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Citizens Group Approves Tax Cut

46 Changes In Law Proposed

WASHINGTON—(P)—A majority of a Citizens Advisory Committee on Taxation recommended Tuesday "a reduction in individual income tax rates for all, with due regard for the cost of living of those in the lower income groups."

But Matthew Woll, AFL official and labor member of the 10-man group, took exception to the recommendations.

The majority of nine and Woll filed separate reports with the House Ways and Means Committee which created the study group, headed by Roswell Magill, former undersecretary of the Treasury. Neither report was immediately made public in full.

The group's report was submitted to the Ways and Means Committee assembled to prepare tax legislation for the special session of Congress convening November 17. Chairman Knutson (R-Minn.) has said he wants a bill cutting income taxes by \$4,000,000,000 a year.

Also on the committee's list of business was the issue of whether farmers cooperative associations should be taxed at the same rate as business corporations. On that, Undersecretary of the Treasury A. Lee M. Wiggins submitted a report suggesting that a decision be deferred.

Wiggins said he thought it would be wise to put off a decision until the treasury completes a study it is now making of the entire tax system.

Labor Files Protest
Magill told the committee his group was making no specific recommendations as to rate changes and personal exemptions, but believes "equitable adjustment of tax rates and exemptions is the number one federal tax problem today."

Knutson withheld temporarily release of the report's text. But it was understood to propose 46 changes in the tax laws.

An associate of Woll said his dissenting report contends the majority recommendations would severely reduce federal revenues, disregard revenue needs for the European aid, and shift the tax load from those best able to those least able to pay.

When the House committee met, Knutson said hearings on a general overhauling of the tax structure would end by January 1 and that he expects the House to pass tax legislation by March 15.

Pyote Buildings Are Being Sold Rapidly
PYOTE—Eighty per cent of the buildings sold by the government at the Pyote Army Air Field have been resold and 50 per cent already have been removed from the field. The remainder will be sold and removed soon, it was announced here.

Retired Diplomat Dies By Own Hand

CONCORD, N. H.—(P)—John G. Winant, wartime ambassador to Great Britain and three-times governor of New Hampshire, shot himself to death Monday night with a .32 calibre Belgian pistol.

The 58-year-old diplomat, who retired only in January as permanent U. S. representative on the United Nations Economic and Social Council, was officially pronounced a suicide by Medical Referee Clarence E. Butterfield. Butterfield attributed the act to overwork.

His secretary, J. Bernard Teulon, said Winant's health had not been good and that a doctor advised him to "take things easy" as he had a heart condition and was suffering kidney or bladder trouble.

Winant had just completed his memoirs—"Letter from Grosvenor Square"—for November 15 publication and was understood to be planning a sequel.

His body was found lying face down near a fireplace cabinet in his son's bedroom by a secretary and maid after they heard a thud—but no shot.

A box of headache pills, some missing, was in the room. Two guns were nearby—the Belgian pistol and a German Luger that apparently had been thrown against the bedroom wall when Winant could not find ammunition.

Crude Production Upswing Halted

TULSA, OKLA.—(P)—A three-week-old record-breaking upward trend in the nation's crude oil production was halted during the week ended November 1 in which output averaged 5,288,380 barrels daily, a decrease of 30,035 from the previous weeks figures, the Oil & Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

Sharpest decline was in Kansas production, which dropped 17,600 barrels to 293,450 barrels.

Other major drops were recorded in Texas, which was 5,425 barrels lower to 2,370,925; California, down 7,100 to 921,700; Montana, off 1,190 to 22,940; Wyoming, 1,140 to 123,760; and Michigan, 6,705 to 42,855.

Foremost among six states which had increased production were: Oklahoma, up 4,450 barrels to 407,300; Louisiana, 4,450 to 358,400; Colorado, 1,240 to 910; and New Mexico, 425 to 117,175. Mississippi production was 108,956 compared to 108,730 October 25. Arkansas was 83,850 compared to October 25 figures of 84,300.

Store-Breaker Killed By Stanton Officer

STANTON—A Mexican identified as Penendo Renza of Big Spring was shot to death here about 1:30 a. m. Tuesday by Bill Pinkston, night watchman, when the Mexican, apprehended after breaking into the City Drug Store, threatened Pinkston and would not submit to arrest.

