## Truman Vetoes Tax Cut Bill

### House Likely To Over-Ride President's Act Tuesday; Senate Strength Doubtful

WASHINGTON — (P)— President Truman Monday vetoed the \$4,000,000,000 tax reduction bill, virtually killing any possibility of a cut in income taxes this year.

The Republican-dominated Congress will vote on whether to pass the bill over the veto, but backers of the legislation conceded they saw no chance for success.

It requires a two-thirds vote to enact a law over the President's disapproval. Leaders said that can be mustered in the House, which will vote Tuesday, but not in the Senate.

### Veto Is Greeted With Caustic Words By GOP

WASHINGTON — (P)— Reaction from the income tax reduction bill veto which President Truman made Monday was immediate, and for the most part, caustic.

The measure's author, Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.), chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, commented in a statement: "The President's suggesting that we wait for tax reduction until next year is nothing but cold-blooded politics."

Carroll Reece, Republican National chairman, said in a statement: "Mr. Truman has committed his administration to continued support of the tax and tax, spend and spend, and elect and elect philosophy of the now discredited new deal."

The President declared it offers "the wrong kind of tax reduction, at the wrong time." He added:

"Proposals for tax reduction must be examined in the light of sound and carefully related fiscal and economic policies. Unless they are consistent with the demands of such policies, they should not be approved."

Arguing against cutting taxes while the debt is high, the President asserted:

"A time of high employment and high prices, wages, and profits, such as the present, calls for a surplus in government revenue over expenditures and the application of all or much of this surplus to the reduction of the public debt."

At the same time, he recommended Congress study and plan for "thorough going revision of the tax system," consider not only individual income tax rates, but adjustments in the level of personal exemptions and changes in excise tax laws, gift and estate taxes, corporation taxes and "the entire field of tax revenues."

"H. R. 1 (the tax reduction bill) fails to give relief where it is needed most," his message asserted. "Under H. R. 1, tax savings to the average family with an income of \$2,500 would be less than \$30, while taxes on an income of \$50,000 would be reduced by nearly \$5,000 and on an income of \$500,000 by nearly \$60,000."

"Insofar as 'take home' pay is concerned under H. R. 1, the family earning \$2,500 would receive an increase of only 1.2 per cent; the family with an income of \$50,000 would receive an increase of 18.6 per cent; and the family with an income of \$500,000 would receive an increase of 62.3 per cent."

Rejection of the tax measure may have some bearing on what the Republicans decide to do next year about such measures as federal aid to education, a general health program, social security benefits and housing—all calling for increased federal expenditures.

### Hungarian Is Defiant In Red Protests

BUDAPEST, HUNGARY — (P)— Deszo Sulyok, Hungarian Freedom Party leader, defied Hungary's Communist rulers Monday by calling an open political rally at which he was expected to denounce the new regime in ever stronger words than he used last week.

Sulyok infuriated the Communists Thursday with a speech in parliament in which he cried that "the wildest and most objectionable political terror reigns in Hungary." He said Hungary had become a police state.

The general opinion here was there would be no attempt to interfere with the rally Monday, since many British and American reporters expected to attend.

Sulyok is considered by his friends to be the most courageous anti-Communist in Hungary today and the leader of the Hungarian anti-Communist element.

Friends describe the bald, medium-sized Sulyok as entirely fearless and determined to speak his mind concerning his passionate belief in the ideal of Western Democracy regardless of any personal or political danger involved.

### Cattle And Sheep Runs Reach New Fort Worth High

FORT WORTH — (P)— Full production and good prices resulted Monday in the largest run of cattle and sheep of the year at the Fort Worth stockyards.

At mid-morning 8,596 cattle and 2,404 calves were unloaded from 591 trucks. USDA estimated the day's run would be 9,000 cattle and 3,000 calves and early morning indications were that the forecast would be exceeded.

It was the largest run of cattle since last October when OPA controls were removed.

Another large run was reported in the sheep yards where estimates placed receipts at 24,000 head. At mid-morning 21,000 head had been received by truck with no rail supplies reported.

