DEEP PROSPECTOR STAKED EAST OF MARTIN FIELD

Shell Oil Company, Inc., and Superior Oil Company have filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to start drilling at once on an 11,500-foot exploration in South-Central Andrews County.

It will be Shell and Superior No. 1 Lockhart, and is located 662 feet from west and 662 feet from south lines of section 22, block A-41, psi survey.

That puts it 1,322 feet due east of Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 5 Parker, a completed producer from the Ellenburger on the east side of the Martin field, 20 miles southwest of the town of Andrews.

The new prospector is less than a mile west of a deep dry hole drilled some time ago by Sunray Oil Corporation as its No. 1 Lockhart and Brown.

SO&G GETS PERMIAN SHOWS IN NO. 1 SIMS

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Sims, semi-wildcat in Central-West Andrews County, and a flanker to the discovery for Ellenburger production in the west side of the Nelson-Fruend area, was drilling ahead below 7,431 feet in lower Permian lime, after a drillstem test at 7,214-7,431 feet.

The tool was open 60 minutes. Recovery was 150 feet of oil and gas out drilling mud. There was a good blow of air throughout the period and a small show of gas was developed.

This exploration is to drill on to the Ellenburger. It is 660 feet from south and east lines of section 16, block B-39, psi survey.

NORTH PECOS PROJECT HAD WATER IN DST

Ralph Lowe No. 1 Blakeslee, steep-out from production from the Ordovician in the Heiner field in North Pecos County, and 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 16, block 105, G&S&F survey, was drilling ahead below 5,175 feet in lime.

It took a drillstem test for one hour at 5,038-5,125 feet. Recovery was 1,200 feet of sulphur water, with no shows of oil or gas. The zone showing the water is reported to be in the lower Permian. The project will be drilled ahead to test the lower pay section which is expected above 5,500 feet.

SW HALE WILDCAT HAS REACHED CONTRACT DEPTH

Glen J. Smith Oil Company No. 1, Durrett, Southwest Hale County wildcat, about one and one half miles north of the Irish field, and 660 feet from south and east lines of northwest quarter of section 7, block DT, H&W&T survey, drilled to its contract depth of 6,000 feet, and had failed to find any indications of oil or gas.

It was to take electric log surveys and then determine whether or not it would be carried deeper. Unofficial observers report that this prospector checked considerably low, geologically, to the nearest oil wells in the Irish field.

MAGNOLIA DRILLS AHEAD AT NORTH WINKLER TEST

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1-DD Walton, wildcat to test the middle and lower Permian, in North Winkler County, 2,310 feet from south and 990 feet from east lines of section 7, block B-3 psi survey, and about three and one-half miles north and slightly east of Kermit, had reached 4,762 feet in lower San Andres lime, and was making more hole.

This exploration has logged some streaks with slight signs of porosity and oil stains, and some bleeding oil—but none of them have been sufficient for any sort of production.

The project is to go around 6,700 feet—and may go beyond that level, if it fails to get commercial production above.

WEST CROCKETT DISCOVERY TESTING LOWER SECTION

Cities Service Oil Company, The Plymouth Oil Company and Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1-B Owens, West Crockett County discovery for flowing production from the lower Permian, at center of southwest quarter of northwest quarter of section 6, block CG, H&O&B survey, squeezed off all previous perforations above plugged back total depth of 5,726 feet, and perforated with 19 shots at 5,686-93 feet. It is now taking a production test on that interval.

The well has shown for good flowing oil production, with extra heavy oil-gas ratio, from sections above the current level of testing.

Transport Strike In St. Louis

ST. LOUIS—(AP)—Virtually everything on wheels that would run was pressed into service Friday as thousands of St. Louisans sought a way to get to their jobs after an early morning strike of street car and bus operators tied up public transportation in the St. Louis area of more than 1,000,000 population.

Family automobiles, ancient jalopies whose lives have been prolonged by the dearth of new cars and all available taxicabs jammed main thoroughfares, snarling traffic at most of the principal intersections.

Absenteeism ran high in the heavily industrialized city during the first hours of the strike which became 100 per cent effective with such suddenness most individuals and firms were totally unprepared.

Most workers faced the situation in good spirits and many drivers went out of their way to pick up hitch-hikers along the most heavily traveled streets.

Hardly a single vehicle reached its destination without picking up a maximum load and many had passengers riding running boards.

