WASHINGTON--(A)-The government hoped Tuesday its wholesale tariff slashes set for January 1 will save Americans money without arousing a storm among industries left with less protection against foreign competition.

Under terms of the Geneva Trade and Tariff Agreement made public Monday night, this country will make more than 3,500 cuts in import duties as part of a 23nation pact affecting half the world's commerce.

AUSTIN -(AP)- The State of Texas Tuesday faced its second segregation suit following filing of charges in Federal District Court that children of Mexican descent are being illegally segregated in

four Texas school districts. The plaintiffs, 20 school children of Mexican descent, asked through legal counsel for both a temporary and a permanent court order to prevent continuance of the alleged illegal segregation.

They also asked a monetary judgment for damage suffered as a result of not receiving the educational, recreational, and health benefits accorded to other white children in so-called "white" 'regular" schools

Secondary Schools Named Bastrop, Elgin and Martindale Independent school districts, the Colorado common school district, the boards of trustees and school superintendents of those districts, State Superintendent of Public Instruction L. A. Woods, and the State Board of Education were named as defendants. This newest suit involving

charges of discrimination through segregation pertains to the elementary and secondary schools of Texas, while the other suit—that of Heman Marion Sweatt-is directed at a higher institution of learning, the University of Texas. Sweatt, a Houston negro postman seeks a court order compelling university officials to admit him as a student in the school of law. His case is now on appeal to the Third Court of Civil Appeals.
