Grand Jury Indicts Movie Figures

Ten Face Trial On Contempt Charges

WASHINGTON—(P)—Ten movie writers, producers and directors Friday were indicted for contempt of Congress in refusing to say at a Communist-in-Hollywood investigation whether they are or have been Communists.

The 10 now must stand trial to determine their guilt or innocence.

Those named in separate indictments returned by a Federal Grand Jury are Albert Maltz, Dalton Trumbo, Samuel Ornitz, John Howard Lawson, Ring Lardner, Jr., Herbert Biberman, Robert Adrian Scott, Lester Cole, Alvah Bessie and Edward Dmytryk.

Eight of them also were indicted on an additional count alleging they refused to say whether or not they belong to the Screen Writers Guild.

All 10 had declined to answer specific questions about Communist affiliations during hearings held by the House Committee on Un-American Activities in October. They contended the committee was violating their constitutional rights by inquiring into their political beliefs.

Dmytryk is a motion picture director. Biberman a director-producer. Chotaw County deputy sheriff and a Frisco railroad special agent were wounded Friday when the deputy tried to question a man near Sawyer and the agent went to the deputy's aid. The deputy sheriff, R. L. (Brown) Page, was shot in the chest with a shotgun when he asked the man about recent burglaries in the Sawyer community. The railroad agent, Jackson Jones, was shot in the eye when he went to help Page.

The man escaped. Chotaw County officers, highway patrolmen and citizens are seeking him. The attempted questioning was at the home of the man. Sawyer is eight miles east of Hugo.

TEXAS OFFICERS ALERTED
DALLAS—(P)—Texas Highway Patrol officers at Greenville, Tyler and Paris were alerted Friday to be on the lookout for a gunman who shot two officers at Sawyer, Okla., a border town on the Red River.

Marshall Insists Ministers 'Get Down To Business'
LONDON—(P)—Secretary of State Marshall urged the Foreign Ministers Council Friday to "drop generalities" and "try to find out what each delegation really has in mind" for settling peace terms with Germany.

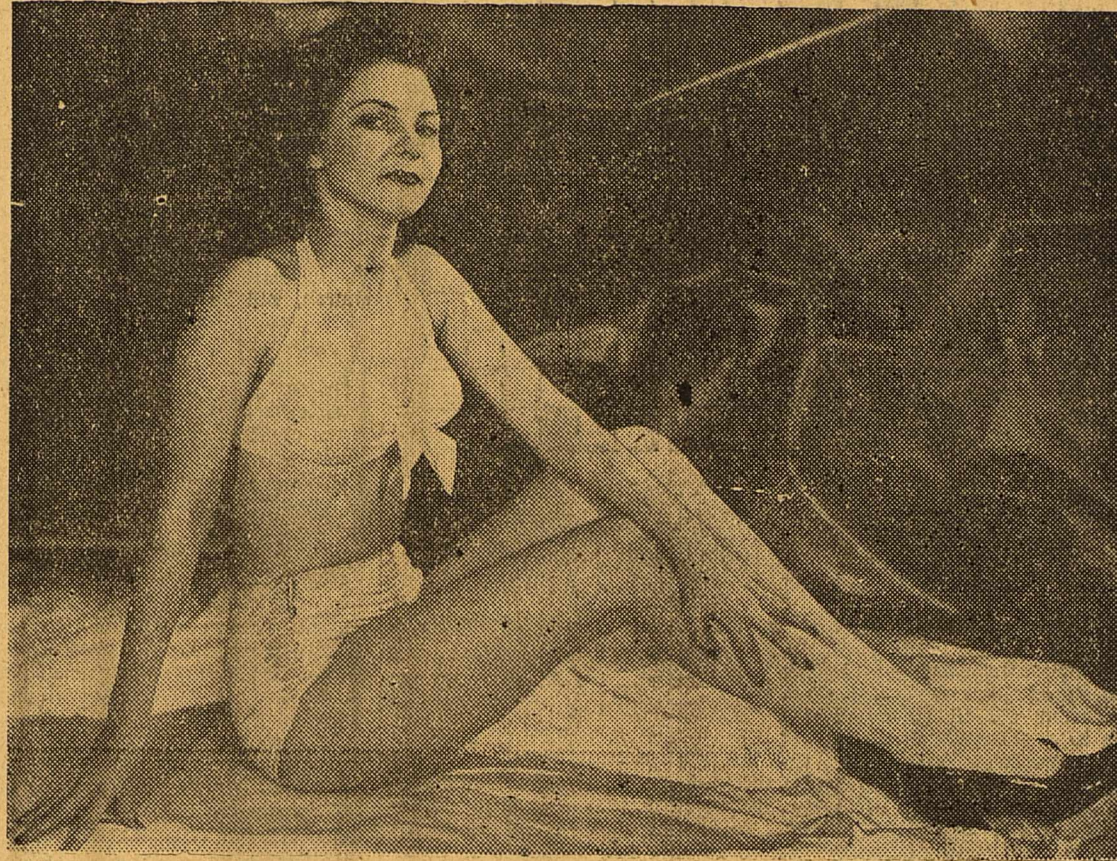
Marshall attacked Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov's almost daily demands for quick creation of a central German government and declared: "Any German government called upon to administer a Germany divided as it is today by the police of the occupying power, would be a sham and a delusion."