### Midland Police Weren't Kidding

The phone jangled in Midland police headquarters Monday morning.

Captain Maxwell of Midland arrested the two youths, ages 17 and 18, hitch hiking through here Monday morning.

The youths were loaded down with loot and officers here where more was hidden.

### Three Burglaries Reported Sunday

Three burglaries were reported in Midland Sunday to city police.

Baker's Ice Cream Store on the East Highway was entered and some \$30 in change was taken.

Midland Jewelry and McCullan's Drygoods Store on South Main Street were entered by a skylight. Amount taken from these stores was not immediately determined.

### Iowa Flood Recedes After Reaching High

KEOSAUQUA, IOWA — (P)— The flood crest of the Des Moines river reached this little town Monday, caused damage in the business district, and moved downstream toward the junction with the rising Mississippi near Keokuk.

Throughout Iowa the flood crisis had eased at nearly all points.

At Ottumwa, 30 miles upstream from here, the industrial city's 32,000 residents rode out the brunt of the flood Sunday without panic and with no reported loss of life.

### Ellis O. Briggs Is Uruguay Nominee

WASHINGTON — (P)— President Truman Monday nominated Ellis O. Briggs of Maine to be ambassador to Uruguay.

Briggs, a 48-year-old native of Waterbury, Mass., succeeds Williamson Howell, who died at his home in Bryan, Texas, May 22.

A veteran of 22 years in the foreign service, Briggs was one of the closest advisors to retiring assistant secretary of state, Spruille Braden.

### Judge Denies Petition To Bar Wallace

WASHINGTON — (P)— Federal Judge James M. Proctor Monday refused to bar Henry A. Wallace from speaking at the government-owned Watergate Amphitheater here Monday night.

The judge rejected a petition from the American anti-Communist Association headed by Representative O'Konski (R-Wis.), that he order Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug to deny Wallace use of the Watergate.

Wallace, who is crusading against the Truman foreign policy, is expected to discuss his views on peace and perhaps also clarify his position in the 1948 Presidential campaign.

Attorney General Clark issued a statement saying the department opposed the petition "because many of the greatest responsibilities of the Department of Justice is to protect the freedom of speech guaranteed under the Constitution and the Bill of Rights."

"While I may not be in accord with Mr. Wallace's views," Clark said, "yet under our Constitution and the Bill of Rights he has a right to express his opinion. If we commence to abridge such rights, we are violating a principle on which our government was founded and has stood for over 170 years."

### Reds' Newspaper Criticizes Plan To Unite Europe

MOSCOW — (P)— Pravda commented disparagingly Monday on Secretary of State Marshall's proposal for coordinated plans to spur European recovery. Foreign political observers said the commentary showed there was little likelihood the Soviet Union would participate in such a project.

The Communist Party newspaper said Marshall's aid-for-Europe proposals, "despite their seeming novelty," merely extended the Truman Doctrine, which it called an attempt to "export political pressure with the aid of dollars—a program interference in the affairs of other states."

Mrs. L. F. Page is camping chairman, and Mrs. L. Otis Baggett is day camp director.

### Violence, Accidents Take 12 Texas Lives

The list of reported week-end deaths from accidents and violence in Texas over the week-end rose to 12 Monday. Three persons died in accidents involving trains, three were killed in automobile accidents, three drowned, two were shot to death and one was dragged to his death by a pony.

### House Strikes From Record Words Of 'Human Welfare' Telegram

WASHINGTON — (P)— The House voted 146 to 7 Monday to strike from its records a protest by the Southern Conference for Human Welfare against a House committee's description of it as a Communist front organization.

The protest was a telegram from Dr. Clark Foreman, president of the Conference. He said a report by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, which linked his group with Communists, contains "lies and half truths" and is itself "un-American."

Rep. Holtifield (D-Calif.) read the telegram to the House.

Up jumped Rep. Rankin (D-Miss.), a member of the Un-American Activities Committee, and demanded it be removed from the record.

Rankin's motion carried 146 to 7. The action means the telegram will not appear in the Congressional record, which is the printed proceedings of the House, although it was read on the House floor.

