speaker Bela Varga, a member of the Smallholders Party; and Josef Cardinal Mindszenty, Roman Catholic primate of Hungary.

At the same time, the Hungarian peoples' court announced 43 "intellectuals"—including doctors, lawyers and professors—would go on trial late this month on charges of conspiring to overthrow the Hungarian Republic.

Meanwhile Yugoslavia disclosed a Bulgarian military mission was in Belgrade, broadening the scope of Balkan conferences which have developed since the Communists seized power in Hungary.

A Czechoslovak military mission also was to arrive Wednesday in Premier Marshall Tito's capital, already host to a Romanian delegation headed by Communist Premier Petru Gроза.

The Bulgarians, Yugoslav information authorities said, actually arrived Saturday. The delay in the announcement was not explained. The Czechoslovak mission ostensibly was to make a 10-day tour of Yugoslavia.

Midwest Flood Reaches High; 20,000 Homeless

HANNIBAL, MO. —(AP)— Floodwaters pouring into the Mississippi River, which already have made more than 20,000 homeless and have inundated nearly 50,000 acres of farm land, in Eastern Missouri and West-Central Illinois, appeared Tuesday to have reached a high point.

Rivermen and U. S. engineers expressed belief only further rains would aggravate the situation, but they also said several river towns in Illinois and Missouri still faced serious flood conditions, despite the promise of receding waters.

U. S. Army engineers and the Coast Guard had every available worker on the job in the flood area, and the American Red Cross had 50 staff workers and about 600 volunteers aiding the homeless.

Water was eight to 10 feet deep in the village of Alexandria, Mo., near the Iowa line, the result of a levee break, and all residents have been evacuated.

Stores Flooded

In Hannibal, a city of 20,000, the water covered nine blocks of the town's main street. Four thousand residents of South Hannibal were partially isolated. No buses were operating and at least a dozen stores were flooded.

At Canton, Mo., 30 miles upstream, the river had reached a stage of 19.92 feet, an all-time high. Although half of the town is under water and a third of the 2200 residents are homeless, relief work was reported well in hand. No trains or buses are operating out of the town and only one highway is open.

A river land district levee, two miles north of Louisiana, broke, flooding 3,000 acres. Sixty families in Louisiana were evacuated.

At Quincy, Ill., where the Mississippi reached a record stage 23.6 feet, railroad yards on the waterfront were flooded, but the town itself, situated on a bluff, was not endangered. Several persons were forced to evacuate homes in South Quincy.

Chamber Of Commerce Will Protest Drastic Postal Service Curtailment

The Midland Chamber of Commerce Tuesday will contact President Truman, Senators Tom Connally and W. Lee O'Daniel, Congressman R. E. Thomson and others protesting the drastic curtailment of services at the Midland Post Office.

Authorization for the action was given by directors at their meeting Monday night in the Scharbauer Hotel. President John P. Butler said an investigation revealed the curtailment of services here was caused by lack of operational fund allotments. He said N. G. Oates, acting postmaster, is doing his best to provide adequate services.

Manager Delbert Downing reported on the proposed post office enlargement program, and said the chamber had been advised funds for the project were not available at this time. Directors agreed that the project should be continued, and that a brief stressing the need of additional space and facilities in the post office should be filed with postal authorities.

Tom Sealy, general chairman of the Civic Affairs Committee, reported on activities of his group. He said a sub-committee including Fred Hogan, John W. House, Addison Wadley, Robert L. Wood and Sealy had been named to study a new zoning plan for the city. The group also will study and make recommendations concerning a proposed garbage collection tax.

Another group, headed by R. I. Dickey, is studying a plan for the adoption of a Community Chest program here.

Sealy recommended the setting up of a committee whose duty would be to strive to bring new businesses and institutions to Midland. The committee would prepare business and industrial surveys and briefs for distribution to firms who might be planning to locate in West Texas. President Butler suggested the chamber's industrial committee be enlarged and that the assignment be referred to it. The suggestion was agreeable to Sealy and to the other directors.

It also was suggested that the Texas and Pacific Railway be contacted concerning the building of a new depot here at an early date.

Rodeo Successful

Leonard Proctor, president of Midland Fair, Inc., reported on the 1947 Midland Rodeo, and said it was a financial success. He termed the show the best ever staged here, and thanked the Chamber of Commerce and organizations and individuals for their assistance and cooperation in the staging of the annual event.

A financial report for May was read by John B. Mills, treasurer. R. L. Miller invited directors to attend the Texas Electric Show of '47 at the Midland High School Friday and Saturday nights.

