

Wheat yields are good, but quality is below par

Wheat yields in the county were good this year, with several farmers harvesting crops of more than 100 bushels per acre. However, quality of the crop was generally below par, especially in protein content and weight.

Elevator operators report that the harvest is 95 to 100 percent complete.

Although hail and rain has cut the average yield and weeds have hindered the harvesting, the 1982 wheat crop is a big one. "As for the quantity," commented Bill Clark of Dimmitt Agri Industries, "more wheat was produced in the county than in the last 10 years, and the quality held out very good."

"The total volume was the biggest volume we had handled in 26 years; we were quite surprised at the amount that came in," said Bill Gregory of Castro County Grain.

Wheat price is same as in 1919

Sixty-three years ago, on July 3, 1919, the Ramey brothers started up the first combine to be used in Castro County. It was a McCormick thresher drawn by a team of eight mules.

They received \$3.23 per bushel for the wheat.

Ironically, that is about what farmers are receiving for their wheat this year as the price ranged from \$2.98 to \$3.40 per bushel during the harvest season.

Wheat prices have been declining gradually in recent years. On July 1, 1979, wheat was \$3.94 a bushel. On the same date the two following years the prices were \$3.56 and \$3.57. By July 1, 1982, the price had dropped to

\$3.25 a bushel.

Farmers eligible for the government reserve program may be able to break even or even make a small profit, local grainmen say. The majority of the other farmers are holding their wheat in hopes of being able to sell it at a higher price in the future.

This year's wheat crop seemed to be of average to good quality, although test weights and protein quality were both down.

All things considered, has the 1982 wheat crop been a money-maker for the farmers?

Most agree with Lynn Ehly of Star Grain at Nazareth, who said, "Oh heavenly days no, definitely not!"

County urges disaster program

The German visitors toured the Amstar Plant, Dimmitt Feed Yards, Taylor Feed Lot and Estacado Industries, Inc., and studied crops in the area.

The Castro County Commissioners Court passed a resolution Monday urging Gov. Clements and President Reagan to declare Castro County a natural disaster area.

Commissioner Edd Wilson presented the resolution at Monday's meeting of the court. The resolution stated that due to adverse weather such as hail, high winds and excessive rains, a disaster should be declared for all crops in the county, and requested that disaster relief funds should be allocated.

In other action, the commissioners gave STM Corp. of Houston a blanket permit to conduct geophysical testing on all Castro County roadways, with permission to operate on road surfaces if necessary.

Provisions of the agreement stated that STM must outfit its equipment with flashing warning lights and furnish flagmen to warn approaching traffic.

STM representative G. C. Bandy said the testing is part of a 500-mile testing program in Castro, Swisher and Briscoe Counties on behalf of Exxon, Gulf and Shell oil companies.

"We're looking for possible drilling sites," Bandy added. In other business, the court:

— Appointed election judges and alternates.

— Discussed the question of who will handle the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) program in the county.

— Decided to contact the county's insurer and the roofer who worked on the roof at Rhoads Memorial Library in 1980 to see what can be done about the leaks that have developed in the roof. Librarian Brick Autry told the commissioners that North Plains Roofers of Amarillo did the work.

— Agreed to see if the local Community Action office could handle the ordering and distribution of government surplus cheese, rather than the county being the "middle man."

— Asked County Attorney Jimmy Davis to look into the laws concerning the county's option of charging taxes on vending or video game machines operated in the county.

— Approved payment of a bill for \$6,591.10 from Precinct 2 to Plains Machinery of Lubbock for repairs. They also approved payment of all bills.

— Voted to send a \$20 memorial to the Heart Association in memory of area Highway Dept. Supervisor George Wall, who died recently.

Germans, locals air trade snags

"We realize there are trade problems between the United States and the European Economic Community (Common Market), and we want to try to solve some of these problems," the head of a German Parliament Agricultural Committee delegation told grainmen here last Thursday.

However, the five German men — four of whom are farmers and members of Parliament — seemed to have no apologies for the high protective tariffs that are keeping American feed grains out of the Common Market countries.

They defended the EEC's import tax levies of \$80.05 per metric ton on Milo, \$90.40 on corn and \$84.75 on wheat as a protective device for Europe's farmers, who they said are having a hard time making ends meet, too.