### No Action Before Friday On Labor

WASHINGTON — (P)— Press secretary Charles G. Ross Monday indicated President Truman may not act on the Taft-Hartley labor union bill until shortly before the Friday midnight deadline.

Ross told reporters, awaiting Truman's message on the income tax bill, that there would be no action on the labor legislation until after the President's return from a speaking engagement at Princeton University Tuesday.

Truman will leave by train at 5:30 a. m. (GST) Tuesday for a speech at Princeton at 10:30 a. m. (GST). He will receive an honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

### KHOI, IRAN — (AP) — Reports reached here Monday of sharp fighting in Northwestern Iran, near the Turkish and Russian borders, where 1,000 encircled Borzoni tribesmen were said to be trying to break through a ring of some 4,000 Iranian troops.

### WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Supreme Court Monday refused for the second time to review the mail fraud conviction of Mayor James M. Curley of Boston.

### JERUSALEM — (AP) — A military court Monday condemned three convicted Jewish terrorists to death as the United Nations Commission of Palestine opened its inquiry amid an Arab general strike.

### NEW DELHI — (AP) — The Indian News Chronicle reported Monday night 60 persons were either shot to death or burned alive when a mob of about 2,000 raided Tikri Village in the Gurgaon District.

### GRAPELAND — (AP) — A trigger-happy hold-up man Monday shot at Garland Hogan, Missouri Pacific night clerk, grazing his right temple, then fled when the pistol jammed.

### Marshall And Aides Figure Out New Plan

WASHINGTON — (P)— Secretary of State Marshall and his top advisers have now worked out an approach to what they consider the twin threats of chaos and Communism in Europe.

Their program will either unite much of that continent by this year's end or divide it worse than ever before—depending on Russian reaction.

Diplomatic officials say if Russia holds to her refusal to cooperate it almost certainly will force the organization of Western Europe alone into a sort of economic federation. That would mean Russia and her Eastern bloc of states would be cut off from any substantial American help.

Marshall is reported to hope this will not happen, that Russia will go along or at least permit some of the dominated countries to go along with the American proposal for some kind of economic federation of Europe. His policy apparently is one of an "open door" to Russian co-operation; if the door is to be closed, Russia will have to close it.

### EAST CROCKETT WILDCAT IS TAKING DST IN ELLENBURGER

Moncrief and Hide, et al No. 1 Helbing, East Crockett County wildcat, about 17 miles southeast of the Todd Deep field, and 660 feet from north and west lines of section 16, block QR, TT survey, was reported to have topped the Ellenburger at 8,660 feet on an elevation of 2,488 feet.

Operators had penetrated to 8,740 feet, and were understood to be taking drillstem test. So far as has been reported no signs of oil or gas were logged from the section of the Ellenburger cut so far.

Ted Weiner No. 1 Vaughn, seven miles east of Todd Deep field, and 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 86, block OP, GC&SF survey, had reached 7,125 feet, and was drilling ahead in lime and shale.

### SW ANDREWS PROSPECTOR GETS OIL IN DEVONIAN

The Pure Oil Company and Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Cowden, wildcat in Southwest Andrews County, 1,980 feet from west and 660 feet from south lines of section 24, block A-52, psi survey, was drilling ahead below 7,635 feet in Devonian lime, topped at about 7,560 feet.

Elevation is 3,169 feet. A drillstem test was taken for three hours at 7,562-7,530 feet. 1,000-foot water blanket was used.

Gas showed at the surface after 70 minutes. There was no gauge or estimate of the volume. Recovery was 990 feet of clean oil and 180 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud.

Flowing bottom hole pressure was 500 pounds. Shutin bottom hole pressure, after 10 minutes was 1,000 pounds. Hydrostatic pressure was 3,800 pounds.

This project has shown for possible production from the Wichita Albany zone of the Permian. The lower interval of that formation at 7,450-7,541 feet tested for salt water with slight signs of oil and gas.

It is expected to be carried on down to test the Ellenburger. This well is three-quarters of a mile north and one half a mile east of nearest Devonian producer in the Dollar Hide field.