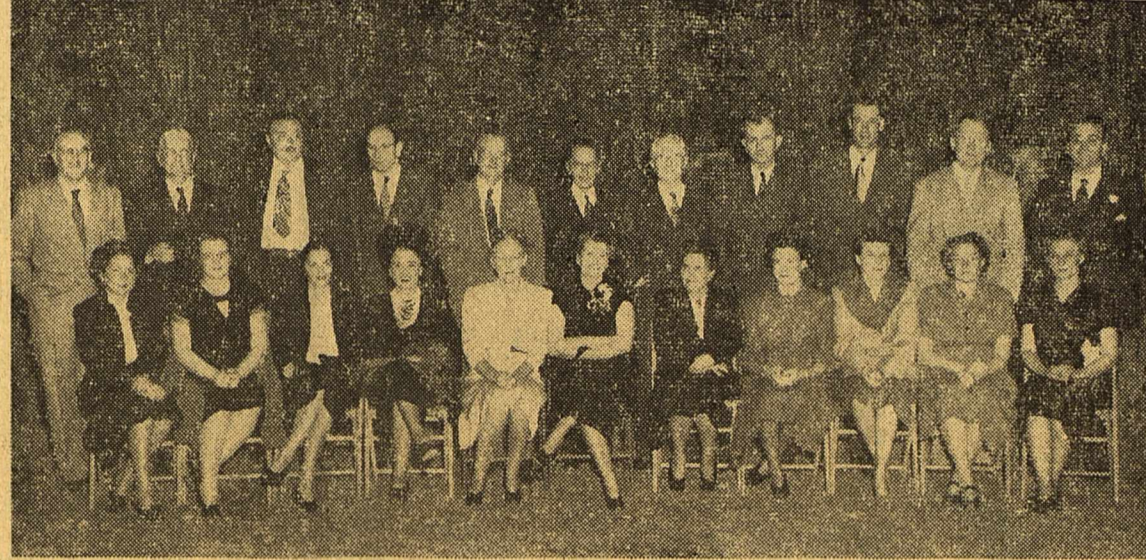
The nightwatchman, sitting in his car in front of the City Drug Store, saw the Mexican cross the street and approach the store's south entrance. The prowler broke the glass door and entered the quarters used as a bus terminal. He then proceeded into the store's drug department, where narcotics and other drugs are kept under lock and key.

Pinkston approached the Mexican, who advanced upon him with a heavy tool in his hand. When the Mexican would not halt at the officer's command, Pinkston reportedly shot him through the heart.

Sheriff Morris Zimmerman said the store-breaker was wearing gloves and had a package of cigarettes in his pocket.

Mikolajczyk Says Poland To Fight Catholic Church

LONDON—(P)—Stanislaw Mikolajczyk predicted Tuesday that Communist-dominated Poland soon will begin an attack on the Catholic Church.

The Polish Peasant Party leader, refreshed after his dramatic flight from his native land to escape being "shot and killed like a sheep," said he intended to go soon to the United States "to see friends."

He predicted that Poland "will come more and more under Communist control and more pressure will be put on the people following the coming of the Comintern."

"If the Yalta decision could be fulfilled in Poland and there could be a free, unfettered election, I am quite sure the Communist bloc would not get five per cent of the votes," Mikolajczyk asserted.

FLEES BY UNDERGROUND
BERLIN—(P)—An American Military Government source said Tuesday that Stanislaw Mikolajczyk was aided in his dramatic 15-day flight from Warsaw to London by a sort of "underground railway" set up by U. S. and British Army Intelligence sections to help "interesting personalities" escaping from East to West.

The informant said the Polish Peasant Party leader, who fled Warsaw October 20, arrived in the British Zone of Germany Saturday.

"We got some hot customers—not with the breath of the Russian pursuers on their necks," the informant said.

Don Estes Buys Midland Auction

Earl Ray, A. C. Francis and M. G. McConal have sold the Midland Livestock Auction to Don Estes of San Angelo, it was announced Monday afternoon.

