6,000-FOOT WILDCAT TO BE DRILLED IN NORTH PECOS

Drilling is to start at once on a 6,000-foot wildcat to explore the Ellenburger in North Pecos County, seven miles northwest of Girvin. The prospector will be Neville G. Penrose of Fort Worth, and McDaniell & Beecher Drilling Company of Dallas No. 1 Cordova Union. Location is 660 feet north of the south line and 660 feet southeast of the northwest line of the north 110 acres of section 91, block 119 H&G.

McDaniel & Beecher will drill the hole, using rotary. The exploration is being drilled as a result of a deal worked out by R. M. (Bob) Payne of Midland. He turned it to Penrose and McDaniell & Beecher to drill the wildcat.

FOREST TAKES 9,000-ACRE BLOCK IN EAST PECOS

Forest Oil Corporation has taken a 10-year commercial lease on a block of approximately 9,000 acres in East Pecos County, which sets out about three miles north of Sheffield, and approximately seven miles southwest of the discovery well of the Owens-Wolfcamp field in West Crockett County. Fee owners of the land covered by the Forest spread include the H. C. Noelke estate, Jacqueline Noelke Thigpin, Will Monroe and Mrs. Mollie Monroe. No information has been released regarding bonuses paid, or annual rentals called for in the lease contracts. It has been learned that the deal did not call for the drilling of a well.

PLYMOUTH TO DIG DEEP TEST IN WEST CROCKETT

The Plymouth Oil Company will dig a 7,000-foot wildcat to test to the Ellenburger in the shallow Oilson field in West Crockett County. It will be the concern's No. 1-A-O. A. C. Hoover. The location is 2,011 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 11, block GG, and adjacent to producers from the San Andres at around 2,150 feet. That puts it two miles north of the Cities Service Oil Company, Plymouth and Humble No. 1-B Owens, discovery well for flowing production from the Wolfcamp, to open the Owens field.

Should No. 1-A-O Hoover develop commercial production from the lower Permian in the same zone which is making petroleum in No. 1-B Owens, at between 5,500-5,700 feet, it likely will be completed there. If it does not pay off in that formation it will be carried on down to around 7,000 feet to explore into the Ellenburger.

BARNSDALL TO DEEPEN S-C HALE WILDCAT

Barnsdall Oil Company No. 1 Camp, South-Central Hale County wildcat, four miles west and three-eighths of a mile south of the initial producer from the Cisco-Pennsylvanian, in the Petersburg field, and 1,890 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of northwest quarter of section 13, block D-8, EL survey, had drilled to 7,533 feet in lime and shale, and was running a Schlumberger survey. Original contract depth on this exploration was 7,500 feet. So far it has not encountered any shows of oil or gas, and has not reached the Cisco lime.

OIL SCOUTS BARBECUE SET FOR 6:30 P. M. SATURDAY

Officials of the Midland Oil Scouts Association said Friday that all arrangements were completed for the West Texas Oilmen's Barbecue at Cloverdale Park in Midland, to be held Saturday starting at 6:30 p. m. Plenty of beef, and all the accessories for a successful affair, had been secured and the association has extended an invitation to all persons in West Texas, who are employed in the oil industry, to attend, and bring their families. The scout association is sponsoring the barbecue, and providing the personnel to stage it. A large number of concerns in the oil business have contributed to the expense of the party.

NE CROCKETT DISCOVERY COMPLETED NATURAL

Sinclair Prairie Oil Company and The Atlantic Refining Company No. 1-66 University, Northwest Crockett County Ellenburger discovery, 1,980 feet from north and east lines of section 30, block 46, University survey, and eight miles northeast of the Todd-Deep field, has been officially completed for a 24-hour potential of 1,320 barrels of 45-gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 2,650-1. B-29s Make Longest And Fastest Flight

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Seven B-29 Superfortresses with 160 persons aboard flew over downtown Washington at noon Friday and landed at nearby Andrews Field—the finish of a one-stop 7,000-mile flight from Tokyo. The planes had spent 31 hours 24 minutes in the air.

The arrival was timed with slide rule precision, the big bombers having made a rendezvous at 9:32 a. m. (GST) over Martinsburg, W. Va., with 23 P-80 Shooting Star jet fighters which escorted them on the final leg to Washington.

Air Force officials described the trip as the "longest and fastest mass flight of bombers ever attempted."