### TERRY COUNTY STEP-OUT SWABBS OIL AFTER ACID

Amerada Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Elkins, on location northwest of the initial producer in the Adair field, in South-Central Terry County, and 990 feet from south and 330 feet from east lines of section 5, block C-37, psi survey, reported to the Railroad Commission of Texas to have swabbed at the rate of 18.37 barrels of oil per hour, after pay between 4,835-4,920 feet, had been treated with 2,000 gallons and 5,000 gallons of acid, through casing perforations.

The well swabbed at the rate of about six barrels of oil per hour, before the acid was injected. It is now in course of completion.

### PHILLIPS SPOTS ANOTHER DEEP TEST IN NW ECTOR

Phillips Petroleum Company has filed an application with the Railroad Commission for a permit to drill its No. 2-P Phillips-TXL, as a 10,000-foot exploration in Northwest Ector County, about one and one-quarter miles north of the TXL field.

It is to be 660 feet from west and 661 feet from north lines of southeast quarter of section 29, block 29, block 45, TP survey, T-1-N.

That puts it one quarter of a mile due north of the location of same company's No. 1-P Phillips-TXL, recently reported as a new prospect. Operator has advised the Railroad Commission that drilling is slated to start on both projects as once.

### MAGNOLIA FOUND WATER IN WINKLER EXPLORATION

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1-DD State-Walton, North Winkler County wildcat to test the middle, and possibly the lower Permian, about three miles north of Kermitt, and 2,310 feet from south and 900 feet from east lines of section 7, block B-3, psi survey, was making new hole below 4,840 feet in lower San Andres lime.

It ran a one-hour drillstem test at 4,800-40 feet. Recovery was 480 feet of sandy sulphur water, with no shows of oil or gas.

### EAST MIDLAND WILDCAT IS PLUGGING TO ABANDON

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Mabel Floyd, wildcat about 15 miles southeast of Midland, in East Midland County, and 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 16, block 37, TP survey.

## A Starting Place

If the American people intend taking General Eisenhower's excellent advice to begin active individual and community efforts for peace, the first question is where to start. One answer has already been provided by some forward-looking communities which anticipated the general's counsel.

These communities have been stirring up a concerted sentiment in favor of strengthening the UN. And surely there could be no better place for the American people to exert the united weight of their efforts toward the prevention of war.

The U. S. is the UN's permanent home. The delegates of the 55 nations will spend much of their time here, and they cannot fail to be conscious of the national feeling that surrounds them. It is up to us, the UN's host, whether feeling is to be one of passive despair or active hope.

The UN is not yet a forum for the world's peoples. It is an organization of world governments. This was made clear during the setting up of the Palestine commission of inquiry. But that is no reason why it should not be sensitive to popular opinion, in America and elsewhere. For once the American people were mobilized for the prevention of war, other democratic peoples certainly would follow their lead.

How should the UN be strengthened, then? Its present weaknesses are apparent. The UN obviously lacks a genuine authority. It lacks a body of international police to enforce what limited authority it has. It lacks even the power to act by majority decision on vitally important matters.

This last weakness, while perhaps not the most important, has caused the most trouble thus far. The root of that weakness, it hardly need be said, is the veto power.

Whether the veto power is a good or bad thing is, unfortunately beside the point. The big-power governments are committed to it and seem to be sold on it. Russia's use of the veto is not what the other Big Five members had in mind when they accepted this Yalta-made agreement at San Francisco. There seems to have been a sort of gentlemen's agreement at that time to use this power only in extreme cases.

It hasn't worked out that way. So it seems necessary to amend the UN Charter limiting the veto to the matters envisioned in this gentlemen's agreement. This is one goal which a united popular sentiment might aim its efforts toward a permanent peace. Of course, Russia or any other of the Big Five has power now to veto changes in the Charter. But the pressure of the opinions of millions throughout the world might be more persuasive than the arguments of delegates.

The marshalling of that opinion would be a long, hard job, but that is no reason why a start should be delayed. No one has said it would be easy. But no one can say that it is not worth trying.