The High Plains grain-growing region was the first stop in a two-week tour that is also taking the German delegation to the vineyards and orchards of California, the soybean fields of Missouri and Illinois, the towers of trade in New York and the political corridors of Washington, D.C.

Hosting the German delegation in this area were the Texas Corn Growers Association, the Grain Sorghum Producers Association and the Texas Wheat Producers Association.

Heading the German delegation was Franz Sauter of the Christian Democratic Union. Others in the group were Josef Brunner of the Christian Social Union, Jan Oostergetelo of the Social Democratic Party, Gunter Bredehorn of the Free Democratic Party, and Otto Mally, assistant to the Liberal Party Parliamentary Group. They were accompanied to Dimmitt by Elbert Harp, executive director of the GSPA, and his

wife Clara.

The German visitors explained that, although their party affiliations were different, they agreed as farmers on most farm-program ideas.

During a steak luncheon with local agricultural leaders at K-Bob's Steak House, hosted by the TCGA, Sauter said he was "very impressed" with the farms the delegation had seen, and especially with "the risks in this business, with the very high interest rates and other factors."

"Although our conditions are very different, many of our problems are similar," Sauter said. "With the hails in June, your problems got

much worse.

"Although there are very big problems now, we hope all the farmers can stay on the land, maybe with a program by the government," Sauter said. "We know your fathers and grandfathers came through many problems on the land, and we hope you can, also."

During an afternoon orientation session in the boardroom of Dimmitt Agri Industries, Inc., TCGA President Carl King and DAI Manager Bill Clark presented the visitors with sample bottles of products and byproducts from the Dimmitt Amstar Plant — high fructose liquid sweetener, starch, gluten meal, germ, steep water and bran — and with sample corn growers' contracts and cost-price charts.

As the local men described the various corn products, the German visitors showed a special interest in the gluten meal, wondering if it were one of the stock-feed additives being "dumped" on the European market in competition with European-grown feed grains. King and Clark assured them that all the gluten meal produced locally goes into the domestic market as poultry and livestock feed.

King pointed out during the day that the EEC's import tax levies on corn, sorghum and wheat almost equal the domestic prices of these products and keep US grain out of the European market.

Using July 1982 figures, King explained that the Texas High Plains corn grower gets \$104.32 per metric ton for his

TCGA sets corn loss at 28% in this area

Tower of Texas and Pete Dominici of New Mexico, Congressman Kent Hance and Gov. Bill Clements within the past two weeks to urge disaster relief for the area's hail-stricken farmers.

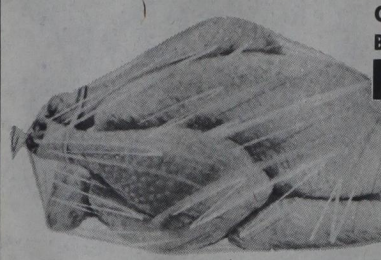

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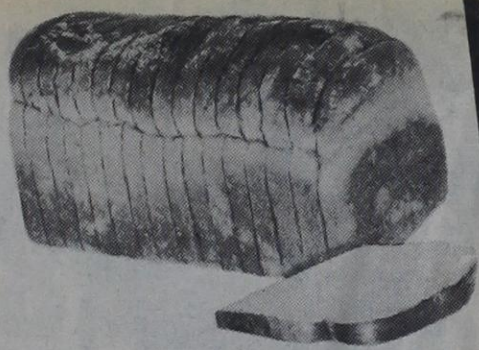

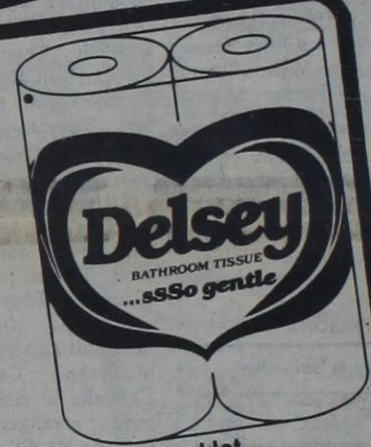

Pensions are paid to veterans totally and permanently disabled from circumstances unrelated to their military service. They are paid also to survivors of veterans who are in need. Unlike compensation paid to those disabled because of military service, pensions are affected by income from other sources.
The 600,000 who received increases in June (payable July 1) are those who are receiving benefits under the "improved" VA pension plan inaugurated by Congress in 1979. The plan links VA pension rates to adjustments in social security payments. Before the change, an individual's pension was subject to reduction each time social security increased.
Pensions for veterans and survivors under the "old plan" remain fixed and payable at rates in effect in 1978. But those rates are protected against reduction that would otherwise result from cost of living increases in their income from other sources.