Cedric Foster To Speak Tuesday In Auditorium Here

Cedric Foster of Boston, noted coast-to-coast commentator, who is spending this week in the Permian Basin area, will speak at 8 p. m. Tuesday in the Midland High School Auditorium, under the auspices of the Midland Junior Chamber of Commerce.

A near capacity attendance is indicated by the heavy advance sale of tickets. Tickets also will be on sale at the door.

Matters of current interest at home and abroad will be discussed by the speaker who is known as the "Connecticut Yankee."

Te Meet With Oil Men

Foster is scheduled to arrive in Midland early Tuesday afternoon and will visit a number of Midland businessmen in their stores and offices.

During the afternoon he is to meet with a group of Midland oil men for a discussion and briefing of the oil industry in the Permian Basin area of West Texas and Southeastern New Mexico.

The commentator, who served as an accredited war correspondent to both the Army and Navy during World War II, is a native New Englander, and was educated in the public schools of Hartford, Conn., Westminster School, Simsbury, Conn., New York Military Academy at Cornwall-On-The-Hudson, and Dartmouth College.

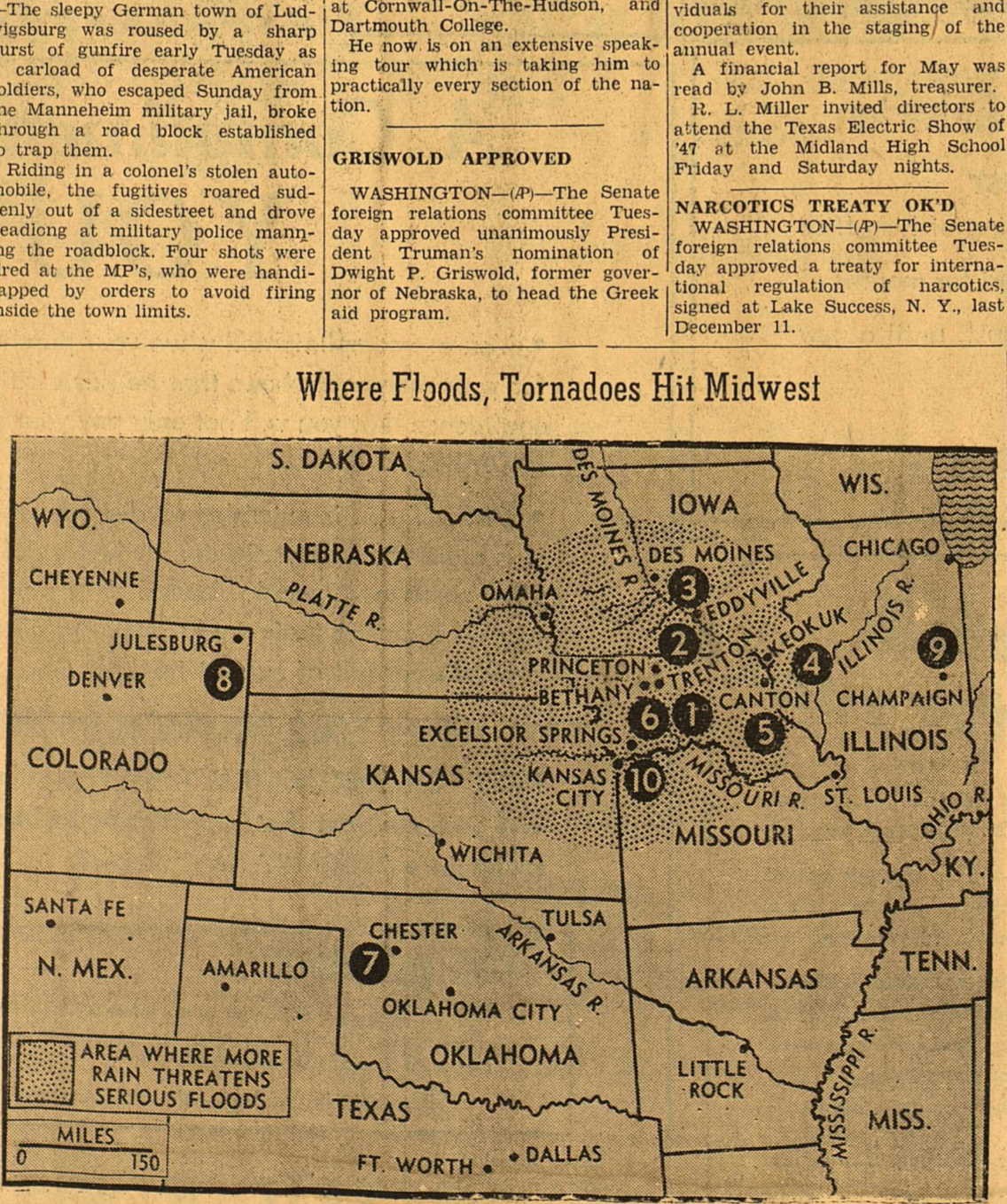
He now is on an extensive speaking tour which is taking him to practically every section of the nation.