No attempt was made by the St. Louis Public Service Company to run street cars and busses which were cleared from their routes as soon as operators completed their scheduled runs.

Sugar Rationing End Causes Varied Comment From Midland Grocers

Sugar rationing ended Thursday but, ironically enough, there were conditions in Midland which at first glance suggested rationing should have just begun.

In some retail stores and in the city's largest wholesale house, there was little, if any, sugar to be found.

All grocers "denied" there was any reason for Midlanders to take alarm, however. There was ample sugar in a few of the retail groceries to supply the city, and grocers who were temporarily sold out expected new shipments to arrive within a few days.

J. H. Moseley, manager of the Kimbell-Midland Grocery Company, a wholesale concern, was less optimistic than some retailers regarding future shipments. He had no sugar stock, he said, and reported wholesalers in some other West Texas cities were in the same predicament.

Transportation Shortage

The trouble is not a shortage of sugar in the nation, he explained, but a critical shortage of box cars for transporting it here. Extremely heavy demands are being placed on available freight cars now by the country's huge grain crop, which has top priority on rail facilities. He said he had no idea when he would receive another sugar consignment.

O. L. Darden, manager of Furr's Super Market, expressed a contrasting view of the sugar situation. Though he had only 1,000 pounds in stock Thursday afternoon, he was not worried, he declared, since he had just received word from Lubbock a carload was expected to arrive in Midland before the end of the week.

Many grocers, anticipating the end of rationing, had deliberately sold out existing stocks in order to clean up their sugar "bank accounts" which will no longer be of any use. One of these was the Morris System store, whose managers reported they had no sugar left. However, they have ordered more sugar and expect to be restocked within a few days.

E. B. Bristow, manager at S. and S. Grocery, was completely calm regarding the sweetening situation. He has a normal supply of sugar on hand, he reported, and there has been no unusual demand for sugar at his store. He predicted Midland grocers who are temporarily low on sugar will have ample supplies next week.

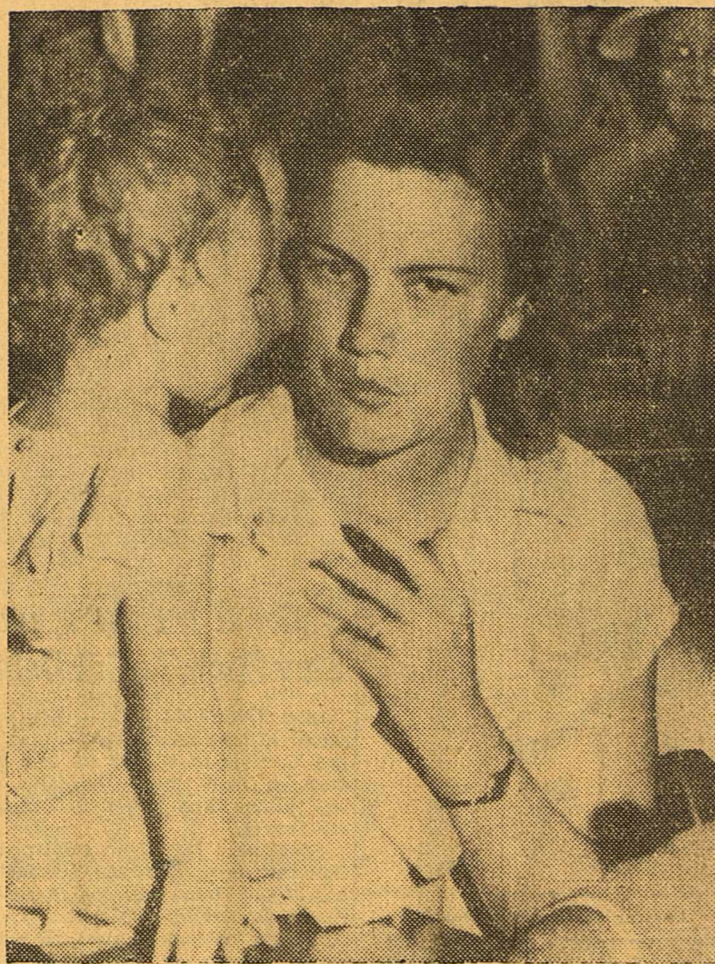
British Open Talks On Marshall's Unity Plan

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The British Embassy has opened talks with the State Department to learn how to put Secretary Marshall's call for a joint European revival program into action.

