Kaiser Says Note To FDR Helped

SEABOARD GETS FREE OIL IN DEEP DAWSON PROSPECTOR

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware No. 6-A Robinson, 12,000-foot wildcat in the shallow Spraberry field in Southeast Dawson County, about 15 miles southeast of Lamesa, has developed some gas, and some free oil, in the Clear Fork-Permian, and is coring ahead.

That prospector ran a drillstem test at 6,457-98 feet, with the tool open for one and one-half hours. An unreported amount of gas showed at the surface in 28 minutes. Recovery was about 500 feet of oil cut in its drilling mud.

Operator was coring ahead and likely will run another drillstem test if more porosity and oil stains are shown in the upcoming cores.

The project is 1,979 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 37, block 34, TP survey, T-5-N.

DEEP REEVES DISCOVERY COMPLETED FLOWING OIL

Reeves County's deep oil discovery, Argo Oil Corporation No. 1 Dora Roberts, 13 miles northeast of Balmorhea, about 25 miles south and slightly east of Pecos, and 1,960 feet from south and east lines of section 294, block 13, H&GN survey, and on which drilling was completed October 9, 1946, has been finished for a 24-hour flowing potential of 71.73 barrels of 43.3 gravity oil from the Wolfcamp, lower Permian at 9,177-10,860 feet, where 6,000 gallons of acid had been injected.

Flowing casing pressure was from 1,400 pounds to 800 pounds. Flowing tubing pressure was from 1,400 pounds to 400 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 650-1.

Top of the Wolfcamp was at 9,775 feet. Base of that formation was at 12,735 feet. The project drilled to total depth of 14,073 feet, and then plugged back to 10,860 feet for completion. Elevation is 2,880 feet.

Drilling on this wildcat started June 30, 1945. Operator has been cleaning and testing on it at intervals since drilling was completed. The potential test was taken on July 23.

Nearest production is 20 miles south in the Chancellor field in West Pecos County. The Fort Stockton field in West-Central Pecos County is 35 miles east of the new producer, and the Monroe field in West Ward County, is about 35 miles to the north.

NW ECTOR WILDCAT FLOWS OIL FROM CLEAR FORK

Phillips Petroleum Company and The Texas Company No. 1 McIntire, Northwest Ector County wildcat, about two miles northwest of the Goldsmith field, has shown for a new discovery from the Clear Fork-Permian, and is due to drill ahead to explore into the Ellenburger.

U. S. Oil Production Increase Chiefly Due To Texas' Hike

TULSA—(AP)—The Oil and Gas journal reported Tuesday crude oil production in the United States averaged 5,094,115 barrels daily during the week ended July 26, an increase of 35,695 barrels over the previous week's output.

Texas accounted for much of the week's gain with an increase of 31,200 barrels to 2,255,250.

Sharp gains were recorded also by Louisiana, which was up 7,600 barrels to 294,450; California, up 3,600 to 921,600; and Wyoming, 3,220 to 117,290. Eastern area increased 2,900 to 65,700. Mississippi gained 1,750 to 96,610. Kansas was up 1,650 to 296,400, and Illinois gained 1,100 to 182,600. Michigan's production declined 14,950 barrels to 42,610, and Oklahoma dropped 3,350 to 384,750.

Posed As Hughes' Son 'To Have Big Time'

CHICAGO—(AP)—A high school youth who posed as "Howard Hughes, Jr.," and ran up a \$166 hotel and automobile bill before his true identity was discovered, told police "I just wanted a big time."

Policeman Herbert Kilacky, juvenile officer, who identified the youth as Glen Cordes, 15, said the boy's father, Gilbert Cordes, a carpenter, paid the bills for the weekend party.

Kilacky said they included rental of a \$40 a day penthouse suite in a Michigan Avenue hotel; steak dinners and champagne for young Cordes and two friends and rental of a limousine. He said the youth had told the hotel manager, Howard Hughes, millionaire airplane builder and movie producer, would arrive at the hotel Monday night from California.