The flight was one of the major features of a world-wide observance of the 40th anniversary of the Air Force, which a week ago was accorded equal status with the Ground and Naval Forces by enactment of the military unification law.

Eight Superforts took off from Tokyo at 12:09 a. m. Thursday. One dropped out after a three-hour stop at Elmendorf Field, Anchorage, Alaska, for refueling.

Taft, Cincinnati lawyer, declared Thursday night at an international convention of the Disciples of Christ Christianity should gear its attempts to win new converts to the economics of a modern world.

Elliott OK'd It

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Maj. Gen. Oliver P. Echols testified Friday Elliott Roosevelt picked a Howard Hughes' plane as the best available for wartime photo-reconnaissance work after the Air Force high command turned it down in 1943. Echols, wartime chief of the Air Corps material command, told the Senate War Investigating Committee the son of the late President Roosevelt in effect reversed the decision of the Air Corps' best experts.

The general agreed if the plane could do a claimed 485 miles an hour it then would have been the Air Corps' fastest plane of the type. Chairman Ferguson (R-Mich) commented the committee has been unable to find any Air Corps records dealing with the experimental plane between July, 1942, and the end of June, 1943. Echols said there probably were none because Hughes was conducting his own development.

More Blood Flowing In Holy Land Fight

JERUSALEM—(AP)—A British regimental headquarters here was attacked Friday with grenades and mortars and one attacker was killed, while in Tel Aviv several Jews were reported wounded by gunfire from a British armored car which created

panic among a funeral procession of 5,000 Jews. Five grenade and mortar explosions heralded an attack on headquarters of the Hampshire Regiment, only 200 yards from the Jewish Agency.

In Tel Aviv, private sources said three bursts of gunfire from an armored car manned by policemen wounded several persons in the funeral procession for five Jewish victims of reprisal shootings Thursday night. A score of Jews were wounded in Thursday night's shootings, which a reliable source attributed to Tommies bent on revenge for the hanging by Irgun Zvai Leumi, Jewish underground organization, of two British sergeants at Natanya.

As the funeral procession, led by the chief rabbi and the city councilors, approached the great synagogue, an armored car manned by British police moved toward it, its Bren guns manned and swinging in arcs. The informants said shots came from the car as it withdrew.

Senator Bricker Guarded By Police

COLUMBUS, O.—(AP)—Police disclosed Friday Senator John W. Bricker (R-Ohio) received two threatening telephone calls Thursday and as a result extraordinary precautions were taken to guard him at the Republican rally here that night.

One of the telephone calls, which police said they believed were made by "cranks," was made to the Bricker home in suburban Upper Arlington a few hours before the senator was to take part in a state-wide dinner honoring Senator Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio). The call was taken by the senator's mother-in-law, Mrs. Maud A. Day, who reported the caller said: "This time we're going to get him."

Three weeks ago Senator Bricker was fired upon in Washington by a former Capitol policeman. The other telephone call was made to Bricker's law office in the downtown Leveque-Lincoln Towers office building.

Merchandise Jubilee Interest Determined By Midland C Of C

To determine whether retail business firms are interested in the staging of a "Midland Merchandise Jubilee," August 25-30, the Chamber of Commerce has mailed questionnaires to member-merchants asking their opinions of the suggested merchandising event and to what extent they will cooperate.

The proposed event will be staged under the sponsorship of the Retail Development Committee of the Midland Chamber of Commerce, of which Harry Murray is general chairman. H. Winston Hull is chairman of the Merchandise Jubilee Committee.

The program is designed to advance Midland's position as the shopping center of the Permian Basin area. Advance work and planning will be started immediately if the majority of the merchants favor the proposal. The questionnaire asks merchants if they will close shop windows a few days prior to the opening of the jubilee; have windows dressed especially for grand opening; include mention of program in advertising; offer special price inducements; attempt to have special items of merchandise available; assist with the expense of the program; serve on special committees; favor street decorations.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Reports that Howard Hughes will ask the Justice Department to investigate the "relationship of Senator Owen Brewster (R-Me) and Pan-American Airways" brought from Brewster Friday an invitation for Hughes to "discuss this matter under oath."

Russia Is Still Mad

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—Russia Friday charged a United States offer to mediate the undeclared war in Indonesia was a "means of circumventing" the United Nations and demanded the Security Council itself take "binding" action.

The surprise Soviet move seriously complicated the mediation plan which already had been accepted by The Netherlands government.