## Texas Wheat Crops Are Expected To Set Record As Others Looking Good

AUSTIN—(AP)—The U. S. Department of Agriculture forecasts Texas farmers would harvest approximately 142,405,000 bushels of wheat—by far the largest yield on record. The prediction was based on June 1 conditions and was about 30,000,000 bushels above the May 1 forecast.

The present record harvest is the 1944 yield of 82,473,000 bushels of wheat in the important High Plains area and checked deterioration in Southern counties of the low rolling plains, where drought conditions prevailed on May 1, the USDA said. Harvesting of wheat was underway in North Texas and the Southern counties of the High Plains and was expected to begin soon in the Northern High Plains.

Heavy rains in May were unfavorable for progress of field work in low crops. The corn crop was in fairly good condition on June 1, although many fields were weedy and in need of cultivation. The prospective peach crop of 1,920,000 bushels is above average. Conditions for the Texas citrus crop are favorable although the bloom was late this year and fruit sizes are smaller.

Range feed supplies improved sharply during May. Seldom have summer range feed prospects been so uniformly favorable, the USDA reported. Cattle were sleek and rapidly gaining flesh on the improved supply of new grain feed.

Those indications also failed to make any free oil, and operator decided to discontinue further operations.

Richfield Oil Corporation No. 1 Mullis unit, South Chaves County New Mexico wildcat, about 20 miles east of Lake Arthur, had reached 11,136 feet in dolomite and chert and was drilling ahead. It is understood that the project has gone through the Mississippian, but the age of the formation now being drilled has not been reported by operator.

## YMCA Discussed By Bill Dawes At Monday Kiwanis Club Lunch

W. R. (Bill) Dawes, general secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association at Big Spring, told Midland Kiwanians at their noon luncheon Monday that a healthy Y. M. C. A. does not require a special building, but it does require the volunteer energies and time as well as money of individuals interested in bolstering youth of the community.

Principal purpose of the organization, he said, is to bolster the young person's faith in himself, his fellows, and his religion. Young persons today, as they strive to achieve independence and self-determination, are faced with a competitive, rejecting industrial order. The number of young men and women between 15 and 25 years of age who break mentally because of the stress of modern society is three times the number of younger boys and girls who "crack up" because of inability to adjust themselves to their environment.

Dawes outlined the general history, functions and organizational aspects of the Y. M. C. A., and described how such an association might work in Midland. Among guests at the luncheon was Lee M. Gardner, Wichita Falls, lieutenant governor of Kiwanis International. He said it had been suggested that Division One be made smaller so that divisional officers could give individual clubs more attention.

## Employment Needed For Texas' Teen-Agers

AUSTIN—(AP)—Suitable employment for large numbers of "teen-age" school children is needed during the summer months, the State child labor division has announced. Under present state laws minors may be employed for eight hours a day 48 hours a week, in any business except factories, mills, workshops, laundries, or any place where explosives are used.

No employment certificates are needed for minors during the school period June 1 to Sept. 1.

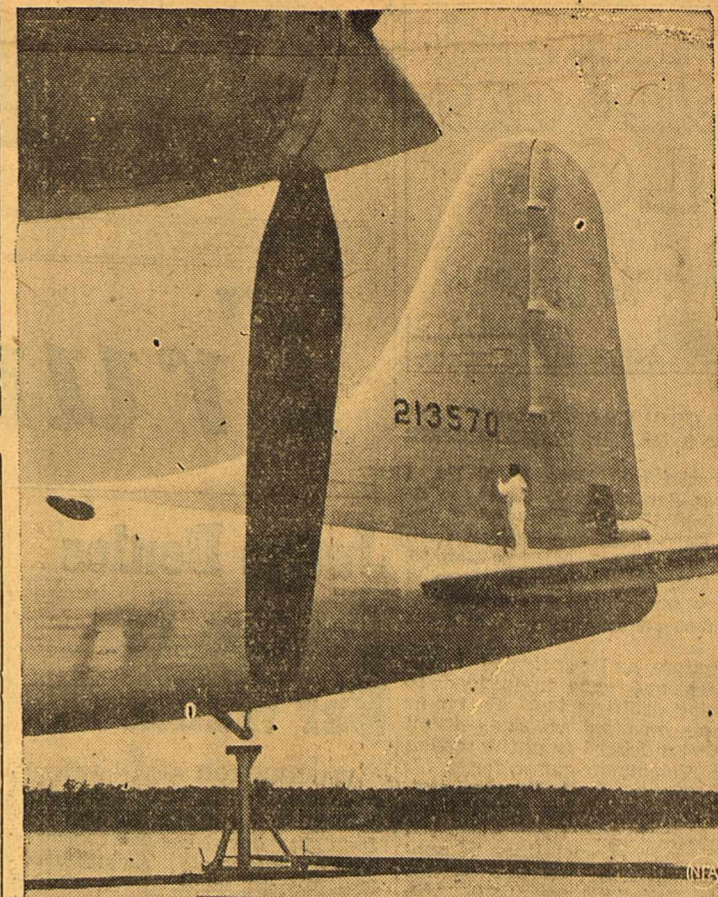
## Committee Will Study Far Eastern Economics