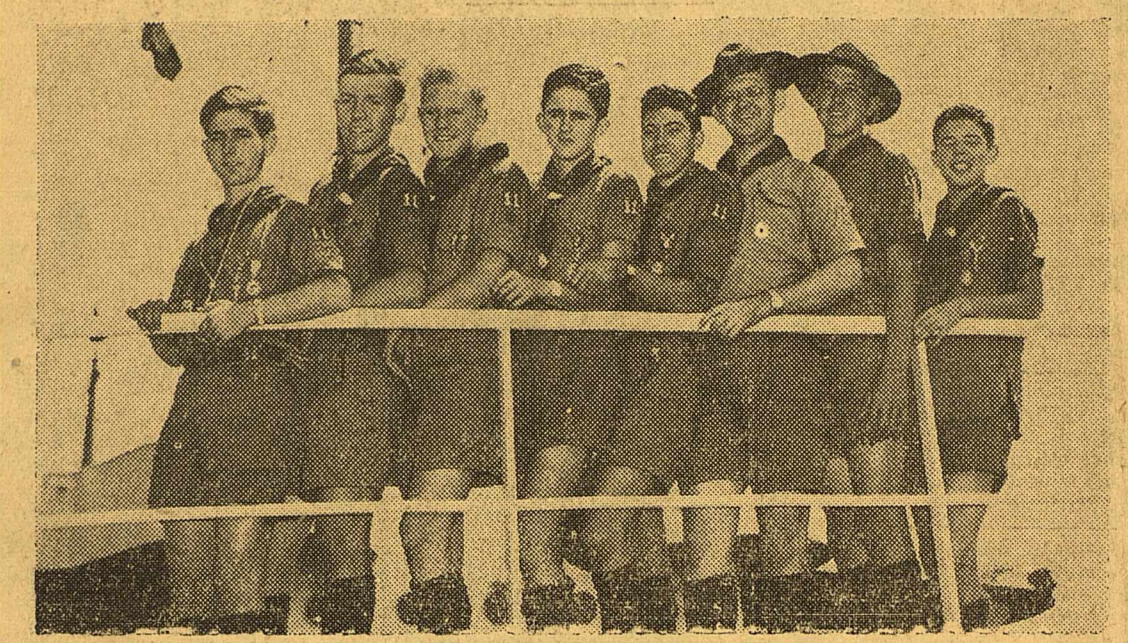
JESTER CALLS DEPARTMENT HEADS FOR CONFERENCE

Death Toll From Ship Explosion In Brest Rises To 15; 422 Are Injured

BREST, FRANCE—(AP)—Officials reported 15 dead and at least 422 injured in this port Tuesday from the explosion and fire which wrecked the ammonium nitrate-laden Norwegian freighter Ocean Liberty Monday.

Four of the injured died this morning, the French Ministry of Marine said. Badly injured and hospitalized at nearby Landerneau were 46 others, five of whom doctors termed critical.

Hundreds more were severely shaken when the nitrate went off with a shattering blast which smashed in building fronts along the sea front, set off an explosion in the city's gas system, fired a gasoline storage tank and demolished lines of communication.

The crew of the Ocean Liberty had been taken off before the vessel's cargo exploded, but her captain was reported fatally injured when struck by a flying piece of metal while standing on shore.

Fires started by the blast still were burning Tuesday. Much of Brest had been destroyed by aerial bombardments during the war and many of the buildings in the business district consisted of pre-fabricated one-story wooden structures which went up like matchboxes.

Commissioners Boost Salaries Of County Officials, Deputies

Midland County commissioners Monday boosted salaries of county officials 25 per cent, gave deputies a boost of \$50 per month, and minor deputies a raise of \$43.75.

These raises, County Judge Clifford C. Keith explained, were authorized by House Bill No. 75, which gives commissioners courts in counties of less than 20,000 population authority to set an increase in salaries. The 1940 census listed the county's population at less than 20,000.

Salaries of county officials now are \$4,500 per year; deputies \$3,000, and sub-deputies \$2,400. Prior to the raise, they received \$3,750, \$2,250, and \$1,875 yearly, respectively.