Diplomatic authorities who reported this Friday said the Embassy officials are seeking clarification of a number of Marshall's suggestions before deciding whether to urge London to take the initiative in getting the European countries together.

These authorities said the United States is looking to Britain to start the program rolling but has no intention of dictating what the next steps should be.

NACOGDOCHES—(AP)—The "Buttermilk Poisoning" trial of Dorothy Stokes, 23, charged with murder in the death of her sister-in-law, is expected to go to the jury late Friday.

In two hours of testimony, Mrs. Stokes denied all accusations. She said the signature on a confession which she allegedly made was "forced."

Defense attorney Hosea L. Edwards asked the defendant, "Did you poison Doriene Garrett?" the slain woman.

"I did not," the Garrison, Texas, mother replied.

Chief U. S. Delegate To United Nations Declares America Has Power To Create Peace Structure

CAMBRIDGE, MASS.—(AP)—Warren R. Austin, chief U. S. delegate to the United Nations, Friday declared "the United States, with half the productive power of the world, has decisive power to create the conditions of permanent peace."

Making the first formal American pronouncement of the new Soviet proposals for atomic control, Austin said in a commencement address at Massachusetts Institute of Technology:

"It may be we shall make little apparent progress for some time to come in these (atomic) negotiations and in the related negotiations on the regulation and reduction of conventional armaments. But even if this proves to be the case, continued study and discussion will, in themselves, I am certain, in the end bear fruit.

"We should never permit ourselves to be driven into inaction or despair by apparent stalemates," he continued. "The United States, with half the productive power of the world, has decisive power to create the conditions of permanent peace."

Criticizes Soviet View

Commenting on the new Russian atomic control plan offered Wednesday at Lake Success by Soviet deputy foreign minister Andrei A. Gromyko, Austin said all the "basic disagreements" remain unaltered, but expressed hope that progress could be made.

"In the field of atomic energy, in which you, as future scientists and engineers, have a special interest," he told the graduates, "the Soviet Union continues to hold out against some of the essential principles for an international control plan originally proposed by the United States and accepted by all members of the atomic energy commission except the Soviet Union and Poland."

He said Russian opposition to the majority view apparently was based on "fear of capitalist 'infiltration' inside Russia" and declared Russian atomic proposals amounted to "unilateral disarmament of the United States and would provide no security either to ourselves or to the rest of the world."

Urge 'Labor' Veto

Vacation's Over — Truman Faces Decisions Of Vast Import

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman returns from Canada Friday to face a series of crucial decisions on congressional acts which may determine the course of the American economy in the next six months.

With foreign policy matters temporarily in the background, the President must decide within the next few days whether to accept or reject Republican-sponsored labor and tax-cutting bills.

Within the next three weeks or less, he must make similar decisions on rent control and wool price support bills, with the possibility that a controversial measure on railroad rate fixing also will be laid before him.

His bipartisan program on foreign policy remains generally intact, despite home cracks in its structure.

Tax Bill First

First on the list of pressing presidential decisions apparently will be the \$4,000,000,000 tax reduction bill, Democratic Leader Barkley (Ky) predicted, after a Senate minority policy committee meeting, the Senate will sustain a veto of the tax-cutting bill if one is forthcoming.

The minority leader told reporters obviously it will be more difficult to uphold a veto of the labor bill, should President Truman decide to reject that measure.

Barkley said he had no information on the President's plans in connection with either piece of legislation.

Senator Taft of Ohio, chairman of the Senate GOP policy committee, told a reporter there is "almost no chance" Congress would override a tax veto. "That would mean continuation of present levies at least until early next year."

Whether the President signs it or not, the labor bill appears likely to become law. There is a clear margin for overriding a veto in the House, and Democratic strategists privately despair of mustering the required one-third plus one vote to sustain in the Senate.

Four Ford Employees Beaten By Mobsters

DETROIT—(AP)—Four non-striking Ford Motor Co. foremen were beaten on their way to work and a new walkout hit the Continental Motors Corp. Friday to mar an otherwise brighter auto industry labor scene.

Both developments came on the heels of a settlement involving 16,000 strikers and a new wage agreement.

Dearborn police said the foremen were dragged from their car and assaulted by three carloads of men about 6:30 a. m. while enroute to the Ford Rouge plant.

Some 3,700 Ford foremen, members of the Foremen's Association of America (independent), have been on strike for 24 days in a contract dispute.