There have been three VA pension plans and laws since WWII.

The first, from about 1948 to June 1960, called the "Protected Pension," had fixed rates for veterans, their surviving widows and children.

The second, effective from June 1960 to Dec. 31, 1978, is called the "Section 306 Pension"; and the third, called the "Improved Pension" began Jan. 1, 1979.

Rates in the first two plans are now frozen. Dependent on income limitations and other factors, it was — and for some it still is — to their advantage to remain under the former plans.

But now it will be of benefit for some to move forward to the new "Improved Pension," even if it was not so in preceding years. Once a later plan is chosen, one cannot return to a former plan.

Your service officer is prepared to assist pensioners in making decisions based on individual and family incomes from various sources and possible future income factors. Everyone's situation is different. Family medical expenses are also a factor to consider.

We have in our office tables of rates and needed information; so come and see us, or send a knowledgeable representative. It is difficult to give advice over the phone; but call on me about office hours, etc.

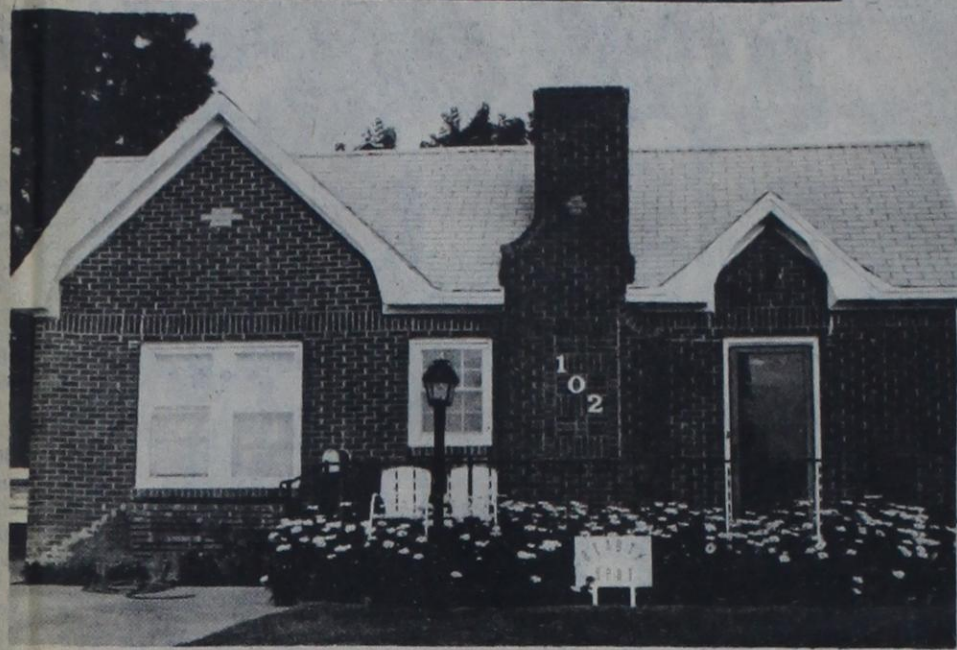

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Dimmitt man is working on governor's task force

Fred Bruegel Jr. of Dimmitt attended a meeting of the Governor's Task Force on Agriculture in Austin last week. It was the second of four meetings planned by the task force.

The first meeting was organizational in nature, and last week's meeting was for input. The next meeting will be for compiling a rough draft of agricultural goals, and the final meeting will be to approve a final draft for presentation to Gov. Bill Clements.

Bruegel was appointed to serve on the task force about three months ago. He will serve until the draft is turned over to the governor, probably in mid-September.

"This task force is analyzing marketing, water, energy, capital, production, transportation and land. These are our areas of study," Bruegel said.

He is serving on the marketing committee, he added. That committee will concentrate on six recommendations

that would require some form of legislation to enact.

They are:
- Market management education through universities, schools, extension agents and other sources.

- Export management and market development.

- Establishment of a South-west forum for better representation of Texas in agricultural policy and marketing.