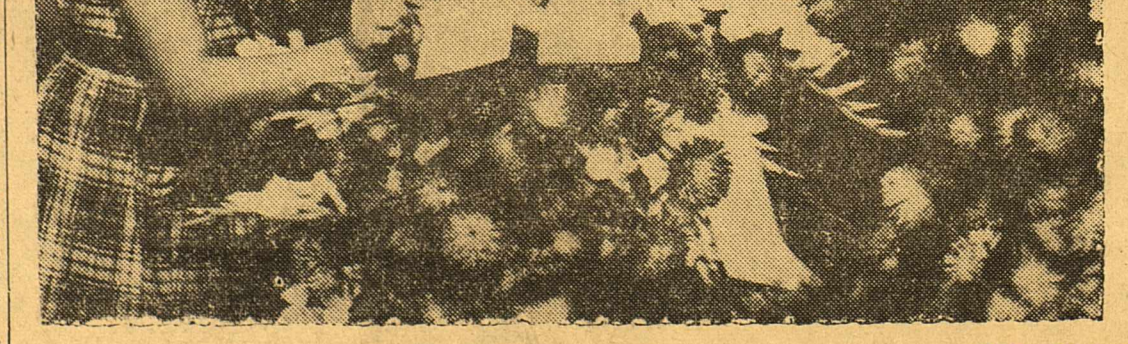
The commissioners discussed, but took no final action on, the county budget for 1948. They also accepted a bid from the Tri-State Equipment Company for a caterpillar road grader.

The increase in county salaries, Judge Keith said, was effected as a long-overdue compensation for rises in living costs and general salary scales which have made it difficult to obtain competent office help in the courthouse. For example, he said, salaries of deputies until now have been limited to \$187.50, and that of minor deputies to \$156.25 per month.

Texan And Pal Hanged For Murder In Kansas

LANSING, KAN.—(AP)—Two former carnival workers were hanged Tuesday at the Kansas State Prison at 12:01 a. m.

The two men, Cecil Tate, 22, of Jacksonville, Texas, and George Guntow, 21, were executed for the slaying of W. W. McClellan, 60-year-old grain elevator operator, and his son, Arnold, 36, at Calista, Kan., May 12, during a robbery which netted only \$4.50.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Henry J. Kaiser testified Tuesday he sent a brief note to the late President Roosevelt and got a wartime contract to build small-aircraft carriers after top Navy officials previously had rejected his offer.

British Hang Jews In Spite Of New Threat

JERUSALEM—(AP)—The British hanged three Jews Tuesday in defiance of a Jewish underground threat to retaliate with the execution of two British hostages and "bathe the Holy Land with blood."

A British military announcement said Meir Nakar, Yaacob Weiss and Absalom Habib were put to death between 4 and 5 a. m. in Acre Prison on Palestine's North coast for their part in the May 4 break there, in which 251 prisoners were freed and 16 persons were killed.

A Jewish underground source said Jaqun Zvi Lenni, to whom the three belonged had tried British Sgt. Clifford Martin and Mervin Paice and condemned them to death for being members of a force "illegally occupying Palestine" and "conspiring to oppress the rightful citizens of Palestine." The sergeants were kidnapped July 12 at Natanya.

Water Torture Is Described

NEW YORK—(AP)—The water torture of an American Army private by Japanese prison guards was described last Monday by a witness at the Navy court martial trial of Chief Signaller Harold E. Hirschberg, 29, accused of maltreating fellow American war prisoners in the Philippines.

One of the specifications against Hirschberg accused him of informing the Japanese guards of an escape attempt of the American private, George Garrett of Waco, Texas, leading to Garrett's subsequent torture and death.

Charles Lester Pruitt, 26, Chief Carpenter's Mate, testified he was a prisoner in March, 1944.

"One day," he said, "I was going with a Japanese guard after nails when I saw that a Jap had Garrett out of guard house and was practicing judo on him."

"Another Jap guard who was watering the lawn with a hose nearby came over to Garrett, apparently with the intention of restraining him. But he rammed the hose down Garrett's mouth and jumped on his stomach as though he were trying to pump the water out of him again."

Navy Lt. Theodore Ietz, 33, of Portland, Me., who was a Chief Yeoman at the time of his detention by the Japs and was outranked by Hirschberg, testified the defendant once had reported him to the guards.

Like some of the other witnesses, Ietz testified under cross-examination Hirschberg sometimes shared cigarettes with fellow prisoners who were subject to his orders and would intervene with the guards to get better treatment for his work details.

Federal Spending To Be Just About Truman's Prediction; Revenue Up

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Administration budget experts said Tuesday that despite congressional cuts, federal spending this fiscal year will run fairly close to the \$75,000,000,000 estimate outlined by President Truman last January.

They said the main reason for this is Congress voted a number of appropriations—chiefly for foreign aid—which were not figured in when Truman drafted his budget estimates.

Emphasizing they have no desire to get caught in the middle of an argument, the men who keep track of such things for the Administration said their rough guesses in the amount of the congressional savings run in the neighborhood of \$1,600,000,000.

