Marshall Outlines Aid Plan For Europe

\$597,000,000 Is Asked For Program Until April 1948

WASHINGTON—(P)—Secretary of State Marshall asked Congress Monday to provide \$597,000,000 for emergency aid in Europe until March 31. He estimated an additional \$7,500,000,000 will be needed in the 15 months starting then.

Eventually, Marshall told a joint meeting of the Senate and House Foreign Committees, long range European recover costs will range between \$16,000,000,000 and \$20,000,000,000.

LaFollette May Direct Aid Program

WASHINGTON—(P)—The name of Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., figured prominently in speculation Monday as the possible director of this country's projected multi-billion dollar European aid program.

Long before there can be any choice of personalities, however, it must be decided whether the so-called Marshall Plan is to be carried out by a new independent agency as pictured by President Truman's Citizen Committee or under direct control of the State Department.

In favoring the new agency approach, the 19-man committee headed by Secretary of Commerce Harriman proposed that the director and board chairman be given vast powers and responsibilities.

LaFollette, former Wisconsin senator, served as chairman of two Harriman subcommittees, one on the administration of foreign aid and the other on drafting its final report to President Truman.

While Marshall confined his report largely to Europe, he said the situation in China "continues to cause us deep concern" and "we should extend to the government and its people certain economic aid and assistance."

Republican leaders have insisted that China should be included in any stopgap aid program.

Marshall said a definite proposal for China is being prepared for early submission. And, he said, the United States and all other world powers recognize the national government of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek as the "sole legal government of China."

This was the first indication from any top government authority of America's future policy toward China.

Marshall has refused to make public a report by Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, who went to China last Summer to make a spot survey of conditions for Truman.

Marshall's original statement made no reference to additional funds to pay occupation costs in Germany, Japan and Korea. He expanded his prepared text later however, to say he understood the Army will ask Congress to supply about \$500,000,000 for that purpose through next June 30.

He added that "slightly more than \$300,000,000" of this amount will go to meet "additional requirements in Western Germany."

The United States and Britain currently are negotiating a new agreement on how much each is to pay to operate their merged zones in Germany. Because of its acute dollar shortage, Britain claims it can no longer bear its share of the dollar expenses involved.

Undersecretary of State Robert A. Lovett, in discussing Marshall's report at a news conference, disclosed the Administration has decided that a stabilization fund to back up European currencies is an ultimate necessity.

The 16 Western European countries participating in the long range recovery program asked \$3,000,000,000 for currency stabilization purposes, but did not include in the \$2,440,000,000 of outside aid they proposed in the report prepared at their Paris conference.

Production last year was 8,640,000 bales and 12,390,000 for the ten-year (1935-45) average.

Truman Says American Aid Saved Greece

WASHINGTON—(P)—President Truman told Congress Monday "Greece is still free" because of American aid but her economic plight "has not basically improved" and the military picture is worse.

That is the way Truman sized things up as of September 30, four months after Congress set up a \$400,000,000 fund to help Greece and Turkey combat Communistic pressure from inside and outside their borders.

The President expressed "grave concern" that "underlying causes of economic and political unrest" still exist in Greece.

But in his first report to Congress on how the aid money is being used, the nearest thing to a hint that more might be asked was a statement that:

"The difficulties which hamper the success of this program must be overcome. Continuation of marginal subsistence only in Greece, without real progress toward recovery, will provide fertile ground for totalitarian ideologies."

The presidential report showed that up to September 30 only \$17,460,171 of Greece's \$300,000,000 and \$1,549 of Turkey's \$100,000,000 actually had been spent with \$150,182 used for administrative expenses. However, \$154,665,000 had been made available to the various agencies carrying out the Greek program and \$20,012,000 to be spent for Turkey.

Truman is optimistic. "The report listed numerous 'unfavorable developments' which have beset the air programs but said that in Greece 'there is every reason to be optimistic about recovery'—if order can be restored.

"If order is not restored," Truman said, "there can be no recovery."

As for the military situation, the President said the Greek government had hoped a Summer campaign would wipe out guerrilla warfare.

"However," he added, "the continued support of the guerrillas by Greece's northern neighbors (Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, Albania) and the diversion of Greek troops from large-scale offensive warfare to the static defense of villages resulted in an over-all worsening of the military situation."

So, he said, at the urgent request of the Greek government, the American aid mission shifted to the military program some money originally allotted to reconstruction and recovery. Originally, the \$300,000,000 was split about equally between the two programs. Now, the report shows, the military end will get about \$168,000,000.

Most Preserve Security. "If Greece is to survive as a free and independent nation," Truman said, "it must preserve its national security."

The President outlined "initial steps" that have been taken to bolster Turkey. The ultimate aim, as in the case of Greece, he said, is to help free peoples maintain a government in accordance with the wish of the majority.