Central Plains MHMR serves Castro County

The Central Plains Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center has 24-hour seven-day, on-call service to residents of Castro County as well as eight other counties.

The facility was begun in 1969 to work with the communities to develop, provide

and coordinate the delivery of mental health and developmental disability services so that persons who qualify can be afforded the opportunity to become healthy, contributing, self-sufficient citizens.

Each client of the center pays for the services based on a sliding scale according to his ability to pay.

The center's sources of funding in 1981-82 included state grant-in-aid, 63 percent; local, 22 percent; other state, 12 percent; and federal, three percent.

Central Plains MHMR recently requested that Castro County contribute \$3,520 in fiscal year 1982-83 beginning in September. That amount will generate \$20,706 from the state, according to Seth Halbert of Plainview.

Use of the various funds in the past year were in areas of mental health, 78 percent; alcohol abuse, 15 percent; mental retardation, four percent; and drug abuse, three percent.

The newest services added are the Homebound Educational Program for children from infancy through three years of age and the service to rest homes providing music and occupational therapies.

Mental health outpatient services are provided through seven locations within the nine counties served by the Center. The Family Service Center in Dimmitt is located at 306 West Bedford and is open between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Genell Craig is employed in the local office, and Carol Lantz of Dimmitt serves on the Center's board of trustees.

Father Harold Waldow, a priest of the Diocesan Order, is the new pastor of the Holy Family Church in Nazareth and the mission of St. John's Church in Hart.

Consider safety first in lakeside excursions

A thermos bottle or ice chest could save a drowning person's life this summer, a Texas Safety Association officer said recently.

Many drownings which occur close to the shore can be prevented by quick action, even if the rescuer has no lifesaving training, according to TSA's Vice President for Home and Leisure Activities, Nelson Mueller.

"This summer, while many families are enjoying water sports, drownings can be prevented by action of those on the shore," said Mueller.

"Persons on shore can help swimmers in trouble by providing them with flotation devices," Mueller said. "It only takes 12 pounds of buoyancy to hold a 180 pound person's head out of water," he added.

"When you see someone in trouble you can throw him or her your coffee thermos because it adds buoyancy which could save a life," Mueller said. Other items likely to be near on a summer outing like a closed fishing tackle box or an ice chest can also be used to save a life. And, of course, a pair of long pants inflated and tied off at the legs and waist can also provide lifesaving buoyancy.

These lifesaving tips come from the U. S. Coast Guard Auxiliary in Texas as a reminder that those on lakeside excursions need not stand idly by while a swimmer or boater drowns close to shore.

Indoor pollutants are a hidden health threat. Are they conquering your home's air?

If so, clean up your air, advised Dr. Jane Berry, a housing and home furnishings specialist on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Indoor pollutants that are potential hazards for humans include carbon dioxide, carbon monoxide, formaldehyde gas, ultraviolet light waves, other chemical vapors, dust, pollen and tobacco smoke, she said.

Berry recommended three methods for controlling indoor pollution. They are:

—Allow enough fresh outside air to come inside to dilute indoor pollutants by using an air-to-air heat exchange system to pre-heat or pre-cool outside air. As the system pre-heats or pre-cools outside air, it saves energy that would otherwise be used by your main cooling or heating system — and it cleans your inside air. This system is a small supplemental device available from many heating and cooling companies.

—Bring outside air indoors with adequate ventilation — this could be eave vents or simply the occasional opening of windows and doors.

—Use filters, air cleaners and heating or cooling coils to remove smoke, odors and other pollutants.

YOUR CITY AT WORK

All cities are faced with the nuisance of neglected or poorly maintained private property. Our City is certainly no exception. We have numerous homes and vacant lots throughout the City which are a source of constant neglect. Weeds, trash, and debris have been allowed to accumulate on some private property throughout the City. When this condition is allowed to continue for a period of several years a City can take on a whole new and unattractive appearance.

On May 18, 1981 the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen adopted an ordinance to put a stop to this ever increasing problem. As your City Manager it is my responsibility to see that this ordinance is upheld and carried out for the benefit of all City residents. I am therefore taking this opportunity to publicly advise all owners of neglected property that appropriate action will be taken to abate this problem within the City. I know that this problem did not develop overnight, and I am certain that it will not be eliminated overnight.

