Reds Spread Rumor U.S. Consul Began Mongolian Incident

MOSCOW—(AP)—A Pravda dispatch said Tuesday there was a rumor in Shanghai that J. Hall Paxton, U. S. consul in Tihwa, "prepared and organized" the incident involving Chinese and Mongolian frontier detachments June 5.

The Communist Party newspaper termed this incident "a violation of the board of the Mongolian People's Republic." (The Chinese Central News Agency declared Mongolian troops invaded Sinkiang Province, with the aid of warplanes bearing Soviet markings.)

The Pravda dispatch said travelers from Sinkiang reported Paxton visited the frontier between Russia, the Mongolian People's Republic and China in April at the instruction of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and photographed the area.

'Draft Wallace For President' Movement Starts In California

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A "Draft Henry Wallace for President" movement began to take shape Tuesday as the former vice president awaited an official response to his call for a Truman-Stalin meeting in Berlin to settle Soviet-American differences.

Wallace, the most vocal critic of President Truman's foreign policy in this country, said he knew nothing of the "draft" move, which originated in California.

L. M. Freels Is 'Top Wrangler'

L. M. Freels was named Midland's "Top Wrangler" of the month at a rousing "chuckwagon" breakfast of the Wranglers Club in the Blue Room of the Scharbauer Hotel Coffee Shop at 7:30 a. m. Tuesday.

Some Texas Wheat To Be Piled On Ground

AUSTIN—(AP)—A large portion of Texas' prospective record wheat crop will have to be dumped on the ground this season, State Director V. C. Childs of the crop report service, United States Department of Agriculture, reports.

Storage on the ground is common practice because the Texas wheat crop usually exceeds storage space, Childs said.

"If it doesn't rain too much, there's ordinarily not much of a problem. It just means some extra handling," he observed.

Rains, or excessively hot weather, could prove costly to wheat growers this year, for the Texas crop is forecast at 142,405,000 bushels, and storage capacity is only 80,000,000. Interior storage facilities will take care of only 30,000,000 bushels, Childs estimated.

WINDSHIELD LICENSE STICKERS VOID JULY 15

AUSTIN—(AP)—The State Highway Department cautions motorists that windshield license stickers will become illegal July 15.

The stickers were issued last March and April to some motorists because of a temporary delay in delivery of metal plates. They now may be exchanged for regular tags at the county tax assessor-collector office where they were issued.

Measure Fails To Get Margin By Two Votes

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The House Monday upheld President Truman's veto of the \$4,000,000,000 tax reduction bill, thus killing it finally and completely.

The veto was 268 to pass the bill over the veto and 137 against. Thus it was two votes short of the two-thirds majority necessary to pass a law over the President's disapproval.

When that count turned up on the roll call, Republican Leader Halleck of Indiana demanded and obtained a recount, but no votes were changed.

Voting to override the veto were 233 Republicans and 35 Democrats.

Special Aide Named In Vote Fraud Probes

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Attorney General Clark Monday appointed Richard K. Phelps, Kansas City attorney, as a special assistant to prosecute any federal law violations in last summer's Kansas City Democratic primary.

Clark's office announced Phelps has been given "full and complete authority" to go ahead with any prosecutions he deems warranted.

Phelps is a former United States attorney for the Western Missouri district. He was active in all of the so-called Pendergast election cases during which 250 persons were convicted.

Sun Oil Company Requests 'Light'

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Sun Oil Company Tuesday charged in federal district court the Justice Department is keeping the firm "unfairly in the dark" concerning an anti-trust suit filed seven years ago against 366 defendants in the petroleum industry.

The accusation was made in a statement submitted in support of a request a year ago that the government specify the charges against the Sun Company. The department objected, asking leave to proceed without supplying the answers.

Angelo Shriners Stop Here On Trip Boosting West Texas Round-Up

Boosting the All-West Texas Shrine round-up in San Angelo Saturday, a bus load of Shriners from that city stopped briefly in Midland Tuesday morning en route to Odessa, Crane, McCamey and other points along the way back home.

The group left San Angelo Monday morning, going to Ballinger, Winters, Abilene, Sweetwater, and stopping for one night in Big Spring. Further advertising of the event by airplane is planned, members of the party advised.

Wool Measure Veto Predicted By Demo

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Rep. Coohey (D.N.C.) Monday predicted President Truman, in an effort to salvage the International Trade Conference at Geneva, will veto a bill giving new protection to American wool producers against foreign competition.