Estes, a former partner in the Producers Livestock Auction in San Angelo and now auctioneer in that sale, will assume operation of the Midland auction this week.

"Mac" McConal will continue as auctioneer here, it was announced. Also to be employed at the sale here is J. T. Marchant of San Angelo. Estes will continue to make his home in San Angelo.

The San Angelo man said he plans to make extensive additions to present facilities at the auction barn here, but the improvement program will be deferred until after the first of the year. He expects to spend \$25,000 to \$30,000 in enlarging and remodeling the plant, he said.

AUSTIN — (AP) — Bids totaling more than \$1,000,000 had been opened in the first hour Tuesday of a mineral lease sale of 2,465,324 acres of state-owned lands by the State School Land Board.

Soviet Is Accused Of Slowing Peace

WASHINGTON—(P)—The United States, in a new foreign policy statement, bluntly accuses Russia of failing to cooperate in efforts to establish peace.

The State Department document, which sets forth this nation's position on postwar problems, declares:

1—Russia is to blame for failure of the United Nations "to grasp the fruits of peace and victory."

2—The Soviet has failed to make good on wartime commitments for the demilitarization and reconstruction of Germany.

3—The USSR is mainly interested in getting "maximum reparations" from Germany and in setting up a German political regime "friendly" to the Soviet.

These and similar charges, most of them previously aired by government leaders, are summed up in a statement entitled "Aspects of Current American Foreign Policy," issued Monday. Fifty thousand copies are being prepared for public distribution.

"A basic aim of the United States," the report says, "is to press for the necessary treaty settlements which will permit withdrawal of occupation troops from Germany, Austria, Korea and Japan and enable all nations of the world to return as soon as possible to a peace-time basis."

