

WASHIN (P)—Gen. Omar N. Bradley is to be the Army's new staff, President Truman said Fri-day, and will be streeded as veterans administrator by Carl R. Gray, Jr., Chicago railway executive and industrialist.

Bradley will take over the top Army job when Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower retires next Spring to become president of Columbia University in New York.

Just when this shift will take place, Truman said, is indefinite, but Gray will start his new duties as veterans

## American Aid And Socialism

American aid should not be used to further nationalization of European industry, says the National Association of Manufacturers. In a set of recommendations presented to President Truman, the NAM also urges that existing state enterprises should be freed of political control, and that American dollars be given to "private competitive enterprises" in the participating foreign countries rather than to governments or their agencies.

These recommendations may seem to bind the whole program of aid with some rather tight strings. But they do tackle a question which must be faced, and which is likely to increase in importance as Secretary Marshall' proposal moves from the planning to the operational stage

The most obvious weakness of aid restrictions is that they would give the Russian propaganda guns a supply of fresh ammunition. Of course, the Soviet government will keep on attacking our aid program anyway. But controls, such as the NAM proposes, would tend to support the Russian charges that the Marshall Plan's purpose is to dictate the domestic economic policies of Western Euro- Girl Scouts and Brownies will prepean governments.

In the case of England, the voters chose a government, by a large majority, which pledged itself to a limited pro-gram of state socialism. 

Housing Situation Makes Farmers Take

To The Open Sea LOS ANGELES - (P) - A 74foot tug recently chugged through Pacific waters bearing 17 agricultural adventurers to a new life on a jungle island where there is no housing shortage or high prices. ### **UMT Backers Expect** Victory Next Year

WASHINGTON - (P) - Congressional advocates of universal military training believe the foreign economic crisis has strengthed their hand. While they do not plan to press

for action during the current special session, they feel that Congress may be willing early next year to make every able-bodied young male citizen eligible for compulsory military training.

'There has always been a need for it," said Rep. Vinson (D-of Georgia), top minority member of the House Armed Services Committee. "What has happened in Europe in recent months has made that need more apparent." The Armed Services Committee last summer recommended that Congress enact training legislation, but the issue did not reach the floor of either chamber for debate.

"We do not intend to ask for it during the special session," Vinson told a newsman. "But it certainly will be called up early in 1948. If ever there was a necessity to be prepared for any eventuality, it is now.'