Mrs. Irene Gum, 49, a passenger in an automobile, was killed in a train-auto collision in Dallas Sunday night.

Lawrence H. Teeple, 22, of Jacksonville, Fla., a student at Texas A&M College, died of injuries received when his automobile overturned Sunday in Dallas.

Dorothy Mae Guidry, three, was fatally burned and three others injured seriously by fire following an oil stove explosion in a tenant house on a dairy farm near Orange Sunday afternoon.

Pvt. Justo Garza, 25, of Laredo, Fort Worth Army Air Field soldier, died Sunday of knife wounds on the head, throat and stomach in Fort Worth.

John H. Calvery, 75, of Dallas died Saturday in a fire which swept a Dallas apartment house.

Susan Lee Branch, six-week-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William C. Branch of Dallas, suffocated early Saturday when her head became entangled with her bedclothes.

George Montgomery, 64, died Saturday night in an explosion and fire at his living quarters in Grand Texas.

Jim Casias, 29, was killed instantly near San Antonio late Saturday night when he was struck by a bullet fired from outside a kitchen window. Deputy sheriffs held a 23-year-old woman in the county jail.

Silmon Parnell Rector, 17, Smithville High School student, was killed Sunday when a 12-gauge shotgun accidentally discharged while Rector was hunting ducks near Smithville.

Nolan Bailey, 57, of Port Arthur was drowned near Beaumont Saturday night when his car went into a drainage canal.

Second Victim Dies After Asphyxiation
The second victim of asphyxiation in a servants' house at the Fred Turner residence last Wednesday died Saturday in a Midland hospital. She was Beatrice Morgan, 27-year-old negro woman.

Hubbard Morgan, 32, negro, was found dead in bed in the servants' quarters at the time the couple were discovered.

Southern Methodist University headed down the home stretch of the Southwest Conference Monday a double-threat combination.

Gilbert Johnson's remarkable exhibition against Texas A&M last week took the Mustangs out of the one-man team classification and added a passing attack as dangerous as the one they have on the ground.

The Mustangs don't figure in the feature game on this week's card, but they play host to down and out Arkansas at Dallas.

Texas and Texas Christian tangle in the biggest game on the schedule, with Rice playing A&M at Houston and Baylor meeting Tulsa at Tulsa.

Johnson completed 14 of 16 passes to revive the Mustangs' famed "aerial circus" and Doak Walker, the sensational Southern Methodist star, played in the same backfield with his former understudy—at the blocking back slot.

Potent Combination With Walker—who completed his only two attempted passes, and Johnson playing together, Coach Matty Bell fields his most potent scoring combination.

Survival in the conference race hinges on the Texas-TCU game.

A victory for Texas would wipe out a lot of the grudge it holds against the Frogs, dating back to 1941 when Dutch Meyer's crew scored one of many upsets.

Last year the Frogs were one of two teams to stop Texas, Rice being the other one. Texas Christian will be the underdog again this week.

Rice finally clicked downing Arkansas, 28-0. The Owls will be favored over Texas A&M, which lost to SMU, 13-0.

Texas knocked off Baylor, 28-7, after a close first half and Texas Christian was idle last week to prepare for their meeting with the Longhorns.

In winning their seven straight games this year, the Mustangs have scored 126 points to the opposition's 52. Texas, in winning seven and losing one, has scored 213 against 54.

Irish Gaining Grid Prestige

NEW YORK —(AP)— Unbeaten Notre Dame, having finally cast off the blankets which cloaked its offensive power B. A. (before Army), was being hailed from all sides Monday as one of the greatest football teams in Irish history as well as the Number 1 college eleven in the nation.

Everyone knew Notre Dame had a very good football team even before Frank Leahy's Fighting Irish nearly annihilated Army 27-7 Saturday. They had seen the South Bend university roll up five straight victories in rather easy fashion although it had been out-rushed by Purdue and had to resort to passes to whip the Boiler-makers.

Neither was the one-sided victory unexpected over the Cadets in the final game of the most famous of all football rivalries which began in 1913. In fact, the score bore out the "pre-makers' pre-game predictions almost perfectly. Notre Dame had been picked to win by 19 points.

The fighting Irish now are practically certain to come up to their last game, with unbeaten but once-tied Southern California on December 6, undefeated. They have only ordinary Northwestern and Tulane to face before meeting the Trojans.

All-Conquering Class The Irish are joined in the all-conquering class, by Michigan, generally regarded as the No. 2 team of the nation, Southern Methodist, Pennsylvania, Georgia Tech, Penn

Waco in a virtual tie for the lead in District 10 and Corpus Christi, Austin, Brackenridge (San Antonio) and Kerrville knotted up in District 15.

Austin (El Paso) awaits the opening of the state play-off. The Panthers clinched the District 4 title weeks ago.