Coohey's assertion came on the heels of House action in accepting a conference committee's recommendations for pegging wool support prices at their present levels and empowering the President to fix import quotas or higher tariffs if he finds imports interfering with domestic prices.

Proclamations Mailed For Amendment Voting

AUSTIN—(AP)—Proclamations for a constitutional amendment submission and calling two special legislative elections Aug. 23 have been printed and will be mailed out soon, Secretary of State Paul Brown announced Tuesday.

Fierce Battle Rages In Manchurian Town

NANKING—(AP)—Street fighting between Chinese Reds and government defenders was underway Tuesday in battered Szeepingka, Manchuria, Chinese dispatches said, after government gunners used artillery to repulse four Red regiments which smashed into the city from the southwest.

The independent newspaper Hsin Min Pao said half of the Communists in the four regiments were destroyed and the other half retired. Members of a fifth regiment gained a foothold within the city's walls and engaged the garrison in battle, the newspaper reported.

Wide Search Is Being Made In Big Bend Area For Monahans Doctor Who Disappeared June 5

MONAHANS—(AP)—An extensive search Monday was being conducted in the Big Bend area for a young retired doctor who has been missing for 10 days. Planes will be used, aiding the Border Patrol and county officials.

The missing man is Dr. R. D. North, about 36, a resident here since last October. He has been employed in a photographic studio. He came originally from Lansing, Mich.

Dr. North moved here because of his health. He retired from active medical practice and devoted his time to his hobby, photography. He worked for a local studio, but several weeks ago he was advised to take a three or four week vacation.

Jester OK's Big Money Measure

AUSTIN—(AP)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester Tuesday signed into law the \$42,001,460 general departmental appropriation bill, the last major money measure on his desk from the 50th session of the legislature.

Jester signed the record-breaking measure just as it was finally enacted by the legislature, deleting no item.

This disposed of reports he might veto sufficient items to permit the comptroller to certify some of the so-called "single-shot" appropriations bills that were red-tagged by the comptroller in the closing hours of the session.

Harvard Hears Of Military's Needs

PRINCETON, N. J.—(AP)—President Truman Tuesday said universal training is a "military necessity" now when weakness by the United States would raise fears among small nations that it is abandoning "world leadership."

Uncertainty as to the future course of America, the President said, might weaken the resistance of free and independent nations to "the encroachment of totalitarian pressures."

Speaking under the elms before Princeton University's historic Nassau Hall in a ceremony in connection with the institution's bicentennial celebration, Truman, who received an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws, said the United States cannot undertake alone the task of building "a new and orderly world."

Redistricting Failure Is Point In Trial

ABILENE—(AP)—Failure of Texas Legislature to redistrict the state after the 1930 and 1940 federal censuses figured in a whiskey possession trial in Taylor county court which may go before the court of criminal appeals.

The trial concerned George Woods, charged with possession of whiskey for the purpose of sale in a dry area. His attorney moved the case be quashed, contending Woods was being prosecuted under a law which had not been legally enacted.

To Pay Or Not To Pay Is Comptroller Poser

AUSTIN—(AP)—Does Texas still have its Veterans State Service Office, or doesn't it? State officials are not sure.

Gov. Beauford H. Jester signed a bill last week creating a new Veterans Commission. The measure provides for absorption of the state service office when the new law is effective.

The new law was immediately effective when Jester signed it. But the new commission has not been appointed.

Jess Ward Dies In Odessa Hospital

Jess C. Ward, 49, Odessa contractor, and son-in-law of Walter Cowden of Midland, died at 11:40 p. m. Monday in an Odessa hospital of a heart attack suffered at his ranch home three miles south of Odessa earlier Monday night.

PORT ARTHUR—(AP)—The first picket lines reported in the national Maritime Union strike in Texas were ordered here Tuesday when efforts were made to sail the freighter Elihu Root.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Joseph F. Freeman, wartime Washington agent for the Garsson Munitions Combine, collapsed Tuesday and was sent to a hospital "in very bad shape" after testifying at the May-Garsson war fraud trial.

AUCKLAND, NEW ZEALAND—(AP)—A wide area along the thinly populated East coast of New Zealand's North Island was shaken during the night by earth tremors which did minor damage to buildings in several small towns.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman Tuesday nominated James Bruce, Maryland corporation executive, to be ambassador to Argentina, succeeding George Messersmith, who recently resigned.

EL PASO—(AP)—Assassination of acting Mayor Francisco Aguirre of Chihuahua City, Mexico, was reported here Tuesday, and Police Chief Antonio Maese said an investigation is underway.