Gentlemen:

I received a card from you asking me to write to President Truman protesting the cut in appropriations to the Post Office Department. This card was written by you following a resolution of the Directors of the Midland Chamber of Commerce.

I would like to write President Truman and Congress objecting to Government bureaus trying to perpetuate their large staffs on the tax payers and the attempted maintenance of large appropriations from the Federal Treasury.

In my estimation the Post Office Department is attempting one of the most stupendous lobbies ever tried on the Congress of the United States. I believe it is a sorry state of affairs when a federal bureau bludgeons the people in an attempt to force appropriations out of Congress. The Post Office Department having been refused an increased budget is now resorting to a sit down strike knowing that a lot of people will do just what the Chamber of Commerce is asking, namely write somebody in Washington.

About five days ago, I was annoyed when two out of five of our windows in the local post office were closed, and when the delivery of certain second class mail essential to my business was held up. I inquired of the postmaster as to just what conditions required this curtailment of service as well as Saturday closing. I found that there has been no cut in the local budget, in fact this office gets more money now than in 1944, 1945 and 1946.

There is probably no doubt that certain areas in the United States handles much more mail than they did in 1946 but even so there is no reason to operate the office with less personnel than last year when the budget is larger now than last year.

I am forced to make certain assumptions from this point because of lack of data but I would guess that somebody in the Post Office Department has ordered a general curtailment regardless of local conditions, in various places, throughout the nation, knowing that Congress would be flooded with messages thus bringing pressure to bear to increase the budget, which Congress recently refused to do.

I repeat I'd like to write Washington objecting, but I'd ask for an investigation as to who is responsible in the Post Office Department for such a slow down order.

Seamon is one of a family of bridge experts. His father and mother played a good game of bridge. One of his sisters, Mrs. E. J. Seligman of New York, is a Life Master, and another sister, Mrs. Anne Bernstein of Miami, is the present holder of the national mixed pair title. Billie is younger than his sisters, but if he plays much more tournament bridge, he soon will be a Life Master.

Seamon pointed out the safety play in today's hand, which many of the players in the game missed. Some safety plays can be cata-

logated, others have to be figured out as they come up in the play. It is important for every bridge player to learn them.

At most tables West held the opening lead and played another spade, which declarer trumped. Two rounds of trumps were taken and a small diamond led to the king. A small diamond was played back from dummy, East showing out, and declarer complained of hard luck when he went down one, losing two diamonds and a spade.

Seamon pointed out the correct play after ruffing the second spade and taking two rounds of trumps. Then declarer should cash the king of hearts, lead a heart to dummy's ace and ruff the third heart. A small diamond should be led by declarer, and when West plays low, dummy's eight should be played. East will win with the ten, and will have to give declarer a ruff and a ruff.

Suppose that East held four diamonds to the queen-jack-ten. After winning the trick with the ten, he would have to return the queen of diamonds and dummy's king would win, West showing out. Then a small diamond would be led from dummy and declarer could finesse East out of his jack.