Where Floods, Tornadoes Hit Midwest



Flooding Mississippi River and its tributaries cause evacuation of more than 5,000 persons in Iowa and Missouri. Parts of Kansas and Nebraska also were hard hit by serious floods. Trenton (1) and Princeton (2), Mo., are isolated; all homes inundated in Eddyville, Iowa (3); power plant flooded and all trains canceled in Keokuk, Iowa (4); transportation cut at Canton, Mo. (5); man drowned in flood waters at Bethany, Mo. (6). At same time tornado's smashed buildings and homes at Chester, Okla. (7), Julesburg, Colo. (8), Champaign, Ill. (9), and rural area near Excelsior Springs, Mo. (10).

WILDCATS IN CROCKETT AND SCHLEICHER SPOTTED

New wildcat petroleum tests have been reported for Northwest Crockett County, for Northeast Crockett County, and for Central Schleicher County.

John I. Moore of Midland has made location for his No. 1 A. C. Hoover, to be an 8,000-foot exploration to test the Ellenburger, in the shallow Shannon field, where the present production is from a Permian lime at around 2,000 feet.

The deep prospector will be 660 feet from north and east lines of section 17, block 1, GC&SF survey. Drilling with rotary is to start by June 17.

In Northeast Crockett County, The Texas Company is to start making hole soon at its No. 1 State University, to be 680 feet from north and 662 feet from west lines of section 22, block 40, University survey.

It is scheduled to dig to around 9,500 feet, with rotary, to explore the Ellenburger. The wildcat is on a block of about 4,800 acres, part of which is in Northeast Crockett County, and part in South Irion. The drillsite is about 1 1/2 miles north of Amerada Petroleum Corporation No. 1-CTA University, now drilling ahead below 9,500 feet in Ellenburger lime, after showing for possible commercial production in the top of the Ellenburger.

L. W. Elliott, trustee, No. 2 V. G. Tisdale, 660 feet from south and west lines of section 16, block A, HE&WT survey, is the new prospector in Central Schleicher County. It is three and one half miles east of Eldorado. Contract depth is 6,000 feet. Rotary and cable tools will be used.

OHIO TO PLUG I-C NEAL, NE SCURRY PROSPECTOR

The Ohio Oil Company No. 1-C Neal, Northeast Scurry County wildcat, about 18 miles northeast of Snyder, and approximately 11 miles west of Rotan, is being plugged and abandoned as a dry hole on total depth of 7,339 feet, in Ellenburger lime, topped at 7,224 feet.

It had some slight shows of oil in the top of the formation, but testing, both before and after acid, failed to develop any free oil. Sulphur water came in the zone above 7,290 feet.

The wildcat was in the R. N. Miller survey No. 1, abstract 868. Ohio has a large spread of leases in that area. Representatives of the concern have not revealed whether other developments are planned for that region at any time in the near future.

NE COMANCHE DUE TO GET ELLENBURGER EXPLORATION

An Ellenburger wildcat is due to be started within 90 days in Northeast Comanche County, on a block of about 15,000 acres, recently acquired by Riley B. Coats and Tobe Foster, independent operators of Lubbock.

Location for the prospector is to be reported in a short time. The block is in the Lone Star area of Comanche County, and sets in a short distance northwest of Dublin, in West Erath County. It is about 30 miles southeast of Cisco in Eastland County.

ANOTHER PETERSBURG OUTPOST IS TO P & A

Standard Oil Company of Texas and Humble Refining Company No. 1 Hunt, one quarter of a mile due west of the discovery well for flowing production from the Cisco-Petersburgian lime, to one of the Petersburg field, in Southwest Hale County, and 660 feet from south and east lines of section 6, block CL, EL survey, has been abandoned and will be plugged on total depth of 7,224 feet.

Top of the lime was at 7,155 feet, on an elevation of 3,315 feet. That put it approximately 250 feet low on that point to the same marker in the initial producer.

This prospector ran a one-hour diurnal test at 7,175-7,224 feet. Recovery was 810 feet of salt water, with no shows of oil or gas developed.

COSDEN ABANDONS HOWARD PROJECT AT 4,172 FEET

Cosden Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Reed, Northeast Howard County exploration, about three miles north of Coahoma, and 330 feet from south and west lines of section 19, block 30, TP survey, T-1-N, has been abandoned and will be plugged on a bottom of 4,172 feet, in lime. It found sulphur water at total depth. This project was started by Norman and Roche, and taken over by Cosden after it had completed its original contract to go to 3,500 feet.