On the bright side of the confusing budget picture is the virtual certainty revenue collections—if they continue at their current rate—will far exceed the \$59,700,000,000 predicted by Truman.

A scheduled mid-August budget revision may jump that figure by \$2,500,000,000 or more, officials said.

Such a development would indicate a budget surplus of between \$4,000,000,000 and \$5,000,000,000 on June 30, 1948.

LIVESTOCK SHIPMENTS AND COTTON CONSUMPTION DOWN

AUSTIN—(AP)—Texas livestock shipments in June dropped below those for May, and cotton consumption for the month also fell off, the Bureau of Business Research said Tuesday.

Livestock shipments sagged 19 per cent from May to June. June shipments totaled 10,083 carloads for an eight per cent gain over June, 1946, loadings.

Cotton consumption in June was six per cent below May levels, after taking a 24 per cent April-to-May fall.

Consumption plunged 29 per cent lower than in June last year, dipping to a June total of 11,696 bales.

Permit Issued For \$100,000 Building In Downtown Midland

A permit for the construction of a two-story brick, tile and steel office building at 117 North Colorado Street, adjacent to Barrow Furniture Company, was issued Monday afternoon to Jack Wilkinson, I. N. Wilkinson, and E. T. Foster. The new structure, which will house oil company offices, will be known as the Wilkinson-Foster Building. The permit was for \$100,000. The second floor of the structure has been leased to the Union Oil Company of California.

The foundation will be sufficient for a six-story structure, and additional floors may be added before the building is completed, Wilkinson said. The building will be 50 by 130 feet.

David L. Harmon has the construction contract and work was scheduled to get underway Tuesday. It is to be completed within six months. J. J. Black of Midland is the architect.

The new building will be completely modern in every respect, and will be cooled by the latest-type refrigerated air system. The front exterior will be of ornamental iron and marble facing.

It ran a one and one-half hour drillstem test at 6,125-6,200 feet. Gas showed at the surface in four and one-half minutes.

Drilling mud came to the top of the drill pipe in 12 minutes. Oil started flowing at the top in 20 minutes. In 60 minutes of flowing to tanks the section produced 27 barrels of pipe line oil. Gas volume was estimated at about 2,500,000 cubic feet per day.

Operators were coring ahead and will continue testing through the Clear Fork, as long as saturation is logged.

It is understood that No. 1 McIntire is about flat, geologically, with the Clear Fork producers in both the Andector and in the Goldsmith fields. Some observers think that all the area between the two fields might produce from the Clear Fork section—only drilling will determine the correctness of those surmises.

SINCLAIR-ATLANTIC START TESTS AT CROCKETT PROJECT
Sinclair Prairie Oil Company and The Atlantic Refining Company No. 1-66 University, Northeast Crockett County discovery for flowing production from the Ellenburger lime about eight miles northeast of the Todd Deep field, and 1,980 feet from north and east lines of section 30, block 46, University survey, was preparing to test on section 7,530-75 feet, though 270 perforations in the 7-inch casing, which had been cemented at 7,666 feet, over total depth reached of 7,860 feet.

The test was through a five-eighth inch bottom hole choke. Sweet gas showed at the surface in three minutes. Oil flowed at the top in 29 minutes. It was flowed to pits to clean for 18 minutes, and then flowed to tanks at the rate of 41.7 barrels of pipe line oil per hour. Gas-oil ratio was 974-1.

Corrected gravity was 40.4 degrees. The drill pipe unloaded oil for 30 minutes after the tester was closed, and before operator started pulling the tool. Final recovery was 660 feet of oil.

Flowing pressure during the test was from 900 pounds to 1,400 pounds. Shutin pressure was 3,125 pounds.

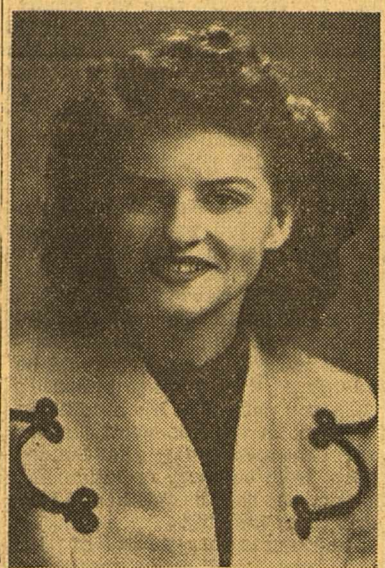

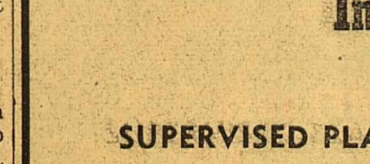

Whose Opinions?