Marshall led off Friday's council discussion on Germany's economic future, and his prepared statement of 1,000 words was handed to reporters shortly after the meeting convened.

His declaration marked the beginning of the long expected American effort to determine whether there are solid chances for agreement on the future of Germany at this conference.

Foreign Aid Cut Sought

WASHINGTON—(P)—A proposal that the House cut the Administration's \$597,000,000 emergency foreign-aid program to \$300,000,000 came Friday from Representative Jonkman (R-Mich.). Jonkman announced he will offer a formal amendment to that effect when the aid bill, now being debated by the House, is opened to amendments next Monday.

In a speech prepared for House delivery, Jonkman contended the State Department has overestimated the needs of Italy, Austria and France. He said the Administration's estimates were based on "hazardous facts."

The Senate has passed a \$597,000,000 bill for aid to the three European countries, as asked by President Truman.

The measure before the House, drafted by its Foreign Affairs Committee, proposes total aid of \$590,000,000 and contemplates that \$60,000,000 of that amount would go to China.

Jonkman said the Administration will get House approval for anything near the amount it desires were dimmed further by the attitude of Representative Taber (R-NY). He said the \$597,000,000 asked is "too liberal."

Bank Robber Caught

"Give me your big money."

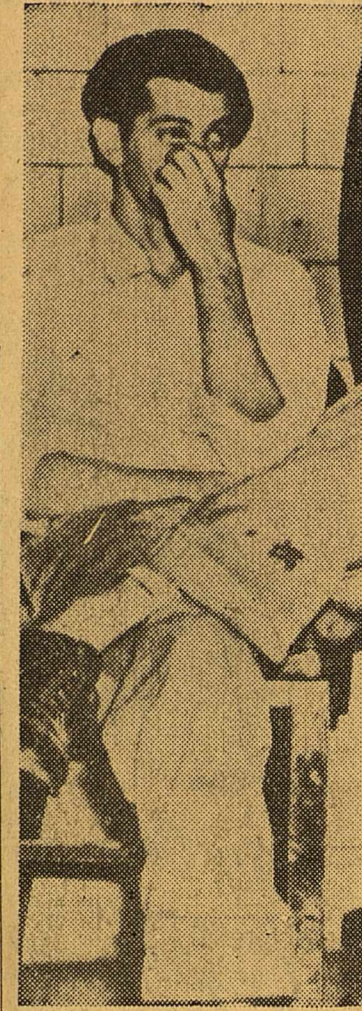
Currie gave him an estimated \$2,000 and the man fled, knocking a blind from a window as he escaped. A taxi was waiting outside, and he entered and fled.

Thermometer Of Hospital Drive Being Remodeled

The Midland Memorial Hospital campaign's progress thermometer on the courthouse lawn Friday was being repainted so as to record total gifts up to \$1,000,000, as campaigners continued to bring in pledges of persons not previously contacted.

Leaders in the drive to obtain funds with which to erect the four-story, 75-bed general hospital announced the campaign will continue until all citizens and all business firms have been given the opportunity of giving to the fund. They indicated \$1,000,000 will be needed to build and equip the type hospital desired and needed.

Next Report Meeting
Most team captains and workers expressed belief they can complete their campaign assignments by December 17, date of the next general report meeting. The session will be held at noon that day in the Crystal Ballroom of Hotel Scharbauer. Numerous gifts from oil companies also are expected by that time.

A total of \$538,812 in cash and pledges was reported at the last report meeting Tuesday. Leaders said the contact work will continue until each of the 6,300 listed prospects have been seen by the campaigners.