There was no immediate comment from the FAA but a spokesman for the union earlier had said violence by its members would not be tolerated.

Texas Electric Show Of '47 Opens Two-Day Engagement Here Friday

The Texas Electric Show of '47, presenting practically every type of modern household electric appliance and electrical equipment for the home and farm is in place at Midland High School in readiness for the opening of the two-day show at 6 p. m. Friday. The show is free, and will be presented again Saturday from 6 to 11 p. m., according to R. L. Miller, manager of the Texas Electric Service Company.

Truckloads of gleaming white electric appliances, newest model radios, home coolers, automatic laundries and dozens of other pieces of electric equipment arrived here Thursday and Friday and were moved into the high school gymnasium. Decorations with a Western motif are set up as an attractive background to the exhibits, and multi-colored illuminated posters profusely decorated with famous cattle brands add to the Western flavor of the show. There, under one roof can be seen almost every kind of electric appliance, arranged in a rich setting of purple and red drapes, colored lighting and glistening mirrored columns supporting large revolving figures of Reddy Kilo-watt.

Visitors will be given Reddy Kilo-watt buttons, a cartoon book on the life of Thomas A. Edison, and other useful pamphlets. A 15-minute program of swing music will be given each hour by a five-girl band, "The Texas Sweethearts."

Feature Attraction

The feature attraction of the electric show will be the two presentations each night of General Electric's famous show and demonstration, "The House of Magic," in the high school auditorium at 7:30 and 9 p. m.

After the visitor to the show has seen the exhibits and the "House of Magic" show, the farm-ranch exhibit, in a large tent on the school grounds near the gym, will be of major interest. Latest types of electrical equipment for the farm and rural home are on display, including a walk-in freezer, home freezers, milkers, milk coolers, water pumps and many other labor-saving appliances to make farm and ranch work easier. The farm tent also has three baby pigs on display under an electric pig brooder, which are being fed on bottles each hour.

By nightfall nearly every person within a 20-mile radius of Midland will know that something big is happening here, for two large army-type searchlights of 800,000-candlepower each will sweep the skies above the high school.

A registered Jersey heifer from the Fred Axels' herd of San Angelo is on display in a pen near the farm-ranch exhibit tent. The calf will be awarded to 4-H Club and FFA members at 10:15 p. m. Saturday.

The Texas Electric Show already has been acclaimed as one of the greatest shows of its kind ever staged in the Southwest, and capacity crowds have attended everywhere it has been held. It is being presented by Texas Electric Service Company, in co-operation with Midland dealers in electric appliances and equipment, distributors and manufacturers.

Small Countries Irked By Big Five

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—Col. W. R. Hodgson of Australia Friday led a small nation attack against a big power failure to break a 60-day deadlock between the United States and Russia on a basic working plan for world disarmament.

He told the United Nations Commission on Conventional Armaments the major powers had only delayed the group's work when they were given problems to settle among themselves.

While criticizing the Big Five's inability to agree on how to tackle arms limitation, Hodgson also drew attention to its failure to agree on a governor for the internationalized city of Trieste.

"We are back where we started from in this commission, the Australian said. "It is a surprising but a true thing that you have a great power submitting a proposal and another major power submitting a counter plan."

Expressing Australia's support of the U. S. plan for the regulation and reduction of armaments and armed forces, he urged the commission to get on with the job which the major powers had failed to accomplish.

Texas Is Chilly All Over; 44 At Pampa

Temperatures dropped to 44 in Pampa early Friday as cool Northern winds swept across the North-eastern section of the state.

In North Central Texas the mercury slipped to 60.

Heavy thunderstorms drenched the upper Red River Valley in the vicinity of Wichita Falls Northwest.

Gainesville received 1.99 inches of rainfall between 2 a. m. and 6 a. m. today. A low of 52 degrees was recorded. Low average of the week was 72.

Experts Say Bill Is Not 'Workable'

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Government labor experts who have been analyzing the Taft-Hartley Bill will advise President Truman the measure is "unworkable" and will not stop a coal strike.

This was learned Friday from officials who have seen the analysis but who asked that their names not be used.

There have been equally reliable reports, however, some other presidential advisers are urging Truman to sign the measure.

This group is said to contend (A) the bill does give the government some means of dealing with the threat of a new coal strike next month and (B) Congress is virtually certain to enact it into law in any event.