Property owners as a rule do have the right to do whatever they choose with their property as long as they conform to City codes and ordinances. These codes and ordinances have been adopted to protect the rights and privileges of all our residents and to make Dimmitt a better place to live.

I think it is time that we all take voluntary action to clean up our own property and maintain it on a regular basis. This also includes the City. City personnel will be cutting weeds and mowing City property in an effort to do our part in keeping Dimmitt clean. I hope that the citizens of Dimmitt will support this voluntary effort themselves, as well as asking their neighbors who are responsible for neglecting property to read this article. In an effort to inform the general public on the contents of this ordinance, I will be printing certain sections of the ordinance in upcoming July articles. This article will cover sections I through V of the ordinance which reads as follows:

Ordinance No. 386
Stagnant Water, Weeds, Filth on Private Property Ordinance

Section I. "It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, who shall own or occupy any lot or lots in the City of Dimmitt, Texas, to permit or allow holes, or places on said lots where water may accumulate and become stagnant or to permit same to remain."

Section II. "It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation, who shall own or occupy any lot or lots in the City of Dimmitt, Texas, to permit or allow the accumulation of stagnant water thereon or to permit same to remain."

Section III. "It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, who shall own or occupy any house, building, establishment, lot or yard

in the City of Dimmitt, Texas, to permit or allow any carrion, filth or other impure or unwholesome matter to accumulate or remain thereon."

Section IV. "It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, who shall own or occupy any lot or lots in the City of Dimmitt, Texas, to allow weeds, rubbish, junk, brush, or other unsightly, objectionable, or unsanitary matter to accumulate or grow on said lot or lots."

Section V. "No owner of any lot, place or area within the City of Dimmitt, Texas, or the agent of such owner shall permit on such lot, place or area; or upon any sidewalk abutting same or any alley abutting the same; any such weeds, grass or deliterious, unhealthy growth, or other noxious vegetable matter that may be growing, lying or located thereon, or any such hole, place or stagnant water, all as herein above defined and set out; and any such weeds, grass or deliterious, unhealthy growth, or other noxious vegetable matter that may be growing, lying or located on any such lot, place or area, when same shall be of such density, height or quantity as to constitute a menace and hazard to the health and well-being of this community, or any such hole, place or stagnant water is hereby declared to be a public nuisance."

Property owners who are responsible for the accumulation of weeds and debris will be receiving written notification in the mail, which will allow them ten (10) days in which to clean up their property. Property owners who choose not to take this voluntary action within the specified time may be fined from \$1.00 to \$200.00 per day until such time that the problem is abated.

I certainly hope that all citizens will take voluntary action to clean up their property. The City has no desire to take any unpleasant action; however, we will take whatever legal action which is necessary to see that the provisions of this ordinance are carried out.

corn after deducting \$11 for nine months of storage and interest — a net price that's less than the average cost of production — and that the export price at the Texas Gulf is \$137.81. But the EEC's protective tariff barrier of \$90.40 per metric ton pushes the EEC entry-level price of Texas-grown corn to \$222.90 in Europe.

The Germans said there are trade barriers "to be found on both sides" — fruit, poultry, dairy products, meats and commodities. One of the main purposes of their visit, they said, was to seek solutions to some of these trade problems.

School board 'holds off'

Among uncertainty over the district's tax values, the Dimmitt School Board has declined all bids on a proposed new steer barn and held a budget workshop during a special meeting.

The board cannot set the tax rate yet. Supt. Robert Ryan said that school trustees must wait until the tax appraisal district completes its re-evaluation and holds its equalization board meeting Aug. 22 before they can determine how much property value can base their taxing on and what tax rate they can levy.

Because of the uncertainty over the budget, the board decided to put off building the steer barn for the FFA. Bids for the project that had been received included \$19,500 for the building, \$6,300 for concrete work, \$2,000 for electrical work and materials and \$6,000 for construction of pens and other items inside and outside the building, a total of about \$33,800.

The FFA has \$9,700 on hand in certificates of deposit to go toward the project, but board members agreed that the project must wait until more funds are available.

"We'd like to have at least half of the cost on hand before beginning such a project," Ryan said. He added that the FFA might continue working on various money-making projects.

The board tentatively set Aug. 26 at 7 p.m. for the annual public budget hearing. The budget must be completed and in effect before Aug. 31.

