

CRANE AND COCHRAN AREAS GET WILDCAT PROJECTS

Locations for a wildcat to test the Ellenburger, in Southwest Crane County, and for one to explore the Clear Fork-Permian in South Cochran County, have been reported.

The Crane County project will be Gulf Cil Corporation No. 7-E Wristen Brothers. It will be 667 feet from east and 2004 feet from north lines of section 17, block B-28, psl survey

Drilling to around 7,800 feet, to test the lower Ordovician, is slated to start at once. The drillsite is six and one-half miles northeast of Grandfalls, which is on Southeast Ward County

STANOLIND TO GO TO CLEAR FORK IN LANDON FIELD

STANOLIND Cil & Gas Company No. 1 M. J. Hall, 1,980 feet from south and 538 feet from west lines of section 13, block L. psl survey, in the Landon area of South-Central Cochran County is to be the 7,600-foot, Clear Fork exploration. This development was originally started to try to develop produc-tion from the San Andres, which Landon region.

Apparently it has failed to enreached approximately 5,300 feet, in lime, and was drilling ahead, at last report.

PURE-HUMBLE 1 COWDEN FLOWS OIL FROM DEVONIAN The Pure Oil Company and Hum-

ble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Cowden, wildcat on the north side of the Dollar Hide field, in Southwest Andrews County, and 1,980 feet from west and 660 feet from south lines of section 24, block A-52, psl survey, was flowing oil from the Devonian at 7,682,7,743 feet, early Tuesday morning.

Operators took a drillstem test that zone. In 22 minutes after the tester was opened the drill pipe started showing gas at the surface The water blanket started flowing at the top in 56 minutes. Oil started coming out the top of the drill pipe in one hour and 16 minutes, and it was still flowing at last report

This prospector has previously shown for possible production from higher section of the Devonian and also from the lower Permian. It is contracted to go to around 10,-500 feet to explore the Ellenburger. and likely will be carried to that horizon before any efforts are made to complete.

Reds Spread Rumor House Upholds Tax Veto U.S. Consul Began Mongolian Incident

MOSCOW-(P)-A Pravda dispatch said Tuesday there was a rumor in Shanghai that J. Hall Paxton, U. S. consul in Tihwa, "prepared and organized" the incident involving Chinese and Mongolian frontier detachments June 5.

The Communist Party newspaper termed this incident "a violation of the board of the Mongolian People's Republic." (The Chinese Central News Agency declared Mongolian troops invaded Sinkiang Province, with the aid of warplanes bearing Soviet markings.)

The Pravda dispatch said travelers from Sinkiang reported Pax-ton visited the frontier between Russia, the Mongolian People's Republic and China in April at the instruction of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and photographed the area.

Measure Fails To Get Margin By Two Votes

WASHINGTON -(AP)- The House Monday upheld President Truman's veto of the \$4,000,000,000 tax reduction bill, thus killing it finally and completely

The veto was 268 to pass the bill over the veto and 137 against. Thus it was two votes short of the twothirds majority necessary to pass a law over the President's disapproval.

When that count turned up on the roll call, Republican Leader Halleck of Indiana demanded and obtained a recount, but no votes were changed.

Voting to override the veto were 233 Republicans and 35 Democrats.

Supporting the President were 134 Democrats, two Republicans - Carl Andersen of Minnesota and Hull of Wisconsin-and the American Labor member, Marcantonio of New York.