Call To Action

To the rank and file of modern men the coming of war has seemed as uncontrollable as the coming of a storm or the turn of the tide. There has been good reason for this. The causes of war have been in the hands of rulers, statesmen, and soldiers. All that the rank and file got was war's consequences. The only way they could stop a war was to win or lose it.

Now General Eisenhower has challenged that belief and called upon the citizens of this country to face the challenge. He does not say that their actions can end war. He does say that "where men comprehend the causes of war and understand their mutual responsibility to control them, war may happen—but it will cease to be an institution, a characteristic of human society."

There is nothing visionary about the chief of staff's challenge. He makes his point with a logic that all can understand. "National welfare," he says, "is that is, general security from the four fundamental evils of human existence: fire, famine, pestilence, and war—is the business of each citizen because it is he, ultimately, who suffers or profits. Because he has made it his business, we have attained a remarkable success over fire, famine, and pestilence."

"War, however, is not a natural evil; it is man-made. Combining all the horrors of the other three, its malevolence and diabolic savagery have been increased by man himself in the very years that he has learned control over the natural evils of life."

We have taken a sensible, realistic attitude toward the natural evils, as the general points out. Men know that if they do not control these evils they will destroy them. Yet the mass of citizens of any country sit blinded and immobilized at the approach of the man-made combination of those natural evils, like an animal of the woods caught in an automobile's headlights on a highway at night.

"What, then, does General Eisenhower propose? 'As I see it,' he says, 'we need an organized effort, embracing every phase of society, whose goal will be the development of individual, community, and national attitudes that will remove war from the category of the inevitable into its proper position as an evil subject to prevention, or at least control.'"

That is not a blueprint, but it is a way. The way is tremendously difficult. Even under a government like ours, the influence of the people in such matters is limited.

Yet there is nothing to be gained by a passive, pessimistic view that war is inevitable, or by a senseless insistence that we disarm immediately because war can't possibly come again.

General Eisenhower has issued this nation a challenge to action. He has asked that we use our democracy to its limit in the cause of peace. It is up to us to lead the way. The American people can lose nothing by doing so. They may help to win the highest prize that human society strives for.

Texas Ranks Fifth In Nation's Crime Wave

AUSTIN—(AP)—Texas ranks fifth in the nation's current and largest crime wave of history, FBI special officer, Maurice W. Acers, Monday told law enforcement officers attending training school here.

Acers, who is in charge of the San Antonio FBI field office, expressed concern over the public attitude toward the crime wave. "We find in many places a feeling of unrest, readjustment, a something-for-nothing complex on the part of some and a general feeling of dissatisfaction," he said. "Many persons frankly admit their uncertainty over the future. They are prone to sit back and wait for things to happen with a calloused and toughened attitude, without expecting too much."

He viewed the national behavior pattern as indicating in some respects "a general breakdown of the American home."

"When that happens there is real cause for alarm," he added. "We in the law enforcement profession sincerely hope this war's delinquents will not become the gangsters of tomorrow."

CHINESE CROWD CHEERS JAPANESE EXECUTIONS

SHANGHAI—(AP)—Two minor Japanese war criminals were shot Tuesday at Kiangwan execution grounds after being paraded in a truck for three hours before howling thousands in downtown Shanghai.

Normally, public executions of Japanese war criminals are not announced until the hour of death is at hand. This time, the parade and the executions were advertised days in advance.

Truman Forgets To Pull Up His 'Dress'

PRINCETON, N. J.—(AP)—A smiling President Truman, wearing black robe and gold-tasseled cap, strode into an elm-shaded square opposite Nassau Hall Monday for the closing convocation of Princeton University's bicentennial celebration.

He walked behind former President Herbert Hoover, Stanford University's delegate at the brilliant ceremony at which the President and 35 other notables were called to receive honorary degrees.

The scene was made colorful by the diplomatic uniforms and robes of delegates from many foreign countries.

The President, moving toward the huge improvised platform to receive his 10th honorary degree of Doctor of Laws, caught a foot in his long academic gown, but righted himself.

"Oops," he said to nearby reporters, smiling, "I forgot to pull up my dress."

He took his place on the platform as the band struck up "Hail to the Chief."

One Of Quads Born In Montana Dies Suddenly

MILES CITY, MONT.—(AP)—One and one-half pound Donna Mae Randash, youngest and tiniest of four babies born here Saturday to Mrs. Edward Randash, Baker, Mont., beauty operator, died just before midnight Monday.