Here are some of the specific reasons they cited as arguments for a veto:

The provision exempting work stoppages resulting from "abnormally dangerous conditions" would make it possible, in their opinion, for John L. Lewis to bring about a nationwide or partial soft coal strike in mines which have become "unsafe" during the 10-day vacation the miners will take from June 27 to July 7.

A provision limiting payroll deductions for union dues after July 1, 1948, to workers who have submitted individual authorizations to the employer, could force wholesale cancellation of contracts—such as the vital two-year agreement of the CIO-Steelworkers.

The analysis says that while contracts may call for continued dues check-off, the Supreme Court has held that when a major section of a contract fails, the entire agreement may be re-opened.

A big Permian Basin area boxing show was scheduled Friday afternoon. All weights from paper to heavy are presented. The boxers are from the Odessa Golden Gloves team and from Fort Stockton and McCamey.

The selection of "Miss McCamey" will be made Friday night in a local bathing revue at the Upton County swimming pool here. The first and second place winners will be eligible to compete for the title of "Miss Permian Basin" in a regional bathing revue Saturday night. More than 20 area beauties are entered in the Saturday night contest.

Following an air show Saturday morning, a softball game between the Electric Service team of San Angelo and the McCamey All-Stars will feature the Saturday afternoon program.

Free street dances will be held following the bathing revues both Friday and Saturday nights.

S. 80, 67, 285, 290 and state 17, 51, 82, 302 and 329, 115.6 miles seal coat, from 19.4 miles East of Jeff Davis county line to Toyah, Brewster county line to Poyah, & S. F. R. R. crossing from 1.9 miles West of Pecos River bridge to Pecos River; Pecos River to Crane county line, Pecos River to Hoban to Saragosa, Orta to Arno, 21 miles West of Sheffield, Odessa to 10 miles West of Sheffield, Ector county line to 1.236 feet south, Winkler county line to Monahans, 12.83 miles East of Reeves county line to 6.1 miles West of Fort Stockton, 11.2 miles East of Kermit to Ector county line, Ward county line to 13.3 miles west of Crane.

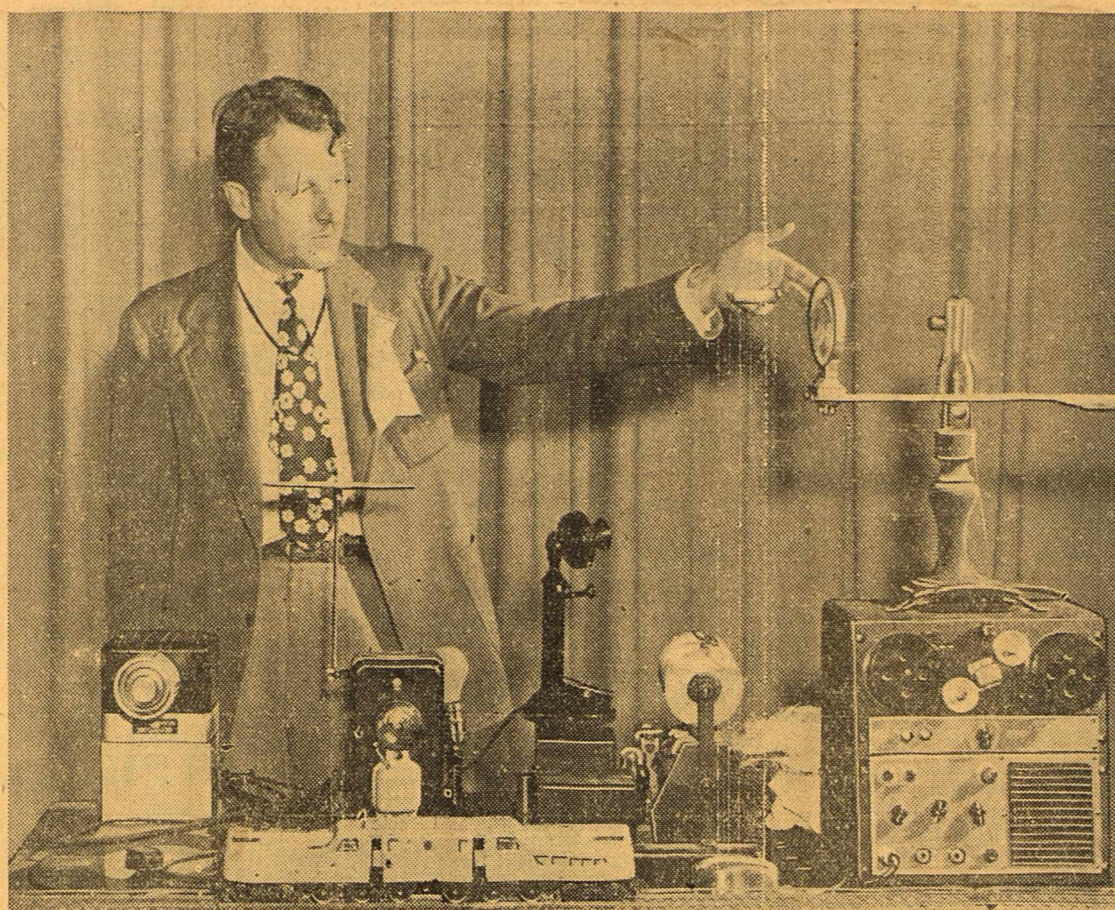
Hospital Medical Staff Holds Regular Meeting

