

"Friday," the Vicercy declared in a farewell address before the Pakistan constituent assembly, "two new soverign states will take their place in the commonwealth; not young nations but heirs of an old and proud civilization; full independent states whose leaders are statesmen already known and respected throughout the world; x x x not immature governments, or weak, but fit to carry on their great share of responsibility for peace and progress in the world.'

The extent of that concession can be seen from the

*fact that nationalization of steel was one of the major items in the platform on which Socialism came to power in the general election two years ago. So important and controversial is the issue that Attlee took his decision before a private abor (Socialist) party caucus. He received approval by a margin of only four votes-81 to 77-while it is said that more than 100 members abstained from voting.

This mixed attitude of the caucus makes it clear that the question of steel nationalization is far from settled, and that there is a sizeable crack in Socialist solidarity. The left-wingers of the party are dead set against any compromise on nationalization.

Fierce Opposition What the Socialists wanted (at least moderate Socialists) was merely nationalization of basic steel production. However, they promptly ran up against the proposition that nationalization in numerous instances involved not only the making of steel but the finished product manufactured from the steel. For instance, the newly made metal was kept hot while it was processed into, say bicycles.

Furthermore, they have encountered fierce opposition from big business.

So rather than interfere with the smooth flow of production in the midst of an economic crisis, the government has deferred action regarding steel. The caucus was told that there was no intention of abandoning the promise to nationalize the industry, but that the cabinet should be free to choose a time which it considered opportune. Two years have passed since the horror of the atomic bomb ended the horror of the second world war. But talk of war remains because the seed of war remains. The struggle of the free man against the omnipotent state is only interrupted, not finished. There is no peace in sight until that struggle is ended, not by another conflict but by compromise and agreement.

It is clear now that the Soviet Union and the Western Allies were not united in a common cause. The war only partially obscured this true state of affairs. But then the mysterious Soviets were not only so indispensable to victory but so easily offended that one scarcely dared even think such a thought.

Now, however, relations between the United States and Russia and her satellites are of undisguised unfriendliness, if not hostility.

Because of this unfriendliness there is no sign, after two years, of any peace treaties with the major belligerents of World War II.

Because of this unfriendliness the United Nations, as noble and necessary in theory today as on the day of its creation, has grown increasingly ineffectual in practice.

Because of this unfriendliness there is no progress toward control of the manufacture and use of atomic weapons, and no progress toward the limitation of conventional armaments.

Ration Card Murders Overwhelm Germany

By IRENE SIMON
BERLIN—(P)—Files at the cen-

tral police station reveal stories of thefts, assaults, kidnappings, and murder-all committed for the sake of another ration card.

Last month, for example, a 50-year-old city relief recipent mur-dered a housewife for her ration card, six children were kidnapped in order to get their valuable children's ration cards and a young wife was fatally stabbed by a husband in an argument over a slab of bacon.

"Hunger and greed is swiftly killing off the last remaining decency in the hearts of we Germans," said a municipal official. "All scruple seems gone. For an extra slice of bread one steals, for an extra pound of butter one commits assault, for an extra ration card one murders.' Officials Are Corrupt

"We in the city administration are helpless to cure the situation because of the city-wide corruption in official circles. The daily papers are full of stories of food, thievery and fraud committed by city offi-

Thoughtful Berliners say that the danger is not the ideological gap between eastern and western minded Germans, but the gap "between peoples and families of food envy," as one daily paper phrased

"Our courts are swamped with divorce suits based on arguments due to the most primitive self-preservation reasons," a leading lawyer de-

"The husband asks why his wife gives him so little to eat? Does she eat more while he is out working? He begins to lock the food away at night. They quarrel bitterly. Soon they're in my court for a divorce," one judge explained.

"Wives report their husbands accuse them of not distributing the family food fairly. Husbands call their wives 'stupid fools' because they do not supplement the regular rations with black market food. In one case a father killed his two children when they surprised him rifling the cupboard for some potatoes mother had locked away for

Sunday. Meanest of all food-crazy Berliners, say the police, is the man who steals ration cards from housewives while they queue up hours for food.


