clouds that brought two heavy rain clouds that brought two heavy rain
storms to the city and street and highway flooding in low-lying areas. Officially, Dimmitt received 3.13 inches of rain Tuesday at
KDHN, the official NWS reporting KDHN, the official NWS reporting rain gauge reports ranged up to rain gauge reports ranged up to
over four inches by noon Tuesday. The area was placed under a severe thunderstorm watch early
Wednesday, and a brief, but heavy, storm dumped another .77 inch of rain. Hail damage was confined to small areas, but, for the fourth year in a row, brought devastation to
farmers north of Easter. Until Friday, Dimmitt had received just 1.40 inches for the
month and 3.21 inches for the year.