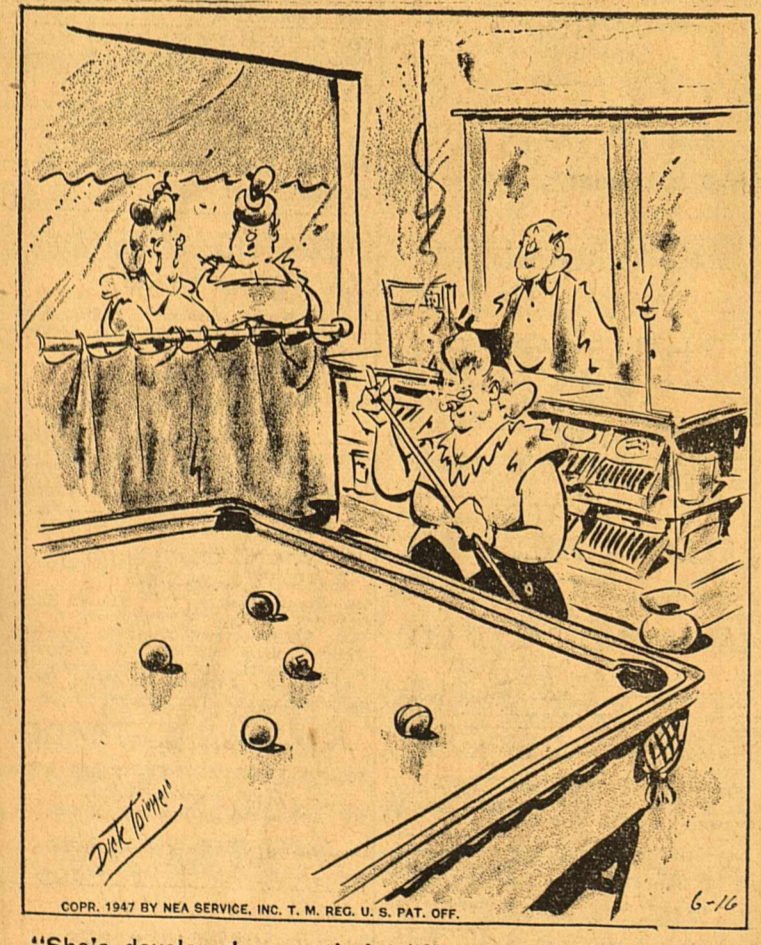

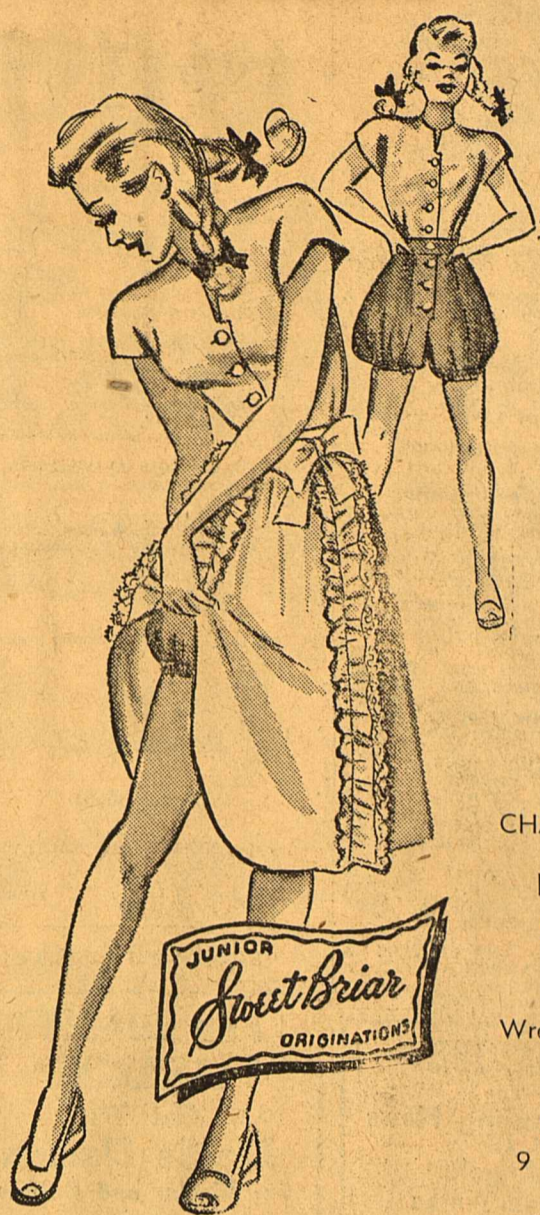

The Midland Colts defeated the Slaton Tigers 14-7 in a baseball game on the Latin-American diamond here Sunday afternoon.