TEXACO SPOTS SOUTHWEST OUTPOST TO CROSSETT FIELD

The Texas Company No. 1-B C. W. Hobbs, 660 feet from east and 1,997 feet from north lines of section 45, block 35, H&TC survey, is to be a semi-wildcat on the southwest side of the Crossett-Devonian field, in Southeast Crane County.

It will be approximately 2,900 feet southeast of Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. 3 Hobbs, nearest completed producer.

Drilling to around 5,400 feet, to explore the Devonian, will be started at the new Texaco prospector at once.

President Truman Is In Canada In Role Of Friendly Neighbor

OTTAWA — President Truman came to Canada Tuesday in the role of a friendly neighbor.

He brought his wife and daughter along for a three-day visit in Ottawa where he will address the Canadian Parliament Wednesday.

The Presidential train was met at Rouses Point, N. Y., on the Canadian border by a Canadian government car occupied by the Rt. Hon. Louis St. Laurent, secretary of state for external affairs; Ray Atherton, the American ambassador and Howard Measures, the Canadian chief of protocol.

Mounties On Hand

These officials, with an escort of Royal Canadian mounted police, planned to accompany the President into Ottawa where he was due at 1:30 p. m. (EST).

The President, smiling, came out on the rear platform of his private car when the train came to a halt at Rouses Point.

A microphone was held up by a radio man.

"Will you say hello to Canada?" he asked.

Speaking into the microphone, the President said: "I'm saying hello to Canada right now. I'm very happy to."

Some one called for Mrs. Truman. The President explained she had not planned to come out on the platform, but finally he persuaded her to.

"Hey, is Margaret there?" asked a thrill boy.

The President's daughter, smiling, too, joined her parents on the platform.

AUSTIN — (AP) — A bill which would have provided an additional \$1,000,000 rural school aid on last year's budget Tuesday was vetoed by Gov. Beauford H. Jester. It was Jester's fourth veto of the session.

BUDAPEST — (AP) — A leading Hungarian Communist Tuesday said a letter had been found from Dean Acheson, former U. S. under secretary of state, "promising support" to former Premier Ferenc Nagy, whom the Communists have accused of plotting to overthrow the Republic.

AUSTIN — (AP) — Gov. Beauford H. Jester Tuesday appointed M. B. Morgan of Denison as the new commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Morgan, a former state representative, succeeds Mauren Moore, whose term of office expired Jan. 31 of this year.

NANKING — (AP) — The official Central News Agency Tuesday said government military sources confirmed reports that outer Mongolian troops, spotted by four Soviet warplanes, had invaded Sinkiang Province.

Jester Signs Law To Permit Use Of Sweet Gas For Carbon Black

AUSTIN — (AP) — Gov. Beauford Jester Tuesday signed into law a bill permitting the use of sweet, as well as sour, gas in the manufacture of carbon black.

Current statutes permit only sour gas to be used in manufacture of carbon black. Henceforth, sweet gas may be used if it is produced from a common sour-and-sweet gas reservoir.

Though statewide in application, the law will effect only the Panhandle area, the only part of Texas now known to have sour and sweet gas coming from a common reservoir.

"It turns out that this bill is applicable to other parts of the state and we find any objections to it in the next two years, the next legislature can review the situation," Jester said.



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Texas Increase Helps Nation's Crude Gain

TULSA — (AP) — The United States' crude oil production averaged 5,077,140 barrels daily during the week ended June 7, an increase of 26,895 barrels over the previous week's output and an all-time record high for domestic crude production, the Oil & Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

An increase in Texas output of 62,100 barrels to 2,288,950 barrels accounted for the gain.

Louisiana's production was up 5,300 barrels to 425,200, the Eastern area increased 3,500 to 66,500, California gained 1,600 to 918,600, Illinois was up 1,600 to 188,000 and Mississippi increased 1,000 to 93,550.

Notable declines were:
Kansas, down 26,600 barrels to 264,900; Michigan, off 6,900 to 138,850; Montana, down 3,110 to 19,740; and Indiana, down 1,100 to 16,800.



