

Stassen's Ideas

Now that Presidential Candidate Harold E. Stassen as written a book and made a lot of speeches, and now at Candidate Robert A. Taft has toured the west, made lot of speeches and thrown his hat in the ring, it's posible to compare their ideas. They're not as far apart as ou'd think. On some matters Stassen is more liberal than ne Democrats and on some others Taft is more progres- Meeting Scheduled ive than Stassen. On foreign policy they appear to be

On aid to Europe, Stassen, at Jefferson, Iowa, last May said: "I believe that for the next 10 years we should levote 10 per cent of our total national production of goods and food to building for worldwide peace and plenty

In his speech before the Ohio Society of New York, Taft said: "I think the figure suggested by the Harriman Committee is higher than is safe.'

Next day, at a Washington press conference, Taft said he was "absolutely opposed" to the \$2,600,000,000 requested by Secretary Marshall for immediate relief aid

o Western Europe. On the other top issue before the special session of Congress-high prices-Stassen and Taft both blame Trunan's veto of the "unworkable" price-control bill of 1946 or today's situation. And both oppose return to OPA price control and rationing. Beyond these two points, the wo candidates seem to part company.

On his western tour, Taft said: "We had better work writers are urged to attend. towards a stabilization of wages and prices at some new evel, perhaps 50 or 60 per cent above prewar." In New ork he said: "Broadly speaking, the President is asking or two completely inconsistent policies at the same time. To Dr. Holman Taylor we want the Marshall Plan, we cannot have lower

Stassen takes no such dim view. He thinks prices an be pulled back down a bit. In two recent statements New York he made these specific and constructive sugrestions

'We should re-establish consumer credit controls. second, we can put our foreign-aid program under a high aliber American agency which will safeguard the effects f foreign shipments on our American prices. . . . Third, he government should carry on a vigorous program st monopolies, hoarding and profiteering

Stassen says the "save food" campaign program hould be thoroughly backed and supported on the present

voluntary basis. Taft at New York said, "Look at the mess made of the voluntary food-saving program to carry out a highly desirable purpose." Later he said there should be a powerful appeal to consumers "to eat less and save their money and not spend it on food.'

Taft has not fully outlined his ideas about tax reform, except to say that tax rates should be cut as "the best way to stop the spiral of inflation and relieve the condition of the lower income workers." He offers tax reduction as a ubstitute for another wage increase. But if the average \$2,500-a-year family man got a 30 per cent tax cut, the wage increase would be about 10 cents a day.

Stassen is for tax reduction, but he has worked out a major revision plan for the entire tax structure. First, he would limit taxes to 50 per cent of any income. Second. ne would put a 1 1/2 per cent tax on big fortunes in idle apital. Third, he would give special benefits to small ousiness. Finally, he would lower taxes, liberalize conumer credit and embark on government public works programs whenever unemployment became greater than ix per cent of the labor force.

On housing, Taft and Stassen look through the same knothole. Taft's housing bill calls for large-scale public lousing. Stassen agrees there must be government-built housing, but he wants it promptly sold to owner-occupants and private investors.







Here is a hand that will be talked about for several weeks. There were many weird contracts, but the greatest freak was at Peter Leventritt's table when he passed his partner's one spade bid and ended up later bidding five spades. The interesting thing about the five spade bid was that it could be made unless West opened a diamond. Also, five hearts East and West was ice cold.

But the real thrill of the hand came with the contract of five diamonds which some North-South pairs got into, and which West doubled. Look the hand over and see if you can figure how to make five diamonds, assuming that East cashes the ace and king of spades, then shifts to the ace of hearts. The ace of hearts must be

Then dummy can be entered with a club.

If West does not trump the jack of spades, declarer must throw all three of his remaining clubs on the spades. A club is led and trumped by declarer, a small trump led to dummy's king of diamonds, and the nine of diamonds is played.

Declarer must be sure to keep the eight-spot so he can play it under the nine. Now all he has to do is lead a club from dummy, West will be forced to trump, and North can overtrump and pick up the queen. This is an interesting double