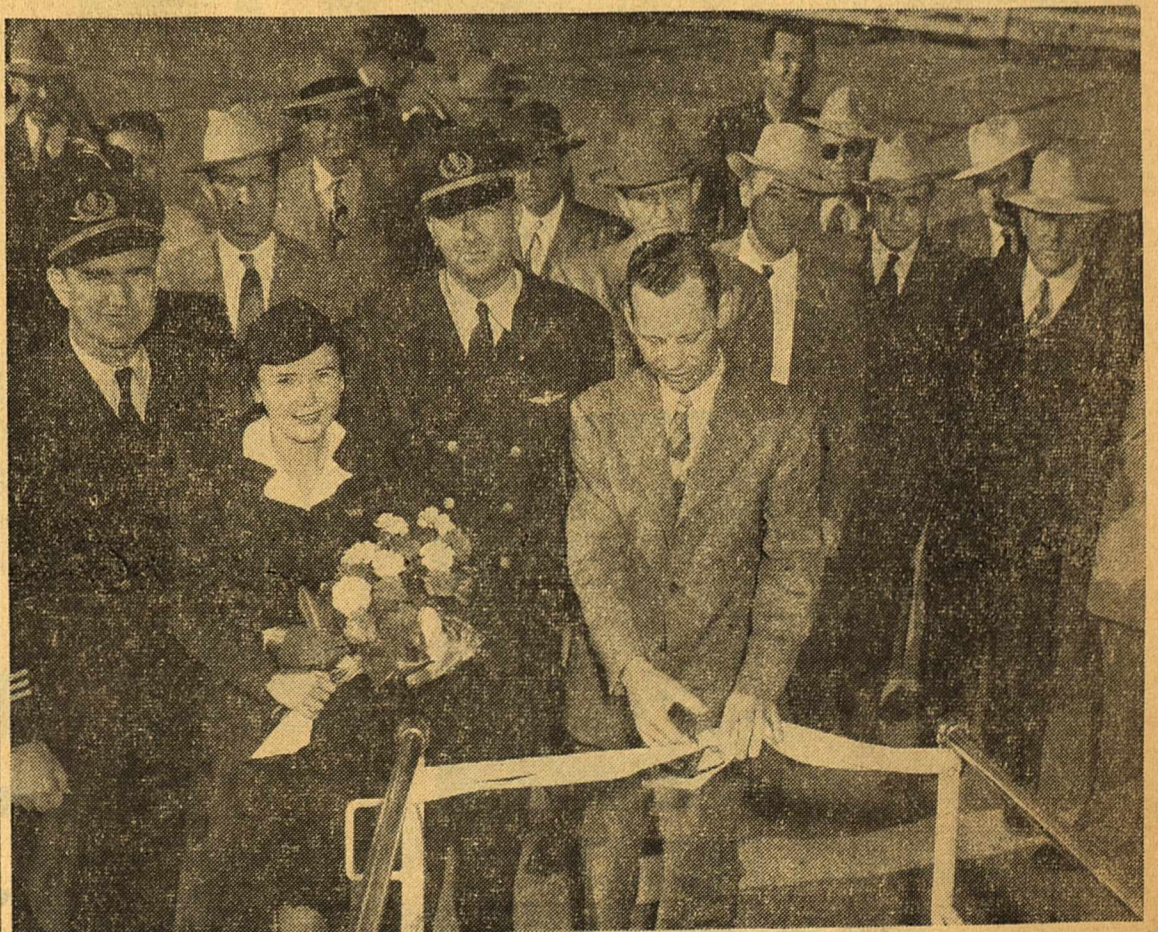



Action Is Essential

There are indications that the European relief program may run into 1948 politics at the special session called by President Truman. This would be most unfortunate. There is a time for everything. This is not the time for politics.

Truman says that France needs \$357,000,000 from us before the first of January, when Congress ordinarily would meet; Italy needs \$285,000,000; the occupied countries need \$500,000,000.

These figures may be right, or too high, or too low. We are in no position to know. We do not ask Congress to rubber stamp them. It is Congress' privilege and duty to check them with care.

But it is important that Congress should not delay. Congress should, by now, have most of the information necessary for reaching a sound decision. If the President has facts not in possession of the legislators, it is to be assumed that he will supply them.

The important thing is that neither the President nor Congress should play politics with this matter. The important thing is action. Correct action is very desirable, but prompt and positive action is essential.

A few unobservant or deliberately blind tourists have returned from Europe denying that the hunger and want there verges upon starvation and destitution. These are in a minority. Not only our most trusted officials, but our most proven objective observers agree that Europe's need is so great that we cannot deny it, so pressing that we dare not delay.

Perhaps the Europeans brought this misery on themselves. Too many millions tried to live on a continent incapable of supporting them. In the pressure for something a little better than existence, they have stepped on one another's toes.

But this is no time for recriminations. There they are—the countries which, with the Americas, make up occidental civilization. They are cold, they are hungry, their clothing is in tatters, their homes are shambles, their industries are broken down by war, their raw materials are depleted. They have little money, and there is little to buy.

Moscow does not want us to help them. That is a most convincing argument why we must. Moscow knows that the colder, the hungrier, the more disgusted and discouraged the people of Europe become, the weaker will grow their faith in democracy, the readier they will become to listen to the siren song of Communism.

Out of poverty and misery we saw Communism arise in Russia. Out of poverty and defeatism we saw Fascism take over Italy and Nazism seize upon Germany. Surely we need no further proof that Totalitarianism feeds on distress, and we cannot forget that Totalitarianism breeds wars.

We can't sit by and watch the rest of Europe drift into the Comintern's web.

It is important whom we elect as President next year, and what principles he is pledged to. But that battle should be fought on legitimate issues. Our children would never forgive us if, to advance the fortunes of a political party or a candidate for office, we procrastinate about halting that economic and moral breakdown in Europe which—if we let it proceed—as sure as shooting will end up in a third world war.