E-C UPTON WILDCAT FLOWS FREE OIL FROM ELLENBURGER

Slick-Urschel Oil Company. The Plymouth Oil Company, et al. No. 1 Alford, East-Central Upton County wildcat, 12 miles northeast of Rankin, and 2.173 feet from north and 4.813 feet from west lines of section 50 1/2, block Y, P. B. Scott survey, has proven that it will make an oil well and a discovery for petroleum production from the Ellenburger.

The project was treated with 1,500 gallons of acid through perforations in the bottom of the hole at 11,885-910 feet; at 11,945-960 feet, and at 11,975-985 feet. Total depth is at 12,022 feet, the 5-inch casing is cemented at 12,018 feet, and drilled out bottom is 12,011 feet.

The acid went in under 4,000 pounds pressure. The swab was pulled three times and the well kicked off and started flowing. It was flowed to pits until the load and residue had been recovered and was then turned to tanks.

Unofficial reports indicate that the flow during the first hour was around 34 barrels; in the second hour it was about 40 barrels of oil. The yield in the third hour was 42 barrels, and in the fourth hour 56 barrels of pipe line oil was produced. Gravity is 51 degrees. There was no gauge on the gas flow.

Operators were continuing to flow to test the petroleum yielding ability of the wildcat. Top of the Ellenburger is at 10,021 feet. The upper zone of the formation had shown for heavy gas and for some distillate.

CONOCO HAS OIL AND GAS IN NE CROCKETT PROSPECTOR

Continental Oil Company No. 1-A-13 University, Northeast Crockett County prospector, 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from east lines of section 13, block 47, University survey, and six miles southeast of the Barnhart field, was drilling ahead below 9,326 feet in lime, after a four-hour drillstem test at 9,188-9,326 feet.

Sweet gas showed at the surface in 37 minutes. It was at the rate of about 12,000 cubic feet per day. Recovery was 250 feet of 45 gravity oil and 980 feet of oil and gas cut oil drilling mud. There was no water. The section tested is said to be either the Hunton, or the Silurian-Devonian. The project is slated to drill to around 10,000 feet—if necessary to go that deep, in order to test the Ellenburger.

Moore's address in Midland is presented by the West Texas Geological Society, in cooperation with the distinguished lecture committee of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists, of which the WTGS is an affiliate.

W. A. (Bill) Waldschmidt, acting president of the regional organization, will preside at the Friday night meeting.

NORTH PECOS VENTURE GETS GAS FLOW IN FUSSELMAN

C. W. Chancellor and Slick Oil Company No. 1 Thornton Davis, North Pecos County deep wildcat, two miles west of the shallow Pecos Valley field, and 1,980 feet from south and east lines of section 105, block 8, H&GN survey, was drilling ahead below 6,450 feet in the Fusselman-Silurian lime, after indicating possibilities of the discovery of a new oil field.

Stassen's Ideas

Now that Presidential Candidate Harold E. Stassen has written a book and made a lot of speeches, and now that Candidate Robert A. Taft has toured the west, made a lot of speeches and thrown his hat in the ring, it's possible to compare their ideas. They're not as far apart as you'd think. On some matters Stassen is more liberal than the Democrats and on some others Taft is more progressive than Stassen. On foreign policy they appear to be poles apart.

On aid to Europe, Stassen, at Jefferson, Iowa, last May said: "I believe that for the next 10 years we should devote 10 per cent of our total national production of goods and food to building for worldwide peace and plenty and freedom."

In his speech before the Ohio Society of New York, Taft said: "I think the figure suggested by the Harriman Committee is higher than is safe."

Next day, at a Washington press conference, Taft said he was "absolutely opposed" to the \$2,600,000,000 requested by Secretary Marshall for immediate relief aid to Western Europe.

On the other top issue before the special session of Congress—high prices—Stassen and Taft both blame Truman's veto of the "unworkable" price-control bill of 1946 for today's situation. And both oppose return to OPA price control and rationing. Beyond these two points, the two candidates seem to part company.

On his western tour, Taft said: "We had better work towards a stabilization of wages and prices at some new level, perhaps 50 or 60 per cent above prewar." In New York he said: "Broadly speaking, the President is asking for two completely inconsistent policies at the same time. If we want the Marshall Plan, we cannot have lower prices."

Stassen takes no such dim view. He thinks prices can be pulled back down a bit. In two recent statements in New York he made these specific and constructive suggestions:

"We should re-establish consumer credit controls. . . . Second, we can put our foreign-aid program under a high caliber American agency which will safeguard the effects of foreign shipments on our American prices. . . . Third, the government should carry on a vigorous program against monopolies, hoarding and profiteering."

Stassen says the "save food" campaign program should be thoroughly backed and supported on the present voluntary basis.