Weldon Stewart, big and sturdy right-hander, will pitch for Midland Friday night. Ernie Nelson, clever left-hander, will attempt ironman tactics Saturday, pitching both games for Midland.

Broncs, Dusters Win; Cat-Oiler Game Blowed Out

A 9-0 shutout over Midland last night gave the Big Spring Broncs a two-game lead in the Longhorn League Friday. In the only other game, Vernon romped over Sweetwater, 20-7, in a free-hitting contest that saw the loser outhit the victor, 18-13.

A big sixth inning, in which eight runs crossed the plate on six hits, gave Vernon a commanding margin.

Odessa's tilt with Ballinger was called at the end of the third inning because of a sudden dust storm, followed by heavy rain.

Battling for supremacy in the Longhorn League before the largest crowd of the season—1,000 paid admissions—the Big Spring Broncs "clobbered" the Midland Indians, 9 to 0, here Thursday night in a game delayed at intervals by sweeping dust winds.

Medics Join Up In Switzerland Strike Epidemic

GENEVA — Switzerland, which was virtually free of labor disturbances during the war and in the immediate postwar period, recently has had a series of localized strikes with threats of a general strike in the building trades.

There have been brief, local strikes by plasterers and paper-hangers in Bern, Biel, Basel and Lugano. Geneva has had strikes in the building trades and in watch-making. Relatively weak segments of the textile workers unions have staged two strikes in the Zurich area.

Two Weeks' Strike
Throughout the canton of Zurich there was a two-weeks strike of physicians who said that the fees paid under the health-insurance system were inadequate.

In every instance the complaint has been that wage increases have not kept up with living-costs increases. The employers, making concessions in some instances, have replied that their production costs have increased, but that prices of their products are controlled by the government.

The government explains that the freeze on wages must be maintained to combat inflation, and that price ceilings must be observed to enable the domestic consumer to buy and to enable the exporter to compete on the world market.

At Variance
After weeks of negotiation, the building trades unions, the contractors and the federal conciliation board are still at variance on questions of wage increases and hours of work per week. The contractors say that basic wages, by means of wartime premiums, have been increased 70 per cent since 1939 and that living costs have increased 55.4 per cent. The unions answered that prewar wages in building trades were "not a living wage."

The conciliation board has suggested slight wage increases which the unions have rejected. Threats of strikes in the building trades have been alarming because Switzerland, as many other nations, has an acute housing shortage.

CHINESE OFFICIALS HAVE YEN FOR JEEPS

NANKING —(AP)— Chinese gendarmes, searching for stolen American vehicles, arrested a Nanking youth who admitted stealing two jeeps and led authorities to the purchasers in a village of 100 miles away.

The Gendarmes found one of the jeeps painted a fire-engine red and equipped with ladder racks. It was in the possession of the village fire chief.

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

Here is an interesting hand from across the sea. Dr. Paul Stern of London, who has sent us some fine hands in the past, sent me this one, at the same time informing me that he has just written a new book. When I receive a copy we will have a few articles about it.

The squeeze in today's hand is one of the most unusual I have ever seen. Dr. Stern said it was played by Paul Grosser, formerly a member of the representative Czech team.

