
Justice of the peace announces for new term







Water district begins well depth measuring

The High Plains Water District has begun its annual program of measuring the depth to water levels in more than 900 observation wells scattered throughout the 15county district.

Castro County irrigators may see a blue and white water-district vehicle in the vicinity of their property in the coming weeks while Don Smith of the district staff measures the 89 wells in the district's observation network in Castro

Since most of the wells to be measured are operational irrigation wells, January was chosen to begin observations to allow for a dormant period and well recovery from the cone of depression developed

Wells will be measured to find the depth of "static" water level. After measuring, each well will receive a red district identification tag for the owner's information.

Data gained from this program are used for decline rate projections, determining the amount of water left in storage, and as a basis for the income-tax depletion allowance claims on landowners'

tax returns.
The annual measurement program is expected to be completed in February, weather permitting. Data on individual wells will be available within a few days of completed readings, but tabulated data on the entire network is not expected until

"Nominations must be received in our Washington office by Jan. 22 to be considered," county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation official Melvin Barton said.

The Agriculture and Food Act of 1981 requires that a committee be established to study alternative methods of setting premiums and discounts for upland cotton.

The committee will be responsible for recommending optional ways of setting premiums and discounts that will accurately reflect true relative market values and actual market demand for upland cotton, Barton said.

The 10-member committee will include two cotton producers from each of the major upland cotton producing One member will areas. represent cotton merchants and one member will represent textile manufacturers. An alternate will be named for each committee member.



No application is needed. Dividends will be paid automatically during 1982 on the anniversary date of the





Arbor Day is a day set aside each year to remember one of our most valuable resources - the tree, said Ted Fisher of Austin, Travis County horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Arbor Day began in Nebraska and is now observed across the country during the month of April. However, Texas Arbor Day was set for the third Friday in January by the Texas Legislature in 1949 because January is an ideal time for planting trees.

As to the importance of trees, Fisher cites a number of contributions.

"In addition to providing lumber and paper, trees also purify and beautify," he said. "They cleanse the air we breathe by absorbing carbon dioxide and returning oxygen to the air. They cool and humidify the air, reduce soil erosion, beautify our neighborhoods and communities, provide cover for fowl and wildlife, and offer a natural challenge for youthful

"Bearing all these things in mind, trees actually work overtime to make our world a nicer place," Fisher said.

climbers," he added.

Planting a tree in the home landscape can be a family project while schools and other groups can be involved in tree planting at community parks and playgrounds.


"Nurseries usually have a good supply of different kinds of trees available this time of the year," noted the horticulturist. There are shade, fruit and nut trees adapted to different areas of Texas that can be admired for generations to come if they are planted now and cared for properly.

"Many of the trees we enjoy today exist because those that came before us cared enough to leave something lasting for future generations." Fisher said, adding, "We can do the same by planting a tree on Arbor Day, Jan. 15."