Soviet Delegate Andrei A. Gromyko agreed with the United States the council should act immediately to order a cessation of hostilities, but he urged the council to go slow on the question of mediation.

Although not stating definitely that he would oppose mediation, Gromyko raised strong objections, including his charge the move would give the Dutch an advantage over the Indonesians because they could start the negotiations from their present military positions. He charged The Netherlands government with a clear "breach of peace" and said the Security Council would be "shirking" its obligations if it failed to take a binding decision.

Col. John Perkins Is Named City Attorney

The appointment of Col. John Perkins as Midland city attorney at a salary of \$250 a month was announced Friday by Mayor Rusty Gifford.

Col. Perkins will handle the city's legal affairs and will represent it in all court cases. City councilmen agreed at a recent meeting to offer the position to Perkins.

Midland has not had an official city attorney in a number of years, although William Neely has represented the city recently in its negotiations with the government for the return of Midland Army Air Field. Perkins' appointment is effective immediately.

TEXAS EMPLOYMENT TO RISE IN AUGUST

AUSTIN—(AP)—A further moderate rise in employment in Texas' 18 major labor market areas was seen for August Friday by the State Employment Commission.

It reported the labor market was at a high level of 1,252,081 workers, with construction employment at its peak. The TEC reported 132,444 workers on construction payrolls.

Tropical Storm In Brownsville

The first reported tropical disturbance of the current hurricane season is expected to strike in the Brownsville area Friday.

The storm is not severe, but covers about a 150-mile area and is expected to bring rains and winds of between 35 and 40 miles an hour. The barometer was dropped at Brownsville Friday morning, and a stiff rain was falling.

The storm first was expected to move inland near Tampico, later curved north and seemed headed for the Sota La Marina area between there and the border. But it curved again early Friday, and is moving toward the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Elsewhere in Texas the weather was hot and dry. Warmest was Bridgeport with 110 degrees. Coolest Friday morning was 61 at Dalhart and Muleshoe. Gainesville reported 107 Thursday, Wichita Falls 105.

ELECTRA EXPLOSION LEAVES GAPING HOLE
ELECTRA—(AP)—A gaping crater measuring 40 by 100 feet Friday bore evidence of an explosion that demolished the Texas Torpedo Company, 10 miles north of here. The explosion, occurring Thursday night, was heard for miles around.

Paul Rapp, owner of the plant, said damage was approximately \$6,000 to \$10,000. Cause of the explosion was not immediately determined. No one was hurt. He said the plant would be rebuilt.

Complex Society And Government Cost More Money

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The more complex our society and government, says Rep. John E. Lyle of Corpus Christi, the more money will have to come out of the taxpayer's pocket.

He dug up these figures after considerable research:

The state-local government expenditures in 1940 amounted to \$9,200,000,000 (billion) as compared with \$1,100,000,000 in 1903, an increase of 736 per cent.

Growth in expenditure of states during the same period was greater than that of local units.

In 1940 local governments spent \$5,600,000,000, a 522 per cent increase over the 1903 figure of \$900,000,000 (million), while state expenditures jumped from \$200,000,000 to \$3,600,000,000 (billion), an increase of 1,700 per cent.

In 1919 state-local tax collections of \$3,000,000,000 (billion) constituted 4.6 per cent of the total national income. In 1940, state-local tax collections of \$8,500,000,000 was 11 per cent of the national income.

Speaking of state-local taxes, Lyle said:

It is an actual fact that in terms of tax collections, it was larger than the more highly publicized federal government for each of the 20 years preceding the war, and in terms of expenditures it was more than the federal government for each of those years except the depression period between 1935 and 1936.

Current expenditures for education by states and localities are double expenditures in 1900. Local governments throughout the United States today employ approximately 2,500,000 persons—650,000 more than are hired by Uncle Sam now and nearly three times the pre-war number of federal employees. More than one-half of the present civilian employees of the federal government are working for the military services and the Veterans Administration.

Chinese College Head Pleads For Asia Aid

COPENHAGEN, DENMARK—(AP)—Dr. Henry Lin, president of Shanghai University, appealed to the world Friday on behalf of 500,000 Baptists in East Asia to "give us a Marshall plan."

The Marshall proposal was for U. S. assistance to European countries willing to help themselves, but it still must be approved and financed by the U. S. Congress.