The opening lead was won in dummy with the ace of diamonds, Mr. Grosser discarding the four of hearts. The ace of spades was cashed and a small heart led, West winning with the ace. He came back with the queen of hearts, which declarer trumped with the deuce of clubs. The five of spades was trumped with the four of clubs, and dummy's eight of hearts ruffed

with the three of clubs. The seven of spades was played, and declarer was careful to ruff this in dummy with the ten of clubs.

Next he led the four of diamonds, and made another unusual play by trumping with the king of clubs. The ace of clubs was cashed, and when declarer led the nine of clubs, West was squeezed.

If West threw away a diamond, declarer would overtake in dummy with the ten of clubs, then ruff the nine of diamonds in his own hand, thus establishing dummy's diamond jack for a discard. If West discarded a spade, declarer would play dummy's six of clubs on the nine, then ruff the nine of spades in dummy, establishing his spade queen for the last trick.

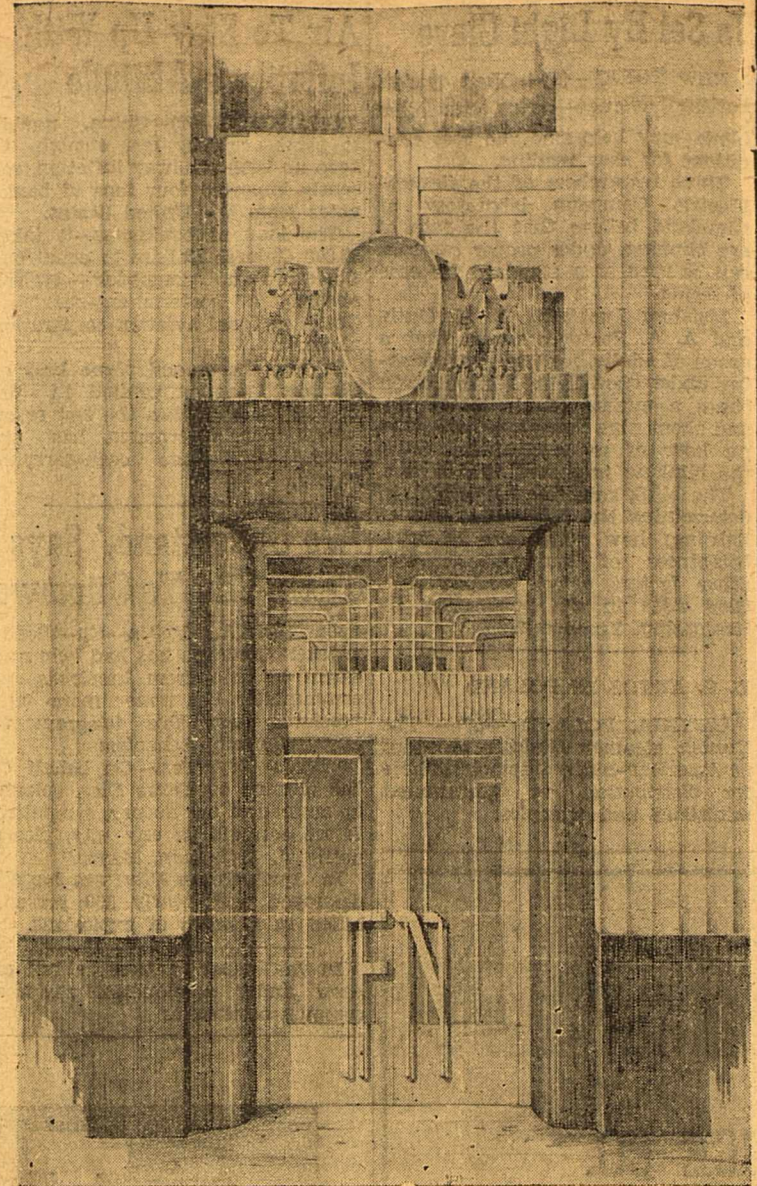
MORE TYPHOONS FORECAST FOR JAPAN

Your Blinking Rate Is Set By Light Glare

NEW YORK (AP)—Your eyelid's battling average—how often you blink—may help find the best conditions for easy reading.

Three researchers of the General Electric Company laboratory at Cleveland believe that the rate of eye blinking, under proper controls, can be used as a standard for ease of seeing.

Matthew Luckiesh, S. K. Guth, and A. A. Eastman report that a group of adults, reading good printing under good light, blinked seven times a minute at the beginning, and about nine times a minute after an hour of reading. Under glare, the blinking increased 56 per cent.