After an interval of comparative silence, Henry A. Wallace delivered his latest opinion of the Marshall plan the other day. He delivered it to a reporter of the official Yugoslav news agency in New York, but the news story appeared under a Belgrade dateline. This was not inappropriate, since Wallace's current estimate of the Marshall plan sounds much like other opinions of it originating in Belgrade and points east.

We seem to recall that the former vice president favored the plan when it first was proposed. But that, perhaps by coincidence, was before Russia decided to stay out. Now he tells the Yugoslav press, as the Moscow propagandists have told the world, that he believes "the Marshall plan delayed an economic depression in the United States."

Wallace also said that he was against the Marshall plan if "it divided the world in two parts" and "if the primary aim is to revive Germany for the purpose of waging a struggle against Russia." Pravda couldn't have put any better.

It may be wondered whether Wallace would give credit for helping to divide the world in two parts to the Soviet walking out of the Paris conference. Perhaps he thinks that the Russian foreign minister was enticed to Paris as part of a new imperialistic plot against the Soviet Union, and that he just managed to escape before the trap was sprung.

Wallace's thinking may appear to waver and vary, but it does seem to cling to one constant, concrete line of thought. That is his apparent obsession with the idea that Roosevelt is gone and Wallace himself is out of the government, there is no one left in Washington capable of handling things.

One can only gather from his speeches that he thinks the high places of our government are filled by men who are not only incompetent but actually vicious.

He may contemplate Russian policy with all the reverence of a Communist Party card holder, if he chooses. But when he accuses Truman of courting war through aid to Greece and Turkey, when by indirection he accuses the Marshall plan of being a prelude to conflict, that is something else.

Those insulting indictments are wholly unwarranted, and when he makes them, we believe that Wallace forfeits his claim to speak for the "common man." The Truman doctrine and the Marshall plan may not be perfect, but their authors may be fallible. But to accuse those authors of deliberate warmongering is simply to parrot the ridiculous output of Soviet propaganda.

Wallace has appointed himself the sole guardian of the New Deal heritage and of Roosevelt liberalism. He has clothed himself in brilliant trappings and attracted a considerable following. He has given the impression that Roosevelt, were he alive today, would feel about Russia exactly as Wallace does. That is obviously a personal opinion and nothing more.

By his present line of talk Wallace is not aiding the cause of peace. He is injuring it by creating the fiction that he is the spokesman for a large block of American opinion.

Wallace is entitled to his own obsessions and opinions, but he has the right to express them. But it would seem that the time has now come when his admirers have the right to question whether those obsessions and opinions are his own, or whether they are patterned after some which are only un-American, but anti-American.

Dr. G. V. Brindley, Sr., of Temple, chairman of the reorganization committee of the Texas State Medical Association, recommended the reorganization of the district, pointing out that a large membership did not necessarily mean the most successful association.

The reorganization meeting was

preceded by a barbecue at the city park given for the visiting doctors by the Board of City Development, and an address by Dr. B. E. Pickett of Carrizo Springs, president of the Texas State Medical Association.

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Dr. Newton Again Loses Appeal For Clemency

AUSTIN—(P)—Dr. W. R. Newton of Cameron has apparently lost his last-ditch appeal for further clemency in his assault to murder conviction.

By a vote of two to one, the state Board of Pardons and Paroles Monday refused to extend his 30-day emergency reprieve for 60 days. Convicted of assault to murder on the late Dr. Roy Hunt of Littlefield, Dr. Newton's case was finally affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals. Then Gov. Beauford H. Jester granted him a 30-day emergency reprieve July 1 on the grounds if the doctor went immediately to the penitentiary, the lives of some of his patients would be jeopardized.

After that, Dr. Newton asked the board for a full pardon, and his plea was rejected by a two to one vote after a week of hearings. Monday Dr. Newton came before the board again. He said the life of his mother-in-law, Mrs. S. Turner Nichols of Clarendon, would be endangered if he went to prison.

She is a patient at his hospital in Cameron. He told the board she was near death Saturday and Sunday nights from coronary occlusion. Dr. Newton also said he still has 15 surgical cases pending.

Chairman Abner Lewis of the board moved a 60-day extension of reprieve be recommended by the board, but members R. A. (Smoot) Schmid and Walter Strong said they did not think there should be further clemency.