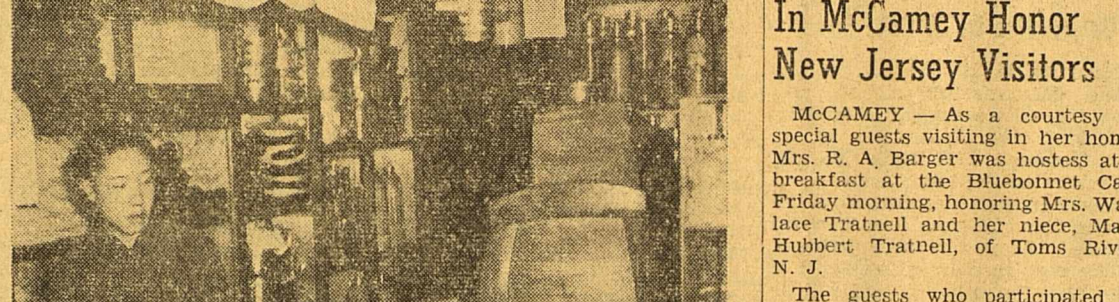

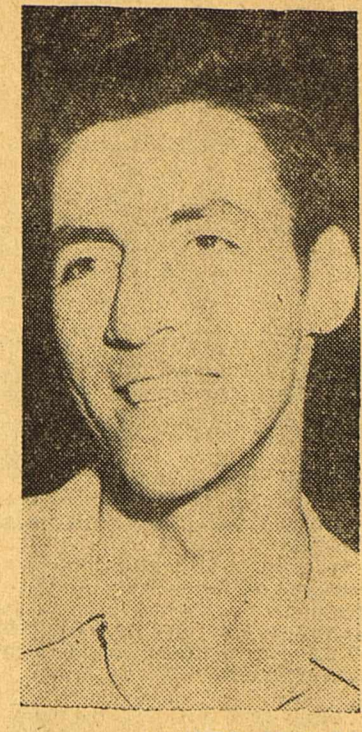

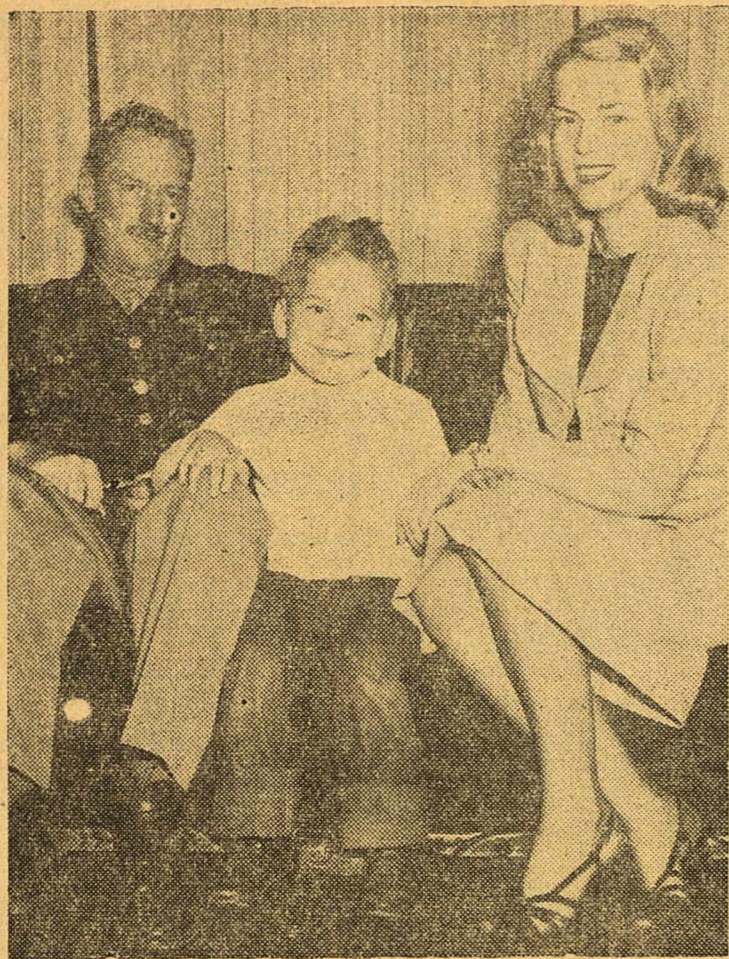
LIFE IMPRISONMENT ASSESSED IN WIFE SLAYING

covered with the queen. Declarer refused to win this trick and laid off the spades until the third round.

Then he led the eight of hearts. The rule is for second hand to play low, but if West plays the four-spot on this trick, declarer will finesse the nine in dummy. East will be forced to win with the queen, and without a spade to return, he can do nothing to prevent declarer from winning the balance of the tricks. On the next heart play dummy's jack can be finessed and the ace will pick up the whole suit.

