made a neat defensive play in today's hand.

South's four and five no trump bids were Blackwood, and North's responses of five hearts and six diamonds showed two aces and

Declarer won the opening diamond lead with the king and led the ten of clubs. He did not have much of a problem. He had five heart tricks, two diamonds, the ace and king of spades and four club tricks. He could even take the spade finesse and get another trick. He decided to take the double club finesse, and when he put on the nine from dummy, the average East player would have won with the jack and led back a diamond.

Not Clarren. He won the trick with the king of clubs, and re-turned a diamond. Declarer won this in dummy, returned to his hand with a heart and played the six of clubs.

Why should he go up with dummy's ace now? East could not have the jack, otherwise he would not have played the king on the first club trick. So declarer put on the eight-spot from dummy, Clarren won with the jack and cashed three good diamond tricks. Six no trump went down four tricks.