The tiny girl had lived 65 hours, had received her first meal Monday from an eyedropper, and had just been named.

Dr. Elma Howard, who delivered the quadruplets, said the other three—two girls and a boy—have an excellent chance to survive.

ANOTHER NAZI BUTCHER GOES ON TRIAL TUESDAY

DASHAU, GERMANY—(AP)—Karl Schoepferle, who commanded one of the establishments at the Mauthausen Concentration Camp, went on trial Tuesday with 11 of his assistants before an American war crimes court.

They were accused of mass murders, beatings and electrocutions. A witness swore Schoepferle gave an order for one starving prisoner to be beaten and thrown against a high tension wire for stealing a crust of bread.

U. S. Says Oil Firms Violate Regulations

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Attorney General Clark said Tuesday a suit charging anti-trust law violations has been filed at Shreveport, La., against the Cotton Valley operators' committee, 15 corporations and 18 individuals engaged in the production of liquid and gaseous products.

Clark said the complaint charges the defendants unlawfully agreed to engage jointly in and to exclude others from the business of extracting, processing and refining hydrocarbon products produced in the Cotton Valley field.

Listed as defendants in addition to the committee included: Hunt Oil Company, Magnolia Petroleum Company, H. L. Hunt, H. L. Hunt as trustee for Hassie Hunt, M. H. Marr and G. H. Vaughn, all of Dallas, Texas; Pohns Oil Company, and Woolly Petroleum Company, both of Houston, Texas, and Bodcaw Cotton Valley Company, Inc., Texarkana, Ark.

RODEO QUEEN WINS IN MURDER TRIAL
LAS VEGAS, N. M.—(AP)—Mrs. Ruth Bibb Rau, 23, former rodeo queen, was free Monday of a charge of manslaughter in the fatal shooting of her husband, Howard Rau, 34, one-time San Angelo, Texas, resident.

She was acquitted by a directed verdict Monday. District judge Luis E. Armijo sustained the defense motion at the end of an hour and a half's testimony by Mrs. Rau, who stoutly maintained the fatal shot was fired during a scuffle over a 38 pistol on Memorial Day, 1946.

MAJOR LEAGUES Fan Mark Likely To Be Broken

By The Associated Press Those who have been predicting Major League baseball attendance never again would approach the altitudinous figures reached last season may be forced to eat their words.

Weather has forced a near record number of postponements but big league attendance is running almost even with last year's record figures, and with the prospect of a neck and neck race right down to the wire in both leagues, a new mark may be set. In 1946, a total of 18,612,704 fans paid to watch Major League baseball.

Including games played last night, the two leagues have drawn a total of 6,798,795 fans, only 101,650 cash customers behind the corresponding period a year ago on games through June 16. However, they have utilized only 355 playing dates as compared to 363 playing dates last year.

A Monday night game Yankee Stadium crowd of 52,633 fans saw their favorites trail for seven innings, then come through with two runs in the eighth and one in the ninth to give the New York Yankees a 4-3 victory over the Chicago White Sox. The triumph increased the Yankees' first place lead in the American League to a game and a half over Detroit and Boston, deadlocked for second place.

With 20,097 looking on in Chicago, the Brooklyn Dodgers, taking advantage of two errors by first baseman Ed Waitkus, scored two unearned runs to eke out a 2-1 decision over the Cubs.

In the only other game played in the Majors, the rejuvenated St. Louis Cardinals eked out a 4-3 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies in St. Louis.

KERMIT—A three weeks term of the 109th District Court opened here Monday, with District Judge G. C. Olsen presiding. The first week is to be devoted to civil cases. The trials of two men, one on an indictment of rape and the other on an attempted rape indictment, are scheduled for this term.

defeat the contract on today's hand, Vernoff did the next thing to trumping his partner's ace, which of course he could not do at no trump.

In response to his heart bid, his partner made the natural heart opening. I presume that many players, without thinking, would put the seven of hearts on North's king, but not Vernoff. He realized that in order to bid two no trump and then three no trump, West had to have at least three hearts to the queen, therefore North's king must be a singleton. So he overtook his partner's king with the ace, even though it established two heart tricks for declarer. Then he shifted to the jack of diamonds.

You can see what happened. Declarer could lead a small heart from dummy and finesse the ten-spot, thus making two heart tricks. But he could only cash eight tricks and he had to cash them right away, because as soon as Vernoff got in, he would continue the diamond.