However, instead of playing low on the first heart, Bob went up with the king. Declarer had to win in dummy with the ace, otherwise Hawk would have cashed the rest of the spades. South returned to his hand with a diamond and led the other heart. When Hawk played the four, dummy's nine was finessed.

Naturally South knew that Hawk did not have the queen, or he would have played it in order to cash the spades. East won the second heart trick and exited with a diamond, and South found it impossible to make more than eight tricks, not being able to cash the hearts.

San Angeloans Start Construction Of New Drive-In Show Here

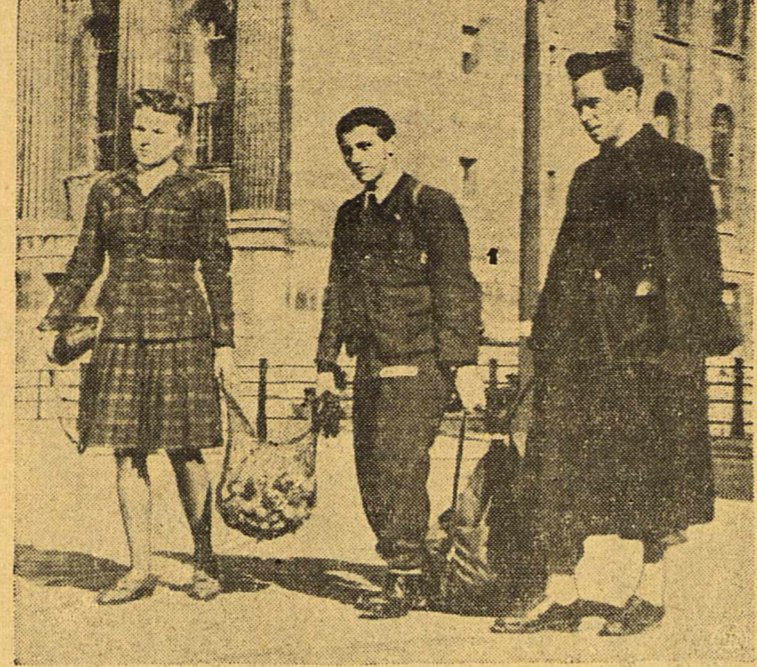

He died an hour later without regaining consciousness.

Though a Republican, Winant became a loyal supporter of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt and campaigned openly for him and the New Deal.

Born of a wealthy family in New York City, Feb. 23, 1889, Winant was educated at St. Paul's and Princeton University, where he majored in American history.

He entered politics in 1916 and won a seat in the New Hampshire Legislature, but his political career was interrupted almost immediately by World War I.

Returns To Politics
Winant enlisted in the Army Air Corps, rose from private to captain while serving overseas and was cited for gallantry under fire.

Upon his return, he went back into politics. After serving two more terms in the State Legislature, he defeated the late Frank Knox, newspaper publisher and a seasoned campaigner, for the Republican nomination for governor.

Winant won the governorship, where he was to break a New Hampshire precedent by serving three two-year terms.

Though a conservative in private life, Winant was regarded by friends and foes as a progressive politically.

President Roosevelt named him as the first head of the Social Security Board, and later he became chief of the International Labor Office at Geneva.

He was appointed ambassador to the court of St. James in 1941 during the blitz.

When Winant was leaving Britain as ambassador, Winston Churchill delivered the valedictory tribute describing him as "a true, faithful and unyielding friend."

Admirer of Lincoln
Winant was ambassador when the United Nations Economic and Social Council was organized in London in January, 1946, and two months later was named by President Truman as this country's permanent representative of the council.

Last December, he asked to be relieved of this post, "to pick up life again as a private citizen in my own country."

Lincolnesque in appearance, Winant was a great admirer of the Civil War president, quoted him in his speeches and collected his works.

Winant leaves his widow, the former Constance Rivington Russell; two sons, John G., Jr., a student at Princeton, and World War II flier, and Rivington, a student at Oxford; and one daughter, Mrs. Carlos de C. Velando of Lima, Peru.