Taft at New York said, "Look at the mess made of the voluntary food-saving program to carry out a highly desirable purpose." Later he said there should be a powerful appeal to consumers "to eat less and save their money and not spend it on food."

Taft has not fully outlined his ideas about tax reform, except to say that tax rates should be cut as "the best way to stop the spiral of inflation and relieve the condition of the lower income workers." He offers tax reduction as a substitute for another wage increase. But if the average \$2,500-a-year family man got a 30 per cent tax cut, the wage increase would be about 10 cents a day.

Stassen is for tax reduction, but he has worked out a major revision plan for the entire tax structure. First, he would limit taxes to 50 per cent of any income. Second, he would put a 1 1/2 per cent tax on big fortunes in idle capital. Third, he would give special benefits to small business. Finally, he would lower taxes, liberalize consumer credit and embark on government public works programs whenever unemployment became greater than six per cent of the labor force.

On housing, Taft and Stassen look through the same knothole. Taft's housing bill calls for large-scale public housing. Stassen agrees there must be government-built housing, but he wants it promptly sold to owner-occupants and private investors.

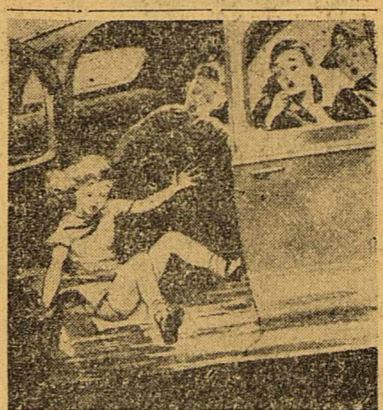
Earl Charlesworth Of Kermit Is Found Dead