Board members and Dr. Newton agreed the effect of the decision was he would have to report to the penitentiary before midnight Wednesday.

Dr. Ross Trial Is Postponed To September 9

NEW BRAUNFELS.—(AP)—Defense attorneys for Dr. Lloyd I. Ross, charged with the murder of four persons killed in an ambush May 25, will rely on an insanity plea when the trial is resumed Sept. 9, they indicated Monday in winning a delay.

The trial opened here in 22nd district court before Judge J. R. Fuchs.

He granted postponement when defense attorneys said they needed more time to get statements and witnesses to prove his claim the handsome 42-year-old San Antonio doctor "was and is insane."

The state, headed by District Attorney J. Lee Dittert, won its first request when it asked Judge Fuchs to suppress written statements from two doctors in Kentucky and Maryland. Dittert said they were taken by a notary public. Judge Fuchs ruled in the state's favor, but during the afternoon session, this point was one which helped give the defense its first round victory.

Delay Necessary. Fred Blundell, heading the attorneys for Dr. Ross, said the statements were important, and a delay was necessary to obtain them in a proper manner.

Blundell also said eight of the defense witnesses were currently unable to appear. These witnesses and statements, plus others, will attest that Dr. Ross recently had undergone a radical "change in personality", and was insane at the time of the tragedy, and was insane now, Blundell said.

Numerous psychiatrists have visited and checked the doctor in his third-floor cell, where he has been since his arrest May 25.

A different hand is played at each table, and when the hands are completed, they are inter-

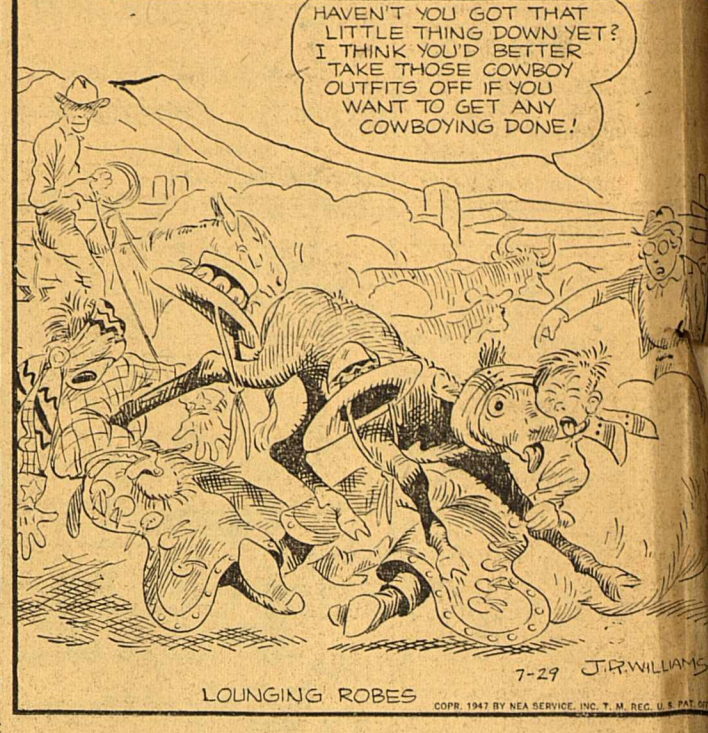

Joe Hatten, the stylish southpaw of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who has beaten Chicago six times without a setback this season, needs only three more triumphs over the Cubs to tie the record for most victories over a club in one year.

The record of nine is held by Ed Reulbach of the 1906 Cubs whose victims, strangely enough, were the Dodgers.
Hatten pitched a three-hit 4-0 shutout over his "cousins" Monday to extend the Dodgers' winning streak to 10 straight, not counting the protested 3-2 "victory" over the St. Louis Cardinals July 20. It is the longest winning streak of the season in the National League.

The win enabled the Dodgers to maintain their seven game lead over the runner-up St. Louis Cardinals who staged one of their customary fast finishes to nip the Boston Braves 9-7. The Braves dropped to nine games behind the Dodgers and one percentage point behind the third place New York Giants who lost to Cincinnati, 5-0, American League.

In the only two American League games, the New York Yankees increased their first place margin over the idle Boston Red Sox to 10 games by defeating the Detroit Tigers 5-1 and the Philadelphia Athletics won over the Chicago White Sox 5-3.