His mother, Mrs. Jeannette Winant, and a brother, Frederick, also survive.

Simple funeral services will be conducted Wednesday afternoon in St. Paul's Episcopal Church, with burial in the Blossom Hill Cemetery, Concord.

Bishop John T. Dallas of St. Paul's will officiate.

United Nations Held Together By Fear Of Failure

The mood of those who are concerned with the welfare of the United Nations is one of increasing fear that our peace organization, which was to unite mankind into one world of friendship, already is an irrevocably tragic failure as the result of the fierce conflict between the Communists and the Democrats.

One strives eagerly but vainly to recall some greater accomplishment by the UN than when the political committee, after a long and bitter battle, finally achieved unanimity. It adopted a resolution condemning all forms of propaganda likely to provoke or encourage any threat to peace.

Agree On One Point
Well, it's as good to find our peace organization at least agreeing that it is against war! Apropos of this, one is reminded of the story about the late President Calvin Coolidge and the Sunday Sermon. I've forgotten who first related the tale but suspect it was Mrs. Coolidge herself who told of asking Cal, upon his return from church, what the minister preached about.

"Sin," replied the ever-laconic Coolidge.

"What line did he take?" persisted Mrs. C.

"He's against it," said the President.

Kept Together By Fear
So the fruit of weary months of fighting is a resolution condemning war. And having passed this they have returned to the wrangling. Small wonder that Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt expressed a hope and a prayer in the UN for a "gradual increase of good will here rather than this continued back-and-forth of our telling each other what dogs we are."

The way it looks from this column's observation post, the UN is being kept going largely because of stark fear among member nations of what would happen if the organization collapsed. The results of a breakdown are too terrible to contemplate.

Await Big Four Meet
There are those who are wishfully thinking—that perhaps the anxiously awaited meeting of the Big Four foreign ministers in London this month may develop something to alleviate the strained situation.

The conference is primarily to try once more to write a German peace treaty over which thus far the former Allies have been unable to agree.

No, this isn't a good time to allow the UN to collapse, as remarked to the writer by an official attached to one of the delegations:

"We are wallowing in the bottom of a wave, and we are shipping water, but we aren't ready to admit that we are shipwrecked."

GREAT BRITAIN MOURNS

LONDON—(P)—Britain mourned the death of former United States Ambassador John G. Winant Tuesday as the loss of a friend who shared this nation's suffering in war and her joy in victory.

Little more than the bare announcement of his tragic end arrived in time for the morning press, but London evening newspapers gave it front page, banner line prominence.

The Evening Star called him a "war casualty" in its headlines.

Mexico Prepares For Big Winter Tourist Business

MEXICO CITY—(P)—The Mexican government's tourist department will spend \$50,000 in the next 12 months for U. S. newspaper and magazine advertising to attract some \$55,000,000 worth of tourist business to this winter garden spot.

"Tourism" is big business for Mexico. The government depends largely on dollars brought in by visitors to offset an annual unfavorable trade balance with the United States.

Alejandro Buelna, Jr., director of the Tourist Bureau, hopes Mexico's resorts will bloom with U. S. dollars this winter.

Upswing In Tourists
Since the end of the war there has been a steady upswing in tourists' visitors. In 1944, official government figures show there were 133,220 tourists. In 1945 a total of 170,508 crossed the border and in 1946 there were 272,150.

These tourists spent approximately \$35,969,400 in 1944, \$46,037,160 in 1945 and \$73,480,500 in 1946. These totals include transportation costs, so that in 1946 the net gain for Mexico was approximately \$55,000,000 Buelna said.

Hotel accommodations are crowded, but the immediate outlook for more rooms is good, Buelna said, because the new Prado Hotel, owned by the government, is expected to be ready in early January with 500 rooms, the Posada Del Sol will have 500 rooms in early 1948 and the Prince opened with 180 rooms. The Hotel Barbara annex nearing completion will add 200 rooms.

Food Is High
Hotel costs are comparable with first class hotels in the U. S. resort hotels are higher. Service does not equal that in the U. S., but is as good or better than in other Latin American countries.

Food costs, especially for U. S. type dishes, are high. Native cooking is cheap but hot, and is not for the uneducated palate.