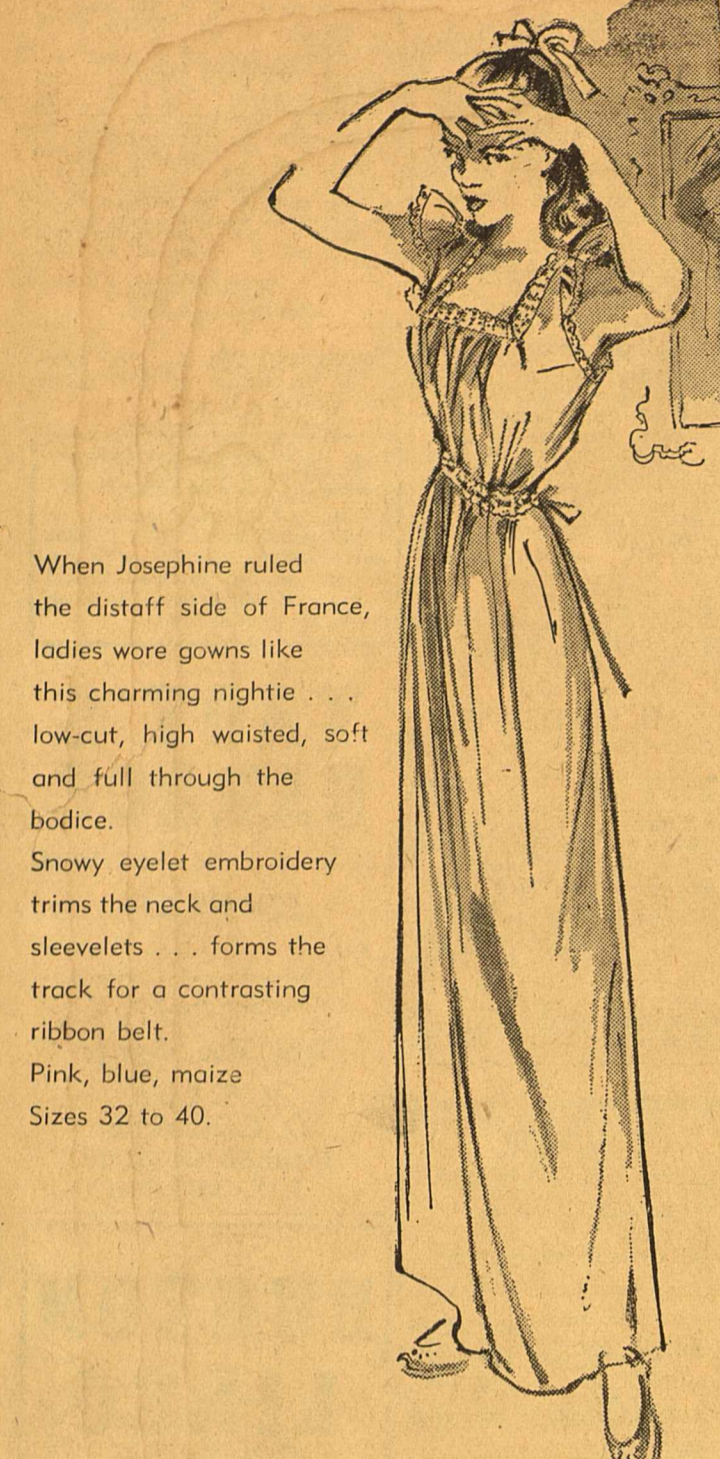