Lin spoke before the Baptist World Alliance's Seventh Congress. He said he observed conditions in Western Europe while en route to Copenhagen and was convinced the Marshall proposal was needed urgently.

"Conditions in East Asia show a desperate need of initiative," he declared.

He was applauded when he invited the eighth congress of the Baptist Alliance to China in 1952.



Water Rationing Program

Full cooperation of all Midland residents in the city's volunteer water rationing program is necessary if Midland is to cope successfully with a critical water situation.

The City Council has requested citizens not to water lawns or gardens on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays for the next 60 days, and it is hoped that under this arrangement the acute situation, brought about by an inadequate distribution system, can be met for the time being. Citizens also have been asked to refrain from all-night watering of lawns and gardens.

The situation is more critical than many persons realize, and could be desperate in case of a big fire. A water reserve cannot be built up with the present heavy demand for water. As a result the city's overhead storage tanks recently have been empty most of the time. The water has been used as fast as it could be pumped into the city and has not had a chance to enter the storage tanks.

The rationing program is the only way to build a reserve, and that cannot be successful unless citizens cooperate. Every homeowner and every householder should abide by the city's request in this emergency.

The permanent solution to the problem is the bringing of additional water into the city and a project is provided for this in the proposed bond issue for civic needs and improvements. Yet, it will take months to complete such a project. The only solution at the moment is water rationing—and that program at present is on a voluntary basis.

Let's give full cooperation in this emergency.

The Republican New Deal

Republican political leaders probably would be the last to admit it, but the record of the congressional session just ended shows the GOP has a New Deal all its own.

The Democratic New Deal which died with Roosevelt developed some very specific objectives. In simplest terms they were to raise the standard of living for the one-third of the population supposed to be ill-paid, ill-fed and ill-housed. All this came to be identified as a "pro-labor" program, though it was more than that. It was a social welfare program for all low-income groups.

When the voters in 1946 kicked out the liberal majorities in Congress, the conservatives of both parties took it as a mandate to substitute a social reform program of their own making.

This program has not yet been carried out in full. It will take another session of Congress to do that. But its broad outlines emerged in the 1947 Congress. It does not quite repeal the Democratic New Deal, but it changes it beyond recognition.

These seem to be its main points:

The Social Security system has been frozen as is until 1950, both as to deductions and benefits. The law called for its expansion.

For the unorganized poor the Republicans propose a health program to be financed by federal tax money grants-in-aid to the states. Local health offices would then have the responsibility of paying hospital and doctor bills for people who could not afford to pay their own.

This same procedure of giving authority to the states is proposed in the Republican aid to education program. What this trend implies is that the Republican Party is becoming the champion of states' rights.

While Republican Senator Taft, in collaboration with Democratic Senators Wagner and Ellender, is sponsoring a long-range federal housing program, the rank-and-file of the conservative congressmen have shown no inclination to go along. As matters stand now, there is ample evidence that a majority in Congress would favor liquidation of all federal housing activities, returning the problem to private industry and local governments.

Passage of the Wolcott bill, easing government controls on rents and housing, was a definite move to aid landlords and the building industry.

Nothing For The Scrapbook

Senora Peron, wife of the Argentine president, changed her mind and crossed England off the itinerary of her European junket. Probably just as well. With Britain's new cut in newsprint, the photogenic Eva would have missed out on all that expensive photographic coverage to which her semi-triumphal tour must have accustomed her.

The New Policy For Germany

The new American occupation policy for Western Germany is clearly an attempt to fit an important missing piece into the pattern of the Marshall plan. It is not a policy to be achieved quickly, and its success is not a foregone conclusion. But it is unlikely that the long-range recovery program, of which the Marshall plan is a start, could work at all without it.

The old policy injured victors and victims, in an economic sense, as well as vanquished. An industrially productive Germany, hedged by safeguards which the new policy provides, should certainly help to rebuild Europe without letting Germany forget her past sins or prepare for future ones.

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware No. 6-A Robinson, deep wildcat adjacent to the Spraberry shallow field in Southeast Dawson County, and 1,979 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 37, block 34, TP survey, T-5-N, was coring below 6,659 feet in lower Permian lime.

This prospector has shown possibilities of commercial production from the Tubb sandy lime between 6,457 feet and 6,815 feet. Drillstem tests through that section developed considerable oil, which was cut with varying amounts of drilling mud.

No water has yet been encountered in the horizon.