Favorites in other districts are: 1, Amarillo; 2, Wichita Falls; 3, Odessa, 5, Paris; 6, Highland Park (Dallas); 9, Brownwood; 11, Longview; 12, Lufkin; 13, Lamar (Houston); 14, Goose Creek; 16, Harlingen.

Only six undefeated teams remain as the campaign thunders into its last three weeks. Wichita Falls, Odessa, Austin (El Paso) and Longview are unbeaten and untied, with Longview unscored on and Odessa setting the state scoring pace with 278 points in eight games.

Forest and Goose Creek are undefeated but have been tied.

Amarillo can clinch the District 1 title this week when the Sandies play Pampa. Odessa can do the same thing in District 3 against Lamesa. Arlington Heights can sew up District 7 honors by beating North Side (Fort Worth). Waxahachie plays Temple in an important District 10 game. Longview can clinch the title in District 11 by licking Marshall. It's the same for Lufkin in District 12 if the Panthers whip Nacogdoches.

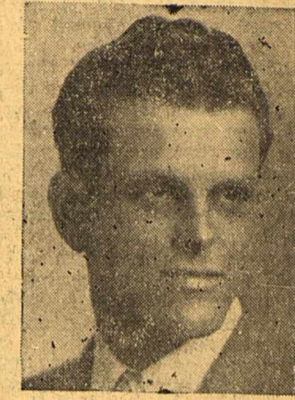

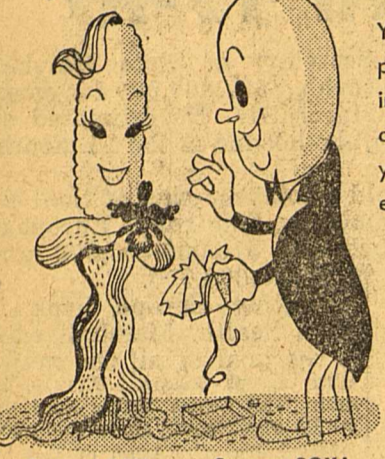

'Pyracantha Week' Observed Here As Part Of State Beautification Plan

A state-wide project, a unified improvement and beautification plan provided by the Texas State Legislature, will be achieved in Midland this week, which has been proclaimed by Mayor R. H. Gifford as "Pyracantha Week." During the observance all citizens are urged to plant the city's flowering shrub as a living memorial to the men and women who served in World War II.

To encourage the planting of the orange-berry variety of pyracantha, the Midland Chamber of Commerce, through the Midland garden clubs, will offer prizes of \$25, \$15, and \$10 dollars for the best plants. 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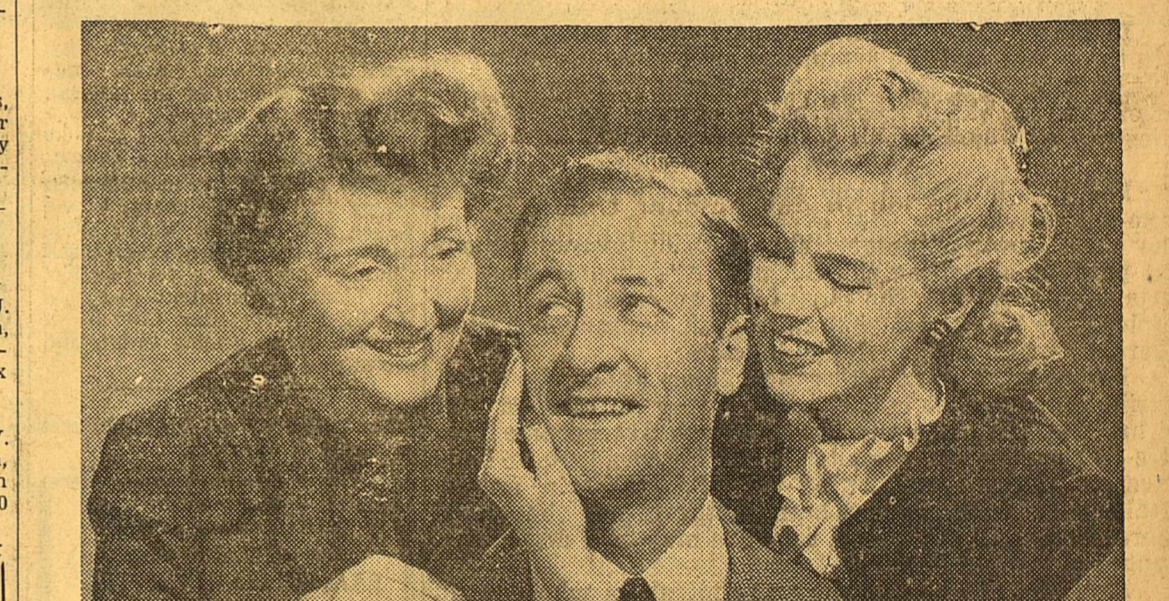