The blink rate can be helpful in determining the best conditions of lighting; how glare, size of type, brightness of surroundings and other factors affect reading ease, they state in the publication Illuminating Engineering.

China Has To Take To Air To Stay Up With Inflation's Altiude

SHANGHAI (AP)—China, unable to print currency fast enough to keep up with runaway inflation, recently imported four tons of banknotes from the United States.

The load of banknotes—it takes 32,000 Chinese Dollars to equal one American greenback—arrived aboard a government-chartered China national aviation corporation plane.

It was the second plane load of Chinese currency printed in the United States within the last seven weeks. The government has arranged two more cash-carrying flights.

Calf Gets Ahead Fast Right From Its Birth

ANNVILLE, PA. (AP)—A Holstein calf on the nearby farm of Harvey Sweigert has a head start on the other animals when eating time rolls around—it has two mouths.

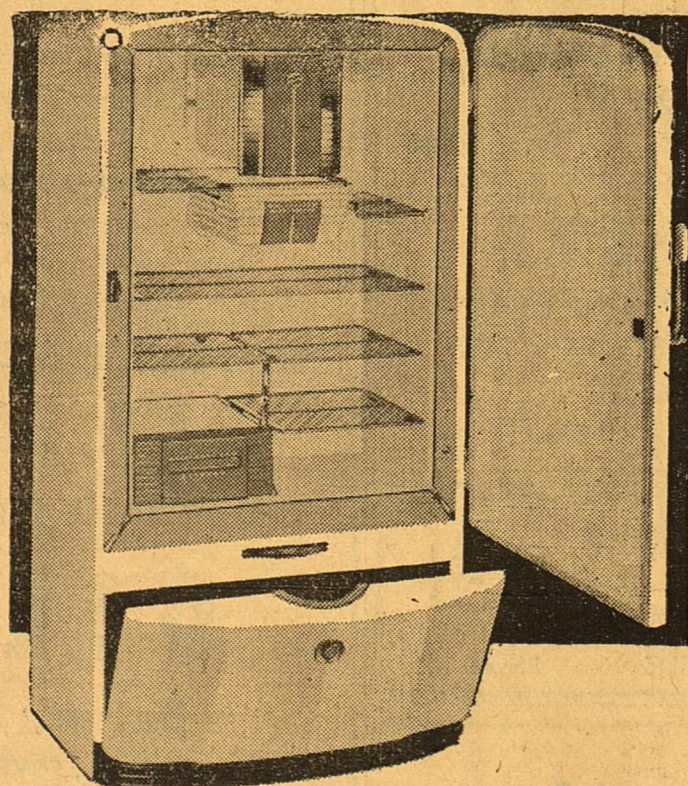

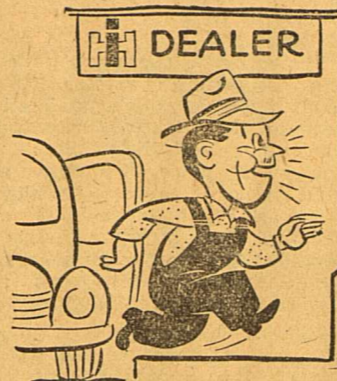
'We Understand,' Says Texas City To Ottumwa

In the polar regions, a fall of snow under a cloudless sky is a common occurrence.



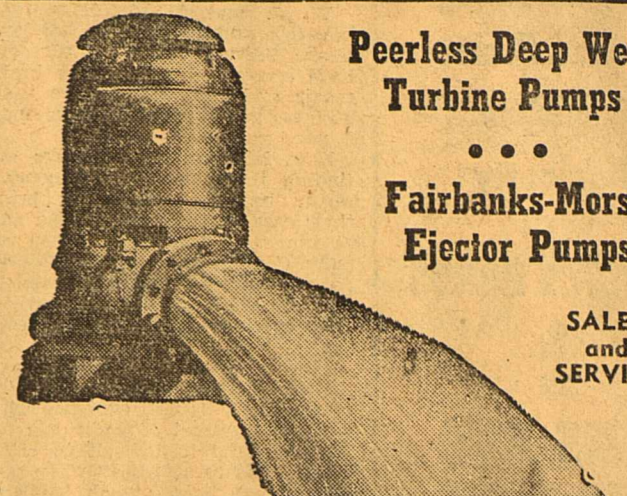