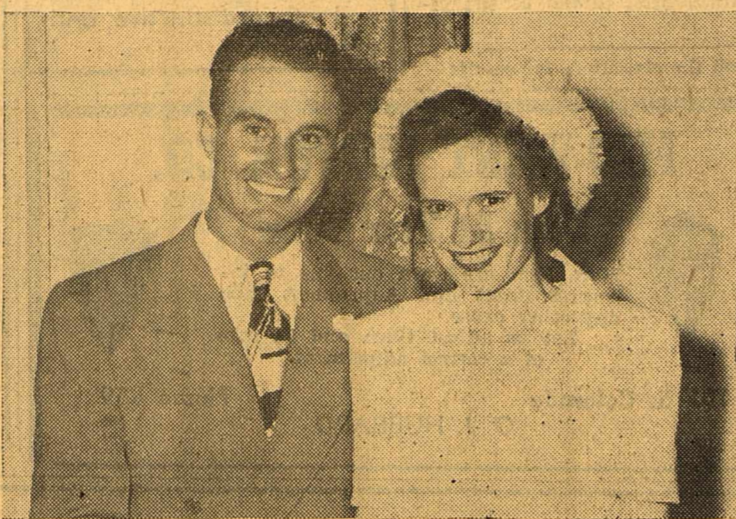

For Better Citizenship

Congress should not adjourn without acting upon the Universal Military Training Bill. This is, War Secretary Patterson says, an absolute essential to our military security.

Congress' failure to give this bill proper priority may be due in part to the pressure of other things. It is due also, in greater part, to timidity rising out of opposition voiced by some mothers and educators.

Such opposition is misinformed. The facts have been befuddled by professional pacifists, by Reds and pro-Reds, by perfectionists.

Educators fear such training will interfere with schooling. It won't. It is for any one year selected by the boy or his parents from his 17th to his 20th birthday. At worst it would delay college graduation one year. And educational courses will continue in camp.

Mothers say they didn't raise their boys to be soldiers. UMT won't make soldiers of their boys. It is intended to help avert war by making this nation strong. It is intended to teach young men, if there must be another war, how to keep out of the way of bullets and shells and bombs, and come home alive and sound.

UMT does not put boys in the armed forces. It cannot send them abroad. It does not render them liable to wartime service. It just prepares them—for war, if one forces itself on us—for peace, if we succeed in avoiding another war.

Opposition to universal training would vanish—except among professional pacifists and Communists—if every mother could visit the UMT experimental unit at Fort Knox. This being impossible, the testimony of a 16-year-old who spent three days there is persuasive.

Next year, if UMT is adopted, he will be eligible for such a camp. After this visit, he is enthusiastic about a prospect that had left him quite cold. It was not militarism, parading, shooting that enthused him. Nor did he get any false idea that such a course is soft.

This observer came away convinced that UMT offers "a swell chance to toughen up, learn new skills, and become better all-around citizens."

Cursing, dirty language, being out after bed check, sloppy care of equipment and such misdemeanors are punished by the boys, acting through their courts.

UMT boys are taught how to look after themselves when away from camp. They are not required to attend church, but youngsters are doing so, voluntarily, who never did at home.

This is not militarism. This is good citizenship. No boy could be injured by such training. Few could fail to be helped, strengthened, matured by it.

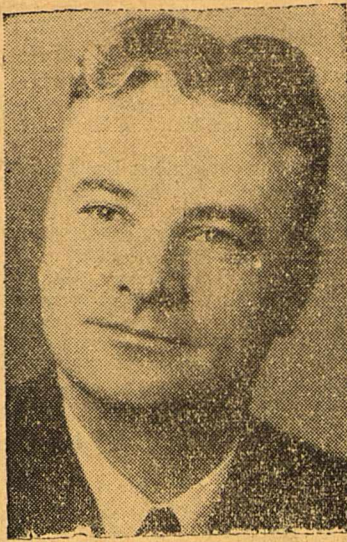

Marshall Approves United Europe Idea

WASHINGTON —(P)— Secretary of State Marshall has expressed general approval of a resolution to put Congress on record as favoring creation of a United States of Europe within the framework of the United Nations.

"Of course the United States wants a Europe which is not divided against itself, a Europe which is better than that it replaces," Marshall said. "Only as we can inspire hope of that can we expect men to endure what must be endured and make the great efforts which must be made if wars are to be avoided and civilization is to survive in Europe."

"But we should make clear that it is not our purpose to impose upon the peoples of Europe any particular form of political or economic association. The future organization of Europe must be determined by the peoples of Europe."

PLEA MADE FOR U. S. FOREIGN BROADCASTS

WASHINGTON —(P)— Secretary Marshall told Senators Tuesday it is "essential to the conduct of our foreign relations" the State Department have funds and freedom to make foreign language broadcasts and conduct a world wide information program.

"As I have said before, one effective way to promote peace is to dispel misunderstanding, fear and ignorance," the secretary of state said to a Senate appropriations subcommittee.