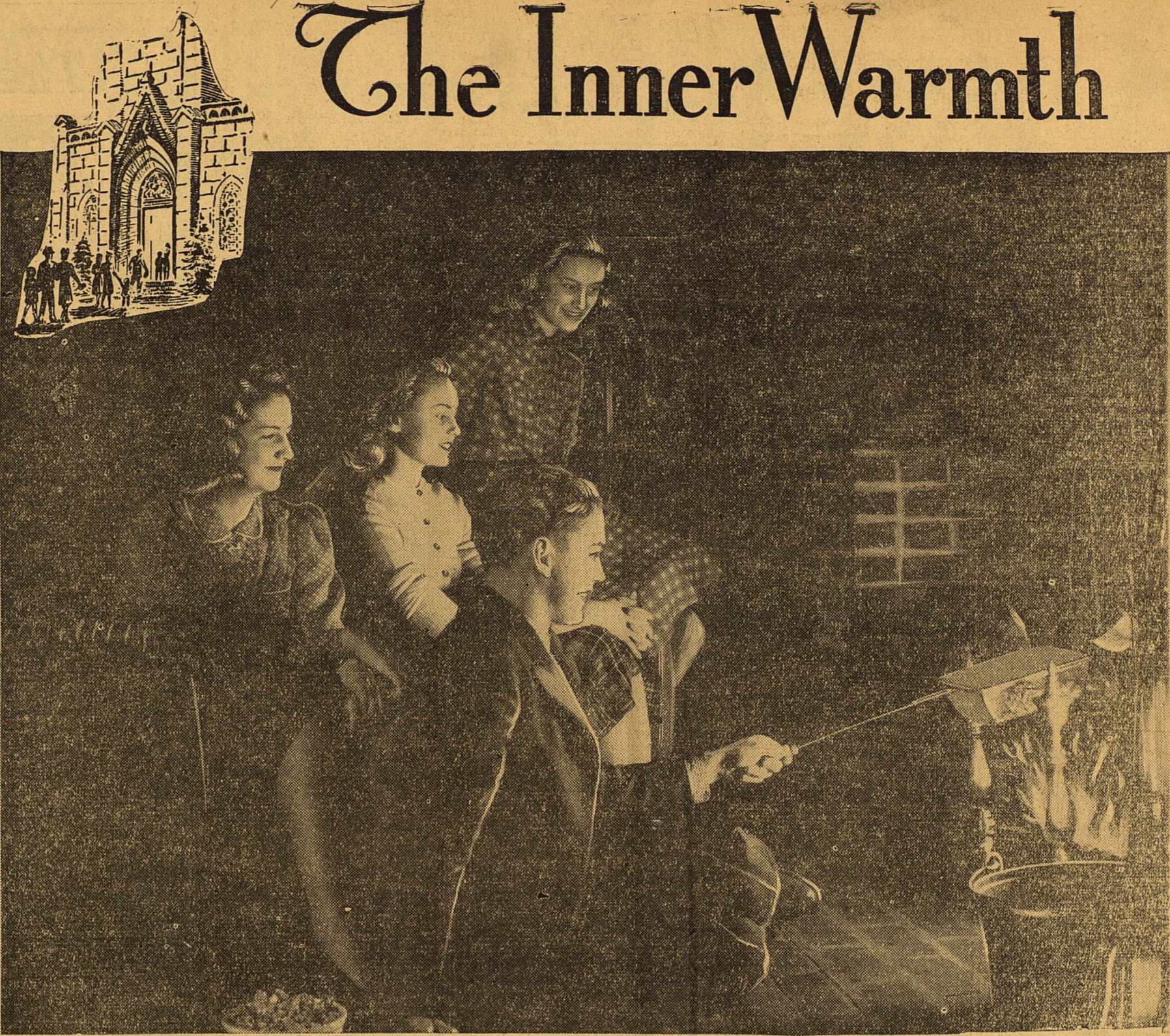

NEW YORK —(P)—Joe Louis risks his heavyweight championship for the 24th time in ten years Friday night, but if Jersey Joe Walcott can take it away from him it will be one of the ring's greatest upsets. Louis has nevertheless told intimate friends he wants to make the fight as short as possible, "maybe even one round." His public prediction is a dignified "I will win." A crowd of approximately 18,000, paying \$225,000, is expected at Madison Square Garden for Louis' only fight of the year, with the main bout starting at 10 p. m., EST, and scheduled for 15 rounds. Both Louis and Walcott are 33, and each is a negro. There the comparison ends. Odds One To 10 Betting has been light. Officially, the odds favoring Louis are one to 10. Anyone can put up \$6.00 for a chance of winning \$5.00 on whether or not Walcott comes out for the fifth round, with the bookmakers taking the advantage either way. Louis, at 219 pounds has about an 18 pound advantage over Walcott's six feet, and has two inches more of reach. Win or lose, Louis gets 45 per cent of the gate, or probably \$100,000, and Walcott gets 15 per cent.

According to the schedule all teams will play their opening games Friday night. The winners will meet in the semi-finals Saturday morning. Losers of the opening round will play Saturday afternoon, the championship, third place winner, and the consolation winner will be determined Saturday night.

Champion 'Risks' Title In Match With 'Jersey Joe'

NEW YORK —(P)—Joe Louis risks his heavyweight championship for the 24th time in ten years Friday night, but if Jersey Joe Walcott can take it away from him it will be one of the ring's greatest upsets. Louis has nevertheless told intimate friends he wants to make the fight as short as possible, "maybe even one round." His public prediction is a dignified "I will win." A crowd of approximately 18,000, paying \$225,000, is expected at Madison Square Garden for Louis' only fight of the year, with the main bout starting at 10 p. m., EST, and scheduled for 15 rounds. Both Louis and Walcott are 33, and each is a negro. There the comparison ends. Odds One To 10 Betting has been light. Officially, the odds favoring Louis are one to 10. Anyone can put up \$6.00 for a chance of winning \$5.00 on whether or not Walcott comes out for the fifth round, with the bookmakers taking the advantage either way. Louis, at 219 pounds has about an 18 pound advantage over Walcott's six feet, and has two inches more of reach. Win or lose, Louis gets 45 per cent of the gate, or probably \$100,000, and Walcott gets 15 per cent.

Schoolboys Start 'Big Push' Friday

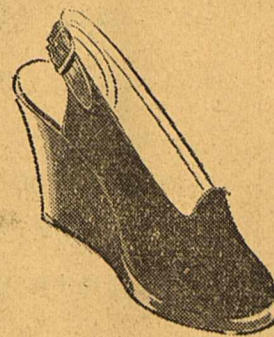

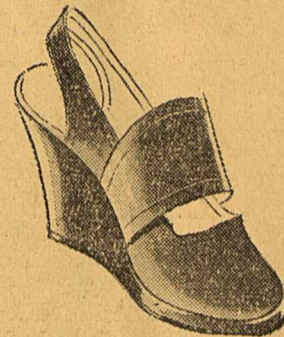

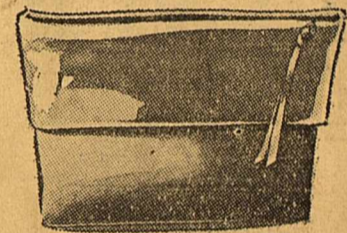