Also, in view of money uncertainty, the trustees voted down the optional 40% exemption for homesteads, saying that they would continue to grant the current \$5,000 regular homestead exemption and the \$10,000 homestead exemption for those who are over 65 or disabled.

Financial Administrator Gene King told the board that the farm implement and livestock exemptions already granted by the legislature could conceivably cost the district as much as a \$75,000 loss in tax revenue. He

estimated that the additional homestead exemption could have brought a \$115,000 loss of revenue.

The board accepted a proposal from Honeywell, Inc. to conduct a technical survey of the heating systems in the elementary, middle and high school buildings.

Honeywell will furnish labor and equipment to perform an infrared scan on boilers, inspect and test boiler controls and burners, test and calibrate temperature controls, inspect and test hot water and condensate pumps, perform thorough analysis on Honeywell electric panel and night set-back controls, inspect and test Lennox rooftop units, and test and calibrate temperature controls and related components such as air conditioner compressors.

The total for all three schools will be \$6,586. A final detailed report and repair estimates will be submitted to the school within three weeks after completion of the survey.

A transportation report which Ryan showed to board members revealed that the conversion of several buses to LP gas usage last year saved the school enough money to pay for the conversion equipment, cover the extra mileage brought about by instituting the East Dimmitt bus route and still cost \$2,000 less than the previous year in total fuel expense.

A food service report showed that, with \$336,606.37 spent for the school lunch program for 1981-82 and revenue of \$314,728.51, the loss of \$21,877.86 was offset by an inventory gain of \$4,976.79, bringing the net loss to \$16,901.07.

"This loss could almost be called satisfactory after the \$33,070.11 total loss we experienced for the 1980-81 school year," Ryan said. He added that the paid lunch prices may not have to be increased, at least for a little while.

In other business, the board:

—Adopted as formal policy the standard procedures used for handling student activity

funds. The board also adopted the Texas Education Association-mandated procedures for handling of funds such as from the sale of school pictures, school supplies and soft drinks, and money raised through projects sponsored by outside groups in support of activities on campus. These funds must be accounted for as general fund expenditures.

—Voted to purchase a new 54-passenger bus, with delivery scheduled for sometime in the spring.

—Named Deanne Clark as the official voting delegate to the Texas Association of School Boards convention in San Antonio in October, with Don Gregory as alternate.

—Accepted the resignations of Janet Bradshaw, high school English, and Ruby Teaschner, kindergarten, and hired 11 people including Linda Lowe, Kay Gfeller and Karen Moss, all of Dimmitt.

LEAF rust took a heavy toll of this year's Texas wheat crop, particularly in central and southern areas, said a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Losses run 50 percent or more in some areas. Leaf rust is a perennial disease problem but was particularly damaging this year because of a new race (type) that infected normally resistant varieties, a large increase in wheat acreage in southern areas that allowed rust spores to develop early and spread northward, and almost ideal weather conditions. To reduce potential problems next year, farmers should plant several different wheat varieties, use fungicides if necessary, and plant later if wheat will not be grazed.

TCGA's seven-county "check-off area" — the state's main corn-producing region — 116,451 of the 421,431 acres planted to corn have been ruined by hail.

The counties include Castro, Deaf Smith, Hale, Parmer, Swisher, Bailey and Lamb.

Hardest-hit, King reported, is the biggest corn-producing county, Parmer, where 141,000 acres were planted to corn and 70,000 acres have been hailed out.

Damage estimates in other counties are Castro, 10,000 of 85,120 planted acres damaged; Lamb, 14,040 of 47,040 planted acres damaged; Deaf Smith, 6,150 of 41,031 planted acres damaged; Swisher, 2,467 of 16,450 planted acres damaged; and Bailey, 11,000 of 35,000 planted acres damaged.

After meeting with Gov. Clements in Lubbock Monday, King commented, "The governor is well-versed in the problems of agriculture, and has a top aide in Jarvis Miller, former president of Texas A&M. Of course, there's not a whole lot the governor can do except to be sure to be in Washington to testify on behalf of the state's farmers when the time comes."

King said he's tried to make the same point with all the officials who have been in the area to survey the damaged crops.

"I've asked them, 'Do you get the significance of what's taking place here?' and told them, 'The point is that if we had had a good farm bill to start with, the farmers could have ridden this thing out,'" King said.
